Re: Medical Plan Anniversary Change

Currently, the group medical plan's anniversary is March 1. Under review is a proposed change in the anniversary date to July 1.

Blue Shield was asked to allow for an anniversary change to July 1 and keep the March 1 renewal rate through 7/1/01. Blue Shield's initial response is that such a change will result in a 7% rate increase.

Currently, the group medical plan includes a \$15,000 life insurance benefit for each covered employee. Under review is a proposed change to increase the benefit to \$50,000.

There are two ways to add to the existing coverage:

1) Increase the benefit with Blue Shield - monthly cost for the increase would be \$250.95

Purchase a stand alone group plan - monthly cost for the increase would be \$84.70

Re: Approved Supplemental Life Insurance Benefit for Library Director

Previously the Board approved providing a supplemental life insurance benefit for Elizabeth Minter which would result in a total benefit equal to two times annual salary. The total benefit would include the combination of any existing group life coverage provided by the Library District plus individual coverage to be applied for.

The plan approved by the Board was a 15 year term insurance plan for \$135,000. As is frequently done in corporate benefit plans Mrs. Minter requested the issuance of a 30 year term insurance plan with the understanding that she will be responsible for the annual premium in excess of the premium for the 15 year term plan.

Here are the final results:

Cost of 30 year term plan - \$1,303.90 Cost of 15 year term plan (paid for by Library District) - \$\frac{5}{785.50}\$

Difference (paid for by Mrs. Minter) - \$ 518.40

The Committee is delighted with the progress of the History Room expansion. We have met on many of the details with Elizabeth, most recently about the carpet and tile selection and an exploratory trip to look at furniture.

We have some tentative ideas for the "grand opening" which may occur in November. We would want to include members of the community who have made contributions. We are considering a series of four talks on local history given on a weekly basis. We will of course want to highlight the involvement of the city council.

The lighting fixture from the old library is being refurbished to hang in the entry to the history room. We have received several additional donations from the Brower estate; one of particular interest is a collection of letters written by both Sarah and William McFadden to their sons attending Stanford, and following the parents' death, amongst the siblings.

The Heritage Coordinating Council has welcomed our involvement in their group, constituted of history room professional staffs around the county. They are amazed at Placentia's volunteer involvement in the preservation of its local history. Next bimonthly meeting will be in May at the Orange Main Library.

Our collaboration group - Building Bridges to Placentia's History - holds its third meeting April 12. The group has brainstormed ideas on creating resident's heightened awareness regarding Placentia's history. Our committee has offered to highlight through its website link information on various groups within the city detailing history, contributions and goals. In addition, we have contacted the city administration for participation of a variety of groups on the Placentia's Place TV show. While invitations to join us were sent to an extensive list, those participating are: Santa Fe Merchants Assn, Chamber of Commerce, Founders Society, Historical Committee, PYLUSD, Round Table, George Key Ranch and a citizen member, John Penner.

We are responsive to requests from patrons and the press; we able to do so because our files are within the building. Our data entry volunteer continues to input vertical file information. Meanwhile, we are researching a more user friendly software system.

We have recently visit CSUF's Local History Collection, the Discovery (History) Museum in Santa Ana and are attending a local history class being offered by the Community College District.

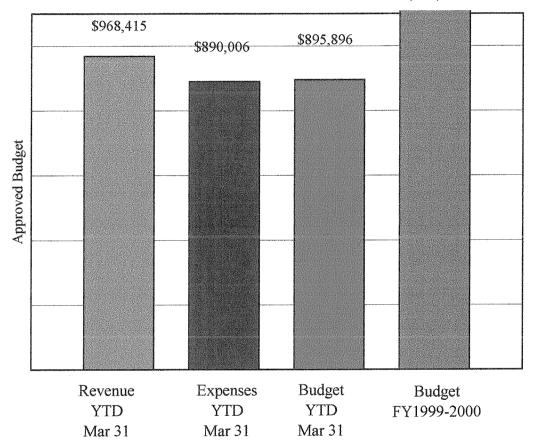

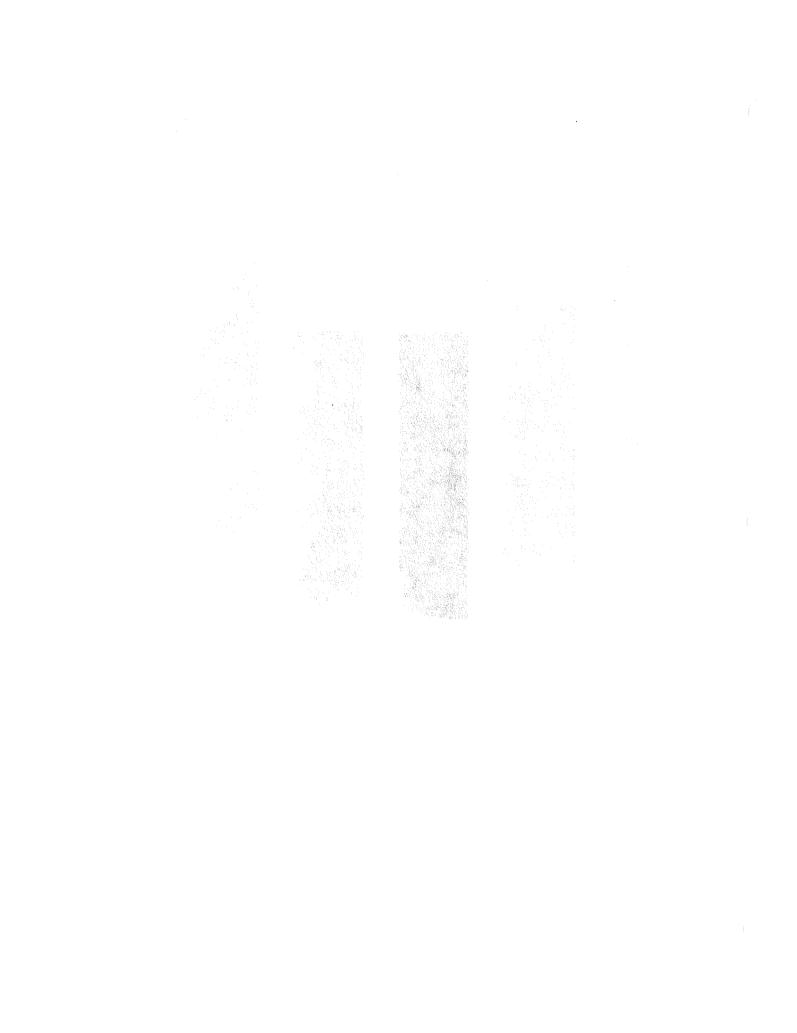

2000 Legislative Positions

The CSDA Legislation Committee reviews numerous bills each year that may be of interest to members. Board ratified *positions* are taken on most of them in March after which the Committee monitors progress until their conclusion. Given that most legislation undergoes numerous amendments during the legislative process, there could occur, from time-to-time, a change in a position. By accessing the California State Home Page, you can check on any bill and even subscribe to bills of interest where you are automatically notified by e-mail of activity.

The various "positions" include Support, Support with Amendments, Neutral, Oppose, Oppose unless Amended, Watch, or No Interest.

In addition to positions on each bill, one of three "priority" designations may be assigned.

Priority 1: Bills deemed to have the highest priority for CSDA for which the CSDA Legislative Advocate will actively lobby for or against the bill; present CSDA's position before all relevant legislative committees; and when warranted, employ CSDA's Grassroots Network.

