The meeting was called to order by President, Pat Irot. Elizabeth Minter, Jim Roberts, and Jillian Rakos represented the staff. Al Skoler was present to represent the Trustees.

The minutes of the February 4 board meeting were approved as read. The treasurer reported a balance of \$15,202.32.

The library will host the Chamber of Commerce mixer on Wednesday, April 17. Eleanor Rankin made a motion to allow up to \$200 to fund this event. Jan Schwartzkopf seconded it. The motion was carried.

The Author's Luncheon was a financial and social success. Doreen Ludwig presented in dramatic form, brief vignettes of pioneer women. The Silent Auction netted \$216.00. The net proceeds from the luncheon were \$6,723.76. Pat Irot praised Jillian Rakos for her well-organized direction and follow through on the Author's Luncheon. The other directors were unanimous in their praise.

The annual meeting is well under control. Jim Roberts will meet with Ellie Rankin, Jan Schwartzkopf and Barbara Hemmerling to plan the refreshments. A suggestion was made to develop a less time consuming plan for the distribution of the recognition certificates.

The follow-up on the membership campaign will be discussed in April.

Eleanor Rankin had no report from the Placentia Library Foundation. The meeting had been canceled.





POST PRIMARY ELECTION

With Tuesday's Primary Election in the record books, the Legislature will now begin to turn its attention to the scores of bills that were introduced by the February 22, 2002 deadline. With respect to the election, for those districts that will be represented by a new legislator, between now and the November General Election is a great time for you to develop a relationship with them.

If you have not already done so, please make every effort to meet with your legislator-to-be and share with him or her information relative to your district and the valuable services it provides to the community.

SENATE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT #7

SCA #7, introduced by Senate President Pro Tem John Burton and Senator Bruce McPherson states in part: "Access to information concerning the conduct of the people's business is a fundamental and necessary right of every person in this State. Public agencies and officers exist to aid in the conduct of the people's business and their actions and deliberations should be open to public scrutiny. Therefore, except as provided pursuant to this Constitution, the people have a right to attend, observe, and be heard in the meetings of elected and appointed public bodies, and to inspect and copy records made or received in connection with the official business of any public body, agency, officer, or employee, or anyone acting on their behalf."

SCA #7 goes on to state: "Privacy also being a fundamental right of the citizens of the State, nothing in this section shall be construed to limit the ability of the Legislature to provide by statute for the protection of information about private individuals submitted to or obtained by any public body, agency, officer, or

employee, or anyone acting on their behalf, except to the extent that the information relates to the qualifications or fitness of a person for any elective or appointive office in government."

How could anyone oppose this? Right? Wrong! The final provision of SCA #7 states: "The Legislature may provide by statute for other limitations on the right of public access to governmental information only as necessary to protect public safety or private property, to ensure the fair and effective administration of justice, or to provide for the preservation of public funds and resources. Any application of such limiting statutes by any public body, agency, officer, or employee, or anyone acting on their behalf, to deny rights specified in paragraph (1), shall be based on particularized findings demonstrating a substantial probability of serious harm to the public interest that the denial will avert, and that this harm cannot otherwise be averted by reasonable alternatives, and shall be no broader in scope or longer in duration than necessary to avert the identified harm." (Emphasis added.)

The sponsors of SCA #7, the California Newspaper Publishers Association and the California First Amendment Coalition, hope to place the measure on the November 2002 General Election ballot. The measure requires a two-thirds vote in each house of the Legislature, but does not require the Governor to sign.

The sponsors have rejected the notion that SCA #7 will lead to increased litigation, a position that defies reality. Consider the fact that if passed by the legislators and voters, these provisions will be placed in the Constitution, requiring every local governmental agency in California to evaluate the conflicts these provisions may create with the Brown Act. Issues relating to public safety in the wake of the September 11th attacks; confidentiality of public employee documents; real property negotiations, just to name a few potential conflicts.

CSDA is working with a coalition of local government associations to develop amendments that would, at the very least, address some of the most troubling aspects of SCA #7. We highly recommend the measure for your reading and please feel free to provide any comments you care to offer.

PERS VOLUNTEERS NEEDED

Nearly 40 bills have been introduced making proposed changes to PERS. To ensure that CSDA has the ability to review all of this important legislation, we are seeking district volunteers (either staff, board or legal counsel) to be placed on an "expert review" list with a charge of reviewing the bills and offering input to the CSDA Legislative Committee. This task would be done through electronic communication but with specific deadlines by which individuals will need to respond. Volunteers are desperately needed for this review as CSDA is facing a huge task during the remainder of this session to be able to respond to all of the bills identified as important for special districts.

STATE BUDGET DEFICIT GROWS

On Wednesday, Legislative Analyst Liz Hill presented her analysis of the Governor's proposed 2002-03 state budget and reported that the state's fiscal crisis is "worse than expected." Hill estimates the budget deficit to be \$17.5 billion, \$5 billion more than estimated by Governor Davis. Assembly Speaker Herb Wesson reacted: "The news today was worse than I expected. BILL INTRODUCTION DEADLINE APPROACHES

Today, February 22, 2002, is the deadline to introduce bills for 2002 and we expect hundreds to be introduced by the deadline. CSDA's Legislative Committee will meet on March 1 to review all newly introduced legislation and develop positions and priorities for each bill of interest.

SENATE LOCAL GOVERNMENT COMMITTEE HEARING

On Wednesday, February 20, 2002, the Senate Local Government Committee held an informational hearing relating to the impact of the Governor's proposed budget on local governments. CSDA Legislative Advocate Ralph Heim presented testimony urging the Legislature to ensure that all state mandated local programs are fully funded and offered the Association's full cooperation during the state budget process. CSDA Executive Director Catherine Smith joined her counterparts from the League of California Cities and the California State Association of Counties (CSAC) in providing an update regarding the sponsorship of a potential November ballot initiative to protect local government revenues and require greater accountability measures for local agencies. Senator Tom Torlakson, Chair of the Senate Local Government Committee, announced the Committee will conduct an additional hearing in Southern California in the early Spring to continue a dialogue with local governments and the state budget process.

MULTI-COUNTY SPECIAL DISTRICT ERAF EXEMPTION

The Legislative Analyst is recommending that the current exemption from ERAF enjoyed by multi-county special districts be eliminated. This recommendation would impact about 92 multi-county special districts and require those agencies to shift approximately \$45 million annually to ERAF.

LEGISLATIVE LULL

Following the frantic pace of activity during January, wherein all two-year bills had to pass their house of introduction, the Legislature is in a pre-March Primary election lull. The deadline to introduce legislation for this year is February 22 and we do not anticipate much legislative activity until after the March Primary election.

GOVERNOR TO SIGN WORKERS' COMPENSATION BILL

According to the Capitol Press Corps, Governor Davis will sign Assembly Bill 749 this afternoon in Los Angeles. Despite strong opposition from public and private employers, the Governor's action was anticipated. AB 749 becomes operative on January 1, 2003, and every district should have their workers' compensation specialists become familiar with the bills provisions.

RECENTLY INTRODUCED LEGISLATION ASSEMBLY BILL 1925(NAKANO):

This bill would declare the intent of the Legislature to enact legislation, provided Proposition 40 on the March Primary Ballot passes, to make available \$30 million of those bond funds to the California Ocean Trust, for allocation to the California Sea Grant Program for the purpose of carrying out a grant program to fund storm water-related research.

