LITERACY RENOVATION PROJECT



CSDA LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Friday, February 1, 2002

WORKERS' COMPENSATION UPDATE

The new, major workers' compensation legislation was amended into Assembly Bill 749 (Calderon) late Thursday afternoon. The amendments, which become the bill, are 94 pages in length and contain the agreement forged by Governor Davis with labor and the applicant attorneys. As of this writing, it is expected the Senate and Assembly will pass the measure next week and the Governor will sign very shortly thereafter.

LEGISLATURE CUTS CURRENT YEAR BUDGET

With remarkable speed, the Legislature this week responded to the Governor's proposed current year budget reductions and cut or suspended some \$2.2 billion in expenditures. While helpful, the anticipated deficit for the 2002-03 state budget remains around \$12 billion and virtually all members of the Legislature agree closing that deficit gap will be very difficult.

SALES TAX SHARING LEGISLATION ADVANCES

As reported in last week's Legislative Update, Assembly Bill 680 by Assembly Member Steinberg continues to move and on Wednesday the Assembly approved the bill by a 41 to 29 vote, sending the measure to the Senate. AB 680 has become one of the most controversial bills of the session and is opposed by the League of California Cities, builders, and realtors, among others, and supported by organized labor, environmental groups, Sacramento County, and others. While the bill relates to sharing sales tax revenues within the Sacramento region, there is talk that other revenues may be discussed, including property tax revenues. CSDA will continue to monitor AB 680 with great care to ensure that independent special districts' revenues are not included.

SENATE LOCAL GOVERNMENT COMMITTEE HEARING

Also noted in last week's Legislative Update was notice of an informational hearing the Senate Local Government Committee will conduct on February 20, 2002. In his letter inviting CSDA to present testimony at the hearing, Committee Chair Torlakson wrote in part: "I invite you to recommend state mandated local programs that the Legislature should suspend or repeal. We also welcome your recommendations that would give local officials more flexibility to cope with our shared budget problems."

This is a great opportunity for CSDA to provide the Committee with ideas and suggestions relative to state mandated local programs and/or ideas that would provide you with more flexibility to manage the affairs of your districts. Stop, thief

Major reform is needed to deal with state's siphoning of local funds

LAST time the state's economy hit the skids, lawmakers in Sacramento balanced the state's budget by siphoning off funds from cities and counties.

Although first cast as temporary, that annual raid continues. Attempts to stop the flow, or cap the annual amount, have failed to pass either the Legislature or the governor's desk.

Now the locals are fighting back. A proposed state constitutional amendment was filed Tuesday to stop future state grabs.

City council members and county supervisors are justified in being fed up with Sacramento capriciousness. How much will San Jose or Fremont or Redwood City have to cut library hours, or postpone road repair, or pare down staff as the state takes away revenue? How can cities and counties plan ahead if no one knows whether Sacramento will help itself to more local property taxes?

San Mateo County Supervisor Jerry Hill lashed out at the Legislature after he was installed as county board president last week. He wants the state to reimburse the \$715 million it has taken over 10 years from his county.

Similarly, Sacramento has siphoned \$1.2 billion each from Santa Clara and Alameda counties, and the annual amount keeps growing.

But even in good years, proposals for the state to give the money back went nowhere.

The proposed constitutional amendment, if it qualifies for the ballot and passes in November, would merely stop additional diversions of funds. It wouldn't reimburse local government for what's already been taken, nor prevent the annual \$4 billion transfer the state now relies on

Preventing further unpredictable shifts to the state makes sense. But the initiative attacks only one angle of a complex problem -- the nonsensical way of financing local government.

Once upon a time cities and counties, along with school districts, set their own tax rates and controlled their own budgets. That independence diminished, unintentionally, with the Proposition 13 tax revolt. Now Sacramento calls the shots.

Another unintended result is the proliferation of retail and industrial development, which enriches local coffers with sales-tax dollars, as opposed to housing, which is badly needed but is a fiscal drain.

Occasional tirades, especially from a normally mild-mannered supervisor such as Hill, remind people that badly needed services are at stake in this finance game. Who knows, perhaps the combined hollering from local Jerry Hills, and that threatened ballot initiative, scared Gov. Gray Davis away from suggesting another revenue raid to bail out the state next year.

That's a relief. But what's really needed is not an initiative aimed at part of the problem, but a major effort to reform local government financing to enable long-range planning, offer incentives for sensible growth and more equitably cut up the fiscal pie.

SUBCOMMITTEES VOTE TO RESTORE \$7.9 MILLION PLF CUT

In November, we alerted you to a package of proposed cuts by Governor Gray Davis, which included a \$7.9 million cut to the Public Library Foundation, in the <u>current year 2001-02 budget</u>. This cut would be in addition to the \$3.9 million cut made by the Governor when he signed the Budget in July. Subsequent to his November announcement, CLA sent letters to the legislative leadership, Budget chairs and Budget subcommittee chairs in each house, and urged you to do the same, requesting that the \$7.9 million be restored. Recently, several legislative offices told us that your letters to them on this subject were voluminous in number and well received. It appears that CLA's efforts may have paid off this morning during an unprecedented joint hearing of the Senate and Assembly Budget Subcommittees on Education Finance.

Senate Subcommittee Chair, Jack O'Connell, and Assembly Subcommittee Chair, Joe Simitian conducted the meeting, which lasted approximately one hour. Flanked by subcommittee members, the two Chairs of the Senate and Assembly Budget Committee, and other interested parties from the education committee, Chairman O'Connell noted that there had been "extensive negotiations going on between the two houses...which produced a working document." Chairman Simitian added that the subcommittees had been able to make certain substituted cuts in order to be able to save programs that were contained in the Governor's cut proposal. When he announced that one of the items to be saved from cuts would be the Public Library Foundation, he added, "It is a small amount, but a high return on the money because it is an important program." The subcommittee found savings in some of the Governor's Initiative programs such as teaching priority block grants, teacher performance

awards, and Reading and Math professional development for teachers.

