

Most patrons need more time than this designation which creates issues for both patrons and staff. 

SB 87 - STATE BUDGET

Late June 28, 2011 the Assembly and the Senate Democrats successfully passed the State Budget, SB 87, with a solid majority vote – using the powers that the voters bestowed on them when they enacted Proposition 25 (majority vote Budget) in November of 2010. Over the last several weeks, when talks broke down with a group of Republican Senators, known as the "GOP 4," over extending the current taxes that were set to expire on June 30th, the Democrats and the Governor worked to craft an alternative Budget, known as "Plan C."

The "Plan C" Budget makes substantial cuts of \$14.6 billion to programs in order to reduce the \$26.6 billion Budget deficit, provides additional resources of \$1.4 billion, a reserve of \$500 million, and assumes new Department of Finance revenue estimates indicating that the tax receipts have continued to grow in the positive by \$4 billion. The Governor had indicated his strong desire to place a tax extension package on a special election September ballot, but with the resistance from the Republican party, he was forced to go in a different direction. There may still be, as the Governor has acknowledged, a desire to go to the ballot in November of 2012 with an initiative to increase state revenues.

What was most surprising about last night's debate on the Budget bills was the speed with which the legislature dispensed with the Budget bill and 7 related measures, including the so-called "Trigger bills." (see below) There was only modest, brief debate from the Republican members about the assumption of the new revenues and if they were solid enough, the structure of the "trigger," and complaints from the Minority Party that they had been "left out of the process." Assembly Budget Chair, Bob Blumenfield, clearly frustrated said during the debate on the main Budget bill, "You can't say that the new revenue assumptions (\$4 billion) is not real and then say that the trigger cuts aren't real. You can't have it both ways. These are very real cuts." In the Senate, several of the members of the so-called "GOP 4" rose to express their displeasure that the disintegration of the Budget talks had led to the Budget products on the Floor, which did not include reforms they argued for including pension and regulatory reform as well as a spending cap. Senator Tom Berryhill said that the package was "totally partisan. It's a sad day. The Governor and the GOP 4 didn't walk away from talks, but labor did. This is the Majority party protecting the status quo."

After the conclusion of all of the work in the Senate at approximately 10:30 p.m., the Senate President pro Tem thanked everyone for their thoughtful work on the Budget and said the night's events caused "mixed feelings. A sense of accomplishment that we passed a Budget on time and addressed the structural deficit. But it was done making cuts that are going to hurt a lot of people...We don't celebrate tonight. We did it with members who were willing to participate in the process, with the tools we had." The Assembly received the final bill, an education Budget "trailer bill" from the Senate close to 11 p.m. and passed it on a vote of 51 "ayes" to 25 "noes" and then promptly adjourned, having concluded their work.

The Governor is in receipt of the Budget bill and the "trailer" bills, including the "trigger bills," and is expected to sign them today or tomorrow. NOTE: \$15.2 million in library funding - \$8.5 million for CLSA, \$3 million for the PLF and the maintenance of effort language, and \$3.7 million for literacy, can be found in SB 87. The State Library begins on page 593 of the enrolled version sent to the Governor.

AB 121 -- "TRIGGER BILL"

For the first time in recent memory, the Legislature has passed two measures that would enact very specified mid-year cuts to programs if revenues do not materialize, as anticipated by December 15, 2011. Called "trigger bills," AB 121 is the major bill affecting cuts to UC/CSU, public libraries, K-12 and other programs, while SB 73 is a trigger bill pertaining to health and human services cuts. Specifically, AB 121 proposes eliminating all remaining library funding (\$15,866 million) should the economy not continue to recover and new revenues do not keep pace with expenditures. You will recall that CLA worked very hard to preserve \$15.2 million of the \$30.4 million that the Governor originally proposed for total elimination in his January Budget. The \$15.2 million reflects a compromise that was reached between CLA, the members of the legislature, and Governor Brown's Administration, in order to save funding for the California Library Services Act, the Public Library Foundation, and the literacy program. The passage of AB 121 means that the remaining \$15.2 million would be vulnerable under the "trigger" scenario, and it also calls for the elimination of the California Civil Liberties Public Education Program and the California Newspaper Project, if necessary, bringing the total potential cut to \$15,866 million.

What Is the "Trigger" and How Does It Work?