ASSEMBLY BILL 1927(KEHOE):

This bill would enact the Neighborhood Infrastucture Bond Act of 2002, which, if passed, would authorize the issuance for the purpose of financing a program to address local infrastructure needs of bonds in the amount of \$6 billion.

SENATE BILL 1384(COSTA):

This bill is cited as The Water Omnibus Act of 2002 and permits the Department of Water Resources to make grants from the California Safe Drinking Water Fund for the purpose of financing domestic water system improvement projects to meet state and federal drinking water standards.

SENATE BILL 1386(PEACE):

The California Public Records Act requires state and local agencies to make public records available upon receipt of a request that reasonably describes an indentifiable record not otherwise exempt from disclosure by express provisions of law, and upon payment of fees to cover costs. Existing law also requires agencies to enact and maintain a permanent privacy policy that includes, among other provisions, a means for protecting personal data the agency collects against unauthorized disclosure. SB 1386 would specify that the provision requiring a privacy policy is among those express provisions of law that may exempt a public record disclosure.

SENATE BILL 1385(BRULTE):

This bill would declare the Legislature's intent that state and local agencies should develop and promote programs that create incentives for existing and new customers to install new water conserving devices and landscapes to reduce water usage.

ASSEMBLY ELECTS NEW SPEAKER

On Wednesday Assembly Member Herb Wesson was elected Assembly Speaker, replacing Assembly Member Robert Hertzberg. In his acceptance speech, Speaker Wesson stated: "We will not balance the state budget on the backs of local government." Additionally, Wesson announced a number of new committee chairs, most of which will assume their new duties shortly after the March Primary Election.

WORKERS' COMPENSATION PASSES

On Monday, February 4, 2002, the Legislature passed Assembly Bill 749 (Calderon), a major workers' compensation measure the Governor is expected to sign shortly. The bill's provisions become law on January 1, 2003, and every special district should have their workers' compensation specialists review the measure to determine the fiscal impacts. The March 2002 issue of CSDA News will cover workers' compensation reform in greater detail.

STATE REVENUES CONTINUE TO DECLINE

It was reported on Tuesday that the state's tax collections are \$600 million to \$1.3 billion below earlier forecasts. Additionally, President Bush's proposed federal budget contains cuts of some \$620 million for transportation aid. These federal reductions add to an already bleak state budget deficit.

UTILITIES ARE RULED LIABLE FOR POLLUTION

On Monday the State Supreme Court ruled unanimously that victims of

contaminated water can sue utilities regulated by the state for violating safe drinking water standards. While the opinion is under review, it appears the decision clears the way for victims of ground-water pollution across the state to seek compensation from private water companies and public agencies that provide "contaminated water." Additional details will follow. PROPOSITION 40 The CSDA Board of Directors voted unanimously to support Proposition 40. Proposition 40, the "Clean Water, Clean Air, Safe Neighborhood Parks and Coastal Protection" measure will be on the March 5, 2002 ballot.

WORKERS' COMPENSATION UPDATE

The new, major workers' compensation legislation was amended into Assembly Bilł 749 (Calderon) late Thursday afternoon. The amendments, which become the bill, are 94 pages in length and contain the agreement forged by Governor Davis with labor and the applicant attorneys. As of this writing, it is expected the Senate and Assembly will pass the measure next week and the Governor will sign very shortly thereafter.

LEGISLATURE CUTS CURRENT YEAR BUDGET

With remarkable speed, the Legislature this week responded to the Governor's proposed current year budget reductions and cut or suspended some \$2.2 billion in expenditures. While helpful, the anticipated deficit for the 2002-03 state budget remains around \$12 billion and virtually all members of the Legislature agree closing that deficit gap will be very difficult.

SALES TAX SHARING LEGISLATION ADVANCES

As reported in last week's Legislative Update, Assembly Bill 680 by Assembly Member Steinberg continues to move and on Wednesday the Assembly approved the bill by a 41 to 29 vote, sending the measure to the Senate. AB 680 has become one of the most controversial bills of the session and is opposed by the League of California Cities, builders, and realtors, among others, and supported by organized labor, environmental groups, Sacramento County, and others. While the bill relates to sharing sales tax revenues within the Sacramento region, there is talk that other revenues may be discussed, including property tax revenues. CSDA will continue to monitor AB 680 with great care to ensure that independent special districts' revenues are not included.

SENATE LOCAL GOVERNMENT COMMITTEE HEARING

Also noted in last week's Legislative Update was notice of an informational hearing the Senate Local Government Committee will conduct on February 20, 2002. In his letter inviting CSDA to present testimony at the hearing, Committee Chair Torlakson wrote in part: "I invite you to recommend state mandated local programs that the Legislature should suspend or repeal. We also welcome your recommendations that would give local officials more flexibility to cope with our shared budget problems." This is a great opportunity for CSDA to provide the Committee with ideas and suggestions relative to state mandated local programs and/or ideas that would provide you with more flexibility to manage the affairs of your districts. OPR Incorporation Guidelines

The Governor's Office of Planning and Research (OPR) has scheduled three working sessions to review their DRAFT LAFCO Incorporation Guidelines. The workshops are scheduled for February 4, 2002 in Ukiah, February 5, 2002 in Tracy and February 8, 2002 in Van Nuys. AB 680

On Thursday, the Assembly Appropriations Committee passed AB 680 (Steinberg), with amendments. The bill would reallocate sales tax among cities and counties in the Sacramento region according to a specific formula. The League of California Cities is opposed to AB 680 as the bill would give the State the authority to redistribute local sales tax. As we know, the State already has authority to redistribute local property taxes and fees related to the Vehicle License Fees (VLF).

The Legislature adjourned on September 14, 2001 sending many bills to the Governor's Desk. Governor Gray Davis had until October 14 to act on the bills sent to him by the Legislature. Bills that did not pass this year are "two-year bills" and legislators may try to move them in 2002. All two-year bills must pass out of their house-of-origin by January 31, 2002. The Legislature will return on January 7, 2002. Legislation that CSDA was tracking throughout the session and acted upon by the Governor are listed below:

The following bills were supported by CSDA and signed by the Governor:

- AB 88 (Alquist) provides Santa Clara Valley Water District with the ability to impose special taxes and exempt taxpayers under certain conditions if at least 65 years of age.
- AB 92 (Chavez) relates to flood control and water conservation facilities.
 AB 169 (Wiggins) creates a standard procedure for correcting property tax allocation errors
- AB 263 (Correa) provides that any bond required on a public works contract be executed by an admitted surety insurer and establishes acceptable process for obtaining information.
- AB 277 (Kelley) Provides that if the purpose set forth in the agreement is to pool the self-insurance claims of 2 or more local public entities, it shall not be considered an agreement establishing joint and several liability among those public entities, as specified.
- AB 331 (Goldberg) Requires the Department of Water Resources to

- convene the 2002 Recycled Water Task Force to investigate opportunities to use recycled water.
- AB 351 (LaSuer) Requires local park agencies to perform background checks on prospective employees or volunteers who supervise children.
- AB 378 (Calderon) Authorizes a regional water quality control board to clean up/abate waste and holds person(s) responsible for the discharge liable for reasonable costs associated with clean up.
- AB 589 (Wesson) creates State-Local Property Tax Administration grants to help pay counties' assessment, collection and allocation costs.
- AB 674 (Dutra) authorizes the Santa Clara Valley Water District, upon approval of its governing body, to use the design-build bidding procedure for public works. Using the design-build method can help the district save time and money on large public works projects.
- AB 682 (Calderon) Increases the sum that a mosquito/pest abatement or vector control district board may provide, by resolution, to board members for expenses incurred in attending business meetings of the board.
- AB 895 (Wiggins) PERS modification for State University police departments.
- AB 901 (Daucher) Requires additional information relating to quality of existing water supply to be included in urban water management plans.
- SB 12 (Chesbro) Provides for state allocations to Napa County as a result of 2000 earthquake.
- SB 86 (Oller) Requires that a majority of the board of directors of a memorial district be composed of veterans.
- SB 282 (Dunn) Requires the State Controller to electronically report on selected special districts' assets, liabilities, and equities.
- SB 544 (Local Government Committee) Prohibits county employees from serving on their own county board of supervisors, just like current law for other local governments.

