LEGISLATIVE ISSUES

Library Director Minter reported that two bills have been introduced into the California Senate this year that would provide property tax shift relief to special district libraries, SB 74 by Senators Speier and McPherson and SB 94 by Senators Torlakson and Figueroa.

The Senate Local Government Committee Hearing on these bills is scheduled for Wednesday, April 4, 2001.

It is important that all letters of support arrive no later than March 27, 2001. California Special Districts Association Lobbyist Ralph Heim sent letters on January 31, 2001.

Library Director Minter and President Shkoler have an appointment to meet Senator Ackerman on March 23, 2001 to ask for his support. Also, he will be asked to sign-on as a co-sponsor when and if the bills are merged and pass out of the Senate Local Government Committee.

The monthly Friends of the Placentia Library Board of Directors meeting was held on March 5. Several items were discussed, and the most important was the upcoming Annual Meeting scheduled for April 2. Jim Roberts, Public Services Manager, reported that plans for the Annual Meeting were going well.

The Annual Meeting on April 2 began at 6:30 PM in the Placentia City Hall Council Chambers, and there were over 120 people in attendance. The following is the order of the program.

The meeting began with a welcome by Friends President, Pat Irot. She expressed her delight about the attendance.

Pat was followed by Jim Roberts who recognized special guests attending the event. They were Placentia Mayor Chris Lowe and Councilwoman Connie Underhill, and Placentia Library Board Trustees President Al Shkloer, Secretary Goeff Braun, and Trustees Peggy Dinsmore, Sondra Stark, and Gaeton Wood. Jim also recognized Donna Espinoza and Julie Kohler from the Financial Assistance Office at Western State University College of Law, and six College of Law Literacy Staff Members in the Federal Work Study Program.

Placentia Library District Board of Trustees President Al Shkoler then recognized and gave certificates to library volunteers, followed by Jim Roberts, recognized and gave certificates to literacy volunteers. Al and Jim also gave special certificates from State Senator Ackerman to Polly Gast and Dale Goodman: Polly had over seven hundred hours and six years of service to the literacy program, and Dale had more than 1,400 hundred hours and twelve years of service to the literacy Program.

Next, Pat Irot held election of Board Nominees and all were confirmed.

Earlene Fowler then gave her program on "A Patchwork of Words," where Earlene talked about writing a novel and making a quilt, and she had several quilts she displayed as she gave her program. Earlene's presentation concluded at about 8:30, and refreshments and book signings followed in the Library's Meeting Room.

The entire Friends Annual Meeting was telecast live by Adelphia Cable on Channels 3 and 53 to Placentia and several other cities in North Orange County.

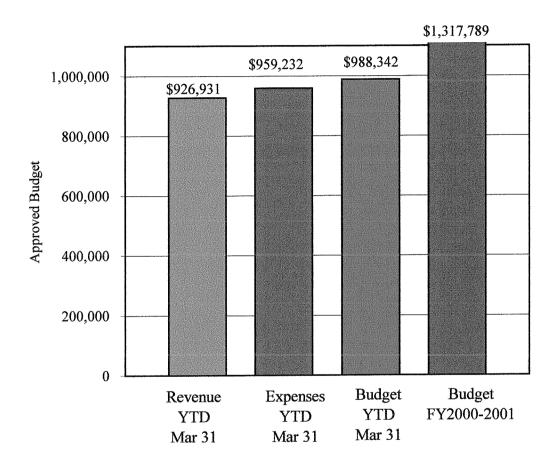

REPORT OF ACTIVITIES

- At the request of City Council and city staff, we hosted an "open house" for executives from HQT builders, a number of city staff plus four council members. The purpose was to provide HQT personnel an opportunity to examine the cabinets which were installed as a gift from them to the History Rom. They seemed to be pleased to be able to make this contribution.
- A city contract employee, Kathy Ageson, has requested and receives assistance for her project which is to develop a public relations package relative to the railroad lowering project.
- 3. We are working with several distrct third grade teachers providing limited information on local history. are accessing our Local History website for information.
- In addition, we continue to move at a slow pace on the project to provide an instructdional materials packet for third grade teachers who are requred to teach local history as part of their social studies curriculum. The preparation phase will accellerate when we are able to unpack our materials. Our goal is to have it completed for school year 2001-2002.
- 5. Our volunteer committee continues to meet with the mayor at his request on a monthly basis in the History Room. We assist with his plan to write a new children's history of Placentia, and to videotape interviews with older residents to capture their recollections of Placentia. Ideas for the upcoming 75th anniversary are discussed. The mayor requested that we search for photographs of former mayors in order that the city's display of photos be complete; this task is in progress and is headed by Marie Schmidt. We attended, at the mayor's invitation, the third graders' visitation to the Civic Center complex. and heard Chris give the students an overview of Placentia history.
 - 6. The Building Bridges to Placentia's Past, a consortium of A Community Resource Supported by the City and Library Historic Preservation Partnership

groups interested in local history, continues to meet. We supported the Santa Fe Merchants Association in its public forum regarding a program, "Historic Downtown" featuring a speaker from Encinitas who is the Executive Director of Encinitas Historic Downtown project. Building Bridges continues to support in concept any project which will enhance the economic, social and historic environment of downtown Placentia.