The representative from the Department of Finance thanked the subcommittees for their "quick efforts. We are very appreciative of you retaining a certain dollar amount. However, we are concerned with the character of the programs you want to swap. We need a couple of days to review." Later, she added, "Most are one-time savings in cuts (affecting the current budget year 2001-02), but the ones you want to restore are ongoing." Senate Budget Chair, Steve Peace, argued that the education proposal did not produce a legitimate savings, as the commitment to ongoing programs would contribute to bigger headaches down the road in 2002-03 negotiations. Said Chair Simitian, "I respectfully have a different characteristic of this. I would rather honor contracts and commitments than tell people that we were 'just kidding' about the level of the appropriation…and have to take the money back." Chair Simitian also expressed interest, along with Chair O'Connell in assuming the cut restorations will be one-time in nature, and that the discussion as to their importance and need will begin again in the Spring during the traditional budget discussions.

In the end, in a bi-partisan effort, and through a cooperative agreement in each house, both subcommittees voted to restore the \$7.9 million for the PLF. The Senate and the Assembly took a separate vote on the package, as they must send both a Senate vehicle and an Assembly vehicle forward through the process, similar to the Budget bill process. If all items reconcile between each house, then there will be no need to convene a Budget Conference Committee for this purpose. The bills will likely be ratified by each House next Monday, with the bills headed to their respective Floors later in the week. Please note that this action on the PLF is not final. Legislative leaders and ultimately the Governor will have final say on the "cut package." Nonetheless, today's developments are certainly a critical and important step in staving off a potentially large blow to local library budgets.

LEGISLATIVE LULL

Following the frantic pace of activity during January, wherein all two-year bills had to pass their house of introduction, the Legislature is in a pre-March Primary election lull. The deadline to introduce legislation for this year is February 22 and we do not anticipate much legislative activity until after the March Primary election.

GOVERNOR TO SIGN WORKERS' COMPENSATION BILL

According to the Capitol Press Corps, Governor Davis will sign Assembly Bill 749 this afternoon in Los Angeles. Despite strong opposition from public and private employers, the Governor's action was anticipated. AB 749 becomes operative on January 1, 2003, and every district should have their workers' compensation specialists become familiar with the bills provisions.

RECENTLY INTRODUCED LEGISLATION

ASSEMBLY BILL 1925(NAKANO): This bill would declare the intent of the Legislature to enact legislation, provided Proposition 40 on the March Primary Ballot passes, to make available \$30 million of those bond funds to the California Ocean Trust, for allocation to the California Sea Grant Program for the purpose of carrying out a grant program to fund storm water-related research.

ASSEMBLY BILL 1927(KEHOE): This bill would enact the Neighborhood Infrastucture Bond Act of 2002, which, if passed, would authorize the issuance for the purpose of financing a program to address local infrastructure needs of bonds in the amount of \$6 billion.

<u>SENATE BILL 1384(COSTA):</u>This bill is cited as The Water Omnibus Act of 2002 and permits the Department of Water Resources to make grants from the California Safe Drinking Water Fund for the purpose of financing domestic water system improvement projects to meet state and federal drinking water standards.

SENATE BILL 1386(PEACE): The California Public Records Act requires state and local agencies to make public records available upon receipt of a request that reasonably describes an indentifiable record not otherwise exempt from disclosure by express provisions of law, and upon payment of fees to cover costs. Existing law also requires agencies to enact and maintain a permanent privacy policy that includes, among other provisions, a means for protecting personal data the agency collects against unauthorized disclosure. SB 1386 would specify that the provision requiring a privacy policy is among those express provisions of law that may exempt a public record disclosure.

<u>SENATE BILL 1385(BRULTE)</u>: This bill would declare the Legislature's intent that state and local agencies should develop and promote programs that create incentives for existing and new customers to install new water conserving devices and landscapes to reduce water usage.

Subject: Update – LAFCO/Special District Activities

Dear Ms. Matheis.

As the special district representatives to LAFCO, we believe that a recap of LAFCO-related activities regarding special districts in 2001 would be beneficial to ISDOC members. The largest and most visible issue affecting LAFCO last year was the Legislature's passage of AB 2838 (Chapter 761, Statutes of 2000). effective July 1, 2001. This new law completely rewrote the Cortese-Knox Act of 1985. Below are key changes of importance to special districts:

- Requiring all LAFCOs to be independent of their respective counties (staffing, facilities, budget, etc.)
- Requiring LAFCO's beneficiaries, the county, cities and special districts to equally share in the funding of LAFCO's budgetary costs
- Requiring LAFCOs to conduct comprehensive, regional studies of municipal services ("service reviews") every five years in conjunction with the review of spheres of influence, and
- Comprehensively rewriting LAFCO's governing law in a clear, concise and comprehendible manner

In response to AB 2838, OCLAFCO adopted new budget and finance policies and procedures. As part of this effort, LAFCO staff coordinated with all special districts, cities, and the County Auditor to determine split funding shares for the FY 01-02 LAFCO budget as required by state law. The current LAFCO budget, adopted by the Commission in June 2001, is a static budget, reflecting a two percent inflation factor from the previous year. Although there are new and substantial work demands on LAFCO because of AB 2838, staffing has also remained static.

Service Reviews

Service reviews will continue to be a Commission priority in 2002 as the legislature has mandated completion of all service reviews within 5 years. LAFCOs are required to conduct service reviews, in conjunction with sphere of influence reviews. Service reviews require LAFCO to look regionally at the myriad municipal service needs and at the capacity of cities and districts to meet those needs over the next 10 to 20 years. The Governor's Office of Planning and Research is scheduled to release service review guidelines for LAFCOs in February 2002. We have been monitoring the progress of the State office and believe that OCLAFCO may better serve both cities and special districts by adopting its own guidelines and policies – tailored specific to the uniqueness of Orange County.