In a briefing packet that was used by the Democrat caucus, it explains the Trigger as thus:

"If revenues do not grow by at least \$3 billion of the projected \$4 billion, then scaled triggered cuts will occur. The concept of the Trigger is to provide assurances the budget holds together, but provide adequate time for follow up solutions and changes to be made to mitigate negative consequences of the potential cuts."

The language in the legislation notes that: "Not later than December 15, 2011, the Director of Finance shall forecast General Fund revenues for the 2011-12 fiscal year and shall determine whether that revenue forecast or the Legislative Analyst's November 2011 General Fund revenue forecast is higher. The Director of Finance shall notify the Joint Legislative Budget Committee of the determination and the amount of the higher forecast. If the higher revenue forecast determined pursuant to subdivision (a) projects General Fund revenues for the 2011-12 fiscal year of less than \$87,452,500,000, the Director of Finance shall do all of the following on or after January 1, 2012." What then follows is a list of the items that would be cut, such as the library programs, \$200 million more to UC and CSU, \$100 million to In Home Support Services, \$30 million community college fee increase, \$72 million cut to juvenile justice programs, etc. These are considered the "Tier 1" cuts. If additional cuts needed to be made beyond those included in AB 121, a second Tier would be triggered, prompting cuts of \$1.9 billion to K-12 schools to reduce the school year by 7 days (\$1.5 billion), eliminate Home-To-School transportation (\$248 million), and community college apportionments (\$72 million).

Senate Budget Chair, Mark Leno said during the presentation of this bill on the Senate Floor, "Hopefully the trigger will not need to be pulled. We have 40% of it in the bank right now and short of something very dramatic on the U.S. fiscal scene, we [won't have to pull the trigger]." His counterpart in the Assembly, Assemblyman Bob Blumenfield agreed, "This is truly a tale of tears....But we believe the revenue increases will continue." In speaking with several key legislators in the hall last night, they told us they are cautiously optimistic that the state will continue its economic recovery and AB 121 will not have to be invoked.

<u>AB 438 – LIBRARY "OUTSOURCING"BILL (AB438) TO BE HEARD JULY 6TH – BILL HAS BEEN AMENDED AGAIN</u>

As of July 6, 2011, AB 438 by Assemblyman Das Williams passed the Senate Governance and Finance Committee (the former Senate Local Government Committee) on a straight party-line vote of 6 "ayes" to 3 "noes," with the agreement that the author would take a series of amendments requested by the Chair and Committee staff. The bill would "impose requirements on a city or library district that intends to withdraw from a county free library system and operate libraries with a private contractor."

The Committee Chair, Senator Lois Wolk, one of the most ardent library supporters in the Senate for many years, had invested a significant amount of personal time doing her own research on AB 438 prior to today's hearing. Similarly, her Senate Governance and Fiscal Committee Consultant reached out to CLA, the State Library, stakeholders pro and con, and others to obtain all of the background and research information necessary to help the committee make an informed decision on the bill today. As a result, the Committee analysis was very thorough and can be obtained here for your information. (You can also see a comprehensive list of the AB 438 supporters and opponents at the conclusion of the committee analysis.)

AB 438, as you may recall, is sponsored by the Ventura Reader's Book Group and supported by SEIU and the California Labor Federation. AB 438 is opposed by the California League of Cities, LSSI, and the California Chamber of Commerce. During debate on the bill, the supporters argued for the protection of jobs and for more public input on the decision to outsource, while the opposition argued that the "practical effect of the bill was to ban cities from contracting out services, which likely means staff layoffs and branch closures."

At today's hearing, Senator Wolk stated that she supported the direction of the bill but also noted that it needed to be "tightened up." She acknowledged that the author had agreed to some amendments, and that she would be working with the author in the coming days to also frame additional amendments to provide for protection for workers affected by contracting out. For those CLA members and interested persons who are actively following the legislation, the amendments, as we understand them, that were agreed to today would:

- 1) Using the June 27th version of the bill, available here
- 2) Strike lines 6 through 25 of the bill on page 4 (This language, which would be deleted from the bill would have stated that the contract could not displace city or library district employees or result in lower contractor pay rates or benefits, among other things.)
- 3) Strike lines 32 and 33 of the bill on page 4 (This language, which would be deleted from the bill stated, "The potential for future economic risk to the city or library district from potential contractor rate increases shall be minimal.")
- 4) Strike lines 1 through 3 of the bill on page 5. (This language, which would be deleted from the bill, stated that the "potential economic advantage of the contract shall not be outweighed by the public's interest in having a particular function performed directly by the city or library district.")
- 5) The bill will also be amended to limit the term of a library services contract to no more than two years.

