

CSDA LEGISLATIVE UPDATE

Monday, June 12, 2000



State Budget Process 00-01

As lawmakers worked through the weekend how the State budget surplus, projected to be just under \$13 billion, will be spent is still somewhat up in the air. One element that remains a moving target is what, if any, fiscal relief will be afforded California's local governments. As of this update, \$200 million appears to be the amount that is acceptable to the Legislature and the Administration. It appears that the distribution of any financial relief for local governments will be referred to the Conference Committee on AB 1396 (local government fiscal reform). The Legislative Budget Committee finished its work early this morning (June 12) and has

sent a final budget to each house. The budget may be voted upon on both floors on Thursday, June 15, the constitutional deadline for the Legislature to send the budget to the Governor.

Conference Committee on AB 1396 (local government fiscal reform)

Over the past six weeks, the Conference Committee on AB 1396 has been holding hearings on local government fiscal reform. The Joint Committee (Co-Chairs Senator Steve Peace and Assembly Member Dion Aroner, Senators Don Perata and Charles Poochigian and Assembly Members John Longville and George Runner) are charged with crafting a local government fiscal reform package. CSDA Legislative Advocate Ralph Heim has been representing special districts throughout the process offering our thoughts and recommendations on issues. To date, there is no real clear direction on what elements might be included in their final product. Unlike the other public policy bodies that have looked at the issue of local government fiscal reform and service delivery, the Committee is faced with an August 31, 2000 report deadline as this committee is working under the auspices of a legislative bill (AB 1396).

Last week, CSDA joined as a co-signatory with the League of California Cities and the California State Association of Counties (CSAC) on a letter and fiscal reform plan which all three organizations could agree upon. Components of the reform plan of particular interest to special districts are: a freeze of the ERAF shift, constitutional protection of current local revenue sources, shifting of the responsibility of payment of the schools' portion of the property tax administration fee away from local government and to the State, and reform of the Commission on State Mandates. Unfortunately, the reform plan received a luke warm reception by the Committee with members indicating it was not creative - "too little, too late."

The Conference Committee is scheduled to meet again on June 21, 2000 and has scheduled a representative of the Legislative Analyst's Office to facilitate a discussion on two LAO documents - "Making Government Make Sense" and "Reconsidering AB 8". As you may recall, the earlier document, produced in February 1993, is not real supportive

of independent special districts. Information on both documents can be viewed on the LAO website – http://www.lao.ca.gov. The CSDA Task Force on AB 1396 will be reviewing the two LAO reports and offering comments to the Committee.

AB 2838 - Hertzberg

On Friday, June 9, 2000, the CSDA Board of Directors approved a Support-1 position on AB 2838 (Hertzberg) which includes the recommendations of the Commission on Local Governance for the 21st Century. The Association had taken a "Support if Amended" position. CSDA Legislative Advocate Ralph Heim had been a participant on a task force that walked through the bill and issues of concern to CSDA have been resolved. The bill has passed the Assembly and has moved to the Senate.

LEGAL UPDATE

County of Sonoma vs. Commission on State Mandates, et al.

CSDA has been tracking the legal challenge spearheaded by the County of Sonoma on the ERAF shift (see Legal Alerts March 6, 2000 and April 24, 2000). CSDA Legal Counsel David McMurchie has received and reviewed the Appellate briefs filed by the Department of Justice and the Respondent's brief filed by County of Sonoma on behalf of the counties. The Howard Jarvis Taxpayers Association has filed a letter with the Appellate Court requesting permission to file an amicus brief in support of the position of the counties, cities and special districts. Their brief was to be filed by June 9, 2000. We have requested the Appellate Court in writing to grant permission to CSDA, California Association of Recreation and Park Districts (CARPD), California Association of Public Cemeteries (CAPC), and the Mosquito and Vector Control Association of California (MVCAC) to file an amicus brief in support of the position of the counties. We should hear from the court this week. CSDA has been compiling tax shift information from special districts in preparation for this brief. It is believed that the Appellate Court may hear this case in the late summer or early fall 2000.