As your special districts representatives, we have taken a keen interest in leading OCLAFCO towards balanced and reasoned policies. Both Charlie Wilson and John Withers assumed a leadership role on this issue and now sit on the four-member LAFCO committee overseeing the development of the Commission policies and guidelines. We will keep you informed as this very important issue unfolds. We anticipate Commission adoption of service reviews policies and procedures in spring 2002.

Water District Study

The El Toro Water District Study is a key project affecting special districts this year. Four cities (Lake Forest, Mission Viejo, Laguna Woods, Laguna Hills) and four special districts (El Toro Water District, Santa Margarita Water District, Moulton Niguel Water District, Irvine Ranch Water District) are participating in a study and analysis to assess the reorganization or consolidation options of their respective organizations. The Commission accepted the offer by El Toro Water District and Rancho Santa Margarita Water District to develop the scope of work and to manage the study. The final report is due to LAFCO next month.

Strategic Planning

LAFCO is scheduled to consider and adopt its 2002 Strategic Plan. The hearing is scheduled on Thursday, January 31 at 9:00 a.m. at the Orange County Sanitation District offices. At this meeting, the Commission will set its priorities for the upcoming year.



The State Library is interested in the areas of your program that you find most significant. This includes both successful and unsuccessful events, methods, materials and other components.

Significant successes:

The Placentia Library Literacy Services (PLLS) was tremendously successful the first half of this fiscal year, particulary in recruiting and matching additional adult learners with volunteer tutors. The total number of adult learners receiving instruction by the end of December 2001 increased by more than thirty (30) percent as compared to those receiving instruction at the end of December 2000. This increase has occurred mostly as the result of additional volunteer tutors due to an increase in tutor training workshops. During the first six months of Fiscal Year 2001-02, PLLS conducted a total of twelve (12) workshops, an increase of 10 percent over Fiscal Year 2000-01. PLLS was excited to add another component to our literacy services in late October, the English Language and Literacy Intensive (ELLI) program. We hired a new full-time staff member, Ann-Margaret Webb, as our ELLI Coordinator, and in a little over two months, she has demonstrated a superb ability to organize staff and outreach in the community.

Problems, challenges, and unresolved issues:

PLLS has no problems or unresolved issues. The biggest challenge that we will probably always face is recruiting and retaining volunteer tutors. We have an adult waiting list of nearly 100 learners, and we simply don't have enough tutors to significantly reduce that list. PLLS will continue to recruit tutors through a variety of media resources: the local newpaper, the local cable TV channel, flyers, and other community outreach.

Anything you would like to share that other CLC programs could use:

While the PLLS Families for Literacy (FFL) has not increased in size, it has matured and grown. In our FFL component, whenever possible, we utilize the team-tutoring concept. For each family we have two tutors: one for the mother or father; and one for the child/children. This allows the parent/s to have relatively undisrupted tutoring session and it also allows the child/children the opportunity to read or be read to at each session. We've found that the "Leapfrog Leap into Literacy" series works extremely well with preschoolers.

- 1. Hours for patron service in the History Room are 6-9 pm Mondays and Wednesdays. We three volunteers are staffing the room at those hours. Typically, on Monday's we rotate our coverage by assigning one of us to cover; however, on Wednesday's generally we are all three there.
- 2. We are pleased to report that patrons are accessing the room and have a positive reaction.
- 3. Recently, on separate occasions, two members of the Tuffree family (Judy Krouse and Mike Fleming) have visited; each has made a commitment to augment our current scanty holdings on that pioneer family with materials currently in their possession. Some of these materials will be photocopied in order for the family member to retain the originals.
- 4. With the semester finished, we no longer have CSUF grad student activity occurring. We are awaiting the receipt of the completed student reports from DR. deGraaf, instructor of the Public History Graduate level class. One report, however, has been filed which represents survey data analysis of the recent Historic Room Tour.
- 4. Placentia History Room Advisory Committee will meet in the very near future. (The scheduled January meeting was postponed because of a city event which caused a conflict for several of the members.) The group will review our goals, collection policy and determine needed priorities.
 - 5. We continue to contribute to Mayor Chris Lowe's desire to create and publish a new children's book on the history of our city. Carpenter's A CHILD'S HISTORY OF PLACENTIA, is currently the standard; each of us has written stories for the proposed new child-centered book which would have an historical-based story format.
 - 6. Both of Carpenter's books (adult and children) are available for sale at the History Room, with the proceeds accruing directly to the City's Historical Committee.
 - 7. Marie Schmidt is writing a revised edition of a Vic Michel book $PLACENTIA\ STREE\ NAMES$ identifying those for whom streets were named. This requires research in the History Room archives as well as contact with long-time members of the community