6) The provisions of the bill will "sunset" (law will no longer be effective) on January 1, 2014, unless the provisions are extended by the Legislature. (We are informed that talks are underway to potentially extend the January 2014 date to a later year.)

Senator Wolk stated that she wanted to eliminate sections that were "too narrowly drawn." But she acknowledged several times that the state, and she personally, has a "vested interest in protecting public libraries" and asserted that there may be some safeguards necessary to ensure that interest is upheld. In his closing, Assemblyman Williams thanked the committee for giving the issue so much of their time and attention, and the bill subsequently passed on a vote of 6 "ayes" (all Democrat members) to 3 "noes" (all Republicans). The measure will now head to the Senate Appropriations Committee.

SB 445 – LIBRARY CIRCULATION BILL

Recently SB 445 by Senator Joe Simitian passed the Assembly Governmental Organization Committee on a strong bi-partisan vote of 17 "ayes" to 0 "noes." The measure seeks to upgrade a 1980 law and a subsequent 1986 law, both sponsored by the California Library Association (CLA), to protect the privacy of patron circulation records at public libraries.

Existing law provides limited privacy protection for "registration and circulation" records, but is largely silent on privacy protection for the many online interactions a patron has at or through their public libraries, including items such as:

- Email or text based communications with a librarian or library staff;
- Online courses:
- Computer research; and,
- Online records of items checked out.

"This simple change ensures that the more than a million Californians who use our public libraries every day will have their personal information protected," said Simitian. "People use libraries to research sensitive and personal topics; their privacy shouldn't be compromised." The change in law was suggested by one of Simitian's constituents through Simitian's annual "There Oughta Be A Law" contest. Cupertino resident and library law consultant Mary Minow submitted her winning entry after attending one of Senator Simitian's Town Hall meetings.

"This bill is a much needed update for library users in California," said Minow. "The existing law only protected our registration and circulation records. In today's world, we email, text, and chat with librarians online. Library users don't expect that to be part of the public record. I'm delighted that a step for privacy has been made for library patrons in the digital world."

Senate Bill 445 makes a small but necessary change in state law to ensure that all patron use records are protected equally, and can be disclosed only to the appropriate parties. The California Library Association and its members expressed support of the bill, indicating that change was needed.

"It has become difficult to fit today's online communications methods used by libraries and their patrons into the existing law. The new language will ensure library users that records of their communications and transactions with their library will remain private and confidential," said San Jose Public Library Director, Jane Light.

"California has been on the leading edge of privacy legislation for decades. This bill brings an important law into the 21st century. Libraries offer electronic connections to a multitude of invaluable online resources. People who use libraries to access such online resources deserve the same confidentiality they obtain when using the more traditional library resources," said Beth Givens Director of the Privacy Rights Clearinghouse, a non-profit agency dedicated to consumer advocacy. The laws have served library patrons well for over three decades, but are in need of update in order to reflect the changes in technology and the way in which electronic records are kept at the public library.

SB 288 - LOCAL GOVERNMENT: INDEPENDENT SPECIAL DISTRICT

CSDA's sponsored legislation, Senate Bill 288 (Negrete McLeod) was signed into law by Governor Jerry Brown on Thursday, July 7 after passing through the legislature unanimously. SB 288 applies to independent special districts that choose to utilize the county treasurer as the treasurer of the district. Most of these districts are currently limited to a 35 year-old \$1,000 revolving fund to pay district expenditures for ongoing operations. Similar to existing authority vested in mosquito abatement and vector control districts and public cemetery districts, SB 288 authorizes all other independent special districts to establish a revolving fund in an amount not to exceed 110 percent of one-twelfth of a district's adopted budget for that fiscal year. Providing more consistency throughout the enabling acts that govern special districts will improve flexibility and reduce confusion.

SB 931 - USE OF LEGAL COUNSEL

Special districts that hire outside legal counsel or consultants for advice on public employee union activities should be extremely concerned about Senate Bill 931 by Senator Juan Vargas. Specifically, this bill prohibits agencies from using public dollars to pay for outside legal counsel or consultants for the purpose of counseling the public employer about ways to minimize or deter the exercise of public employee union rights. CSDA believes that current law already prohibits public agencies from engaging in "union busting," the cited reason for the bill. The practical effect of this bill, if it were to be signed into law, would be increased challenges by labor resulting in heightened costs to employers to defend themselves.