BUDGET CONFERENCE COMMITTEE WRAPS UP

The Budget Conference Committee wrapped up most of its actions on the State Budget about 2:30 AM Sunday morning, came back at 7:30 AM for a brief meeting, adjourned and reconvened Sunday night at 9:00 PM, ultimately completing their task a little after midnight. Legislative Staff, as well as representatives of the Department of Finance and Legislative Analyst's Office, literally worked around the clock, often with only a couple of hours of sleep. Finishing touches are now being added to the Budget, including the drafting of budget bill language to implement some of the policy directives, and preparing of "trailer bills" that will accompany the Budget where major policy initiatives are tied to funding in the Budget. We anticipate as many as 40 budget related "trailer bills."

Both the Senate and Assembly are expected to take up the Budget on Thursday and attempt to pass it by the June 15th constitutional deadline for the first time in 14 years. Several legislative sources have informed us that initially there may not be the necessary 2/3 votes needed for passage because of ongoing disagreements over portions of the transportation and tax reduction packages. Should the Budget be passed by both houses, the Governor will then have until July 1 to sign the Budget and veto any items contained therein.

CLOSE CALL FOR THE PLF

You will recall from our earlier legislative update that CLA had been successful in getting both the Assembly and Senate Budget Subcommittees on Education to include an augmentation of \$15.3 million to fully fund the PLF at \$72,159,000 for the first time since enactment of the law in 1982. This year was unique as, for the first time in many years, both the Assembly and Senate agreed upon a like dollar amount for the PLF. When both houses agree, the issue usually does not come before the Conference committee for consideration.

Thus, we were shocked last Friday evening when Committee Chair, Senator Peace, announced that he had received a request to reopen the Public Library Foundation and place it on a list to be discussed later. This meant the \$15.3 million PLF augmentation, along with dozens of other "reopened issues," were suddenly vulnerable.

We hurriedly contacted key legislative staff and ultimately found out that we were indeed likely to lose the \$15.3 million. The reason given -- \$300

million had to be cut from the Budget in the final hours, and our funding was not included by the Governor in his May Revision of the Budget. In the ensuing hours, we actively lobbied members of the Budget Conference Committee, who ultimately came to our rescue, particularly Assembly Conferees Denise Ducheny and Carole Migden. We had a sense that things were eventually turning in our favor when Assembly Speaker Hertzberg walked by and commented, "Are you happy?" - to which we responded, "Yes, thank you for helping the libraries." Despite the Speaker's positive comments, we were nonetheless anxious until 2:00 AM Sunday morning when the PLF issue was brought before the Conference Committee and the members voted to not reconsider the item, thus leaving the PLF intact. Members may wish to drop a note to Assembly Members Ducheny and Migden and thank them for helping to maintain the \$15.3 million PLF augmentation. Members should also write to Governor and urge his support for the augmentation. In your letters, please indicate how the unprecedented action of funding the Public Library Foundation for the first time will assist you in keeping your libraries open longer, allow you to make needed materials or technology purchases, etc. Please direct your letters to: The Honorable Gray Davis Governor, State of California State Capitol Sacramento, CA 95814

WHERE DID THE MONEY GO?

The most difficult times in Sacramento for the Budget Conference Committee are when there is too little money, which necessitates tax increases or draconian cuts, or when there is an abundance of money and every conceivable interest group wants some of it. Such was the case this year with constant newspaper reports of "surpluses" in the neighborhood of \$12 billion. This figure represents revenues that exceed last July's budget estimates for the current year, and anticipated revenues in the budget year, (i.e. July 1, 200 - June 30, 2001), beyond what the Governor had estimated for his budget in January. While \$12 billion sounds like a lot, in reality it represents about 12% of the \$100 billion budget, and can be spent pretty quickly.

Typically, Governor Davis, like other governors, directed almost all of the money to his programs and initiatives. The Governor was careful to spend current revenues for one-time expenditures rather than ongoing commitments. Major expenditures, beyond increased caseload and growth commitments, included \$1.8 billion to buy out the education "deficit" created in the early 1990s, as well as \$2 billion for other education expenditures, \$2 billion on transportation needs, \$1.7 billion for tax reduction, which the Legislature later increased to \$2.7 billion, \$500 million for anticipated legal actions, and a prudent reserve of \$1.5 billion.