- 8. A custom-made display cabinet has been completed to hold the adobe bricks salvaged from the Ontiveros Adobe at the time of its demolishment. (Dave Snow was farsighted in saving these). It will be placed at the History Room entrance. Above the cabinet, we will hang a framed piece designed by Marie Schmidt showing photos of the Ontiveros owners along with picture of the adobe residence and one taken during its destruction. (An historic marker on south side of Crowther Avenue, between Bradford and Kraemer marks its former location.)
- 9. Storage cabinets in the Work Room area are being painted by a voluneer, Jerry Jertberg.
- 10. Routine organizational tasks continue to be consume time. With the assistance of several student volunteers, an important archival task is in progress. Using the proper archival materials, the volunteer is transferring the materials and labelling properly. This collection was donated by a former Placentia Courier photographer who had each carefully labeled as to subject and date; we are taking the next step to assure their preservation.
- 11. Two microfische cabinets containing important information will need to be located near our room for patron access (to be used when we obtain a reader and printer). Space is not available within the History Room.
- 12. A consultant is needed to advise on software appropriate to our needs. The need is not only related to software acquisition but to programming for our collections. The consultant is needed to advise as well on legalities related to digitizing text and photo materials. (when the equipment is acquired)
- 13. We continue to do outreach into the community, keeping in contact with community individuals and groups interested in historic preservation. Additionally, at opportune times, we urge residents to assist in filling the need for photos and text related to our ethnic communities. Also we have urged Placentia organizations to create their own archival collections or to make PHR their archival depository. So far, no action, just some verbal agreement.
 - 12. Work with the PYLUSD continues preparing materials for the third grade local history requirement. We have directly contributed all information on Placentia, assisted with Yorba Linda, Brea, and Fullerton's information. Meetings held with district staff indicate that computerization of text is underway and production of materials is not far off.
 - 13. We expect in the near future to have Placentia History Timeline on display; this is being done by Michael Schmidt.
 - 14. Photos, paintings, displays are in evidence everywhere. Thanks to Elizabeth.

BACKGROUND:

Attachment A is a letter from Orange County Auditor-Controller David E. Sundstrom to the Orange County Board of Supervisors providing his estimate, by jurisdiction, of the initial and ongoing impact of the Two Percent Assessment Appeals Case.

Neither Orange County nor the Independent Special Districts of Orange County have recommended any specific action to local jurisdictions.

The initial impact (one-time cost) of the property tax refund for Placentia Library District in Fiscal Year 2001-2002 would be \$129,228.22. For each year the refund is delayed the amount would increase by approximately \$66,000, plus interest. Placentia Library District is listed on page 7 of 9 of Attachment A.

The ongoing impact (permanent loss) on future revenue would be a loss of \$65,913.61 per year.

As of Wednesday, February 13 the news from the Orange County Auditor's Office, Neal Gruber, was that the court is supposed to make a ruling in early March on whether to make the lower court opinion a class action. The Board of Supervisors has left the decision on whether and when to formally appeal the lower court ruling to the Orange County Assessor and that he appears to be waiting for the ruling on the class action. There is a possibility that if the class action is denied that the one case will be paid out and everyone else who is eligible for a similar refund would be forced to file individual lawsuits which, given the small amounts of individual return, is somewhat unlikely because the cost of individual lawsuits would outweigh the return of tax dollars.

Two Percent Assessment Appeals Case

My letter to County Counsel Ben De Mayo dated December 19, 2001, provided an initial estimate of the impact of the two percent assessment appeals case on various categories of taxing entities. We have prepared the attached schedule that shows estimates of the refunds to be recovered and continuing reductions from each agency compared to an estimate of their next largest secured tax apportionment that will be made in April 2002. This was done to assist Board members and the officials of the impacted agencies in planning for *possible* refunds that could be ordered by a court. Please note that we have no immediate plans to escrow the funds – the schedule was produced only to measure potential impacts. The schedule also shows the amount of net tax that would be distributed to the individual agencies after allowing for refunds on a "going forward" basis. Even if refunds are not ordered by a court as soon as April 2002, the schedule provides a good indication of the one-time and continuing reductions in allocation of secured taxes that could be expected in the future. Please note that the schedule excludes interest that must be paid with the refunds. If the Assessor decides not to appeal the decision, the taxing authorities would have little choice other than to reduce their revenue projections.

Yesterday, the Assembly Committee on Revenue and Taxation rejected AB 1315 (Havice) that attempted to modify Section 51 of the Revenue and Taxation Code to conform with the judge's ruling. Committee staff reported that "This bill is unconstitutional, because it would reduce assessed values below levels authorized by the constitution." Committee staff further reported that "This bill is premature. Many tax professionals across the state believe that the Orange County court decision is flawed and in violations of existing law. Codifying the decision before it is reviewed by an appellate court could be construed as overly hasty."

There is a reasonable expectation that the judge's order would be reversed on appeal. It is in the best interests of the State, the County, and our cities, special districts and schools to appeal the decision and await the final outcome of the appeals process prior to making refunds. Otherwise, there is a strong potential that we would be needlessly expending County resources (as much as \$5 million) on the initial distribution of the supposed overpayments and then subsequent collection efforts of those overpayments if the ruling is reversed. Moreover, it would be difficult, if not impossible, to reverse the refund process and the interest paid.

This action could be exposing various jurisdictions in the county (especially the basic aid school districts of Laguna Beach and Newport-Mesa) to unnecessary draconian budget cuts that would be necessary to cover revenue shortfalls. As an example, Newport-Mesa (who may be facing a four-year catch up shortfall of \$11,577,407) must learn soon its potential for a revenue shortfall to decide whether lay-offs will be necessary. According to school district collective bargaining statutes, lay-off notices must be sent by March 15 to be effective for the next school year. This could have a further deteriorative effect on school bond ratings of both their issued and yet to be issued bonds. It should also be noted that as a result of the reassessment process, many taxpayers who had purchased properties during the adjustment period will be receiving additional bills for supplemental taxes. This action too could prove to be unwarranted if the decision is reversed.

The attached estimates are a rough order of magnitude, and category totals differ slightly from the amounts in my letter to Counsel De Mayo. Being a rough order of magnitude, the estimates will be subject to continuous refinement as we obtain more information on the scope of the case and have more time to prepare analyses of data in our tax system. However, they are reliable enough for decision-makers to begin planning for a possible reduction in secured taxes.