If this bill is signed into law, special districts who hire outside legal counsel or consultants for advice on public employee union activities could face challenges that the advice they received could "minimize or deter" the exercise of union rights. This would force districts to disclose confidential attorney-client communications. This threat of disclosure would likely deter districts from getting desired advice on some issues, like hiring a consultant to train staff on better employee relations or hiring outside legal counsel for advice on what steps to take if a strike were to occur. SB 931 specifically allows public employers to only hire consultants or counsel to engage in "collective bargaining on behalf of the employer with respect to wages, hours or other terms and conditions of employment."

Special districts rarely have in-house counsel to provide advice on labor relations. Districts rely on hiring outside counsel and consultants as they cannot afford to directly employ legal counsel that specialize in employer-employee relations. SB 931 could jeopardize districts' ability to seek the best advice on employee relations. This bill is currently on the Assembly Floor and may be considered by the full Assembly as early as this Thursday. CSDA is opposed to SB 931.

Senate Bill No. 87

CHAPTER _____

An act making appropriations for the support of the government of the State of California and for several public purposes in accordance with the provisions of Section 12 of Article IV of the Constitution of the State of California, to take effect immediately, Budget Bill.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SB 87, Leno. 2011-12 Budget.

This bill would make appropriations for support of state government for the 2011–12 fiscal year.

This bill would declare that it is to take effect immediately as a Budget Bill.

Appropriation: yes.

The people of the State of California do enact as-follows:

SECTION 1.00. This act shall be known and may be cited as the "Budget Act of 2011."

SEC. 1.50. (a) In accordance with Section 13338 of the Government Code, as added by Chapter 1284 of the Statutes of 1978, and as amended by Chapter 1286 of the Statutes of 1984, it is the intent of the Legislature that this act utilize a coding scheme compatible with the Governor's Budget and the records of the Controller, and provide for the appropriation of federal funds received by the state and deposited in the State Treasury.

(b) Essentially, the format and style are as follows:

(1) Appropriation item numbers have a code which is common to all the state's fiscal systems. The meaning of this common coded item number is as follows:

2720—Organization Code (this code represents the California Highway Patrol)

001—Reference Code (first appropriation for a particular fund for support of each department)

0044—Fund Code (Motor Vehicle Account, State Transportation Fund)

- (2) Appropriation items are organized in organization code order.
- (3) All the appropriation items, reappropriation items, and reversion items, if any, for each department or entity are adjacent to one another.
- (4) Federal funds received by the state and deposited in the State Treasury are appropriated in separate items.
- (c) The Department of Finance may authorize revisions to the codes used in this act in order to provide compatibility between the codes used in this act and those used in the Governor's Budget and in the records of the Controller.

(d) Notwithstanding any other provision of this act, the Department of Finance may revise the schedule of any appropriation made in this act where the revision is of a technical nature and is consistent with legislative intent. These revisions may include, but shall not be limited to, the substitution of category for program or program for category limitations, the proper categorization of allocated administration costs and cost recoveries, the distribution of any unallocated amounts within an appropriation and the adjustment of schedules to facilitate departmental accounting operations, including the elimination of categories providing for amounts payable from other items or other appropriations and the distribution of unscheduled amounts to programs or categories. These revisions shall include a certification that the revisions comply with the intent and limitation of expenditures as appropriated by the Legislature.

(e) Notwithstanding any other provision of this act, when the Department of Finance, pursuant to subdivision (d), approves the schedule or revision of any appropriation relating to the elimination of amounts payable, the language authorizing the transfer shall also be eliminated.

SEC. 1.80. (a) The following sums of money and those appropriated by any other sections of this act, or so much thereof as may be necessary unless otherwise provided herein, are hereby appropriated for the use and support of the State of California for the 2011–12 fiscal year beginning July 1, 2011, and ending June 30, 2012. All of these appropriations, unless otherwise provided herein, shall be paid out of the General Fund in the State Treasury.

(b) All capital outlay appropriations and reappropriations, unless otherwise provided herein, are available as follows:

(1) Studies, preliminary plans, working drawings, and minor capital outlay funds are available for expenditure until June 30, 2012.

(3) All other capital outlay funds are available until June 30, 2014.

(c) Whenever by constitutional or statutory provision the revenues or receipts of any institution, department, board, bureau, commission, officer, employee, or other agency, or any moneys in any special fund created by law therefor, are to be used for salaries, support, or any proper purpose, expenditures shall be made therefrom for any such purpose only to the extent of the amount therein appropriated, unless otherwise stated herein.