Priority 2: CSDA will express its position and suggested amendments, where appropriate, in writing to the bill's author and relevant committees and present testimony.

Priority 3: CSDA will express its position in writing to the bill's author only and may provide testimony on a limited basis.

The format used in reporting this information is to list the *bill*, the last name of the *author*, the *title* and the *position and priority* taken on the bill by CSDA. AB means "Assembly Bill"; SB means "Senate Bill"; ACA means "Assembly Constitutional Amendment" and SCA means "Senate Constitutional Amendment". SB 238-BACA

Strongly Oppose

Would require every public library that provides access to the Internet to purchase, install and maintain computer software which will prohibit access to obscene material on all computers used by children. As amended in Senate Judiciary Committee 4/20, would require an adult to provide supervision to a child using the Internet, or provide them with the option of using a filtered terminal, or signing a parental consent release.

Senate Public Safety Failed Passag Reconsideration Granted

SB 571-ALARCON

Watch

Expands the Families for Literacy Program (which provides funding for eligible public libraries with the purpose of providing literacy, and coordinating literacy efforts) to also provide training to parents who are not reading skilled.

Vetoed by Governor

SB 639-McPHERSON Support As introduced, would include a "library" in the definition of an organization that performs beneficial or charitable works, for the purpose of allowing a raffle to be conducted on its behalf. It is considered a "raffle" and not a prohibited lottery if all of the funds raised are used solely for the benefit of the library. Later amended to specify that these organizations must also obtain a registration or permit from the California Gambling Control Commission.

Senate Appropriations Suspense F

SB 921-VASCONCELLOS Support Would appropriate \$40 million to create the Faculty, Counselor and Librarian employment Fund for the purpose of increasing the number of full-time faculty, counselor, and library positions in the California Community Colleges by 2000 persons over a 5 year period.

Would appropriate \$1.2 million from the General Fund to the State Librarian for allocation to the California Newspaper Project from the 2000-01 fiscal year to 2003-04 inclusive to preserve valuable newspaper collections on microfilm

SB 992-KNIGHT Oppose Would require every computer at a public elementary or secondary school that has access to the Internet to install blocking software programs.

Blue Shield Access+ HMO

Certain changes have been made to your health plan. While your new contract will provide the details, the changes are summarized as follows.

Assembly Bill 7 - Length of Hospital Stay for Mastectomy

To meet the requirements of Assembly Bill 7, Blue Shield will allow the length of hospital stays associated with mastectomies and lymph node dissections to be determined by the attending physician in consultation with the patient and consistent with sound clinical principles and processes. In addition, a physician will not have to obtain prior approval from Blue Shield in determining the length of a hospital stay following a mastectomy or lymph node dissection.

Assembly Bill 984 - 911 Emergency Response

To comply with Assembly Bill 984, Blue Shield is adding language to the Evidence of Coverage booklet encouraging subscribers to use the "911" emergency response system when they reasonably believe they have an emergency medical condition that requires an emergency response.

Senate Bill 1129 - Continuity of Care

To comply with Senate Bill 1129, Blue Shield is informing subscribers how under certain circumstances a subscriber may request continuation of covered services from a provider who has been terminated.

Senate Bill 1443 - DOC Telephone Numbers/Internet Address

To meet the requirements of Senate Bill 1443, Blue Shield is including in the Evidence of Coverage booklet, along with the Department of Corporation's toll-free telephone assistance number, the California Relay service's toll-free telephone numbers for the hearing and speech impaired, the Department's internet address, and a reference to Blue Shield's telephone number. Additionally, Blue Shield is clarifying that Blue Shield's grievance process and the Department's complaint review process are in addition to other dispute resolution procedures that may be available, and do not preclude the use of any other remedy provided by law.

Outpatient Prescription Drug Benefit

Blue Shield is making the following changes to the outpatient prescription drug benefit: (1) revising the generic and brand name copayment amounts for Mail Order service to equal twice the generic and brand name Retail copayment amounts; and (2) changing the allowed Retail quantity from a 34-day to a 30-day supply.

Assembly Bill 1621, Reconstructive Surgery

To comply with Assembly Bill 1621, Blue Shield is revising the reconstructive surgery benefit to provide benefits for reconstructive surgery necessary to improve function or create a normal appearance, to the extent possible, and which results in more than a minimal improvement in function or appearance.

Expedited Decision Process (Grievance)

Blue Shield has established a procedure for Subscribers and Dependents to request an expedited decision when the routine decision making process might seriously jeopardize the life or health of the individual. Blue Shield will make a decision and notify the Subscriber or Dependent and physician within 72 hours following the receipt of the request.

Assembly Bill 974 and Senate Bill 625 - Outpatient Prescription Drugs

To meet the requirements of Senate Bill 625 and Assembly Bill 974, Blue Shield is revising the Outpatient Prescription Drug benefit language to (1) include a description of the authorization process for obtaining nonformulary drugs; and (2) specify that if a drug that was previously approved by Blue Shield for a Member's condition is changed to non-formulary status, Blue Shield will not limit or exclude such drug as long as the provider continues to prescribe the drug for the medical condition, and it is considered safe and effective.

Short Term Rehabilitation Therapy Services

Blue Shield is making the following modifications to this section and re-naming it Rehabilitative Therapy Services:

All day or visit limitations for Outpatient Rehabilitative Therapy Services are being removed. Benefits for these services will continue to be provided as long as they are medically necessary and as long as continued treatment offers a reasonable expectation of significant improvement. Outpatient Rehabilitative Therapy includes physical, occupational, speech and respiratory therapy. The day maximums for Inpatient rehabilitative services remain.

Assembly Bill 1663 and Senate Bill 189, Servises Denied As Experimental or Investigational

To comply with Assembly Bill 1663 and Senate Bill 189, Blue Shield is revising the "Services Denied As Experimental or Investigational" language to more fully disclose the external review process. Also, the definition of those eligible for this review is changed from those persons with a "terminal" condition to those persons with a "life threatening or seriously debilitating" condition.

Location Guidelines for Selecting a Personal Physician

The reference to a "30-mile radius" for selection of a Personal Physician is being deleted. The language now states that the Member's Personal Physician must "...be located sufficiently close to the Member's home or work address to ensure reasonable access to care, as determined by Blue Shield."

Assembly Bill 2003, Dental Anethesia.

To meet the requirements of Assembly Bill 2003, Blue Shield will provide coverage for general anesthesia services in connection with dental procedures under certain circumstances. These services will be covered when required because of an underlying medical condition or clinical status and when the person is under the age of seven or developmentally disabled regardless of age or when the persons health is compromised and for when general anesthesia is medically necessary regardless of age.

Assembly Bill 39, Contraceptive Benefits.

To meet the requirements of Assembly Bill 39, Blue Shield must provide coverage for a variety of Plan-designated FDA-approved prescription contraceptive methods for all groups with an Outpatient Prescription Drug benefit. If the Member's physician determines that none of the covered methods are medically appropriate for the patient, Blue Shield will provide coverage for another prescribed method. The Bill allows for an exemption if an employer meets the Bill's strict definition of a "religious employer".

Voluntary External Review.

Blue Shield is implementing a voluntary review process by which Members may request an independent, external review of services which have been denied by Blue Shield for Medical Necessity. Blue Shield will cover the cost of the review less a \$35 fee which must be paid by the Member. This fee will be waived in instances of financial hardship.