Although not now a party to the litigation, I need to consider the County's options and my responsibilities in the potential refunding process – including whether in the claims process we have a mechanism to challenge the decision. Although I may have little choice in the matter, I would like to confirm our options and remedies to mitigate the impact. Because of your Board's recent decision not to appeal the case, County Counsel may have a conflict in providing me legal advice as to how to proceed. Accordingly, I request outside counsel. I would like to proceed as quickly as possible.

Tutor Training. The Literacy Coordinator conducted two tutor training workshops during January and seventeen tutors were trained, eleven adults and six teens. All seventeen new tutors are matched and tutoring in the Library. The next tutor training is scheduled for February 2, 2002.

Families for Literacy (FFL) Program Status. We now have eight families in the FFL component.

Rotary Reading Assistance Program (RRAP) Continues. RRAP, a partnership with the Placentia and Yorba Linda Rotary Clubs, the Placentia/Yorba Linda Unified School District (PYLUSD), and the Library, continued in January. So far, we have trained more than 130 high school volunteers for this school year. We now have ten Esperanza High School RRAP volunteers tutoring at the Yorba Linda Library. RRAP offers high school students the opportunity to get community service hours by volunteering at local elementary schools.

Reach Out and Read Partnership Continues. In January, the Placentia Library Literacy Services continued its partnership with St. Judes Medical Center and the Reach Out and Read Program, a pediatric-based literacy program. We want to continue to especially recognize one of our volunteers, Diane Martlo, who goes to the Whitten Center in Placentia on Monday mornings and reads to children in the waiting room while they are waiting to see the St. Judes pediatric staff.

English Language and Literacy Intensive (ELLI) Program Update. We are now working with approximately 50 kindergarten students at Ruby Drive Elementary through the ELLI Program. Another group of 50 kindergarten students will start receiving tutors in their classroom within the next several weeks. Within the next two weeks we will begin working with about 65 additional students, kindergarten through 6th grade, also at Ruby Drive. We are in the process of placing tutors with 32 5th and 6th grade students at John Tynes Elementary, and will be providing tutors for another 50 students whose parents attend ESL classes at Tynes. The staff at Rio Vista Elementary is currently preparing a list of 1st and 2nd graders who need tutors in their classrooms. This list should be completed within a week to ten days, at which point ELLI tutors will be provided.







nity feeling," she said. "I remember always being impressed by that, whenever I passed through the area. You can go and be a part of the city.

"There's an opportunity to know people on City Council. Before we moved here, we lived in Anaheim for more than 20 years and never felt involved."

Hundreds of red, white and blue balloons sporting imprints of the city's 75th anniversary logo were released into the sky.

Former council members greeted each other with warm hugs.

The African American Museum and Library at Oakland

Oakland, the other city in the bay area, has been a thriving and active center of California's African American community for over 150 years. Soon, the African American Museum and Library at Oakland (AAMLO), a division of the Oakland Public Library, will serve patrons from the heart of Oakland's most historic neighborhood in the restored, 17,500 square foot. By weaving the rich history of Oakland's past into Oakland's bustling and diverse present, this groundbreaking cultural and resource center hopes to lead the state in providing information about, and access to, not only California's African American legacies but also contemporary multi-cultural discourse.

While slavery seethed in the south in the midnineteenth century, Oakland became a place where "freemen" and escaped slaves settled and established institutions and businesses, setting precedents for future African Americans. Dr. Shirley Ann Wilson Moore, Professor of History at California State University at Sacramento, says, "in the 1850's, African Americans came to Oakland looking for the opportunities that come

with freedom. Their community was small but their interactions with the white community were disturbing." Leaders like Issac Flood, a "freeman" who formed the first all-black African Methodist Episcopal (AME) church in Oakland in 1858, quickly constructed their own institutions so they could, according to Moore, "launch an attack against slavery and, later, Jim Crow laws." Prominent abolitionists and educators like Jeremiah Sanderson and Elizabeth Thorne Scot joined men like Flood to build a

neighborhood embodying the fight against discrimination and segregation.

AAMLO's Chief Curator, Rick Moss, says that AAMLO springs from Oakland's founding African American community; its mission is "to discover, preserve, interpret and share the historical and cultural experiences of African Americans in northern California for present and future generations." Not only is AAMLO's historic building located near 19th century African American landmarks like the AME church, its collection includes the papers of people like Flood and Sanderson, marginalized leaders whose actions and achievements helped define

American landmarks like the AME church, its collection includes the papers of people like Flood and Sanderson, marginalized leaders whose actions and achievements helped define California's African American community.

AAMLO is the African American "institution" about which men like Flood could only dream. AAMLO's responsibility, according to Moss, is to "improve the popular image of black people in the eyes of other Americans." Other groups, says Moss, "need to see African Americans as essential to California history contemporary California culture." Through solid information and enlightened discourse, this institution, Moss says, is "dedicated to breaking artificial cultural boundaries, to transcending race through access to clasic African American fiction and non-fiction texts, to historical documents and to contemporary authors."

Rare texts and archival documents are the price of AAMLO's collection and the backbone of cross-educational programs it creates when collaborating with local museums for major exhibits on African Americans. AAMLO contains original manuscripts, letters, diaries, memoirs, lectures, and other writings, over 10,000 photographic images depicting the story of early and present-day black Californians.

Among AAMLO's papers are those of C.L. Dellums, the father of former U.S. Congressman Ron Dellums and one of the founders of the Brotherhood of Railway Porters Union; of Frederick Roberts, the first African American elected to the California legislature; and of Oakland cartoonist Morrie Turner. There are also tucked in AAMLO's archives the papers of less acclaimed, but just as colorful pioneers. Delightful characters like Ambrosia Jones pepper AAMLO's papers, reminding patrons of the whimsy and romance that the frontier fleetingly embraced without regard to race.