- 8. Locally, there is an informal meeting every other month of librarians responsible for local history collections. We have been welcomed most warmly when we have been able to attend. We look forward to the May meeting in Fullerton when their newly revamped History Room will be on display. This group helps us to be aware of what is happening in the field. The members are proud to say that this is the best kind of organization no officers, no dues. Meeting locations are rotated and by invitation of the host groupwe hope to host after November.
- 9. We are often asked by the Placentia News Times reporter for assistance. Most recently, assistance was provided for an article on the McFadden school-park agreement between city and school district.
- 10. Fifteen photograph albums which arrived at the library from some unknown source, have been assembled into acid-free albums. The collection was done by Virginia Carpenter, well-organized and dated, with negatives. Included are some family photos, unrelated to our local history; Marie Schmidt has made contacts, unproductive at this point, in Glendale and Pasadena in an attempt to place these photos in the hands of families who will appreciate them.
- 11. At a meeting with Elizabeth and the city's grant writer, we were made aware of the limited funding sources for History Room assistance.
- 12. Letters were sent to three district teachers complimenting them on items displayed at the district's ARTWORKs show. These items were third graders' projects dealing with Placentia history.

RE: POSSIBLE RETURN TO SELF INSURANCE

Dear Member District:

You will recall that last year SDWCA sent to you information necessary to obtain a new Certificate of Consent to Self Insure from the Department of Industrial Relations, Self Insurance Plans, which information is required for SDWCA and its member districts to return to self insurance status for fiscal year 2001-02. Our records reflect that you submitted a properly executed Resolution from your Board of Directors and a properly executed Application for a Public Entity Certificate of Consent to Self Insure last spring. It was not necessary for SDWCA to return to self insurance for fiscal year 2000-01 since we were able to obtain favorable insurance quotes from the commercial insurance market.

However, due to the hardening of the workers' compensation market this year, it is necessary for SDWCA to prepare to return to self insurance effective July 1, 2001. In order to submit the Resolution and Application which your district executed last year, it is necessary for us to submit to the Department of Industrial Relations, Self Insurance Plans, a Certification, a form of which is attached, certifying that the Resolution which your Board passed last spring and the Application which it authorized to be executed are still in full force and effect and have not been rescinded, revoked or modified in any way. This Certificate will establish to the Department of Self Insurance Plans that your district's Resolution and Application to return to self insurance are still in full force and effect.

It is NOT necessary for your Board to pass another resolution. It is only necessary for the Secretary of the Board of Directors to review the records of the actions of the Board of Directors and execute this Certificate if it is found that the Resolution and the Application are still in full force and effect. Please make sure that the Certificate attached either includes your district seal, or, if no seal is available, that the signature of the person executing the Certificate is notarized.

It is imperative that we receive these Certificates in SDWCA offices prior to May 10, 2001, so that we can file them with Self Insurance Plans and obtain the required approvals prior to July 1, 2001. If this information is not received from your district and we are unable to process your Application for a Certificate of Consent to Self Insure, your district will be required to make other arrangements for workers' compensation coverage commencing July 1, 2001.

BACKGROUND

Review of Property Tax Shift Issues

In 1992-93 and in 1993-94, \$3.6 billion of property tax revenue was transferred from cities, counties and special districts to the Education Revenue Augmentation Fund (ERAF).

This money was directed toward K-14 schools and allowed the State to reduce its general fund spending on education.

The property tax shifts have grown an average of 3% each year and continue today. The shift for Placentia Library District for Fiscal Year 2000-2001 is \$1,040,847.67. (The shift for Buena Park Library District is \$619,610.24.)

The California Library Association (CLA) Legislative Updates for this report period are Attachment A.

Assembly Local Government Committee Hearing Scheduled for AB 315 (Dutra/Thomson

The hearing in the Assembly Local Government Committee is scheduled for Wednesday, April 18, 2001 at 9:30 A.M. This is the Assembly version of the ERAF exemption for dependent and independent library districts. Assemblywoman Daucher is a member of this Committee. Library Director Minter has been asked to testify representing the independent special library districts. A copy of AB 315 is Attachment B.

Meeting with Senator Ackerman

President Shkoler, Orange County Librarian John Adams and Library Director Minter met with Senator Ackerman (a member of the Senate Local Government Committee) on Friday, March 23, 2001. He said that he will support the ERAF reversal for library districts.