During the four-month budget process, legislators and special interest lobbyists requested augmentations to the Budget, such as CLA's request for \$15.3 million for the PLF. The extensive amount of requests ultimately resulted in the Legislature's budget being \$1.5 billion higher than the Governor's budget. Like the special interest groups, legislators, on behalf of local constituencies, submitted hundreds of requests for parks, playgrounds, museums, school swimming pools, etc., often referred to as legislative "pork." One of the early actions by the Conference Committee

was to reduce the local government funding proposal (including ERAF relief) from \$500 million to \$250 million to help balance the budget. The local government relief item was subsequently reduced to \$200 million in the final minutes of deliberations to make room for local legislative projects.

One of the major "fights" was over the Assembly's version of the Budget to provide \$2.5 billion for transportation needs versus the Senate's version of \$2 billion. Ultimately, the Committee adopted the Senate version. The Member Requests were also controversial as Assembly Members and Senators fought to keep funding for their local projects intact. In fact, Senator Peace commented at one point that if the Conference Committee did not wrap of its actions before Monday morning, the entire process would "implode when the planes land Monday morning," meaning that legislators would balk when they found many of their requests denied. In the end, we are told, sufficient funds were moved around to meet the top priorities of most legislators. We hope this information will help our readers understand that the best fiscal times can often be the most difficult times for budget writers.

The Western State University College of Law FWS Program encourages participants to place FWS students as reading tutors of preschool age children and children in elementary school to support the America Reads Challenge. Tutoring can be done at the Library or off site such as community centers or other similar facilities. FWS tutors could also be utilized to conduct story times for children.

We have requested three (3) FWS tutors at fifteen hours a week. Since these students are college graduates, we plan to start them at a Library Assistant 1 hourly rate of \$13.74. The U.S. Department of Education will reimburse us from 75-100%. I talked to the director of the FWS Program at Western State University College of Law, and she seemed confident that the hourly wage we are offering will attract some good candidates. The FWS Program will parallel the state fiscal year and start on July 1, 2000.

The Placentia Library Literacy Services (PLLS) is a major Department of the Placentia Library District and provides free and confidential basic literacy and English as a second language instruction and tutoring to adults and children, pre-school through eighth grade. WHAT:

Placentia Library Literacy Services (PLLS) is a library program developed in partnership with the California Literacy Campaign. Operating out of the Placentia Library District, PLLS provides free and confidential basic literacy and English/reading instruction to adults and children pre-school through eighth grade in the Placentia and North Orange County area. Our students are both native English speakers needing help with basic reading and writing skills and speakers of other languages seeking to improve their English communication skills. All instruction is centered on the goals and needs of the individual student. Students work individually and in small groups with volunteer tutors who complete a 15-hour tutor training course.

WHERE:

The Placentia Library Literacy Center is located next to the Children's Services Department in the Placentia Library. Tutors and learners can meet in a variety of sites: the Placentia Library Literacy Center; the Yorba Linda Library and other libraries; churches and community centers; and in private homes.

WHY:

It is estimated that one-fifth to one-third of adult Americans need to improve their reading and writing skills. In Orange County, over 270,000 adults are considered candidates for literacy instruction. In addition, as the immigrant population grows, the need for more English language instruction grows commensurately. The children of foreign born and U.S. born parents also have literacy needs. We all have a stake in a more literate community, for example: managers looking for skilled job applicants; consumers expecting quality goods and services; worshippers wanting to read religious materials for themselves; and children waiting for someone to read them a bedtime story.

Purpose of the Library of California Act:

The Legislature finds and declares that it is in the interest of the people of the state to ensure that all Californians have free and convenient access to all library resources and services that could provide essential information and enrich their lives; and, to respond fully and successfully to these information needs and to the diversity of California's population, libraries of all types and in all parts of the state must be enabled to interact, cooperate, and share resources. This policy shall be accomplished by enabling libraries of all types and in all parts of the state to provide their users with the services and resources of all libraries in this state, and by assisting libraries to provide and improve services to the underserved.

To achieve the purpose of the Act, the following actions were taken at the Library of California Board meeting in Sacramento on April 26-27, 2000:

Adoption of Agenda

1. It was moved, seconded (Spence/Fong) and carried unanimously that the Library of California Board adopt the agenda as modified.