The following bills were **supported** by CSDA and **vetoed** by the Governor:

- AB 49 (Washington) Would have established the Youth Mentoring and Safe Community Grant Program through the public library system.
- SB 147 (Bowen) Would have prohibited an employer from secretly monitoring the electronic mail or other computer records generated by an employee.

The following bills were **opposed** by CSDA and **signed** by the Governor:

- AB 132 (Horton) Relates to the Meyers-Milias-Brown Act and agency agreements.
- AB 663 (Vargas) Extends workers' compensation benefits to lifeguards employed by local agencies/State with respect to skin cancer and creates a rebuttable presumption. CSDA had an oppose unless amended position. The author did amend that the bill only relates to active lifeguards employed for more than three consecutive months in a calendar year.
- AB 1014 (Papan) Requires additional assistance to an individual who is requesting to view a public record in his/her search to identify such record and/or identify other information that may be responsive to his/her request.
- AB 1281 (Cedillo) Relates to the Meyer-Milias-Brown Act and the

- recognition of an employee organization.
- AB 1532 (Pavley) Relates to the California Environmental Quality Act (CEQA) and transportation.
- SB 202 (Soto) Relates to the Public Employees' Medical and Hospital
 Care Act which requires contracting agencies to pay employer contributions
 for postretirement health benefits for employees who retire, for service as
 specified.
- SB 975 (Alarcon) Relates to the Bergeson-Peace Infrastructure and Economic Development Bank.

The following bills were **opposed** by CSDA and **vetoed** by the Governor:

 SB 71 (Burton) - Authorized changes to the administration and benefits for California's workers' compensation.

Local Government Revenue Ballot Measure Continues to Develop
As reported in the September 2001, issue of CSDA News, the CSDA Board voted unanimously to support the efforts of the League of California Cities (LCC) and the California State Association of Counties (CSAC) in pursuing a possible November 2002 ballot measure to protect local government revenue sources and increase accountability to our constituents. The ballot measure currently deals with three areas:

- State Mandates
- 2. Protection of Local Revenue Sources
- 3. Accountability

CSAC, LCC and CSDA are in the midst of final discussions on the ballot measure and a decision will be made in the very near future on whether the local government organizations will pursue the measure. State's Fiscal Picture Looks Bleak

Even before the tragic events of September 11th, California's fiscal picture was dimming. Currently, legislative analysts are projecting that the State could be facing a budget deficit in excess of \$9.5 billion. Last week, Governor Davis ordered heads of state agencies to prepare to cut their budgets by 15 percent next fiscal year. A consideration of a state hiring freeze and limiting state purchases are also being discussed. The last time the state has faced a fiscal crisis of this magnitude was the early 1990s. Local government representatives remember those years as the birth of the Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund (ERAF).

Reports indicate that Governor Davis may be convening his cabinet early next week to discuss the budget plan and related issues. There is also talk of the Governor planning a summit with business leaders and possibly a special legislative session for measure to stimulate the economy.

CSDA is activating its grassroots network in an effort to derail AB 1355 and is asking all member districts to fax a letter to Assembly Local Government Committee Chairwoman Patricia Wiggins and fax copies to her colleagues on the committee.

AB 1355 would require in each county that negotiations take place between counties, cities, and special districts regarding the distribution of the annual property tax increment that is in excess of 2 percent (referred to as the designated increment portion) of the allocation from the previous fiscal year.

There are a number of problems with AB 1355, but two in particular are cause for concern:

While the bill requires negotiations, it does not promise any agreements, rather it provides a default formula for allocating the designated increment portion. The default formula would provide zero dollars to independent special districts and instead give 40% to schools, 35% to cities, and 25% to the county. What local governments need is a rational restructuring of the state-local fiscal relationship that will protect our revenues and provide us with greater predictability.

The Assembly Local Government will be hearing AB 1355, Wednesday, April 18th.

As the Governor and his Administration, California's lawmakers and citizens, continue to focus on California's energy challenge, non-energy related issues being addressed in the Capitol appear to be moving at a less-frenzied pace. Although 1500 bills were ultimately introduced by February 23, California's ability to respond to this energy situation is in the forefront of everyone's minds. The BIG question is what will be the final price tag attached to the final solution? A March 17, 2001 Los Angeles Times article stated that since January 17, 2001 when the Department of Water Resources started buying electricity for customers of the near-bankrupt Southern California Edison and Pacific Gas & Electric, Co., the State has spent nearly \$3 billion.

BUDGET SUBCOMMITTEES BEGIN HOLDING HEARINGS: LETTERS ON PLF NEEDED

Next week the Assembly and Senate Budget Subcommittees on Education Finance will begin their hearings on various aspects of the Governor's Education Budget. The subcommittees will ultimately make policy decisions and recommendations based on testimony from the Department of Finance, the Legislative Analyst's Office, the Department of Education, lobbyists, the Governor's "May Revision" of the Budget, and other factors through the month of May. Recommendations of the subcommittee will then be forwarded to the larger Budget Conference Committee who will either accept the report, or decrease or delete specific items. This year will be a particularly challenging one for the legislature, as they are facing an unprecedented \$17 billion budget deficit.

Within the purview of these two committees is the Budget for the California State Library, and more specifically, the Public Library Foundation (PLF). Thus, the two Budget Subcommittees on Education Finance determine the initial recommendation for the Public Library Foundation funding.

You will recall that both the Assembly and Senate Budget Subcommittees on Education Finance met jointly in January to address the Governor's proposed list of cuts to the current year budget. The Governor had recommended back in November of 2001 that the PLF be cut \$7.9 million. As we reported, the subcommittee, in a bi-partisan concerted effort, saved the PLF from enduring the \$7.9 million cut, and the money was restored.

The Governor is now proposing to cut the Public Library Foundation in the 2002-03 Budget by \$11.1 million (the \$7.9 million, proposed earlier cut, plus an additional \$3.2 million). Please take a moment today to write each of the members of the Assembly and Senate Budget Subcommittees on Education Finance in the next few weeks. In your letters, please thank the subcommittee members for their efforts in saving the \$7.9 million cut. Further, please request that the subcommittee reject the Governor's proposal to cut \$11.1 million from the Public Library Foundation (Budget Item #6120-221-0001) in the 2002-03 Budget. In your letters, you may wish to offer specifics as to what your library would be required to eliminate if a cut of this magnitude was sustained this year (i.e. cuts in staff positions, hours of service, materials/book purchases, etc).

Note: Due to the extraordinary circumstances surrounding this year's budgetary crisis, the legislature is strongly conflicted as to whether or not programs should be slashed to avoid a tax increase, or whether solutions such as a tax increase and creative financing proposals should be considered. Consequently, since all special interest groups affected in this year's budget will be

facing the same challenges for maintaining existing funding, the subcommittee members will need to receive hundreds of letters on the PLF in order to elevate it above other competing interests. Thank you for your help!