Rick Moss says that AAMLO, in offering a balanced schedule on art, history and literature, wants to be "a forum for discussion on a whole series of subjects"; that lectures from scholars like Tony Gleedon, who is speaking at AAMLO's opening, will spark "healthy dialogues" between not just African Americans but everyone.

Oakland's literacy rate is disturbingly low but AAMLO will not serve as a community center for at-risk youth. Instead, AAMLO will lead urban kids by example. African Americans, says Moss, have long had to react to history but AAMLO is different. It represents scholarly action, enlightened cultural celebration. Because AAMLO's directors know that inner-city kids don't come to libraries, AAMLO will encourage youth to "get on the stage of history," to lead their peers. As part of this plan, AAMLO will recruit corporate sponsors to underwrite its youth

docent, runner, shelver and page program at the library. With a little professional help, AAMLO will get the message to Oakland's teens that their new library is cool, that their city's past is glorious and something of which they can be proud.

AAMLO's gala public opening is February 22-23, 2002. Exhibitions, lectures and performances make up the opening's busy schedule. There have been many contributors to the restoration and enhancement of this vital museum and library. Among them is the Federal library Services and Technology Act with funding provided by the Institute of Museum & Library services, administered in California by the State Librarian. e-books ready or not!

Golden Gateway Library Network's experiment in electronic service development

In early 2001, the media touted electronic books, or e-books, as one of the greatest consumer products of the

decade. In October, the media turned around and gleefully reported the sinking fortunes of netLibrary, Ouestia, and other e-book vendors. Despite this fluctuating media spin, e-books remain a vital medium for libraries. especially libraries participating in a resource-sharing consortium. The Golden Gateway Library Consortium, which formally began business July 2001, has proven e-books' usefulness by

sponsoring two e-book projects in its first year. Both e-book projects have tested the potential of new electronic services for an emerging library network.

Golden Gateway Library Network E-book Consortium

Following a series of e-book workshops at the November 2000 California Library Association annual conference, a group of nineteen northern California libraries each volunteered to contribute at least \$3,000 to explore the consortium purchase and joint use of e-books. The group asked the fledgling Golden Gateway Library Network (GGLN) to sponsor and to be the fiscal agent for the consortium project, since the membership cut across the geographic boundaries of all five California Library Services Act (CLSA) Systems in the multi-type GGLN area. By January 2, 2001, one CLSA library system (the Peninsula Library System), the Solano Napa and Partners (SNAP) libraries automation cooperative, fifteen independent public libraries, two college/university libraries, and one school library were on board.

Librarians from the San Francisco Public Library collected the initial 1,500 e-book titles by the end of February 2001, and a collection development subcommittee of the consortium purchased another 1,100 titles throughout the year. Library of Congress Machine-Readable Cataloging (MARC) records for each title were purchased from netLibrary, which made it

possible to link via the Internet each bibliographic record with the full text book on netLibrary's server.

GGLN's Shared Resource Collection

At the first GGLN Council meeting in May 2001, members of the network approved the new organization's bylaws, budget and

program, including another prototype e-book project: a

Shared Reference
Collection (SRC) of ebooks. Based upon the
immediate success of
the self-funded e-book
consortium, the
GGLN spent \$32,500
from its state-funded
Library of California
budget to offer its member
libraries free access through
efficient resource sharing to a "core"
collection of more than 400 reference e-

books. The SRC collection became available to members on October 15, 2001, the date of the kickoff public relations campaign for e-books. By that time, half of the GGLN members (76 of 151 libraries) had signed up to participate in the Shared Reference Collection.

Public Awareness Campaign

Library Communications Strategies, Inc., a public relations consultant firm, created an E-book Promo Pack for each member library participating in both the Consortium and the SRC. The Promo Pack provided answers to frequently asked e-book questions, gave sample press releases, and offered a written workshop on conducting effective word-of-mouth and publicity campaigns. Library Communications Strategies also designed Day-Glo bookmarks featuring selected e-books and the theme "E-books, Ready when you are @ your library." It also made buttons for library staff to wear. The GGLN staff distributed four posters, 500 children bookmarks, 500 adult bookmarks, and 50 buttons to each of the 251 library sites participating in the two e-book programs.

Training

In the original January 2001 netLibrary contract, the E-

book Consortium included training for staff. Three workshops were held in the region, one in the South Bay, one in San Francisco, and one in the East Bay. Since the Shared Reference Collection now includes many smaller libraries, GGLN is developing a new plan to use staff as trainers.


Communications

Project developers wondered how to address member questions and how to select e-books for different types of libraries and library users. Good communication was the answer. While the entire membership is invited to bimonthly meetings at San Francisco Public Library, the primary means of communication are through email, the GGLN e-book listsery, and publishing minutes and updates on the GGLN website (www.goldengateway.org). Interested librarians have formed a collection development subcommittee that reviews thousands of new books that become available every quarter through netLibrary. They also review title and subject suggestions that librarians participating in the consortium submit to Ebooks@sfpl.org.

One of the unique advantages of using e-books is the ability to select books based on use. NetLibrary tells libraries how many times a book is not available to a user because it has been checked out to another library user. NetLibrary calls these "turn away statistics." One consortium librarian monitors these turn-away statistics and automatically orders another copy of any book that has had more than three "turn-aways." To date the consortium has purchased only a few duplicate copies of books, but expects the turn-away statistics to grow. As use of e-books increases, additional copies will be ordered.

Use of the Collections (Information Services)

After almost a year of e-books being available to GGLN members, the GGLN members are still asking "how well are e-books used?" The system allows each member to see how many of the titles in the collection were used specifically by its borrowers and summarizes the library's e-book use by subject matter. For example, consortium member libraries in Alameda used 1,011 of the 2,695 titles; Contra Costa used 1,155; and San Jose and San Francisco used more than 1,559 titles. However, these and other consortium member libraries did not request e-books on the same subjects. For e-book users in Alameda, Oakland, and San Jose Public Libraries, computer books were the most popular topic. Economics and Business was the "hot" topic for Contra Costa, Peninsula Library System, and SNAP libraries. Among all consortium libraries the following subjects were the next most popular (in descending order): literature, technology and engineering, medicine, and law.