Assembly Bill 12, Second Opinion Procedures

AB 12 entitles a Member receiving HMO services to request a second medical opinion from a qualified Personal Physician or specialist physician under certain conditions. It also establishes a 72-hour time limit, whenever possible, for Blue Shield to provide or authorize this second opinion if the Member's condition is an imminent and serious threat to health. A specialist's second opinion can be obtained from any Blue Shield HMO networkprovider who has the same or equivalent specialty, while a Personal Physician second opinion mustbe obtained from a physician within the same Medical Group/IPA as the Personal Physician. All second opinions must be authorized by Blue Shield.

Senate Bill 189, Grievance Procedure

To meet the requirements of Senate Bill 189, Blue Shield is revising language in the Member Service, Appeal Procedure, and Department of Managed Care Review provisions to state that:

Member Service will respond to all inquiries within 30 days,

both initial appeals and final appeals will be resolved within 30 days.

* a Member may submit a grievance to the Department of Managed Care after participating in Blue Shield's grievance process for 30 days,

and

* a Member may request an expedited decision if experiencing severe pain.

Senate Bill 737, Late Enrollees

SB 737 is a state law enacted to further comply with the Federal Health Insurance Portability & Accountability Act (HIPAA). In addition to confirming previous HIPAA requirements, this bill also makes the following revision: when special enrollment is used due to a marriage, the effective date will be the first day of the first month following receipt of the request for enrollment, rather than the first day of the month following the date of marriage. The effective date provisions are not discretionary.

BACKGROUND

Families for Literacy (FFL) is a California State Library sponsored project that targets adult learners with pre-school age children. The concept of FFL is that through the adult learner, the child/children will learn the value of reading at a formative age. The Placentia Library Literacy Services previously had an FFL Program, but library cutbacks eliminated that program several years ago.

On February 24, 2000, Jim Roberts, the Literacy Coordinator, participated in an FFL/ Prop 10 (tobacco tax) application workshop at the State Library in Sacramento. The California State Library is offering two grants in Fiscal Year 2000-2001 for California Literacy Campaign libraries who have existing FFL Programs or want to start new ones.

Libraries at the February workshop were invited to submit two FFL Grant Applications for fiscal year 2000-2001: a Families for Literacy Prop 10 Grant Proposal; and a Families for Literacy Grant Proposal. The State Library FFL Consultant committed \$10,000 from the FFL Prop 10 Grant and \$10,000 from the FFL Grant to the Placentia Library Literacy Services.

The main difference between the two grants is that the FFL Grant is renewable, but the State Library is not certain if FFL Prop 10 monies will continue to be available in subsequent fiscal years. Both grants are identical except the FFL Prop 10 Grant has a paragraph **VIII. PROP 10 ISSUES**, and the FFL Grant stops at paragraph **VI.** We requested \$30,000 in the FFL Grant and the State Library committed \$10,000. There is the likelihood that the full \$30,000 will be awarded in our Fiscal Year 2001-2002 FFL Budget. Both grants will be effective on July 1, 2000.

We plan to hire a .50 FTE Library Assistant for the FFL Program, effective June 12, 2000. We plan to start the FFL Coordinator on June 12 so that person can attend the annual Southern California Library Literacy Network Retreat from June 13-15 and receive adequate training prior to July 1.

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. Receive & File and Ratify applications for the Families for Literacy Proposal for Fiscal Year 2000-2001, and the Families for Literacy Prop 10 Grant Proposal for Fiscal Year 2000-2001, and
- 2. Authorize .50FTE position of Library Assistant for the Families for Literacy Program, effective June 12, 2000 with the personnel cost for the Fiscal Year 1999-2000 to be paid from the Substitute Librarian expense category.

FAMILIES FOR LITERACY GRANT PROPOSAL FISCAL YEAR 2000/2001

I. RATIONALE & INTEGRATION:

The Placentia Library Literacy Service (PLLS) is a charter member of the California Library Literacy Campaign and has been providing literacy services to the City of Placentia and several adjacent cities for more than twenty (20) years. PLLS was established as a member of the California Library Literacy Campaign in 1984 as an adult literacy provider and has been a library service and an integral part of the Placentia Library District over those same years. PLLS added a Families for Literacy (FFL) component in 1990 and provided FFL services until 1996 when budget and personnel cuts forced the library to eliminate the program. In addition to one-to-one adult tutoring, PLLS has an English speaking conversation group that concentrates on reading, writing, and conversation. In addition, we have school age learners being tutored in the program, which could be a logical follow-on to a Families for Literacy Program.

The Placentia Library District Director is a firm believer in the importance of literacy as a library service, and stresses that all departments of the library must work together as a team. In that respect, the Public Services Manager is also the Literacy Coordinator, and supervises Children's and Reference Services. The Public Services Manager/Literacy Coordinator conducts monthly meetings with the Children's and Reference librarians to work on coordinating, planning, and publicizing future programs. Children's Services presently has weekly lap sits (ages 0-2) and story times (ages 3-6) and one month of music time each quarter. The PLLS staff and tutors encourage learners to bring their children to these programs. The library has at least two staff meetings each month, and at these meetings the staff shares what is going on within each department. Every week, the Library Director, the Public Services Manager, the Technical Services Manager, and the Administrative Assistant meet to plan, share information and discuss strategies. Since the Families for Literacy Coordinator will be supervised by the Public Services Manager, as the Children's Librarian is now, communications between the two departments will be simplified.

II. POPULATION TO BE SERVED:

The City of Placentia is a city of approximately 50,000 residents and is located in northern Orange County. The city is bordered to the west by Fullerton (population 125,000), to the north and east by Yorba Linda (population 61,000), and to the south by Anaheim (population 302,000). Placentia is an ethnically diverse community with more than 30 percent of its population Hispanic and 11 percent Asian Pacific Islanders. Anaheim, Fullerton, and Yorba Linda have similar ethnic diversity. Placentia is part of a tri-city on line library automation system with Anaheim and Yorba Linda. The only other city in north Orange County that has a California Library Literacy Campaign literacy program is Anaheim, but the Anaheim Library does not have a Families for

Literacy Program. Consequently, the Placentia Library District population service area exceeds 500,000. Placentia has over 10 percent of its population below the poverty level. Many of the learners in the PLLS live below the poverty line. The PLLS presently has more than 70 learners—50 adults and 20 children. Of the 50 adults, five (5) have been identified who qualify for Families for Literacy. The PLLS is in the process of registering former LVA tutors and learners who meet in the Fullerton Library. We estimate that by the end of April, this will add an additional 30 matched pairs to the PLLS Program. From these additions, we estimate another five (5) learners who qualify for Families for Literacy. In addition, there is a Placentia-Yorba Linda School District Head Start School less than two miles from the Placentia Library. There are 122 pre-school age children enrolled there, and the staff estimates that a minimum of 20 percent or 24 families have literacy needs.