I. SENATOR JACKIE SPEIER INTRODUCES BILL TO LOWER THE VOTE REQUIREMENT FOR LIBRARY BONDS

Senator Jackie Speier (D-Hillsborough) has introduced SCA 10, which would require the approval of local library construction bonds at 55%, rather than the current 2/3rds vote requirement. When Senator Speier's office contacted us several weeks ago to let us know of her intent in this area, they noted that the Senator believes that it is appropriate to bring libraries into line with what is currently being authorized for school bonds – 55%. Because the bill is a constitutional amendment, SCA 10 would need to be passed by the Legislature and placed before the voters of California at an upcoming election.

You may recall that Senator Speier also authored legislation last year to assist ERAF Orphan

libraries, and we are pleased that she has taken a leadership role in this area of the vote requirement for library bond construction as well

II. LOCAL GOVERNMENTS AND THE GOVERNOR'S BUDGET

SENATE LOCAL GOVERNMENT COMMITTEE HEARING

On Wednesday, February 20th, the Senate Local Government Committee held an informative hearing on how the 2002-03 State Budget may affect counties, cities and special districts.

After brief comments by Committee Chair Tom Torlakson and Vice Chair Bob Margett, the committee heard a presentation by representatives of the Legislative Analyst's Office on how the Governor "bridges the gap" on the \$12.6 billion deficit. Over one-third of the Governor's proposed solution to meet the deficit involves borrowing (\$4.8 billion), the biggest portion (\$2.4 billion) involves the issuance of revenue bonds that would be repaid over many years with so-called "tobacco settlement funds." The Analyst also predicts an additional shortfall of \$5 billion beyond what the Governor currently anticipates. Finally, the Analyst outlined programs for local government assistance in the 2002-03 budget that total more than \$600 million, including the Juvenile Justice Grant Program, Traffic Congestion Relief Program, and the Public Library Foundation Program. He noted the amount of \$42 million for library services. Upon prodding by Senator Margett, the Analyst admitted that the PLF had been significantly reduced in the Governor's proposed budget, from \$53 million to \$42 million, an \$11 million reduction.

Representatives of the County Supervisors Association, League of California Cities, and Special Districts Association also addressed the committee. The theme of the presentations was that local government was generally pleased that the Governor did not "balance the budget on the backs of local government." However, Steve Keil, representing CSAC, noted that the budget did contain cuts in the areas of health and welfare, as well as public libraries, which will require "backfilling" by counties if the cuts are sustained. Keil also mentioned that local government budgets were suffering particularly as a result of increased caseloads and security costs. At the invitation of Senator Torlakson, CLA also submitted information for the record outlining the actual and proposed cuts to the Public Library Foundation program since the time of Governor Davis' proposed budget in January 2001.

The committee also heard a presentation by the Executive Directors of CSAC, the League, and Special Districts Association on proposed voter initiatives on state-local finance. Two initiatives have been submitted to the Attorney General's office for title and summary, and polling data to be received within the next few weeks, will determine which of any of the alternative initiatives goes forward. The thrust of the initiatives is to stabilize the current revenue base of local government through constitutional protection. At the conclusion of the presentations, Senator Torlakson noted, "your challenge will be to put something in front of the public without giving the impression of its solving all your problems."

GOVERNOR SIGNS "CUT BILLS" - \$7.9 MILLION FOR PLF IS SAVED

Many of your local papers may have reported that on Saturday, Governor Gray Davis signed SB 1xxx, which contains language to restore \$7.9 million for the Public Library Foundation. You will recall that the Governor had proposed cutting \$7.9 million in current year funding from the PLF and incorporated this cut into SB 1xxx. Thanks to your support, and CLA lobbying efforts, the legislature opposed the \$7.9 million cut and subsequently restored the funding. The bill went down to the Governor's office with the PLF intact.

We have been cautiously optimistic since the signing of the bill on Saturday, as there was minimal information available as to what the Governor's action may have been beyond the signing of the measure. (You will recall that the Governor has "line item veto" authority on this bill.) As of this morning, there was still no information available regarding his specific actions. A chaptered copy of the bill was not available to lobbyists or staff all day, and the Budget and Fiscal Committee was unable to answer the "mystery" of what had actually transpired on Saturday at the signing. Late this afternoon, we were able to receive confirmation from a senior staff member of the Governor's Office who said the bill was "untouched" and that the Governor left the bill as the Legislature had submitted to him.

We thank the legislature and the Governor for their action on our behalf and look forward to working with them into the 2002-03 Budget process to save further cuts to the PLF. Please take a moment today to write your individual legislator(s) and thank them for their strong support of the public libraries and this important budget action.

UPDATE ON PLF FOR TODAY'S "DAY IN THE DISTRICT" EVENT

We have received a few calls from CLA members who will be visiting with their legislators today, wondering the final outcome of the \$7.9 million potential cut to the Public Library Foundation (PLF). You will recall from our memo last week that the joint Budget Subcommittees on Education Finance voted to reject the Governor's proposed cut of \$7.9 million to the PLF in the **current year** Budget. Amendments were then taken to the Governor's "cut bill" to "restore" the \$7.9 million to this important program.

This week, the Senate passed the "cut" bill on a 40-0 vote, while the Assembly voted to send the bill to the Governor on a 66-6 vote. We were reticent to alert the field of this action, based on the fact that it is not final. According to news sources in our building, the Governor will have "line item veto authority," which includes potential action on the PLF. In fact, in yesterday's Sacramento Bee, the Governor's spokeswoman was quoted as saying, "The administration is

examining its options for changing or rejecting parts of [the bill]." Legislators that we have talked to have received no indication from the Governor's Office as to when he might act upon the measure.

When you meet with your legislators today during "Day In the District," please thank them for their strong vote of support to sustain the funding to the PLF, by rejecting the Governor's proposed cut. If any of the legislators are interested in offering additional support to ensure that the PLF is not affected during the Governor's signing, you might encourage them to drop a note to Mike Gotch, the Governor's Secretary for Legislative Affairs in the Governor's Office.

SUBCOMMITTEES VOTE TO RESTORE \$7.9 MILLION PLF CUT

In November, we alerted you to a package of proposed cuts by Governor Gray Davis, which included a \$7.9 million cut to the Public Library Foundation, in the **current year 2001-02 budget**. This cut would be in addition to the \$3.9 million cut made by the Governor when he signed the Budget in July. Subsequent to his November announcement, CLA sent letters to the legislative leadership, Budget chairs and Budget subcommittee chairs in each house, and urged you to do the same, requesting that the \$7.9 million be restored. Recently, several legislative offices told us that your letters to them on this subject were voluminous in number and well received. It appears that CLA's efforts may have paid off this morning during an unprecedented joint hearing of the Senate and Assembly Budget Subcommittees on Education Finance.

Senate Subcommittee Chair, Jack O'Connell, and Assembly Subcommittee Chair, Joe Simitian conducted the meeting, which lasted approximately one hour. Flanked by subcommittee members, the two Chairs of the Senate and Assembly Budget Committee, and other interested parties from the education committee, Chairman O'Connell noted that there had been "extensive negotiations going on between the two houses...which produced a working document." Chairman Simitian added that the subcommittees had been able to make certain substituted cuts in order to be able to save programs that were contained in the Governor's cut proposal. When he announced that one of the items to be saved from cuts would be the Public Library Foundation, he added, "It is a small amount, but a high return on the money because it is an important program." The subcommittee found savings in some of the Governor's Initiative programs such as teaching priority block grants, teacher performance awards, and Reading and Math professional development for teachers.