CHAPTER 41

An act to amend the Budget Act of 2011 by adding Sections 3.94 and 3.97 to that act, relating to the State Budget, to take effect immediately, Budget Bill.

[Approved by Governor June 30, 2011. Filed with Secretary of State June 30, 2011.]

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 121, Committee on Budget. Budget Act of 2011.

Existing law requires the Legislature to pass a Budget Bill making appropriations for the support of state government for the ensuing fiscal year

This bill would amend the Budget Act of 2011 to require the Director of Finance to forecast General Fund revenues for the 2011–12 fiscal year by December 15, 2011, and to determine whether that revenue forecast or the Legislative Analyst's November 2011 General Fund revenue forecast is higher. Under this bill, the Director of Finance would be required to make reductions to specified items of appropriation if the higher revenue forecast is less than \$87,452,500,000 and to make additional reductions to specified items of appropriation if the higher revenue forecast is less than \$86,452,500,000.

This bill would also provide that items of appropriation in the Budget Act of 2011 shall be reduced as appropriate to reflect any funds used from the Trial Court Security Account, the Social Services Subaccount, or from other accounts or subaccounts of the Local Revenue Fund 2011, and would require the Director of Finance to allocate the necessary reductions to each item of appropriation to accomplish the reductions required by this bill.

This bill would declare that it is to take effect immediately as a Budget Bill

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 3.94 is added to the Budget Act of 2011, to read: Sec. 3.94. (a) Not later than December 15, 2011, the Director of Finance shall forecast General Fund revenues for the 2011–12 fiscal year and shall determine whether that revenue forecast or the Legislative Analyst's November 2011 General Fund revenue forecast is higher. The Director of Finance shall notify the Joint Legislative Budget Committee of the determination and the amount of the higher forecast.

- (c) Notwithstanding any other law, and in addition to the reductions authorized by subdivisions (a) and (b), each item of appropriation in Section 2.00 shall be reduced as appropriate to reflect any funds used from the accounts or subaccounts in the Local Revenue Fund 2011 or from the Social Services Subaccount in the Local Revenue Fund pursuant to subdivision (b) of section 17601.20 of the Welfare and Institutions Code. The Director of Finance shall allocate the necessary reductions to each item of appropriation to accomplish the reductions required by this subdivision.

An act to amend Sections 19104 and 19116 of, and to add Section 19104.5 to, the Education Code, relating to libraries.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 438, as amended, Williams. County free libraries: withdrawal: use of private contractors.

Existing law provides that the county boards of supervisors may establish and maintain, within their respective counties, county free libraries pursuant to specified provisions of law. Existing law provides that the board of trustees, common council, or other legislative body of any city or the board of trustees of any library district may, on or before January 1st of any year, notify the county board of supervisors that the city or library district no longer desires to be a part of the county free library system, as specified.

This bill would impose specified requirements if the board of trustees, common council, or other legislative body of a city or the board of trustees of a library district intends to withdraw from the county free library system and operate the city's or library district's library or libraries with a private contractor that will employ library staff to achieve cost savings, unless the library or libraries are funded only by the proceeds of a special tax imposed by the city or library district. These requirements would include, but not be limited to, publishing notice of the contemplated action in a specified manner, clearly demonstrating that the contract will result in actual overall cost savings to the city or library district, prohibiting the contract from causing the displacement of city or library district employees, and imposing specified requirements on contracts for library services in excess of \$100,000 annually. The bill would also provide that its provisions do not preclude a city, library district, or local government from adopting more restrictive rules regarding the contracting of public services.

Vote: majority. Appropriation: no. Fiscal committee: no. State-mandated local program: no.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

1 SECTION 1. Section 19104 of the Education Code is amended 2 to read:

3 19104. (a) The board of trustees, common council, or other legislative body of a city or the board of trustees of a library district 5 may, on or before January 1 of any year, notify the county board of supervisors that the city or library district no longer desires to be a part of the county free library system. The notice shall be 7 accompanied by a statement complying with the requirements of 9 Chapter 8 (commencing with Section 54900) of Part 1 of Division 2 of Title 5 of the Government Code. The clerk of the board of 10 supervisors shall file the statement with the county assessor and the State Board of Equalization. Thereafter the city or library 12 district shall cease to participate in the benefits of the county free 13 library system, and the property situated in the city or library 14 district shall not be liable for taxes for county free library purposes. 15

(b) If the board of trustees, common council, or other legislative body of a city or the board of trustees of a library district intends to withdraw from the county free library system and operate the city's or the district's library or libraries with a private contractor

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that will employ library staff to achieve cost savings, the requirements of Section 19104.5 shall apply, unless the library or libraries are funded only by the proceeds of a special tax imposed by the city or district pursuant to Article 3.5 (commencing with Section 50075) of Chapter 1 of Part 1 of Division 1 of Title 5 of the Government Code.