III. REQUIRED SERVICES:

- A. The Literacy Coordinator and the FFL Coordinator will work with the Children's Librarian to select books that are appropriate to give to children. The Technical Services Department will order these books. The books should be available to use with and give to the young children by early August 2000. Families for Literacy funds will be used to acquire these books. Families for Literacy Program funds will not be used to purchase books for the Placentia Library or to distribute to non-eligible learners or families.
- B. By early October, the Families for Literacy Coordinator will establish a regular story time for participants in the Families for Literacy Program. These story times will reflect the multicultural materials that are available in the library. We will also draw upon the experience and expertise of staff and volunteers who have backgrounds in multi-cultural children's literature. At the story times, staff and volunteers will conduct a variety of activities, such as songs, puppetry, finger plays, and crafts to promote an interest for and love of reading.
- C.&E. The PLLS FFL Coordinator, along with the Children's Librarian, will plan and schedule two programs during the year (one in November and another one in April) for parents and their children on how to encourage reading and how to do other enjoyable activities in the library. The Children's Librarian will provide materials from the library that parents can check out to help promote the love of reading to their children, for example books on how to tell stories, books on cassettes, books on arts and crafts, songbooks, etc. The FFL Coordinator will also encourage learners to sign their children up for regularly scheduled story times and the Children's Summer Reading Program.
- D. The PLLS Literacy Coordinator conducts monthly tutor training workshops. In the training, he stresses to the tutors the importance of the Language Experience Approach and emphasizes the value of incorporating them into literacy instruction. By July 2000, he will also provide additional training in the families

for Literacy Program. The PLLS will be implementing a novel "team tutoring" concept when we begin the FFL Program. In addition to adult tutors, the PLLS will recruit and train high school tutors, team them with adult tutors and a family so that when the family comes in, the tutor team also does, with the adult tutoring the parent and the high school tutor tutoring the child. In addition to the pre and post FFL Parent Survey, the PLLS will use CASAS pre and post testing to measure reading improvement and coordinate with the State Library and other FFL programs for additional measurement tools.

- F. The Children's Librarian, along with the FFL Coordinator, will give tours to all Families for Literacy participants, including tutors, of the Children's Department. The Children's Librarian will point out collections pertinent to the FFL Program. As new tutors are trained and matched with learners and join the FFL Program, the FFL Coordinator or the Children's Librarian will give them a similar tour. The tour will again highlight the programs offered by the Children's Department, and include the close relationship between Children's and Families for Literacy. Each year, the Friends of the Library hold an Annual Meeting on the second Monday in April where many volunteers are recognized, including literacy volunteers. In April 2001, the Families for Literacy Program will included in this event.
- G. The FFL Coordinator will work with the Public Services Manager to develop programs for Families for Literacy participants in using services to access books and other materials on a variety of parenting subjects, such as nutrition, parenting, health, and child care. We will invite experts on some of these different subjects to present programs and we will make library materials available for check-out. The FFL Coordinator will work with the tutors and families to promote the programs and encourage attendance.
- H. The PLLS realizes that there are obstacles for some learners when it comes to participation in library-based literacy programs. We have found that economics—the learner has to work, transportation, childcare—are the most common. With our "team tutor" concept, we hope to eliminate the childcare obstacle. As far as the learner working, since we match our tutors and learners together when both are available, that should eliminate conflicts there. We will assess transportation on an individual basis. If we determine that providing transportation or reimbursement for transportation is a limiting factor for a learner joining the Families for Literacy Program, then we will work with the tutor and try to find a way to resolve the problem.

IV. STAFF RESOURCES:

The Placentia Library District will commit the following staff resources to insure the success of the PLLS Families for Literacy Program for FY 2000-2001.

The PLLS Coordinator: 10 hours a week, funded by the Placentia Library District.

The PLLS FFL Coordinator: 20 hours a week, funded by Prop 10 and FFL Grants. Four (4) hours a week, funded by the Placentia Library District for a total of 24 hours per week.

<u>The Placentia Library District Children's Librarian</u>: 5 hours a week, funded by the Placentia Library District.

The Placentia Library District Director: The Placentia Library District Director is committed to making the Families for Literacy Program a success and will provide professional assistance and guidance as needed.

We will also be coordinating with professional experts outside of the library to provide programs for the FFL Program.

V. <u>EVALUATION COMPONENT:</u>

We will administer the pre and post Families for Literacy Parent Survey and in this manner be able to ascertain behavioral changes in family attitudes and behaviors toward reading. We will also incorporate into tutor training this facet of observing and communicating with FFL families and periodically get feedback from our FFL tutors. We will also administer a pre and post CASAS reading test to all FFL learners to gauge quantitative improvement in reading comprehension. Verbal communications improvement is hard to measure, but we will rely on our tutors to provide us periodic feedback on successes.

VI. PROSPECTS FOR CONTINUANCE IN THE FUTURE:

The PLLS Families for Literacy Coordinator's position will be integrated into regular library services and will need ongoing FFL funding in order to continue. We hope to be able in the future to augment the FFL funding and make the FFL Coordinator a full-time position.

We will also draw upon the experience and expertise of staff and volunteers who have backgrounds in multi-cultural children's literature. At the story times, staff and volunteers will conduct a variety of activities, such as songs, puppetry, finger plays, and crafts to promote an interest for and love of reading.
- C.&E. The PLLS FFL Coordinator, along with the Children's Librarian, will plan and schedule two programs during the year (one in November and another one in April) for parents and their children on how to encourage reading and how to do other enjoyable activities in the library. The Children's Librarian will provide materials from the library that parents can check out to help promote the love of reading to their children, for example books on how to tell stories, books on cassettes, books on arts and crafts, songbooks, etc. The FFL Coordinator will also encourage learners to sign their children up for regularly scheduled story times and the Children's Summer Reading Program.
- D. The PLLS Literacy Coordinator conducts monthly tutor training workshops. In the training, he stresses to the tutors the importance of the Language Experience Approach and emphasizes the value of incorporating them into literacy instruction. By July 2000, he will also provide additional training in the families

for Literacy Program. The PLLS will be implementing a novel "team tutoring" concept when we begin the FFL Program. In addition to adult tutors, the PLLS will recruit and train high school tutors, team them with adult tutors and a family so that when the family comes in, the tutor team also does, with the adult tutoring the parent and the high school tutor tutoring the child. In addition to the pre and post FFL Parent Survey, the PLLS will use CASAS pre and post testing to measure reading improvement and coordinate with the State Library and other FFL programs for additional measurement tools.

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VIII. PROP 10 ISSUES:

1. IMPROVED FAMILY FUNCTIONING: STRONG FAMILIES

The total Families for Literacy concept centers around improving family functioning and making strong families. By stressing to a child at the formative ages of 3-5 the importance of reading by the parent and the child has a definite positive impact on the family as a whole. The closeness that comes from a parent reading to his/her child will have a lasting and positive impact on the child, and facilitate the child's ability to create successful relationships, solve problems, and carry out responsibilities. Reading at a formative age and providing positive feedback to the child on his/her accomplishments will help build a strong self-concept at an early age.

2. IMPROVED CHILD DEVELOPMENT: CHILDREN LEARNING AND READY FOR SCHOOL

As stated in number 1 above, providing positive feedback to the child on his/her ability to read at an early age will build a strong self-concept, and could last a lifetime. At the

Placentia Library Literacy Services Families For Literacy Program, we plan to implement a tutoring concept that may help the child improve and succeed even more. We plan to implement a "team tutoring" concept, where we will train and match an adult tutor and a high school tutor with the family, and the parent and child will come to each tutoring session. The parent learner will be tutored by the adult tutor, and the child learner will be tutored by the high school tutor. This will create an environment where the child will be in a setting where he/she can develop skills that promote problem solving and creative thinking.