INTRODUCED BY Assembly Members Dutra and Thomson (Coauthors: Assembly Members Corbett, Keeley, and Longville)

FEBRUARY 16, 2001

An act to add Chapter 10 (commencing with Section 19745) to Part 11 of the Education Code, relating to libraries.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 315, as introduced, Dutra. Libraries: special districts. Existing property tax law reduces the amounts of ad valorem property tax revenue that would otherwise be annually allocated to the counties, cities, and special districts pursuant to general allocation requirements and requires that the revenues not allocated to the counties, cities, and special districts as a result of these reductions be transferred to the Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund in each respective county for allocation to school districts, community college districts, and the county office of education.

This bill would exempt dependent and independent library special districts, as defined, from shifting ad valorem property tax revenue to county Educational Revenue Augmentation Funds. The bill would require the state to hold harmless the school districts and community college districts in each of the counties in which the dependent and independent library special districts exist from the financial impact of the exemption.

Vote: majority. Appropriation: no. Fiscal committee: yes. State-mandated local program: no.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. The Legislature finds and declares all of the following:

- (a) Public libraries are an important resource to further California's reading and literacy goals both in conjunction with the public schools and for the adult population, a fact recognized by the voters of this state when they approved the California Reading and Literacy Improvement and Public Library Construction and Renovation Bond Act of 2000.
- (b) Public libraries are a supplement to the formal system of free public education and a source of information and inspiration to persons of all ages, cultural backgrounds, and economic statuses, and a resource for continued education and reeducation beyond the years of formal education, and as such, deserve adequate financial support from government at all levels.
- (c) In the early 1990's, the state faced a several billion dollar budget gap as costs for state programs exceeded state tax revenues. To close the gap, the Legislature took over two billion six hundred million dollars (\$2,600,000,000) from local government and "shifted" it to the schools, thereby relieving the state of its constitutional obligation, on a dollar-for-dollar basis, for school funding. The property tax money taken from cities, counties, city and county, and special districts was placed in the Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund, commonly known as ERAF. The amount taken grows every year as property tax collections increase. Today, the amount shifted annually exceeds three billion six hundred million dollars (\$3,600,000,000).
- (d) Of the 182 public libraries in the state, 35 are "ERAF orphans," that are dependent districts receiving a designated property tax allocation with no mitigation for the 44 percent ERAF shift. The 24 dependent library special districts that are county libraries and 11 independent library special districts receive a

direct share of the property tax of each of their counties and have experienced and continue to experience substantial losses of revenue beginning in the 1991-92 fiscal year due to the requirement to shift ad valorem property tax revenues to their respective counties' Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund.

- (e) The total amount of property tax shifted from these libraries was approximately sixty-two million dollars (\$62,000,000) in the 1998-99 fiscal year and resulted in significant reductions in services to residents of these districts, inadequate library hours, inadequate collections of library materials, inadequate staff services to promote reading and literacy, and inadequate resources to fully participate in partnerships with the public schools.
- (f) Most ERAF orphan county libraries receive up to 75 percent of their total revenue from property tax. Counties count property tax proceeds as only 12 percent of all general revenue, and cities even less. This means that a 44 percent tax loss takes away a much higher proportion of total revenue for ERAF orphan libraries than for city or county libraries.
- (g) The independent library special districts, although some are governed by unified school districts boards, are public libraries, comparable in their purpose and services to city libraries and county libraries, and are not school libraries.
- (h) These libraries provide library service to 11,200,000 people, approximately one-third of the state's population.
- (i) These libraries have not directly or indirectly enjoyed the benefit of the two billion three hundred million dollar (\$2,300,000,000) state mitigation offsets provided to cities and counties that have benefited city libraries and county libraries not classified as dependent library districts.
- (j) The constitutional provisions of Proposition 218, March 2000, passed after the Education Revenue Augmentation Fund (ERAF) shift was enacted, eliminate virtually all assessment mechanisms for these library special districts to raise revenue. No library has attempted to test the law in this area since its passage.
- (k) The dependent and independent special district libraries do not have the ability to independently raise revenue without a two-thirds voter approval requirement.
- (1) Current law holds a large number of special districts harmless from the ERAF shift or has dramatically limited the amount shifted. Special districts receiving legislative relief include fire, police protection, water and flood control, open space, resource conservation, hospital, transit and memorial districts, and several specific library special districts not included in the provisions of this legislation.
- (m) The appropriations for the Public Library Foundation Program made pursuant to Chapter 1.5 (commencing with Section 18010) of Part 11 of the Education Code, while substantial and reflecting recognition by the state of the important role of libraries in education, have offset only a small portion of the revenue loss experienced by these libraries.
- (n) It is in the interest of the people and of the state that these libraries have a more adequate funding base to provide open hours, reading materials, and staff services, in order that they can contribute effectively to the improvement of reading and literacy skills throughout the state.
- SEC 2. Chapter 10 (commencing with Section 19745) is added to Part 11 of the Education Code, to read:
- CHAPTER 10. CALIFORNIA DEPENDENT AND INDEPENDENT LIBRARY SPECIAL DISTRICTS RELIEF ACT OF 2001
 Article 1. General Provisions
- 19745. This chapter shall be known and may be cited as the California Dependent and Independent Library Special Districts Relief Act of 2001.
- 19747. As used in this chapter, the following terms have the following meanings:
- (a) "Dependent library special district" means a county free library established pursuant to Article 1 (commencing with Section 19100) of Chapter 6, for which a property tax rate was levied in the 1977-78 fiscal year, and that is subject to the requirement to shift