The representative from the Department of Finance thanked the subcommittees for their "quick efforts. We are very appreciative of you retaining a certain dollar amount. However, we are concerned with the character of the programs you want to swap. We need a couple of days to review." Later, she added, "Most are one-time savings in cuts (affecting the current budget year 2001-02), but the ones you want to restore are ongoing." Senate Budget Chair, Steve Peace,

argued that the education proposal did not produce a legitimate savings, as the commitment to ongoing programs would contribute to bigger headaches down the road in 2002-03 negotiations. Said Chair Simitian, "I respectfully have a different characteristic of this. I would rather honor contracts and commitments than tell people that we were 'just kidding' about the level of the appropriation...and have to take the money back." Chair Simitian also expressed interest, along with Chair O'Connell in assuming the cut restorations will be one-time in nature, and that the discussion as to their importance and need will begin again in the Spring during the traditional budget discussions.

In the end, in a bi-partisan effort, and through a cooperative agreement in each house, both subcommittees voted to restore the \$7.9 million for the PLF. The Senate and the Assembly took a separate vote on the package, as they must send both a Senate vehicle and an Assembly vehicle forward through the process, similar to the Budget bill process. If all items reconcile between each house, then there will be no need to convene a Budget Conference Committee for this purpose. The bills will likely be ratified by each House next Monday, with the bills headed to their respective Floors later in the week. Please note that this action on the PLF is not final. Legislative leaders and ultimately the Governor will have final say on the "cut package." Nonetheless, today's developments are certainly a critical and important step in staving off a potentially large blow to local library budgets.

I. GOVERNOR RELEASES 2002-03 BUDGET: CUTS TO LIBRARY PROGRAMS

Shortly before 1 p.m. this afternoon, Governor Gray Davis met with members of the press corps to release his 2002-03 State Budget. Facing a \$12.5 billion budget deficit, the Administration and the Legislature are facing difficult decisions regarding where to make the necessary cuts. However, the Governor's Budget states that "essential programs, providing core services were protected from significant reductions, including K-12 education, public safety, and health coverage for children and low-income families, as well as those programs that will provide an immediate stimulus to the state's economy."

Unfortunately the Public Library Foundation (PLF) took a significant hit. The PLF total currently stands at \$52,970,000 million. The Governor's Budget reduces this amount to \$41,812,000, a

cut of \$11,158,000 or 21% from the Budget signed by the Governor in July. (This includes the \$7.9 million cut proposed by the Governor in November and reported to you.) You will recall that last January, the Governor increased the 2000-01 PLF amount of \$56,870,000 by a COLA of \$2,092,000 for a total of \$58,962,000. Thus, the Governor's proposed Budget for 2002-03, reflects a reduction of 29 % from his Budget proposed last January.

The Governor tries to put a positive spin on these disappointing numbers by stating that most library programs have enjoyed increases since he took office in 1999. Following are the comments from the Governor's Budget Summary:

Public Libraries

The Budget provides ongoing assistance in 2002-03 as follows:

- \$41.8 million for local public libraries to provide basic library services under the Public Library Foundation Program. With this funding, over \$200 million has been provided over the course of this Administration.
- \$598,000 to reduce funding for the Library of California from \$4.0 million to \$3.4 million. Over four years, the Administration has provided approximately \$15.4 million for this program.
- Other library funding provided since 1999-00 includes:

\$350 million from the California Library Construction Bond Act.

The CLA Legislative Committee will be meeting tomorrow in Sacramento to discuss legislative issues and the Governor's Budget, and will be formulating a collective response to today's news.

Note: Below for your information is a chart showing the recent budget cuts.

II. ASSEMBLYMAN HERB WESSON ELECTED NEW ASSEMBLY SPEAKER

This morning, Assemblyman Herb J. Wesson (D-Culver City) was elected as the 65th Speaker of the California State Assembly. The vote to elect, Speaker Wesson was unanimous, and his name was placed in nomination by current Speaker Bob Hertzberg. Because the vote was supported by both Democrats as well as Republicans, Speaker Hertzberg noted that "it is a tribute to this House that we are moving ahead without rancor or discord to elect a new Speaker." Assemblyman Wesson will be sworn into office officially on February 6, 2002. Shortly after that time, it is rumored that many of the committees may change Chairmanships as well as their committee composition.

GOVERNOR GRAY DAVIS PRESENTS HIS "STATE OF THE STATE T. ADDRESS" DURING UNCERTAIN BUDGET YEAR

On Tuesday evening, Governor Gray Davis addressed the California State Legislature in the Assembly chambers for his annual "State of the State" address. Due to the state's dismal economic downturn, many were looking to the Governor's speech to provide them with a beginning roadmap for tackling the looming budget crisis of 2002. The speech lacked many specific details regarding how he plans to address the budget shortfall, choosing to focus instead on the aftermath of the September 11th tragedy and how the state has enhanced its safety and preparedness.

Regarding the projected \$12 billion budget deficit, the Governor noted that "even with the budget cuts that will be necessary, California will still be much stronger than it was when I took office." "The budget I will submit to you in two days will be fair, will preserve the major gains of the last three years, will protect local government – and will not increase taxes. I will call on [the Legislature] to close the budget gap with a combination of cutbacks, deferred spending, internal borrowing and accelerated revenue," said Davis. The Governor's address highlighted his ongoing commitment to education and protecting K-12 funding, public safety, and expanding children's services. He also stated as his fourth tenant that he is "opposed to balancing the State's budget on the backs of local government. Whether we are elected at the State or local level, we all took the

same oath – to serve the people. So I will continue the State's commitment to repay vehicle license fees to local government."

The Governor announced that he has called a "concurrent Special Session of the Legislature" (which will resemble the Special Session called last year to address the State's energy crisis), encouraging the Legislature to "take up as your first order of business \$2 billion in cuts in the current budget year that I called for in November. Failure to act quickly on these cuts will only increase the pain for our fellow citizens who depend on the State for vital services."

On Thursday, Governor Davis will formally release his January Budget. We will update you as to its content, as soon as possible.

II. PROCLAMATION ISSUED FOR SPECIAL SESSION ON BUDGET

As mentioned, yesterday Governor Davis issued a proclamation calling for an Extraordinary Session to be convened to address "critical budget issues." The session has been called for Thursday, January 10 "at a time appointed by each house of the Legislature of said day to consider and act upon legislation to do the following:

- 1) Enact current-year General Fund spending reductions as specified in the November 2001 'Proposed Reduction in 2001-02 Spending.'
- 2) Enact further General Fund spending reductions identified for 2001-02.
- 3) Make recently enacted employment benefit increases retroactive to September 11, 2001, accelerate the delivery of certain capital outlay projects to stimulate the creation of jobs by shifting the financing for these projects to lease revenue bonds, and authorize general obligation bonds for critically needed infrastructure."

You will recall that contained in the Governor's "Proposed Reduction in 2001-02 Spending" proposal is a plan to cut \$7.9 million from the Public Library Foundation in the current year Budget. This amount would be in addition to the \$3.9 million cut that the PLF endured when the Governor issued his Budget veto messages and subsequent cuts last July. We have spoken to legislative staff who inform us that your letters opposing such action (see memo Dec. 18, 2001) are "starting to pile up." Thank you for your efforts in this regard.