3. IMPROVED CHILD HEALTH: Healthy Children

The Placentia Library Literacy Service Families for Literacy Program believes that a healthy child is a happy child, and health includes the mind, body, and spirit. We plan to make the child's mind healthy by providing him/her with a tutor to facilitate reading. We will have programs for the parent and the child that emphasize the importance of health. Once these two are achieved, the spirit will follow.

BACKGROUND

The California Special Districts Association Board of Directors has voted to file an amicus curiae brief with the appellate court supporting the lower court ruling in County of Sonoma v. Commission on State Mandates et al. Background information is Attachment A.

The County Librarians have organized a legislative effort to have both the dependent and independent special district libraries exempted from the property tax shift. The independent districts initially were excluded but thanks to the work of Orange County Librarian John Adams and Los Angeles County Librarian Sandra Rueben we have been added. The independent special library districts have been asked to be prepared to make a full legislative "push", including the assistance of any lobbyists with whom we have a relationship, as soon as this bill is introduced. The proposed legislation is Attachment B. President Shkoler and Library Director Minter will report on a meeting to discuss this proposal with Assemblyman Dick Ackerman that was held on the afternoon of April 19, 2000.

The request through Assemblyman Ackerman's office for a legislative grant of \$55,000 for a roof replacement for Placentia Library has been forwarded to the Assembly Budget Committee. Letters in support of this request need to be sent immediately as we no longer have anyone in Sacramento who make personal visits to Assembly leadership on our behalf. Assemblyman Ackerman's letter is Attachment C.

LITIGATION SUCCESSFULLY CHALLENGING ERAF PROPERTY TAX SHIFT County of Sonoma v. Commission on State Mandates et al

Dear Member District:

RE:

As you are aware, beginning in fiscal year 1992-93 the State Legislature shifted property taxes from local governments to schools to close the annual budget gaps faced by the State. The concept of the property tax shift was to shift property taxes from local governments to schools which reduced, on a dollar-for-dollar basis, the amount the State was required to spend for schools pursuant to Proposition 98. These property tax shifts were implemented on a permanent basis so that cities, counties and special districts continue to receive a smaller share of property taxes than they did before the tax shifts, and schools receive a larger share. The property tax shift in the current budget year redirects about \$4 billion of property taxes from local governments to schools, which offsets an equal amount of State education spending.

STATUS OF LEGAL CHALLENGES TO PROPERTY TAX SHIFT

Several legal challenges have been filed to overturn the property tax shift. The grounds alleged by local government for overturning the property tax shift are that: (1) the State lacked the authority under Article XIII A of the State Constitution to reallocate property taxes to increase school funding; and (2) the property tax shifts violated local governments' "home rule" authority provided in the State Constitution. The courts rejected these arguments.

However, a different type of challenge was initiated by the County of Sonoma in December 1997. The County of Sonoma, later joined by most other counties, filed a claim with the Commission on State Mandates, arguing that the property tax shifts represent a reimbursable state mandate. Specifically, Sonoma County argued that the State has historically been responsible for funding the cost of education, and that the passage of Proposition 98 in 1988 mandated the State to contribute a minimum amount from its general fund to fund education. The property tax shift resulted in the State transferring part of its school funding responsibility to local governments by reallocating a portion of property tax revenues back to schools through ERAF's. The ERAF legislation caused the shift in the cost of funding schools by compelling cities, counties and special districts to accept partial financial responsibility for education that was previously funded by the State under the mandate of Proposition 98. The County of Sonoma argued that this practice of compelling local governments to accept financial responsibility for a program that was previously funded by the State constitutes a reimbursable mandate under Article XIII B section 6 of the Constitution.

In November 1998 the Commission on State Mandates issued its decision rejecting the test claim filed by the County of Sonoma and forty-seven other counties. The Commission

specially held that the reallocation of property tax revenues from cities, counties and special districts to ERAF's is not subject to Article XIII B section 6 of the Constitution regarding mandate reimbursement. In reaching this conclusion the Commission found that since there was no local expenditure of property tax proceeds by cities, counties and special districts for educational purposes, that there was no requirement to reimburse the cities, counties and special districts. In other words, since the property taxes are shifted from cities, counties and special districts and reallocated directly to schools without such property tax revenues ever having been received and then expended by local government, that there is no specific expenditure by local government of those property taxes for educational purposes, and without such an expenditure there is no obligation to reimburse.

In March 1999 the County of Sonoma filed a petition in the Sonoma County Superior Court to set aside the Commission's decision. In October 1999 the trial court concluded that the property tax shifts created a new program or higher level of service as defined by Article XIII B, section 6, and that the property tax shift legislation compels cities, counties and special districts to accept partial financial responsibility for a State program, education, that had previously been funded entirely by the State. The Court specifically disagreed with the Commission that a local expenditure of property tax proceeds for a previously State funded program is necessary for a mandate to be reimbursable. Rather, the Court held that a reimbursable mandate exists when the State shifts the cost of education by compelling local governments to pay the cost of entirely new programs created by the State, or by compelling them to accept financial responsibility in whole or in part for a program, such as education, which was funded entirely by the State previously. Local government is not required to expend their own funds on new programs in order to be entitled to reimbursement. Rather, it is sufficient if the responsibility for the cost of the program is shifted from the State to local government. The Court noted that in the case of the ERAF legislation, the cost of education has been partially shifted to local government by diverting local property taxes to ERAF which cities, counties and special districts would otherwise have used for other programs.

Therefore, the trial court ordered the Commission on State Mandates to find that the property tax shifts constitute a reimbursable mandate and make a determination as to the amount of money that should be reimbursed to local government.

EFFECT OF THE COURT'S DECISION

Although the test claim filed by the County of Sonoma before the Commission on State Mandates dealt with only the shift of the County's portion of the property tax to ERAF, the Court's decision speaks generally of the property tax shift legislation as effecting cities, counties and special districts. The decision also states that the specific purpose of Article XIII B, section 6 of the Constitution is to equalize financial responsibility between the State and all local government entities by requiring the State to reimburse those local entities when there is a shift of financial responsibility for the cost of a mandated program from the State to the local entity. The Legislative Analyst's Office has agreed that the Court's ruling applies to all local governments sustaining property tax shift losses; cities, counties and special districts.

The Commission on State Mandates regulations limit the period of time over which a reimbursable mandate must be reimbursed to a period beginning with the fiscal year prior to

the year the test claim is filed, and ending when the ruling requiring reimbursement becomes final. In this case, all local governments could conceivably be eligible for reimbursement for property taxes shifted since the 1996-97 fiscal year. The Legislative Analyst estimates that by the end of 2000-01 budget year, the total amount of property taxes shifted since 1996-97 will total over \$13 billion. This amount could be subject to offset by various legislative relief measures which have been passed since 1993-94 to mitigate the effect of the property tax shift legislation. Most of those relief measures directly effect counties and public safety functions of cities, counties and special districts.

The current status of the County of Sonoma litigation is that the Commission on State Mandates filed an appeal of the trial court decision with the First District Court of Appeal on December 21, 1999. The case is currently being briefed. CSDA will be seeking permission from the Court of Appeal to file an "amicus curiae" or "friend-of-the-court" brief to support the position of the counties.