Approval of Minutes

2. The draft minutes of the February 17-18, 2000 Library of California Board meeting were approved as submitted.

Adoption of Resolutions

3. It was moved, seconded (Kallenberg/Fong) and carried unanimously to adopt "Library of California Board Resolution 2000-01" for Patricia T. Otstott and "Library of California Board Resolution 2000-02" for Nolan Frizzelle as Library of California Board Members for their contributions to the libraries and people of the State of California. (See Attachments A & B)

Assembly Bill 2311

4. It was moved by the Legislation Committee (Steinhauser) and carried by a vote of 9 yeas, 1 nay (Spence) and 1 abstain (Fong) that the Library of California Board supports AB 2311, as amended April 5, 2000, with the proviso that this support position in no way inhibits the authority of any planning region or regional library network regarding the eligibility status for staff with special attention paid to the statutory phrase, "equivalent graduate education" or "demonstrated professional experience."

It was moved by the Support Services Committee (Kallenberg) and carried unanimously that the Library of California Board supports collaboration with the California Digital Library (CDL) and directs the Chief Executive Officer to work with the CDL to develop a joint statement of collaboration which addresses issues of mutual interest and concern, directly relates to the Board's adopted priorities, and may be terminated by either party at any time; and, that the Board's approval of collaboration with the CDL does not constitute a precedent for interaction with other entities; and that the Board authorizes the President to sign the statement when it meets the Board's direction, and that a progress report be presented at the June 2000 meeting. The funding of any collaborative endeavors requires prior approval of the Board.

7. Library of California 2000/2001 Funding Request

It was moved, seconded (Kallenberg/Wang) and carried unanimously that the Library of California Board affirm the request, submitted to the Governor by the State Librarian on March 29, 2000, for additional Library of California local assistance funds for implementation of Regional and Statewide service program for the fiscal year 2000/2001, as this request is described in this agenda item.

Board Priorities

8. It was moved, seconded (Kallenberg/Purucker) and carried unanimously that the Library of California Board adopt the following program priorities which the Board identified as part of their Planning Session on February 16, 2000:

For Fiscal Year 1999/2000 (not in priority order):

- Develop infrastructure for regional network development including operational funding.
- Implement online databases in all regions aimed at the general public and youth.
- Select the telecommunications model at the regional level and implement the selected model.
- Begin the direct loan pilot.

and for Fiscal Year 2000/2001 (not in priority order):

- Develop statewide database programs and criteria for development.
- Implement electronic document delivery.
- Implement trial databases for specific library type.
- Develop statewide resources for statewide licensing.
- Implement ILL at the regional and inter-regional level.

Telecommunications Infrastructure

- 9. It was moved by the Support Services Committee (Kallenberg) and carried unanimously that the Library of California Board adopt the following criteria for the regional telecommunications infrastructure:
 - Regional telecommunications programs geographically conform to Library of California planning regions, with participation by libraries that meet Library of California Interim Eligibility requirements and are capable of supporting the appropriate technologies.
 - When a Regional Library Network replaces a planning region, eligibility consists of membership in the Regional Library Network and the ability to support the appropriate technologies.
 - Regional Library Networks address regional resource sharing protocols and ongoing regional telecommunications infrastructure needs in their annual Plans of Service.
 - Regional Library Network gateway catalogs are available to the general public via remote Internet browsers.
 - Regional Library Networks use the Z39.50 protocol as the access protocol for their telecommunications infrastructure programs.
 - Regional telecommunications programs should include electronic interlibrary loan with the goal of public-initiated loan requests via the Internet.
 - Regional Library Networks address the issue of access to materials outside the region through the adoption of standards and resource sharing protocols in collaboration with other Regional Library Networks.
 - Libraries requesting Z39.50 server software apply through the Library of California Z39.50 Server Software Grant program.

Telecommunications Infrastructure

10. It was moved by the Support Services Committee (Kallenberg) and carried unanimously that the Library of California Board authorize the expenditure of up to \$2,262,000 to support project grants for regional telecommunications infrastructure leading to the establishment of regional library catalog access and electronic interlibrary loan, and electronic patron authentication and that the Board direct its Chief Executive Officer to develop a grant program to award these funds.