ad valorem property tax revenue annually to the county's Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund.

(b) "Independent library special district" means a library district established pursuant to Chapter 8 (commencing with Section 19400) of Part 11, a unified school district public library district established pursuant to Chapter 3 (commencing with Section 18310) of Part 11, and a library district in unincorporated towns and villages established pursuant to Chapter 9 (commencing with Section 19600) of Part 11, for which a property tax rate was levied in the 1977-78 fiscal year and which is subject to the requirement to shift ad valorem property tax revenue annually to the county's Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund pursuant to Chapter 6 (commencing with Section 95.31) of Part .5 of the Revenue and Taxation Code.

Article 2. Fiscal Provisions

19751. Commencing July 1, 2001, for the 2001-02 fiscal year and each fiscal year thereafter, dependent library special districts shall be exempt from the requirement to shift ad valorem property tax revenue to their respective counties' Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund pursuant to Chapter 6 (commencing with Section 95.31) of Part .5 of the Revenue and Taxation Code. For the purposes of this chapter, these dependent library special districts include:

- (d) Kings.
- (e) Lake.
- (f) Los Angeles.

- (p) San Joaquin.
- (q) San Luis Obispo.

- (w) Ventura.
- (x) Yolo.

19753. Commencing July 1, 2001, for the 2001-02 fiscal year and each fiscal year thereafter, the following independent library special districts shall be exempt from the requirement to shift ad valorem property tax revenue to their respective counties' Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund pursuant to Chapter 6 (commencing with Section 95.31) of Part .5 of the Revenue and Taxation Code:

- (a) Altadena Library District (Los Angeles County).
- (b) Banning Unified School District Library District (Riverside County).
 - (c) Beaumont Library District (Riverside County).

California is facing a significant energy challenge. As we move closer to the summer when demand will be at its peak, Governor Davis has asked state agencies, cities, counties, businesses, residents, and independent special districts to do their fair share...and if possible, even more.

Stabilization

"Our first priority must be providing reliable, reasonably priced energy to power our homes and businesses."

Governor Gray Davis is meeting the challenge of rate stabilization by working to: reduce the wholesale cost of electricity, keep consumer rates at a reasonable level, and maintain the solvency of the investor-owned utilities.

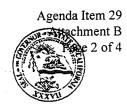
Recently, Governor Davis announced an agreement in principle with Southern California Edison on a plan to ensure reliable and affordable electricity and keep the utility solvent and viable.

The Davis administration is continuing negotiations with Pacific Gas & Electric and San Diego Gas & Electric to forge similar agreements.

In addition, other key rate stabilization initiatives include:

- Assembly Bill 1X, signed by the Governor on February 1, which allowed the state to enter into long-term contracts. Its credit worthiness allows the state to purchase electricity at a better price than the utilities.
- An unprecedented on-line energy auction for generators to submit bids to provide electricity in long-term contracts.
- Agreements with generators for 40 long-term, low cost power contracts to supply an average of 8,886 MW per year over the next ten years.
- Negotiations to reduce the price of power delivered by co-generation and renewable energy suppliers ("qualified facilities").
- The seizure of less costly energy contracts from the now-defunct California Power Exchange that otherwise would have been auctioned for higher prices.
- A new law making the Independent System Operator that manages the power grid truly independent, replacing its stakeholder board with independent leadership.

• A new law to prohibit utilities from selling off any more of their power plants that produce low cost power without further approval of the state.

Conservation

"Yes, we have a power shortage, but we are far from powerless. By reducing our electricity demand by even a small amount, we can reduce the price, avoid shortages and lower energy bills."

In his State of the State Address, Governor Davis issued a new call for energy efficiency and backed it up with a record commitment of funding.

In February, the Governor unveiled what is believed to be the most sweeping conservation campaign ever undertaken by a state. \$404 million in new conservation initiatives will augment the \$424 million in existing programs already funded by the Administration. The new initiatives alone are expected to reduce California's peak load demand by more than 3,200 MW this summer.