WHAT YOUR DISTRICT CAN DO

In light of the appeal of the trial court decision, the Commission on State Mandates has not yet had an opportunity to follow the direction of the trial court which ordered it to make a determination as to the amount which should be reimbursed to all of the counties who participated in the test claim. Therefore, the Commission on State Mandates proceeding has not yet been finalized. CSDA is filing appropriate paper work with the Commission on State Mandates to become an "interested party" in that proceeding. The status of an "interested party" will allow CSDA to receive and evaluate copies of all written arguments filed by all of the parties in the matter, obtain timely copies of all rulings and decisions by the Commission on State Mandates after appeal, and participate in argument as to the amounts of property tax shifts for special districts which should also be reimbursed.

Special districts should first determine whether their respective counties have participated as a party in the County of Sonoma litigation. Next, special districts should inquire of their respective counties as to whether the individual claims for reimbursement filed by each county in the litigation include the total amount of property tax shifted on behalf of all cities and special districts within the county as well as the county's share itself, or whether the county's claim only includes the amount of the county's portion of the property tax that was shifted to the local ERAF. County Counsel for County of Sonoma advises that the Sonoma County claim filed in the litigation included only the county's share of the property tax shifted to the local ERAF. However, County Counsel has also advised that other counties participating in the litigation have included in their claims the total amount of property tax shifted by all local government agencies receiving property tax within that county, including all special districts receiving property tax within such counties. Each member special district should determine from their county whether the special district's share of property tax shifted to ERAF since 1996-97 is included within their county's respective claim or not. If it is determined that the amount of property tax shifted from special districts has not been included in a participating county's claim, an effort should be made to persuade such counties to amend their claims to include the amounts of property tax shifted on behalf of all local government agencies receiving property tax within that county.

If the County of Sonoma is successful on appeal, the specific issue of reimbursement will be returned to the Commission on State Mandates for decision. The regulations governing the procedures of the Commission on State Mandates appear to allow other "interested parties," such as special districts, to file their own claims for reimbursement of shifted property taxes before the Commission.

CSDA will continue to apprise special districts of the status of the litigation and the procedures available to special districts to process their own individual claims for reimbursement before the Commission.

PROPOSED LEGISLATION: EXEMPTION OF SPECIFIED PUBLIC LIBRARIES FROM ERAF

Article I - General Provisions

This chapter shall be known and may be cited as the California Dependent and Independent Library Special Districts Relief Act of 2000.

The Legislature finds and declares the following:

- A. Public libraries are an important resource to further California's reading and literacy goals both in conjunction with the public schools and for the adult population, a fact recognized by the voters of the State of California when they approved the California Reading and Literacy Improvement and Public Library Construction and Renovation Bond Act of 2000.
- B. Public libraries are a supplement to the formal system of free public education and a source of information and inspiration to persons of all ages, cultural backgrounds, and economic statuses, and a resource for continuing education and reeducation beyond the years of formal education, and as such, deserve adequate financial support from government at all levels.

- C. The 24 dependent library special districts which are county libraries and 11 independent library special districts receive a direct share of the property tax in each of their counties in accordance with AB-8 and have experienced and continue to experience substantial losses of revenue beginning in fiscal year 1991/92 due to the requirement to shift ad valorem property tax revenues to their respective counties' Educational Revenue Augmentation Funds.
- D. The total amount of property tax shifted from these libraries was approximately \$62 million in fiscal year 1998/99 and resulted in significant reductions in services to residents of these districts, inadequate library hours, inadequate collections of library materials, inadequate staff services to promote reading and literacy, and inadequate resources to fully participate in partnerships with the public schools.
- E. The independent library special districts, although some are governed by unified school district boards, are public libraries, comparable in their purpose and services to city libraries and county libraries, and are not school libraries.
- F. These libraries have not directly or indirectly enjoyed the benefit of the \$2.3 billion State mitigation offsets provided to cities and counties which have benefited city libraries and county libraries not classified as dependent library special districts.

- G. These libraries provide library service to 11.2 million people, approximately one-third of the State's population.
- H. The Constitutional provisions of Proposition 218, passed after the ERAF shift was enacted, eliminate virtually all assessment mechanisms for these library special districts to raise revenue.
- 1. Current law holds a large number of special districts harmless from the ERAF shift or has dramatically limited the amount shifted. Special districts receiving such legislative relief include fire, police protection, water/flood control, open space, resource conservation, hospital, transit and memorial districts, and several specific library special districts not included in the provisions of this legislation.
- J. The dependent and independent special district libraries do not have the ability to independently raise revenue without a two-thirds voter approval requirement.
- K. The appropriations for the Public Library Foundation Program through Education Code, Title 1, Division I, Part 11, Chapter 1.5, Sections 18010-18031, while substantial and reflecting recognition by the State of the important role of libraries in education, have offset only a small portion of the revenue loss experienced by these libraries.

L. It is in the interest of the people and of the State that these libraries have a more adequate funding base to provide open hours, reading materials, and staff services, in order that they can contribute effectively to the improvement of reading and literacy skills throughout the State.

As used in this chapter, the following terms have the following meanings:

- A. Dependent library special district means a county free library established pursuant to Article 1 of Chapter 6 of Part 11 of Division I of Title 1 of the Education Code, for which a property tax was levied in the 1977/78 fiscal year and which is subject to the requirement to shift ad valorem property tax revenue annually to the county's' Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund.
- B. Independent library special district means a library district established under Education Code, Sections 19471-2, a unified school district public library district established under Education Code, Section 18490, and a library district in unincorporated towns and villages established under Education Code, Section 19657, for which a property tax was levied in the 1977/78 fiscal year and which is subject to the requirement to shift ad valorem property tax revenue annually to the county's Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund.

Article II - Fiscal Provisions

A. Effective July 1, 2000, for fiscal year 2000/01 and each fiscal year thereafter, the county free libraries established pursuant to Article 1 of Chapter 6 of Part 11 of Division 1 of Title 1 of the Education Code, and for which a property tax was levied in the 1977/78 fiscal year, shall be exempt from the requirement to shift ad valorem property tax revenue to their respective counties' Educational Revenue Augmentation Funds.

B. For the purpose of this legislation, the following county libraries are those defined as dependent library special districts for tax purposes:

C. Effective July 1, 2000, for fiscal year 2000/01 and each fiscal year thereafter, the following independent library special districts shall be exempt from the requirement to shift ad valorem property tax revenue to their respective counties' Educational Revenue Augmentation Funds:

Banning Unified School District Library District (Riverside County)

Beaumont Library District (Riverside County)

Blanchard/Santa Paula Public Library District (Ventura County)

Buena Park Library District (Orange County)

The purpose of this letter is to provide the Assembly Budget Committee with an outline of my state and local priorities for the 2000-01 Budget. In light of the historic budget surplus estimates of more than \$10 billion, any budget adopted by this Legislature must contain significant tax relief to the hardworking families of California. In addition, new funding to strengthen education must provide local discretion to our school districts. This budget must also contain a down payment of one-time funding invested in rebuilding California's infrastructure needs, as well as provide money dedicated to local governments' fiscal relief.

I have provided regional and district project descriptions below. In addition, I have attached a chart that includes a brief project description, appropriate state department, amount requested and the recipient agency of funds for these priorities. Supplemental background material for each project is available upon request.