(a) If the board of trustees, common council, or other legislative body of a city or the board of trustees of a library district intends to withdraw from the county free library system and operate the city's or the district's library or libraries with a private contractor that will employ library staff to achieve cost savings, all of the following requirements shall apply:
- (1) At least once a week for four consecutive weeks prior to taking any action, the board of trustees, common council, or other legislative body of the city or the board of trustees of the library district shall publish, in a newspaper designated by it and circulated throughout the city or library district, notice of the contemplated action, giving the date and place of the meeting at which the contemplated action is proposed to be taken.
- (2) The board of trustees, common council, or other legislative body of a city or the board of trustees of a library district shall clearly demonstrate that the contract will result in actual overall cost savings to the city or library district, provided that, in comparing costs, all of the following occur:
- (A) The city or library district's additional cost of providing the same services as proposed by the contract shall be included. These additional costs shall include the salaries and benefits of additional staff that would be needed and the cost of additional space, equipment, and materials needed to perform the necessary functions of the library.
- (B) The city or library district's indirect overhead costs shall not be included unless those costs can be attributed solely to the function in question and would not exist if that function was not performed by the city or library district. For purposes of this subparagraph, "indirect overhead costs" means the pro rata share of existing administrative salaries and benefits, rent, equipment costs, utilities, and materials.

- 1 (C) The cost of a contractor providing a service for any 2 continuing city or library district costs that would be directly 3 associated with the contracted function shall be included. 4 Continuing city or library district costs shall include, but not be 1 limited to, costs for inspection, supervision, and monitoring.
 - (3) The contract shall not be approved solely on the basis that savings will result from lower contractor pay rates or benefits. Contracts shall be eligible for approval if the contractor's wages are at the industry's level and do not undercut city or library district pay rates.
 - (4) The contract shall not cause the displacement of city or library district employees. Displacement includes layoff, demotion, involuntary transfer to a new classification, involuntary transfer to a new location requiring a change of residence, and time base reductions. Displacement does not include changes in shifts or days off, nor does it include reassignment to other positions within the same classification and general location or employment with the contractor, so long as wages and benefits are comparable to those paid by the city or library district.
 - (5) The overall cost savings of the contract shall be large enough to ensure that the savings will not be eliminated by private sector and city or library district cost fluctuations that could normally be expected during the contracting period.
 - (6) The amount of the overall cost savings of the contract shall clearly justify the scope and duration of the contract.
 - (7) The contract shall be awarded through a publicized, competitive bidding process.
 - (8) The contract shall include specific provisions pertaining to the qualifications of the staff that will perform the work under the contract, as well as assurances that the contractor's hiring practices meet applicable nondiscrimination standards.
 - (9) The potential for future economic risk to the city or library district from potential contractor rate increases shall be minimal.
 - (10) The contract shall be with a firm. For purposes of this paragraph, a "firm" means a corporation, limited liability company, partnership, nonprofit organization, or sole proprietorship.
- 37 (11) The contract shall provide that it may be terminated at any 38 time by the city or library district without penalty if *the contractor* 39 *fails to perform and* notice is provided within 30 days of 40 termination.

- (12) The potential economic advantage of the contract shall not be outweighed by the public's interest in having a particular function performed directly by the city or library district.
- 4 (13) If the contract is for library services in excess of one hundred thousand dollars (\$100,000) annually, all of the following shall occur:

The city or library district shall not renew or extend the contract prior to receiving and considering the audit report.
 - (C) The contract shall include provisions for an audit by the city or library district, or an independent auditor approved by the city or library district, to determine whether and to what extent the anticipated cost savings have actually been realized. The city or library district shall not renew or extend the contract prior to before receiving and considering the audit report.