- 2. Briefly explain the types, structure and content of the regular meetings of parents and children conducted by FFL in public library settings. How often do you hold these meetings? (This should include but not be limited to family parties, events, story times.)

The only meeting held so far is the FFL Christmas Party the last week of December. At the beginning of meeting we had a short period for socializing, then we had a storyteller. After that dinner was served (pizza and salad) then we had a craft project for the families to work on together. We then distributed books and had fifteen or so of reading time before cleanup. This is a rough framework to work within and offers flexibility for planning future parties and theme events. There are also the family tutoring sessions. Tutors work with parents and children separately, then the last part of the meeting is a read along session between parents and children followed by a short discussion of the books read.

3) If you promote the enjoyment of reading for your parents in ways other than the regular meetings described in #2 above, please describe.

Other than the individual and family tutoring sessions not at this time.

4) Please describe how tutors/teachers are incorporating language experience stories and children's literature from the FFL program in the adult learner's instructional program. **Briefly** describe how/when you train tutors in these techniques.

All tutors are trained using the language experience approach and are encouraged to use it with students. They are also trained on the Laubach and Challenger series. When to incorporate language experience or Laubach/Challenger and how to use them is left up to the individual tutors.

5) Do you train parents in book selection for their children other than the use of story times and lapsits for modeling to parents listed under question B-2 or 3? If yes, please describe.

Parents learn about book selection and things to consider when choosing children's literature during book distributions. While they are at the library for the family sessions, parents often pick out books with staff assistance.

6) Do you provide FFL services that enhance full family participation and foster a family environment conducive to reading other than those already listed? If yes, please describe.

Not at this time, but we are planning a greater number and variety of activities for the Spring and Summer.

7) How do you help parents in using services to access books and other materials on such topics as parenting, child care, health, nutrition and family life education, as well as assistance in the use of the full range of library services

During library tours, families from targeted groups get library cards and are encouraged to check out items. It is emphasized that the library offers information and tools they can use to find practical solutions for daily and lifelong issues of living. Children and parents are encouraged to explore the Children's Department and learn about activities and programming.

8) Do you provide any **other** services which enable families to participate in the Families for Literacy Program? If yes, briefly describe. If incentives were used, please list.

Not at this time.

9) How do you recruit your families for FFL? Is that effective? Describe any effective retention strategies?

We get referrals from the Placentia HEADSTART school, and the local CBET program. Retention has been a problem in the past but this is changing. Problems with conflicts between work, school, commuting to/from work, and tutoring has made for a fairly transient student population. However, we have a larger group of tutors with flexible schedules and this has allowed for more matches and greater retention of families.

11) How do you determine or measure success in your FFL program? How do you track the progress of your adults and children as they move through their FFL involvement?

There are many different ways to measure success. How well a parent reads the monthly book to their child, how often they move to the next reading level and how they view their progress are examples of things considered during the evaluation process. For pre-school aged children, the FFL Parent Survey Form has proved to be a useful measuring device. For older children, the quality of schoolwork completed, grades, as well as teacher and student feedback are used to determine if a tutoring strategy is working. Of course, enjoyment and pleasure derived from reading are looked at and considered. These are some of

the ways we determine success in our program.

C. Lessons Learned This Year

The State Library is very much interested in sharing your successes and difficulties with other programs participants and in improving the overall program in future years. Please respond, as fully as possible to the following questions, keeping in mind your original Plan of Service proposal.

1) Describe those elements of your program that you feel have been **most successful.** What are the key factors that have contributed to their success (e.g., talents, library administrative support, communication, etc).

The family tutoring format that has developed works very well. Some of our families come in for tutoring as families. While a tutor works with the parents, another provides homework assistance to grade school age children. Another tutor, usually a high school volunteer, will read to the preschool age children. This would not have been possible without our student assistant staff and our volunteer high school students. The student assistants also provided administrative support, without which the program would have grown at a much slower pace. Our community partnerships have been very productive. They have provided referrals and insights into the needs of the targeted population. Lastly the cooperation between FFL and the Children's Department has been of vital importance, as detailed below.

2. An important element of FFL is the cooperation between Children's Services and the adult literacy program/FFL program. Describe your relationship with Children's Services in your library and how you have worked together in FFL.

The relationship between Literacy Services and the Children's Department has been close and productive. Literacy staff gained experience in planning and producing music times and story hours. Staff also became familiar with child and family related issues at home and at school, book selection, and district reading guidelines.

3) Describe the most difficult challenges you program has faced so far and what actions you have initiated to overcome them. Are these actions proving successful?

The most difficult challenges the program has faced were issues associated with matching tutors and students. Issues such as work schedules, school schedules and lack of transportation would often limit student's availability to times inconvenient for most tutors. This resulted in long waits for matches and a

great deal of frustration among staff and students. This has been turned around by matching students with tutors who are retired, and starting study groups for those students willing to be tutored three or four at a time.

4) If you knew at the beginning of this fiscal year what you know now, what, if any, changes would you make?

These are the things I would have done differently at the beginning of the fiscal year: Activities would have been offered much sooner. Instead of trying to find a time that was good for everyone in the program, programming should have taken place maybe at two different times and whoever wished to could attend one or the other. A variety of parent and child oriented activities should have been in place in addition to the weekly tutoring session. I think this would have provided something to do for the students who had not been matched as well as created networking opportunities for all the families.

5) Did someone from your program attend any State Library sponsored literacy event this reporting period? Yes

If yes, briefly describe what was learned at the convocation and how this new knowledge will impact your program.

If no, briefly describe why you were unable to take advantage of this opportunity.

I attended the Southern California FFL meetings in Corona California, the training for ELLI grant recipients, and the training on "Learning With Mother Goose". Every meeting I have gone to has been useful and informative. I have learned about what is working in other programs and how it could be applied in Placentia. At some meetings we have had presentations about how people learn and develop which has been invaluable as a place to start from in relating to students, talking with tutors, and deciding on the direction the program should take. Being part of the ELLI team has given me more experience working with children of all ages and a variety of needs which has been extremely enlightening and rewarding.

6) How do you see the future of the Families for Literacy Program in your library? What aspects have you already incorporated into regular library services? What aspects of the FFL program could you offer in your setting by reallocating resources of without outside (funding other than that provided by your library or community) funding? What are the barriers to achieving incorporation?

The Placentia Library FFL program will continue to expand as a response to the needs of our learners and the community. There are already a number of programs incorporated into regular library services such as Children's Story Times, Music Times, and Parenting classes. At this time, further incorporation has not been considered.

7) Please share any anecdotes or interactions that occurred in the course of your program that would give us a better understanding of the benefits to individual families gained through your FFL program.

(These are particularly helpful to Dr. Starr and to me as we give presentations about our FFL programs and use these anecdotal stories as illustrations of our impact on individual families)

At our Christmas Party we distributed books to our families. All the kids, not just the pre-readers were excited. I watched as a mad scramble for books slowly died down into pairs and groups of kids and adults reading and talking about the books. Older children were reading to the younger children whether they were related or not while their parents looked on. I was struck by the enthusiasm and delight which everyone showed towards the books. Barriers didn't seem to exist, lines of communication were opening up, and everyone was sharing

something they clearly regarded as very special. There are many wondertum memories from the previous year, but that one stands out among them all.