The state is leading by example. Every single day, state government is cutting its consumption by at least 8 percent. During Stage Two alerts, it's saving 20 percent.

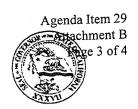
In early March, Governor Davis announced that Californians had risen to the task: business and consumers slashed energy use during the month of February by eight percent.

Governor Davis also used his emergency powers to set up the 20/20 Rebate Program, which rewards those who reduce energy consumption during summer months by 20 percent with a 20 percent reduction in their rates.

New initiatives in the Governor's energy efficiency campaign include:

- \$75 million for consumer rebates for replacing energy-inefficient appliances.
- \$95 million in incentives for businesses that install demand-responsive systems in commercial buildings and reduce commercial lighting.

- \$60 million to fund innovative peak-load reduction proposals.
- \$50 million to improve energy efficiency in State buildings.
- \$50 million for reflective lighting and roofs, improved shading and other measures for commercial buildings.
- \$20 million for the first stage of a paid media campaign sponsored by the Department of Consumer Affairs. State agencies and departments will support this effort with four million public contacts a month.

The Governor also signed an executive order requiring all retail establishments to reduce outdoor lighting during non-business hours to a fraction of maximum capability.

Generation

A reliable supply of electricity is the lifeblood of California's prosperity. Unfortunately, deregulation has left a dangerous imbalance between energy supply and demand.

For the twelve years before Governor Davis took office, the state failed to build a single major power plant. Under the Davis Administration, those days are over.

Since April 1999, nine new major power plants (eight of which will produce 500 MW or more) have been licensed. Six are under construction. In addition, 15 are being considered for licensing.

Under Governor Davis' emergency powers and proposals, California will streamline efforts to bring an additional 20,000 MW online by summer 2004. By July 2001, California should have another 5,000 MW in new power generation on line. By summer 2002, that number should increase to 10,000 MW.

Governor Gray Davis

Governor Davis will ensure that all generation measures maintain California's commitment to clean air and the environment. He has appointed a Clean Energy Green team to oversee the permitting and construction process.

He is also committed to upgrading the transmission system to improve its efficiency and improving fuel delivery.

Governor Davis has also announced a legislative package to provide incentives to power up more renewable energy, distributed generation and co-generation.

Governor Davis and his Administration have:

- Signed an Executive Order to maximize generating output at existing facilities by allowing increased operating hours and waiving cumbersome timelines for retrofits and restarts (provided additional power is sold at reasonable rates under DWR).
- Created an acceleration bonus for developers who can complete construction and bring plants on line by July 2001.
- Directed State and local agencies to streamline the review and permit process for new baseload facilities that can come on line during peak demand periods in 2002.
- Streamlined review process for siting of new natural gas fired or renewable peaking power plants that can be on line by summer 2001.
- Released a report by the California Energy Commission identifying 32 potential locations for the siting of "peaking" plants.
- Taken steps toward providing low-interest financing for new peaking facilities and the "re-powering" of existing ones.

The ISDOC Subcommittee on LAFCO Funding met Friday morning (March 2) to discuss recommendations from the staff subcommittee (memo attached).

Subcommittee members – Arlene Schafer, Jim Reed, Joan Finnegan, Ed Royce, Mike Dunbar, Mary Aileen Matheis and Keith Coolidge – agreed with the tiered approach and unanimously recommend it implementation, with the following changes:

- 1) Create a new tier among the non-enterprise districts to include those districts with operating revenue between \$500,000 and \$1 million/yr.;
- Modify Tiers C & D to more closely align districts with similar operating revenue.

Some Subcommittee members were concerned that the Rossmoor/Los Alamitos Sewer District's operating revenues are considerably less than the others in their category. This could be addressed by creating a lifeline tier with a fixed charge similar to the non-enterprise districts, however, the Subcommittee did not recommend that approach.

Programming- The winter programming ended late February. There were no storytimes, lapsits, or musictimes in March.

School Visits- School visits have continued. Eleven classes and private schools visited during March. A total of 226 children participated in these visits. A CBET class with 50 adults and 10 children came in one day for a tour of the library and instruction on children's book selection.

Offsite Programming-Storytimes at the Placentia Community Centers and the Head Start classrooms have continued. There were 4 storytimes at the community centers with a combined attendance of 28. Four storytimes were performed for each of the seven Head Start classes with a combined attendance of 560.

Reading Incentive Programs- The In-N-Out reading program "Food for Thought" began February 11 and ended March 22. Children who read five library books earned a free hamburger. By the end of the program 189 children had signed up, 31 had finished one book mark, and 35 had finished all three bookmarks.