Telecommunications

As a result of these preliminary findings, the GGLN has learned that there is a need for peer-to-peer technical consultation, to develop pathfinders and procedures for downloading e-book MARC records into various vendors' online catalogs, and for improved telecommunications training at the local level. GGLN has also learned that payment for MARC records should be based upon the number of automation systems used not the number of libraries participating in the consortium. The original contract and pricing was based upon members, not automation systems accessing the e-books.

The Future

As previously mentioned, after a year of the consortium and two months of the SRC project being available, the GGLN staff is undertaking a survey of its members to better evaluate the service and gauge future member needs. Us the Web-based Zoomerang survey tool, GGLN will determine exactly how many libraries have website connection to the ebooks. The tool will also determine how many downloaded MARC records into their OPACs, what use was made of the PR materials, how satisfied libraries are with the e-book selections, and how GGLN might improve the operations next year. The GGLN has found that the e-book projects are exciting and challenging, pushing the limits and definition of electronic resource sharing and information delivery among libraries. This prototype project has created new, costeffective electronic services, and has shown how GGLN can provide the necessary training, public relations, and technical and professional support for each member. Media hype or not, e-books are now an integral part of the Golden Gateway Library Network's services to its members.

Easy Reading Voter Guide, popular resource on election issues

The March 2002 election looms ahead, but many voters dread the election process. Why? Election

materials are often full of obfuscating jargon. Fortunately, this problem has an answer: the *Easy Reading Voter Guide*.

The Easy Reading Voter Guide (ERVG) has become popular with voters who want a fast way to learn about major election issues. The March 2002 Primary Easy Reading Voter Guides are now available at public libraries through a partnership with the California State Library, local library literacy programs, and the League of Women Voters of California Education Fund (LWVCEF).

The ERVG has been published for every California statewide election since 1994 thanks to a federal grant funding to the Santa Clara County library literacy program. Since

begun using ERVG because its election overviews are free of the intimidating political and technical language that turns off many voters. The ERVG is also an essential resource for immigrants, new citizens, and non-native speakers.

"The Easy Reading Voter Guide is a tremendously useful guide for anyone who wants to be informed about the candidates and issues before casting his or her vote," says State Librarian Dr. Kevin Starr. "I'm especially pleased that adult learners still find this guide to be a vital source of information about political parties, candidates, and ballot measures."

This election year, the League of Women Voters of California Education Fund (LWVCEF) voter service has taken the lead in promoting and sponsoring the *Easy Reading Voter Guide*. This is an exciting role for the LWVCEF because the *Easy Reading Voter Guide* embodies the LWVCEF's mission of fostering citizen participation in government and providing nonpartisan information about

election candidates and issues.

Voters have reacted enthusiastically to the guide. One voter said, "This is a wonderful publication. As a college-educated person I still find the ballot measures difficult to understand. Do I vote no to get it passed or is it yes? I commend you on turning out such a helpful piece of literature." Another voter said that this guide was cured his nascent voter apathy, saying "this really made the difference between going to the polls and not going."

The Easy Reading Voter Guide's style has evolved from surveys and focus groups with both new and experienced voters. Although the content varies with each election, the basic format is the same: a visually attractive, multi-colored, 16-page booklet with information on California's political parties, statewide candidates, and statewide ballot measures. Guides are available in English, Spanish, Chinese, and Vietnamese. A review team of adult learners edits the guide to ensure that the information is easy to read for its core readers, adult learners. This year's review team included: Susan Clark. executive director, Target Knowledge, Dareen Pardue, adult learner, Berkeley Reads, Nancy Bickel, Berkeley League of Women Voters, Gloria Ashford, student advocate, Berkeley Reads, Bijaya Simmons, Berkeley Reads, Elsie Blunt, adult learner, Berkeley Reads, Noreen Lepe-Shaw, adult learner, Project Literacy San Leandro Community Library, and Emma Torrez, Santa Clara County Vision Literacy.

The Easy Reading Voter Guide will help the LWVCEF bridge a voter information gap. In a 1996 survey, the League of Women Voters learned that voter turn out increases when people believe they have accurate information. Since a high percentage of California adults read at an 8th grade level or less, and the official election information is written at a much higher reading level, many California voters, in effect, cannot find the information they need to cast their ballots. The Kettering Foundation's research study in 1996 found that the Easy Reading Voter Guide contributed to a higher voter turnout among populations such as the less educated and ethnic minorities.

Charles Osgood of CBS Radio has summed up the ERVG well in saying that "the *Easy Reading Guide* turned out to be more popular that they ever dreamed ... simpler is not shorter, it's better."

Since 1994 this project has been supported in part by the Institute of Museum and Library Services through funding from the Library Services and Technology Act and its predecessor act, both administered in California by the State Librarian.

2002 California Civil Liberties Public Education Program reaches out to California

In his letter to 2001-2002 California Civil Liberties Public Education Program (CCLPEP) grant applicants, Dr. Kevin Starr, State Librarian of California, writes that he joins "with millions of Californians and other individuals across the nation in expressing my [his] sorrow and deep concern over the tragic incidents" of September 11th. Starr points out that the "importance of protecting civil liberties" has become "acutely relevant and essential"; that "we have learned from our nadir history that all individuals need to be protected even through the most challenging incidents in our nation's history."