- (2) Any personal property within the facility related to the provision of library services, including books and resource materials, computer systems and software, furniture, and furnishings, shall be transferred for the lesser of:

- (B) The fair market value of the personal property. However, on or before the March 1 preceding the July 1 of the base year, the county librarian may designate collections of resource books and materials that are unique in, and integral to, the county free library system to be special collections. However, if the withdrawing entity contributes to the provision of library services from other city funds, or through taxes, assessments, or fees of its residents, the withdrawing entity may provide additional services to its residents. An act to amend Section 6267 of the Government Code, relating to public records.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SB 445, Simitian. California Public Records Act: library records. The California Public Records Act requires state and local agencies to make their records available for public inspection and, upon request of any person, to provide a copy of any public record unless the record is exempt from disclosure. The act provides that all registration and circulation records of any library which is in whole or in part supported by public funds are confidential and shall not be disclosed to any person, except as provided.

This bill would, instead, provide that patron use records, as defined, of any library which is in whole or in part supported by public funds shall remain confidential and not be disclosed, except as provided.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 6267 of the Government Code is amended to read:

- 6267. All patron use records of any library which is in whole or in part supported by public funds shall remain confidential and shall not be disclosed by a public agency, or private actor that maintains or stores patron use records on behalf of a public agency, to any person, local agency, or state agency except as follows:
- (a) By a person acting within the scope of his or her duties within the administration of the library.
- (b) By a person authorized, in writing, by the individual to whom the records pertain, to inspect the records.
 - (c) By order of the appropriate superior court.

As used in this section, the term "patron use records" includes the following:

(1) Any written or electronic record, that is used to identify the patron, including, but not limited to, a patron's name, address, telephone number, or e-mail address, that a library patron provides

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in order to become eligible to borrow or use books and other materials.

(2) Any written record or electronic transaction that identifies a patron's borrowing information or use of library information resources, including, but not limited to, database search records, borrowing records, class records, and any other personally identifiable uses of library resources information requests, or inquiries.

This section shall not apply to statistical reports of patron use nor to records of fines collected by the library.

Senate Bill No. 288

CHAPTER ____

An act to amend Sections 53952 and 53961 of the Government Code, relating to local government.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SB 288, Negrete McLeod. Local government: independent special districts.

Existing law authorizes the governing board of a special district, by resolution, to provide for the establishment of a revolving fund, in an amount not to exceed \$1,000, to be used to make change and pay small bills directly, and requires the resolution establishing the fund to make specified designations relating to the purposes for which the fund may be expended, the district officer with authority and responsibility over the fund, the necessity for the fund, and the maximum amount of the fund.

The Cortese-Knox-Hertzberg Local Government Reorganization Act of 2000 sets forth the definition of an independent special district.

This bill would additionally authorize the governing board of an independent special district, as defined, to provide, by resolution, for the establishment of a revolving fund in an amount not to exceed 110% of V_{12} of the independent special district's adopted budget for that fiscal year, and would require the resolution establishing the fund to make specified designations relating to the purposes for which the fund may be expended, the district officer with authority and responsibility over the fund, the necessity for the fund, and the maximum amount of the fund.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

SECTION 1. Section 53952 of the Government Code is amended to read:

53952. (a) The governing board of a special district may, by resolution, provide for the establishment of a revolving fund in an amount not to exceed one thousand dollars (\$1,000) to be used to make change and pay small bills directly. The resolution which

establishes the district revolving fund shall designate all of the following:

(1) The purposes for which the fund may be expended.

- (2) The officer of the district who shall have authority to make disbursements from the fund and be responsible for keeping account of all receipts and disbursements from the fund.
 - (3) The necessity for the fund.
 - (4) The maximum amount of the fund.
- (b) In addition to the authority granted by subdivision (a), an independent special district, as defined in Section 56044, may by resolution provide for the establishment of a revolving fund in an amount not to exceed 110 percent of one-twelfth of the district's adopted budget for that fiscal year. LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SB 931, as amended, Vargas. Public employee organizations.

The Meyers-Milias-Brown Act, the Ralph C. Dills Act, the provisions commonly referred to as the Educational Employment Relations Act, and the Higher Education Employer-Employee Relations Act each provide for negotiations concerning wages, hours, and other terms and conditions of employment between a state or local public employer and representatives of recognized employee organizations. Those acts prohibit public employers from, among other things, intimidating, coercing, or discriminating against employees because of their exercise of rights guaranteed under the acts, as specified.