Summer Reading Program- Planning for the Summer Reading Program continues. Seven performers are booked for Way Out Wednesdays including: Magician John Abrams, Pierre Cruzatte of the Lewis and Clark Expedition, Franklin Haynes Marionettes and others. Funding came through from the LA Times Read by Nine organization and Calfed. The funds will cover the artist fees, and the cost of printing the children's materials (book-logs, bookmarks, posters and certificates). Riverside Press Enterprise will be donating their services to print the YA materials.

Tutor Training. The Literacy Coordinator conducted a tutor training workshop on Sunday, March 4 and nine tutors were trained, six adults and three teens. Additionally, one adult and one teen tutor received accelerated training for a total of eleven for the month. All eleven new tutors are matched and tutoring in the Library. The next tutor training is scheduled for April 1.

New Families for Literacy (FFL) Program Status. We had no new families begin in March. Erin, one of our FWS staff, is now on site at Placentia Head Start every Monday and Wednesday mornings. She is there to interface with the Head Start classes and to recruit FFL families.

Partnership for Change (PFC) Coalition Meets/Phase 1b of Spanish Literacy Begins. In March, the PFC coalition, consisting of the Library, the City of Placentia, Placentia Head Start, and Altrusa, met to discuss the budget, student recruitment, and the next phase of Spanish Literacy. The current phase, Spanish Literacy 1b, began February 6 and will conclude April 27. We will continue to recruit additional Spanish literacy students during phase 1b, and we plan to start a new phase 1 in April.

Rotary Reading Assistance Program (RRAP) Kicks Off. RRAP, a partnership with the Placentia and Yorba Linda Rotary Clubs, the Placentia/Yorba Linda Unified School District, and the Library, started in February at three district high schools: El Dorado, Esperanza, and Valencia. A concept developed by Jeff White of the Yorba Linda Sunrise Rotary Club, RRAP offers high school students the opportunity to get community service hours by volunteering at local elementary schools. RRAP Tutors began going to local elementary schools the last week of March. Placentia Library's Literacy Coordinator developed the training for the program, and had trained a total of 71 volunteers high school volunteers by the end of March.

Reach Out and Read Partnership Begins. In March, the Placentia Library Literacy Services began its partnership with St. Judes Medical Center and the Reach Out and Read Program, a pediatric-based literacy program. On Monday mornings, one of our staff members, Charris Medina, and a volunteer, Diane Martlo, go to the Whitten Center in Placentia and read to children in the waiting room while they are waiting to see the St. Judes pediatric staff.

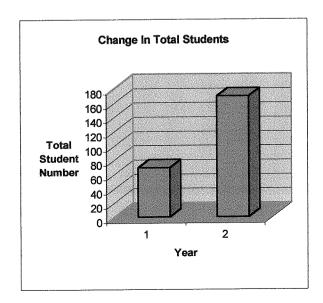

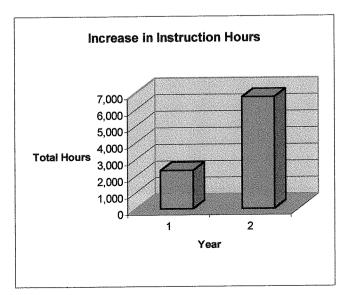

Governing board policies: What should the board have in place?

Board policy

ichigan Board Chairperson
Felicia Hunter asked me a very
good question recently. "What
are the basic board policies and procedures that should be in place for a governing board?" she asked.

This is a very astute question for board members to ask, because it cuts right to the heart of a board's duties and responsibilities to a nonprofit organization.

Here are the board policies and governing documents that I believe boards, working with their executive director, should create for their organizations...

- 1. The organisation should have bylaws. Bylaws and articles of incorporation govern how the board will operate. They meet legal requirements and specify matters like the number of members on the board, meeting quorum requirements, the number and type of board officers the board will have, along with their duties, the types of committees the board uses and a description of what they do, and indicate the parliamentary authority the board will use for its meetings, e.g. Roberts Rules of Order.
- Board policies. The following is not an exhaustive list, but gives a good overview of the types of board policies boards use to guide their operations.
 - Board education.
 - Executive director evaluation.
 - Conflict of interest.

- Code of conduct or code of ethics.
- Board/staff relationship.
- Emergency meetings of the board.
- The board's need to support its decisions.
- Spending authority for the administrator.
- Financial policies.
- Authority of individual board members.
- Board evaluations.
- Mission.
- Roles and responsibilities of board members.
- · Volunteers.
- Board recruitment.
- A policy on writing board policy.
- Board orientation.
- Removal of board members.
- Advocacy.
- The board member job description.
- Committee job descriptions.
- 3. Organizational policies. These are the policies that the board approves that "set the rules" for how the organization works. Most boards work closely with their executive director and staff to develop these policies. Some examples include:
 - Personnel policies that ensure compliance with state and federal laws like the Americans with Disabilities Act, The Family and

Medical Leave Act, and policies on Equal Employment Opportunity, sexual harassment and at-will employment.