CCLPEP, which puts anti-discriminatory rhetoric into action, evolved from the California Civil Liberties Public Education Act, or AB 1915, that Assembly-member Mike Honda introduced in the California legislature in 1998. Now, thanks to Assembly-member George Nakano's support, CCLPEP has been extended two more years. The California

State Library is the administering agency for CCLPEP.

CCLPEP 's mission is to award grants to people whose educational and artistic projects honor the spirit and history of the over 120,000 United States citizens of Japanese ancestry who, because of Executive Order 9006, were incarcerated by the Army to ten concentration camps throughout the west during World-War II. It is one of California's most accessible and compelling vehicles for disseminating the "acutely relevant" word about civil liberties and racial profiling.

CCLPEP director, Diane Matsuda of the California State Library, says that the program's audience is Californians who, in their day to day life, wouldn't normally research Japanese-American history and experience. Matsuda says that CCLPEP projects, like wall hangings, quilts, documentaries, and easy-to-read books engage a broader range of people than would traditional textbooks: CCLPEP couches facts in accessible, non-threatening forms. "All the programs," Matsuda says, "are specifically about incarceration but their broader significance is about protecting American civil liberties."

Matsuda suggests that libraries are ideal conduits for engaging the public in this compelling, and timeless, topic. Library-centric programs that CCLPEP offers are increasing Californians' awareness of the nation's problematic track record on civil rights. The Bruggemeyer Memorial Library in Monterey Park has held two enormously successful events, a discussion of Asian women's writings on Japanese internment and screenings of the program's documentaries followed by talks between the filmmakers and patrons. This year, one grant recipient, is working with the San Diego Public Library in an art and literature contest. The San Joaquin/Stockton Library has also participated in outreach.

Some of CCLPEP's materials that have increased library patrons' awareness about Japanese Internment are: a CCLPEP documentary (which libraries can present in tandem with historical displays), by Karen Iushizuka and Bob Nakamura of the Japanese American National Museum, about Clara Breed, children's librarian of San Diego. California library statistics online

This year, for the first time ever, California public library statistics have been collected via the World Wide Web through a system called BIBLIOSTAT COLLECT. The trial test with California public libraries that have input their statistics into BIBLIOSTAT COLLECT using the Web has been extremely successful this year. Plans are afoot to test it with academic, special, and county law library statistics next year.

The success of BIBLIOSTAT COLLECT is also the first step in making the collected statistics available beginning this month to the contributing public libraries via the Web through a companion system called BIBLIOSTAT CONNECT. This Web-based system now contains California public library statistics for the 1998/99 and 1999/2000 fiscal years and should soon include that for 2000/2001, as that information is almost complete via BIBLIOSTAT COLLECT. Clearly, then, trends can now be tracked easily across years using this tool. The system also contains the Public Library Association's Public Library Data Service (PLDS) statistics, and those that the Federal State Cooperative System for public library data (FSCS) collects from all public libraries in the country. The contributing public libraries will begin testing BIBLIOSTAT CONNECT this month.

It is important to note that, without any training sessions at all, most public libraries (113 of 179) did opt to input their library's statistics to the annual public library report through BIBLIOSTAT COLLECT this year, and they indicated that they found it much easier to use than previous OCR- or diskbased input methods. A few libraries did not try out this new system in this initial, test year. They opted, instead, to submit

their statistics on paper forms that California State Library (CSL) staff subsequently input. These staff members, incidentally, also reported that using BIBLIOSTAT COLLECT to input statistics was simpler and quicker than using previous methods.

But what about the non-public libraries? With the success of BIBLIOSTAT COLLECT for the public libraries this year, the California State Library is now moving ahead to provide, in a test mode, this same Web-based data collection system for 2001/2002 data for all 58 county law libraries, the 186 college and university libraries, and the 224 special libraries that report their statistics to the CSL. The goal will then be to make all of this data available to all reporting libraries via the Web through BIBLIOSTAT CONNECT after completion of the 2001/2002 data collection cycle in November or December 2002.

BIBLIOSTAT CONNECT allows libraries to compare themselves online with any libraries they choose using any of the data elements libraries typically submit in their annual reports. Once the comparisons are made, the results can be displayed on a table, sorted in ascending or descending order by any value being compared. Alternatively (or in addition), the results can be displayed in bar, line, or pie charts in a wide variety of colors or in black and white.

This is a very powerful and customizable tool. The CSL will still provide its service of producing comparisons for libraries on request. The expectation, however, is that BIBLIOSTAT CONNECT will be a far superior tool for such comparisons.

Laura Bush addresses nation's shortage of librarians: \$10 million to recruit new librarians

First Lady Laura Bush announced a proposed \$10 million initiative for 2003 to recruit a new generation of librarians. Making the announcement on Jan. 9 at the Topeka and Sawnee County Library in Kansas, Mrs. Bush said, "In May 2000, Library Journal magazine reported 40 percent of America's library directors plan to retire in 9 years or less. And, according to the July 2000 Monthly Labor Review, in 1998 57 percent of professional librarians were age 45 or older."

The Institute of Museum and Library Services (IMLS), a federal agency that supports the nation's 122,000 libraries, will manage the initiative. "Recruiting and educating the next generation of librarians is essential", said Dr. Robert Martin, IMLS director. "They help parents teach their children before they enter school, they are partners with the schools in their communities and they help adults continue to achieve and enjoy learning throughout their lifetimes."

Recruiting a new generation of librarians is vital. Research scheduled for publication in the March 2002 issue of *American Libraries* will show that based on 1990 census data almost 58 percent of professional librarians will reach the age of 65 between 2005 and 2019. Funds from this initiative will be used to invest in a variety of recruitment efforts such as scholarships and fellowships for master's programs; support for doctoral students who will train the next generation of librarians; leadership development; distance learning for



underserved rural areas; and efforts to recruit librarians to serve increasingly diverse communities with diverse language skills.