Dear Senator Margett:

Thank you for your presentation to the Rotary Club of Placentia several weeks ago. I appreciated the opportunity to meet you and hear about your philosophy of governance.


The purpose of this letter is to transmit to you some background information about Placentia Library District.

As we discussed at the end of the Rotary meeting the rate of Placentia Library District's property tax transferred to ERAF was calculated by the Orange County Auditor to be 50.41%. Since property tax is the District's only tax revenue the loss was devastating to our services to area residents. A detailed history of Placentia Library District's property tax and valuation history is Attachment A.


The following is a summary of Placentia Library District's property tax revenue since Fiscal Year 1992-1993:



The loss of property tax revenue caused a reduction in staff that ultimately caused a reduction in the hours of Library operation. In January 1997 the Library became a single shift operation with all of the staff working the same hours. As a result the Library is no longer open on Fridays or Saturdays and is closed on Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday mornings.



Reductions in property tax revenue also had a severe impact on the Library's book budget. The benchmark for library materials expenditures for a public library is 15% - 20% of the total operations budget. Attachment B shows the percentage expenditures by categories for the District. It shows that the balances of these percentages has been maintained with the cutbacks in revenue.




One of the reasons for the increases in the General Fund book expenditures in the past four years is that the Legislature has increased its allocation for the Public Library Fund (PLF). At


Placentia Library District the PLF is used exclusively for book purchasing. The State's continued support of the Public Library Fund is the major component, approximately 50%, of the District's book budget.

Also, the District has increased its local revenue by becoming a United States Department of State Passport Application Acceptance Agency. This activity now provides approximately \$50,000 per year for the book budget.

Placentia Library Foundation was established in 1994 and conducted its first Adopt-A-Book Campaign in 1995. While the development of a charitable giving program enhances book purchases, it is not replacing the \$1 million shortfall in the District's General Fund property tax revenue caused by the property tax shift (ERAF).



In addition to increasing local revenue through the Foundation and Passport Services, Placentia Library District has also actively sought grants from the State Library and private foundations. Many of the literacy and after-school programs are funded by State and Federal grants.



One of the consequences of the reduction in hours of service and purchasing of new books is that Placentia Library District residents are making heavy demands on neighboring libraries. While this activity is partially subsidized by the State it creates a heavy burden on the Yorba Linda, Fullerton and Anaheim public libraries.

Despite the heavy use of neighboring libraries by Placentia residents, Placentia Library continues to provide 35.6% of its circulation services and 46.8% of its Internet and electronic reference services to users who live outside its service area. Yet Placentia Library District receives no direct loan reimbursement from the State Library because so many of its cardholders are using the Yorba Linda Library.

Placentia Library District is in a perilous position. Additional property tax shifts would threaten our very existence. We are also dependent on the continued stability of the Public Library Fund. The District is facing the potential impact of a nearly \$200,000 loss next year if the 2% property tax rebate is upheld – this will be a major blow to an annual budget of \$1.3 million. Please keep Placentia Library District in mind as you are negotiating the structure of the State's budget for Fiscal Year 2002-2003. The fate of our future is in your hands!



BACKGROUND:

At its meeting on February 20, 2002 the Library Board of Trustees requested a review of the meeting notification provisions of The Brown Act and that a Meeting Notification Policy for District Trustees be developed.

Each of the Trustees has been given a copy of *Open & Public III, a User's Guide to the Ralph M. Brown Act*, by Ted Fourkas. Published by Capitol Enquiry, Inc. in Sacramento this annotated guide to The Brown Act is endorsed by many organizations including the California Newspaper Publishers Association, the League of California Cities and the California Special Districts Association.

The Brown Act defines a public body's relationship to the public. It does not address internal operations of the public body. Those relationships are defined by either the *California Code* or local policies and procedures.

Attachment A is a proposed Placentia Library District Library Board Meeting Notification Policy for the Board's consideration.

RECOMMENDATION:

Adopt the Meeting Notification Policy for Placentia Library District Board of Trustees

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Placentia Library District Library Board Meeting Notification Policy Proposed March 20, 2002

Notification for regularly scheduled meetings of the Library Board of Trustees shall be given by the delivery, by staff, of the Agenda, to the address of record as designated by each Trustee, at least seventy-two (72) hours before the meeting. A regularly scheduled meeting is one that falls on the date and time established by the Library Board of Trustees at its December meeting, or at a non-regular date and/or time that has been set by Board action at a regular Library Board meeting.

Requests to change the date and/or time of a regular meeting that occur after the Library Board meeting immediately preceding, shall be made to either the Library Board President or the Library Director. At the instruction of the Library Board President or the Library Director the Library Administrative Assistant will survey each of the Trustees by telephone or e-mail to check for availability for the proposed date and/or time. The survey results will be forwarded to the Library Board President who will make the final determination about the meeting date and/or time. In the absence of the Library Board President the Library Board Secretary will make this determination. The Administrative Assistant will notify each Trustee by telephone or e-mail about the final determination for the meeting date and/or time. The Agenda will be delivered by staff to the address of record as designated by each Trustee, at least seventy-two (72) hours before the meeting. The Agenda notebook for each meeting that was not pre-approved by Library Board action for an unusual date and/or time will use a red cover page and the meeting announcement on the Agenda will note the "Unusual Date and/or Time".

Programming- The winter programming session ended in February. There were 8 storytimes, 4 lapsits, and 8 musictimes with a total attendance of 566.

School Visits- School visits have continued. Eight classes visited the library during February. A total of 173 children participated in these visits.

Offsite Programming- Storytimes at the Placentia Community Centers and the Head Start classrooms have continued. There were 4 storytimes at the community centers with a combined attendance of 32. Three storytimes were performed for each of the seven Head Start classes with a combined attendance of 420. The children's librarian visited a local preschool and performed a 20-minute storytime for each of the four classes. A total of 60 children enjoyed stories, songs, and flannel boards about frogs and toads.

Reading Incentive Programs- The In-N-Out Burger reading program "Food for Thought" began February 3. Children who read five library books will earn a free hamburger or cheeseburger. By the end of February 228 children had signed up for the program and 78 children had completed at least one bookmark.

Other programs- The Children's Department and the Literacy Department held the second of four parenting classes, "Discipline, Setting Limits and Temper-tantrums". Adriana Montes again conducted two sessions of this class, one in English and one in Spanish. A total of 15 adults attended these two classes. Thirteen children required child-care during the classes. Child-care was provided by the children's librarian and a group of volunteers.

Tutor Training. The Literacy Coordinator conducted two tutor training workshops during February and eight tutors were trained, five adults and three teens. All eight new tutors are matched and tutoring in the Library. The next tutor training is scheduled for March 3, 2002.

Families for Literacy (FFL) Program Status. We now have eight families in the FFL component.

Rotary Reading Assistance Program (RRAP) Continues. RRAP, a partnership with the Placentia and Yorba Linda Rotary Clubs, the Placentia/Yorba Linda Unified School District (PYLUSD), and the Library, continued in February. So far, we have trained more than 130 high school volunteers for this school year. We now have ten Esperanza High School RRAP volunteers tutoring at the Yorba Linda Library. RRAP offers high school students the opportunity to get community service hours by volunteering at local elementary schools.


Reach Out and Read Partnership Continues. In January, the Placentia Library Literacy Services continued its partnership with St. Judes Medical Center and the Reach Out and Read Program, a pediatric-based literacy program. We want to continue to especially recognize one of our volunteers, Diane Martlaro, who goes to the Whitten Center in Placentia on Monday mornings and reads to children in the waiting room while they are waiting to see the St. Judes pediatric staff.