- Policies that govern service delivery.
- Financial policies (internal controls).
- Administrative policies (matters like keys to the offices, smoking, staff training, job descriptions, staff performance appraisals, staff

- orientation and training, and termination of employment).
- Volunteer recruitment and management.
- Policies that govern holidays, vacations, pay schedules, etc.

Tips to improve your board's time management

eople who volunteer to serve on a nonprofit's board of directors are usually adding one more commitment to an already hectic personal life.

They don't have time to waste when it comes to meeting their board obligations. That's why it's important that all board members value time, and work efficiently as they conduct their board business.

Here are some suggestions, both for the individual board member, and the board team, that can help you work efficiently.

For the individual board member:

- 1. Manage your paper effectively. Be prepared. Spend time studying the meeting packets your administrator sends you. Jot your questions on the materials you review.
- 2. Be efficient on the telephone and with e-mail. Set aside time to make all your board-related calls and e-mails in one time period. This also gives you a chance to prepare for these conversations, etc.
- 3. Set aside time to speak with your administrator. Communication is a two-way street. This is when you can get your questions answered, in advance of board meetings.

For the board team:

- Always have an agenda for board meetings, set an adjournment time and stick to it.
- 2. Take accurate meeting minutes.

- Recording board activities saves you time, because you don't have to reconstruct what happened at the meeting at a later time. You can also bring board members who missed a meeting up to speed quickly.
- 3. Ask your administrator to write board motions in advance of meetings when the board will be asked to make decisions. This way, motions will be worded properly, and time isn't wasted at meetings hashing out motion language.
- 4. Don't cancel meetings. This is unfair to board members who make the effort to attend.
- 5. Use committees effectively. A committee should study issues that require a board decision—do the groundwork—and make recommendations for board approval. Don't rehash committee work at board meetings. This wastes both the committee's work and the full board's time.
- 6. As a board activity, put a dollar value on the board's time. What is an hourly "value" for each board member's time? Multiply this figure by the number of members of your board, and you'll likely see an impressive figure that should drive home the importance of working effectively and efficiently as a board.

First LLABS vehicle arrives in Stockton/San Joaquin County

The first Library Literacy and Books Services (LLABS) vehicle arrived at the Stockton/San Joaquin County Library in January 2001. Nicknamed "Training Wheels," this 32-footlong vehicle provides Families For Literacy (FFL) type services to hard-to-reach families and care providers with children under five years of age.

Technology Act grant, which the California State Librarian administers. The grant will serve as a model for another ten vehicles destined for public libraries throughout the state.

The California State Library also received a California Children and Families Commission grant award of \$2.1 million in 2000. This state money has been

granted to ten public libraries statewide to purchase LLABS vehicles, like the one that visited the Stockton/San Joaquin County Library, and operate them for one year.

Four LLABS vehicles will be parked near the San Francisco Convention Center on Saturday, June 16, 2001, during the American Library Association's annual conference. These vehicles will be featured during the conference as an exciting new outreach effort.

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LLABS has books, educational videos and video players for loan. It also has computers and educational software for pre-schoolers so that families without access to computers can become familiar with them prior to their children entering school. And LLABS provides a variety of intergenerational activities for families, including story times, puppet shows, and storytelling. As part of their services to families, LLABS distributes free children's books and literacy-enriching materials for the home through this LLABS vehicle.

The program requires that each recipient public library partner closely with other agencies and services in its county/community to see that families are connected to the important services available to them. The partnering effort will ensure that families are

provided with literacy, parenting, health, nutrition, safety, and other valuable information.

The purchase of the first LLABS vehicle was through the support of the U.S. Institute of Museum and Library Services under the provisions of the federal Library Services and



Three programs highlight latest literacy campaign activity

Below are updates on three projects of the California State Library's California Literacy Campaign program:

Early Steps to Reading Success (ESRS):

Public library literacy staff were encouraged to partner with this exciting project of the California Council for the Education of Young Children (CCEYC) and to share the opportunity with their children's services departments. A key benefit of this ESRS project is that selected sites throughout California will receive satellite dishes, and the sites will receive three year memberships to the national Head Start network called "Heads Up! Network." To get these great benefits, libraries participating in this project must host a 44 hour training course for daycare and homecare providers using the satellite dish. To date, eleven public libraries have received satellite dishes, and ESRS will notify libraries about an additional round of satellite grants later this year.

New Partnership with the Vermont Center for the Book (VCB):

The California State Library recently entered into a new partnership with the VCB to pilot *You Can Count on Mother Goose*, a family program designed to help parents with children four to eight years old to use and value math. Like the previous science curriculum partnership and pilot program entitled *Mother Goose Asks Why?*, the new program uses quality children's books to engage participants in the pilot program.