- \$345,546, to fund a multi-faceted project of the Orange County Conservation Corps (OCCC) in conjunction with Orange County, involving the removal and control of non-native vegetation near the Santa Ana River and Featherly Park. The habitat for the endangered species, the Least Bell's Vireo, will also be restored at the park through the replanting of a competitive native plant species called the Mule Fat. The project will put at-risk youth to work on a regional project that will benefit the community and environment.
- \$200,000, for a one-time capital improvement project to update and expand the City of Fullerton's antiquated traffic control system. The current system is failing and has outgrown its operational capacity of 118 city traffic signals. For instance, 17 traffic signals currently are not part of the traffic control system due to the existing system limitations. In addition, various studies have demonstrated that improvements to the signal timing plan can save commuters time and reduce mobile source emissions.
- \$110,000, to provide for traffic circulation improvements and an expansion to the existing parking lot at John Marshall Park. Due to the volume of traffic to the park from La Palma Avenue, a left turn

pocket needs to be installed in the median. In addition, the high volume of visitors/users due to tournaments and baseball games requires an expansion of the parking lot.

- \$100,000, to assist the Orange County Gateway Project (OCGP), a rail-lowering project with the objective of facilitating the movement of freight, improving safety at grade crossings and enhancing air quality. Placentia has committed almost \$1 million to the project's preliminary engineering phase over the last 2 years. In addition, OCTA has funded \$4.6 million for the EIR and preliminary engineering. The project has the following regional support: Orange County Board of Supervisors, Mayor Daly, SCAG, OCTA, AQMD, and others.
- \$75,000, to begin an engineering study to determine the scope of the work that will restore the lake at Laguna Lake Park in the City of Fullerton. The total cost of the lake restoration project is \$2.9 million, which includes \$900,000 in park improvements and \$2 million for the lake restoration. The California Department of Fish and Game's Urban Fisheries Program has made a series of recommendations to improve the lake. Funding for the engineering study would assist the City in fulfilling some of the Department's recommendations.
- \$55,000, to replace the Placentia Library District's deteriorating roof that was originally constructed in 1974. The library has multiple leaks in its roof that puts educational materials at risk.
- \$50,000, to benefit the Boys & Girls Club of Placentia for the following site improvements: \$15,000 to re-asphalt the parking lot; \$20,000 for gym floor repairs; and \$15,000 for the purchase of a club van.

Trustee Robin Masters represented Placentia Library District at the Arroyo Seco Library Network, Region IV – Library of California, Membership Meeting on April 11, 2000 in Whittier.

Attachment A is an Executive Summary of the proposed bylaws for the Arroyo Seco Library Network and Attachment B is an explanation of the services of the Library of California and the Arroyo Seco Library Network.

By the end of 2000 Placentia Library District will be asked to join the Arroyo Seco Library Network. Ultimately this will take the place of the District's membership in the Santiago Library System which will be going out of existence.

Mr. Masters will make a report at the Library Board Meeting.

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY Bylaws of Arroyo Seco Library Network

The Draft Bylaws of the Arroyo Seco Regional Library Network are based on a template developed by McDonough, Holland and Allen, a law firm contracted by the California State Library to assist the Library of California planning groups in this process. They determined that incorporating under the California Nonprofit Public Benefit Corporation Law, Corporations Code sec. 5110 et seq, is the only option available to regional library networks. Another consideration is that the regional library networks will be subject to the Ralph M. Brown Act, Government Code sec. 54950 et seq.

The membership provisions in the Bylaws are those specified in the Library of California Act, Education Code sec. 18800 et seq. In particular, Bylaws Article 3, Section 2B, Eligibility for Membership, restates Education Code sec. 18830.

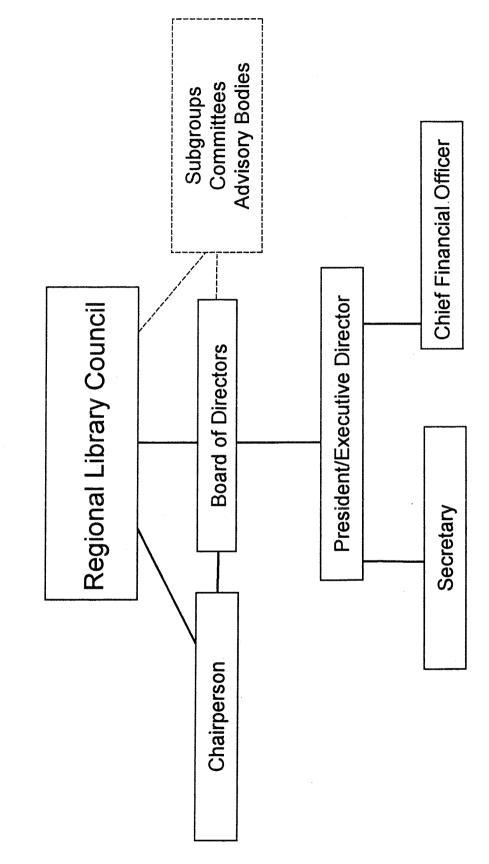
Article 4 covers the Regional Library Council. It incorporates the provisions of Education Code sec. 18841, which provides that every eligible institution of which one or more libraries is a participating library shall have a representative on the council, along with a library user from each type of library and the director of each public library jurisdiction. The Core Planning Group recommended that the quorum for the Council be set at ten percent of the total membership, with the additional requirement that at least ten percent of the total number of members in each segment (public, academic, school and special) must be present for a quorum to exist.

Article 6 deals with the Board of Directors, which the Library of California Act refers to as the Representative Board. As recommended by the Core Planning Group, there are thirteen directors: two directors from each type of library, elected by Council members of that type of library; two library users; two additional directors from statewide resource libraries within the region, one from the academic statewide resource libraries and one from the public statewide resource libraries; and the Council Chairperson. A director may serve no more than three consecutive two-year terms. An affirmative vote of a majority of the members of the board is required to exercise the powers of the board.

Article 9 concerns the officers. The Chairperson is chosen by the Council from among its members, and other officers may be chosen by the Board, if the Council so directs. The President is the Chief Executive Officer, and is also known as the Executive Director. The Secretary and the Chief Financial Officer are also required positions under the Bylaws. It is anticipated that the President, Secretary and Chief Financial Officer would be paid staff positions.

Other significant Bylaws provisions are for authorizing actions re grants, contracts, etc., indemnification, keeping books and records, inspection rights of members, and investments standards.

The Library of California creates a network of libraries and library resources throughout the State of California. Resources will be shared via technology and traditional means. The Library of California Act specifies which services shall be provided and the responsibilities of member libraries. The Arroyo Seco Library Network

Sharing Resources for Network Libraries and Library Users

The Arroyo Seco Library Network, a regional network of the Library of California encompasses the geographic areas of Los Angeles and Orange County. All libraries within the area are eligible to join the Arroyo Seco Library Network if they meet membership requirements and responsibilities. There is no fee for network membership and all basic, state-funded services are available at no charge to members. Enhanced services would be available on a fee basis.

Membership requirements include:

- > A written explicit mission statement and service objectives.
- A fixed location in California.
- > Established hours of service.
- An organized collection of information and materials accessible for use by its primary clientele.
- Designated, onsite, paid staff for library services. At least one staff person shall have a master's degree in library or information science or a California library media teacher credential issued by the Commission on Teacher Credentialing, but equivalent graduate education or demonstrated professional experience may be substituted for this requirement. The eligibility determination will be made by the regional library network.
- An established funding base.
- with disen > Official action by the board of governance or the appropriate administrative authority for each academic library, public library, school library, and special library to approve network membership.