This bill would additionally prohibit public agencies from using public funds to pay outside consultants or legal advisors for the purpose of counseling the public employer about ways to minimize or deter the exercise of rights guaranteed under this chapter. Under this bill, these provisions would not apply to payments for representation of a public sector employer before any court, administrative agency, or tribunal of arbitration, or for payments for engaging in collective bargaining on behalf of the employer with respect to wages, hours, or other terms and conditions of employment.

- 6075.3Requests for posting event/information must be emailed to the Administrative Assistant and must meet the following requirements:
 - 6075.3.1Submission must include name of event, brief description, dates, times and contact information. This information needs to be embedded in the body of the email or attached as a Word or Publishers document. Photos need to be submitted as a jpeg file.
 - 6075.3.2Submission must include the name of sponsoring agency or organization and contact information for person submitting.
 - 6075.3.3Requests must be submitted at least two (2) months prior to the event.
 - 6075.3.4Approvals are granted at the discretion of the Library Director.
 - 6075.3.5Submissions that do not represent the mission and goals of the District will not be accepted.

Naming of Library Buildings and Departments

POLICY NUMBER: 6090

6090.1 It is the Policy of the Placentia Library Board of Trustees to accept donations for facilities, site amenities, equipment and capital projects, and to recognize donors who make such donations by authorizing the naming of a library building or department.

6090.2 Naming Criteria.

6090.2.1

The Placentia Library District will name library buildings and departments as follows:

- When the Library Board of Trustees choose to honor an individual for significant, outstanding contribution in keeping with the nature and mission of the Library.
- When the Library Board of Trustees choose to accept the gift of a donor(s) who requests naming rights and who contribute a minimum of 51% of the total project costs, including construction, equipment, furnishings and collections for the building.
- No naming opportunities will be considered for corporations or religious entities.

6090.3 Duration and Modification of Naming

6090.3.1

The duration of a donor's name on any building or in any department ordinarily continues for as long as the building or department is used in the same manner or for the purpose for which the naming occurred. Upon demolition, replacement, substantial renovation, redesignation of purpose, or similar modification of a named building or department, the Placentia Library District may deem that the naming period has concluded.

When a donor's naming period has concluded, the Library Board of Trustees has the rights to rename the building or department, in recognition of new gifts, subject to any specific terms and conditions set forth.

- If a donor requests a change to the name of a building or department (e.g., due to divorce), the Placentia Library District will consider the request. If approved, all replacement signage and other related costs shall be at the donor's expense.
- In certain circumstances, the Placentia Library District reserves the right, on reasonable grounds, to revoke and terminate its obligations regarding a naming, with no financial responsibility for returning any received contributions to the donor.
 - 60903.3.1 If the donor's reputation changes substantially so that the continued use of that name may compromise the public trust, dishonor the Placentia Library District's standards, or otherwise be contrary to the best interests of the Placentia Library District, the naming may be revoked.
 - Any proposal to rename a building or department or to add a second name in recognition of a gift shall be reviewed by the Library Board of Trustees.
- **6090.4** Donor means a company or individual who provides the District with funds, products or services.
 - Donor Agreement means that agreement between the District and the Donor that details the form, type and duration of any donor recognition.
 - 6090.4.2 District means Placentia Library District.

Keyless Restroom Access

BACKGROUND

At the January 17, 2011 Regular Board Meeting, April 7, 2011 Work Session and April 18, 2011 Regular Board Meeting, library staff presented the need to implement a keyless system for the public restrooms by the lobby area. The need was presented based on the following concerns and issues employees encounter with the current restroom access procedure:

- Germs passing on keys from one person to the next.
- Key holder is often returned wet.
- Patrons leave the key inside the restroom.
- Patrons pass the key amongst themselves.
- Patrons experience difficulties opening the door.
- Identification requirement is intrusive and inconvenient for patrons.
- Staff time involved.

The current key system was implemented due to a rash of vandalism and graffiti incidents in both the restrooms by the lobby area. Since the key system implementation, there has been one vandalism incident which was reported to the Police Department. To maintain and provide a clean and safe facility for our patrons, library staff recommends the continuation of a secure access system. The secure access system recommended is a keyless system which would eliminate the above concerns communicated by staff. Examples of keyless systems include, but are not limited to: card access, key pad, or token/coin access. These systems can be further investigated to identify the system that best meets the needs of the library.

Fiscal Impact: \$6,000

RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. Discuss the need for keyless restroom access and related issues based on information presented: and,
- 2. Authorize library staff to seek proposals for a keyless restroom access system.