California will use the pilot project with the VCB to focus on families with low literacy skills. The VCB is not only providing \$10,000 worth of books and materials, but also training for five public libraries with Families For Literacy (FFL) programs. Library jurisdictions selected to participate include Escondido, Riverside County, South San Francisco, Solano County, and Napa City/County.

Governor's Book Fund (GBF):

Over 2,700 applications for the GBF School Library Enrichment Grants were received in December 2000, an overwhelming response for the first year. Forty-seven school libraries were selected based on their need and their creative approaches to selecting and promoting the books purchased with the grant money. IN MEMORIAM

Lawrence Clark Powell, A legendary librarian

Lawrence Clark Powell died in Benson, Arizona Wednesday, March 14, 2001, at the age of 94. Powell, an extraordinary librarian and literary bibliographer, was best known for his work at the UCLA library where he established the UCLA School of Library Service. UCLA's library on the Westwood campus in Los Angeles was named the Powell Library when Powell retired, a fitting tribute to this pioneer of the library field.

California State Librarian Dr. Kevin Starr made this statement about Powell's passing: "Lawrence Clark Powell was not only my personal friend and constant correspondent. He was my model as well for what a librarian should be: in love, that is, with books, information, libraries, and the life of the mind. Dr. Powell will now rank with Justin Winsor and Althea Warren in

the pantheon of great American librarians."

Although Powell was chief librarian at UCLA for 28 years, from 1944 until he retired in 1966, he was also a writer: his love of books overflowed from bibliographical science into biography and fiction. His most famous biographies and essays are about Western writers such as Robinson Jeffers, Charles Edward Pickett, Zane Grey, and Raymond Chandler. Powell also wrote novels.

In addition, Powell was president of the California Library Association, the Bibliographical Society of America, and was a California Historical Society fellow.

According to the Los Angeles Times, a memorial service is scheduled April 8 at 2 p.m. in the Singing Wind Bookshop near Benson, Ariz.

Connecting the future with the past:

Digital storytelling in Sunnyvale

With the proliferation of information available on the World Wide Web and other technologies, one of the questions that arises is how the public library of the future will remain viable. One answer could be that the pulse of a library depends on the strength of its heart: the community. In this scenario, development of community and local history resources could become a vital component of any library service mission. would then become not only collectors and organizers of local information, but producers of content as well. The Sunnyvale Voices: From Settlers to Silicon project represents this scenario as one possible avenue for libraries to take in the future to capture and preserve their local history through the stories of their residents, and to

The project began in early 1998 when the Sunnyvale Public Library celebrated its 85th birthday. The library held a birthday celebration during which longtime residents shared their recollections of life in Sunnyvale before it became known as the "center of Silicon Valley." Apricot growers, defense workers, and others reflected on how much change had taken place over the years. After the event, members of the audience approached library staff requesting that the library somehow capture these stories so they could be shared with others in the future. This input from the community along with the realization of the dwindling number of people who had memories of Sunnyvale's early history led to capturing these stories with the help of a computer.

make them available in a variety of formats.

Digital stories are dynamic and interactive; they typically include voice, music, photographs, and video elements. The stories are digital because all of the processes involved including capturing, scanning, recording, editing, and distribution are accomplished with the help of a computer. The tools of a digital storyteller include digital still and video cameras, scanners, video editing computer workstations, and various software applications. Building on the work of the Center for Digital Storytelling at UC Berkeley and the non-profit Digital Clubhouse Network in Sunnyvale, the Sunnyvale Library's digital storytelling project aimed to provide access to the oral histories of local residents.

Creating a digital story begins with an orientation meeting of the story collector and the storyteller. If the

storyteller is sufficiently interested in the project, a story development session is scheduled. At this session,

discussed until both the storyteller and story collector agree on one that will be interesting to local residents and easy to tell in 4-7 minutes (the average length of one story). The storyteller prepares a written draft, which is reviewed by an informal editorial

board. Once approved, the storyteller telling his or her story is recorded using a digital video camera. The video footage is combined with a soundtrack, any scans of photographs the storyteller may have shared, and any digital still pictures taken during the session. A project file of the session is then created using an Adobe Premiere software program. The project can then be transferred for archival purposes onto CD-ROM or a backup hard drive, to VHS or S-VHS video tape for public viewing or cable broadcast, or to Real Player formats for streaming the video over the World Wide Web.

This project is supported by the U.S. Institute of Museum and Library Services under the provisions of the Library Services and Technology Act, administered in California by the state librarian. Between October 1999 and September 2001, the Sunnyvale Public Library received two LSTA grants to fund the Sunnyvale Voices project. During this time, both storytelling and technical processes were developed and refined. Twenty-two stories are anticipated to be complete by the end of the grant period in September 2001.

"After hearing the different Sunnyvale Voices stories, the community seems more like a large family," observed Ann Zarko, one of Sunnyvale's longtime residents.