English Language and Literacy Intensive (ELLI) Program Update. The ELLI Program has expanded at Ruby Drive, and the teachers there have identified well over 150 at risk students in grades K-6 that we are working with. We are utilizing both staff and volunteers to work with the children at Ruby Drive. For example, Jack Meza, who assists with art projects, is an eighth grader from Kraemer Middle School, and Linda Noss, who works with the extended kindergarten day program, is a literacy intern from Cal State Fullerton. At Rio Vista we have placed ELLI Program tutors in seven kindergarten and lst grade classrooms, and at John Tynes, we have staff and tutors working with almost 40 students. Since the Library started the ELLI Program in January, 2002, we have reached over 230 students, more than 30 above our initial goal. Teachers at all three elementary schools have expressed their gratitude for the extra help the ELLI tutors provide. Several have mentioned that the tutors are making a significant, positive difference in the reading and writing ability of their students.

rews push to complete Civic Centers 38

Gone is the yellow tape stretched across walkways and orange cones blocking access to the City Hall, Police Department and Library. After weeks of delays, the update of the city's 30-year-old central courtyard is almost complete.

The \$435,000 Placentia Civic Center project that began in July is the first renovation of the area at Kraemer Boulevard and Chapman Avenue since its construction in 1973.

The construction timeline called for work to end in November. But that was before crews discovered they had to dig out an unexpectedly thick 2.5 inches of concrete from each of two smaller fountains. That extra demolition work

And it moved the deadline to Christmastime, causing city officials to cancel the annual center tree-lighting ceremony.

Rainy days also hindered progress and pushed back the schedule even further.

"They fell behind in the beginning and just never caught up," said Chris Becker, public works director.

The project cost has risen slightly, Becker said, but not because of contractor delays. Part of the holdup involved special orders of materials.

The city also underestimated the project timeline by at least 20 days, he added, saying work is now 95 percent complete.

City Management Analyst Kris Gundel believes the delay is not that significant, considering the project's size and in-

"It's nothing out of the ordinary," she said. "There are so many different elements to coordinate, from the landscaping to the electrician work. It's very involved."

Working whenever weather permitted, including through the holidays, the contractors' crews pushed to complete the new look - planting bushes, grass and trees; laying new walkways, fixing up the library's exterior and cleaning and repainting the bell tower and remaining large fountain.

Officials hope residents find the Civic Center a more community-friendly area without the smaller fountains and cumbersome cobblestone paths.

The revamped center features benches, grass around the bell tower and smooth river rock set in the ground.

"It really opens up the

plaza," Gundel said. "It allows more room for occasions. Before, you would have to walk around the fountains, and it wasn't clear for residents where to go."

The Library District is sharing in much of the costs, which included replacing dry-rot areas on the library building that had allowed rain to leak in.

In related projects, the center will soon have a directional sign to guide visitors to the various buildings.

A monument sign facing the Chapman / Kraemer corner is the only major element miss-

The monument, a wall consisting of two concrete wings. has been scaled back to about 5 feet high.

Gundel expects all the work to be finished by mid-February.



332 County opens first cyberlibrary branch

County • Compact, low-cost storefront library in Costa Mesa features 25 computers and about 2,000 books.

It looks more like a cybercafe than a library, and it has more computers than rows of books.

But if the county's newest storefront branch catches on, it could be the look of Orange County libraries in the 21st cen-

The Orange County Public Library opened its 28th branch Wednesday in a Costa Mesa strip mall. It was opened in a fraction of the time and at millions less than it costs to build a traditional library.

With 25 computer stations and just 2,000 books, the branch at the corner of Bristol and Baker is small enough to tuck away in any corner of the county, and yet its patrons still have access to the county system's 2.5 million books.

It's California's first and one of few techno-libraries in the country.

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school-age children, plans to be one of the first patrons at the new library.

"We use the library a lot," she said. "My kids always say 'Mom, can you take me to the library,' and sometimes I just don't have the time."

Now Djokovic and her children plan to order their books online from home and pick them up at the new Technology Library in their neighborhood within 24 hours.

In Tampa, Fla., the county runs an e-mail library to reach people in rural areas far from its branch locations. Computer terminals are set up at recreation centers and churches where people can order books and have them delivered to their homes.

"It's more convenient for a lot of people," said Peggy Hupe, reference librarian at the Tampa Hillsboro County Public Library.


Demand for the e-mail library is constantly growing with two new ones being set up in local churches, she said.

The Technology Library at Costa Mesa has computers that run on hyperfast T-l lines. Patrons can access the Internet, Microsoft Word, e-mail, free e-books, and review the county's book catalog.

The new approach was developed because the county saw a need for a library on the east end of Costa Mesa, but did not want to spend the \$4 million to \$5 million it takes to build a new complex. So the county rented a storefront and operates it with a \$120,000 annual budget.

Anyone with a library card can use the computers and two color printers at no cost.

The computers have filters to keep children from inap-

rue, at the time there was some talk of renaming the holiday "Presidents Day" to also honor Abraham Lincoln. But the "Presidents Day" idea was never enacted into federal law, and to this day the federal holiday is officially known as "Washington's Birthday."

Unfortunately, the seeds of the myth had been planted. Because of the earlier talk about creating "Presidents Day," people started thinking there really was such a thing. In fact, 12 states actually created "Presidents Day" holidays, some in the mistaken belief that that was what the federal holiday was called.

California, however, was not among them. Here the state holiday is still officially called Washington's Birthdav.

But at the local level, holiday disorder reigns. Some Orange County city and county government agencies call it "Washington's Birthday" while others insist it's "Presidents Day."

And some agencies are thoroughly confused. For example, the Orange County Public Law Library's official 2002 holiday list says Feb. 12 is Washington's Birthday (it's actually Lincoln's Birthday, which is another state holiday), while Feb. 18 is called "President's Day" - which would indicate that it belongs to one president, but they. don't specify which one.

So maybe it's time for us to get our holiday house in order. Let's go back to calling the holiday what it is: Washington's Birthday.

After all, if Christopher Columbus and Cesar Chavez and Martin Luther King Jr. all get their own holidays in California, then surely the Father of Our Country deserves his own holiday, too.

Elect to end Presidents Day myth forthwith

No matter what you've heard, yesterday wasn't Presidents Day. It wasn't President's Day, or Presidents' Day, either.

Yes, know it was a holiday, least for some people. Federal, state and local government offices were closed. and we didn't get any mail. There were

also any number of advertisements in this paper and other media outlets for "Presidents Day Sales" and "President's Day Sales" and "Presidents' Day Sales" - I saw it all three ways - most of them bearing pictures of George and Abe.

But Monday wasn't Presidents Day. Because, as I've said before in this space, there is no national holiday called Presidents Day.

Let me repeat that, with emphasis: THERE IS NO NA-**TIONAL** HOLIDAY **PRESIDENTS** CALLED DAY. OR ANY APOS-TROPHE'D **FORM** THEREOF!

My source on this is a UC Berkeley law student named Jason Bezis, who for years has been waging a campaign against what he calls "the Presidents Day myth." Some years ago I happened to mention "Presidents Day" in a column, after which Jason contacted me and set me straight.

According to lason's well-documented research. the "Presidents Day" myth started in the late 1960s, when Congress was moving holidays to Mondays to create more three-day weekends. The Feb. 22 George Washington's Birthday federal holiday was moved to

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