Membership responsibilities include:

- Sharing resources and services with other members of the regional library network.
- Providing resources and services for other members of the regional library network.
- Meeting the minimum resource-sharing performance standards of the regional library network.
- > Agreement by the governing board or administrative authority not to reduce funding for library services as a result of network participation.
- > Participation in the Regional Library Council

Library gets computers thanks to Gates grant

Valencia High School student Maria Gonzalez is taking a trip to her native country, Mexico. Before dinner, she'll travel to the moon or take a virtual flight to San Francisco.

Gonzalez is one of many Placentia Library District patrons who have already taken advantage of new computer equipment and software provided last month by a \$20,000 grant from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. The addition of four computers will bring the total to 11 Internet-ready terminals available to library patrons.

The foundation has committed \$11 million to libraries in under-served communities throughout the United States. Placentia was the sole Orange County recipient.

Julie Shook said the computer lab will help the library stay current with technology.

"We're keeping up," said Shook, technical services librarian. "This expands it even more, especially with the multi-media, sound, movie clips and such."

Every day after school, 17year-old Maria visits the library with her brother and two sisters. The siblings read, explore or work on homework until their parents pick them up.

As Gonzalez takes a detour to Rio de Janiero on her way to New Orleans, the computer screen leaps to life with vivid color, music and photographs.

Gonzalez is pleased with the equipment.

"They have more information and you can learn more stuff," she said.

As part of the grant guidelines, Shook said the library will also provide instruction sheets in Spanish.

Shook said the whole com-

munity can benefit from the computer lab. The equipment can be adjusted to provide large-type for those with sight difficulties. There are tutorials in several subjects, including algebra and the how-to's of using a computer mouse.

"It'll benefit a lot (of people), especially with the resume and publishing templates. Theycan be used to make newsletters and greeting cards," said Shook.

Additional software includes Encarta Deluxe (encyclopedias), World Atlas 2000, Africana (African culture), Excel 2000 (spreadsheets), Publisher 2000, Powerpoint 2000 (multi-me-

dia presentations) and Ac cess 2000 (database).

Children's programs include Arnold Rock College (geology), Barney circus farm and sea, Doctor Seuss Cat in the Hat, Magic School Bus - rainforest, earth and dinosaurs and story-telling programs.

"The kids are excited about going into the living books and just being able to experience the different opportunities and explore," said Jim Roberts, public services manager. "They have games ... It's lively, it's animated and it piques their interest. It helps. They're learning but they don't know they're learning."

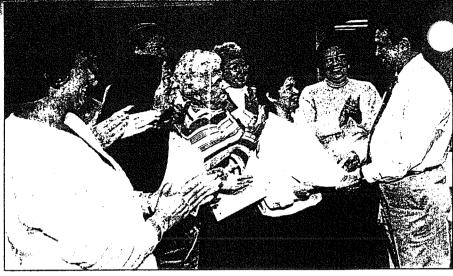

Literacy tutors complete their training

Ten-year-old Andrew Peechaphand has a fever, but it didn't stop him from meeting his tutor at the library to do his homework.

His brother, Thanin, 13, is there for help, too.

Their mother, Shirley, has brought them to the Placentia Library District to be matched up with a teen tutor, a new program at the library.

The high school tutoring program is part of an overall push to improve literacy in adults and children. The library recently received \$10,000 in Proposition 10 (to-bacco tax) funds for this pur-

pose. Another grant from Families for Literacy is expected later this year. The money will be spent on books, materials and a part-time staff member.

Last month, the library graduated 15 teen tutors and a handful of adult teachers. So far, seven elementary and middle school students have been teamed with high school tutors.

"Tutoring children has never been done here. You can see there's a need," said Jim Roberts, Public Services Manager for the li-

Why do you need board policies?

Nonprofit staff come and go, but board policy endures

- Effective, written board policies maintain continuity and consistency, and foster stability. Board members and employees come and go, but policy endures. A board policy manual, containing current policies and regulations, permits smooth transitions when changes take place.
- Effective, written board policies clarify board/administrator relations

Tips for writing board policy

H ere are some specific tips a board should follow when writing board policy:

- When filling in a blank requiring a name or a position title, use the position title. This will keep the board policy current even when there is a turnover in employees.
- In a board policy, state that every time the title "Administrator" is used, it also means "or designee." This eliminates the need to add "or designee" to board policies.
- Eliminate duplication or inconsistencies in board policy. Assign someone to read through the board policies and highlight duplication and inconsistencies. The board should then rewrite the board policy so that it is consistent or eliminate the duplicate board policy.
- Use the adoption, revision and review dates on the bottom of the last page of the board policies. These dates will provide guidance and assistance, especially during accreditation reviews.
- When updating board policies, remember to update the legal and cross references.

and provide guidance for the administrator. The board looks at the organization's big picture and determines the direction of the programs within the organization. This direction is written in board policies. By writing broad directions, the board gives the administrator the guidance that he or she needs to administer the organization to ensure the goals of the board are met.

- Effective, written board policies will legitimise board actions. Properly written board policies provide a basis for accountability for board action. Properly written board policy also shows the organization's constituents that the board takes its job seriously and is committed to board policy.
- Effective, written board policies will allow the board and administration to operate in a more efficient manner. When policies exist, there is no longer a need for lengthy board discussions on every matter that comes before the board. The board frees itself up to work on more important matters that need board attention.
- Effective, written board policies provide the basis for a legal record. Board policies are the law of the organization. If policies are written properly and are consistent with federal and state laws and regulations, the board's action should be upheld.

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If you could change just one thing about your board's meetings...

Meeting advice for busy board members

- Structure the meeting so that all board members participate!, says a Minnesota board member. "I think all board members must do more at meetings than just listen," she says. "They need to contribute as well. "As board chairperson, I let board members know in advance that I expect their opinions on the issues before the board—they need to come prepared. We also have small group discussions about topics that need board input."
- Type up and present committee reports to board members before the meeting! "That's the difference between spending 10 minutes vs. 45 minutes on committee business," says Board Member Margaret Leinbach (Charlotte, NC). "When committee reports are presented by a board member at the meeting, we spend too much time on reading the reports and answering questions that could have been addressed before the meeting."
- Handle complaints systematically!
 Rather than springing a complaint on the board and staff at the meeting, get your issue on the agenda in advance of the meeting, says a Florida board member. Could the complaint have

been handled by the administrator if he or she was aware of it? Usually, yes. If the matter truly is a board issue, contact the administrator and board chairperson before the meeting to get the matter on the meeting agenda.

• Share successes and good news!, says a North Dakota board member. "I volunteer my time to make a difference at this nonprofit and in the community," she says. "Rather than perfunctory reports and strictly business, I want to hear about the positive things happening at the organization. It should only take five minutes to hear about staff recognition, client success stories or awards the nonprofit has earned. These are the types of things that tell me my contribution is making a difference."

Share the board's expectations about fund raising with candidates

ne of the "touchiest" aspects of serving on most nonprofit boards is the need for board involvement in fund raising.

That's why it's important that this expectation is made crystal clear to all potential board members. Board Chairperson Karen Faber (Columbia, SC) tells me that her board has a simple—but important—expectation in this area for all board members.

The board asks each of its members to

give two days each year to the nonprofit's development efforts. It's explained to all new board members on the Board Service Commitment they review and sign when they join the board.

"On our board, most members meet this expectation by participating in our big annual special event," says Faber.
"But it could also be met by serving on our endowment board, helping with our golf tournament or recruiting new board members."