Statewide Information Databases

11. It was moved by the Support Services Committee (Kennedy) and carried unanimously that the Library of California Board direct its Chief Executive Officer to allocate Library of California funds not to exceed \$25,000 for support of fiscal agent workload for a cooperative purchasing arrangement for the RAND California database.

Statewide Information Databases

12. It was moved by the Support Services Committee (Kallenberg) and carried unanimously that the Library of California Board direct its Chief Executive Officer to allocate Library of California funds not to exceed \$387,000 for continuing support of the Library of California Periodicals/Serials database.

Statewide Information Database Licenses

13. It was moved by the Support Services Committee (Kallenberg) and carried unanimously that the Library of California Board authorize the expenditure of up to \$192,000 to support the Librarians' Index to the Internet on behalf of the Library of California and that the Board direct its Chief Executive Officer to award these funds to the Peninsula Library System to continue the Librarians' Index to the Internet through June 30, 2001.

Regional Library Network Development

14. It was moved by the Support Services Committee (Kallenberg) and carried unanimously to ratify the decision made by the Board President and Vice President to expend \$3,753 above the amount approved by the Board in February 2000.

Regional Library Network Development

- 15. It was moved by the Support Services Committee (Kallenberg) and carried unanimously that the Library of California Board authorize the awarding of Library of California funds in accordance with the Criteria for Supplemental Grant Applications adopted by the Board on February 18, 2000 (Exhibit C), for the following:
 - for Database Project requests

\$ 989,540

 for Planning Grant Augmentations and Network Development requests

188,276

for a total of \$ 1,177,816

CLSA Interlibrary Loan, Universal Borrowing, Equal Access Programs

16. It was moved by the Access Services Committee (Fong) and carried unanimously that the Library of California Board adopt, subject to the concurrence of the State Department of Finance, reimbursement rates for the 2000/01 fiscal year as follows: for CLSA interlibrary loans, a reimbursement rate of \$4.14 per eligible transaction; for CLSA direct loans, a reimbursement rate of \$.77 per eligible transaction; and that the Chief Executive Officer inform all participants of the 2000/01 reimbursement rates as soon as Department of Finance concurrence is obtained.

PRICE AND POPULATION INFORMATION

APPROPRIATIONS LIMIT

The California Revenue and Taxation Code, Section 2227, mandates the Department of Finance to transmit an estimate of the percentage change in population to local governments. Each local jurisdiction uses their percentage change in population factor for January 1, 2000, in conjunction with a change in the cost of living, or price factor, to calculate their appropriations limit for fiscal year 2000-2001. Enclosure I provides the change in California's per capita personal income and an example for utilizing the price factor and population percentage change factor to calculate the 2000-2001 appropriations limit. Enclosure II provides city and unincorporated county population percentage changes, and Enclosure IIA provides county and incorporated areas population percentage changes. The population percentage change data excludes federal and state institutionalized populations and military populations, as noted.

POPULATION PERCENTAGE CHANGE FOR SPECIAL DISTRICTS

Some special districts must establish an annual appropriations limit. Consult the Revenue and Taxation Code, Section 2228, for the various population options available to special districts to assess population change in their district. Article XIII B, Section 9 of the State Constitution exempts certain special districts from the appropriations limit calculation mandate. Special districts required by law to calculate their appropriations limit must present the calculation as part of their annual audit. No State agency reviews the appropriations limit.

POPULATION CERTIFICATION

The population certification program applies only to cities and counties. Revenue and Taxation Code 11005.6 mandates the Department of Finance to automatically certify any population estimate that exceeds the current certified population with the State Controller's Office. The Department of Finance will certify the higher estimate to the Controller by June 1, 2000.

The Newport Harbor High School freshmen were on a class field trip. In some ways, it was the usual: board the bus, take a tour, see the sights, bring home a souvenir.

In a big way, though, it wasn't the usual at all. The main attraction was a library. These students were visiting the main branch of the Newport Beach Public Library to do research for their history papers. They got a quick lesson in the computerized card catalog, a tour of the building and the stacks, and library cards of their own.

They were touring a place many of them used to visit weekly as young children. By the time they became teen-agers, though, it was no longer a regular stop.

Josh Hanson, 14, who learned how to conquer the microfilm, was making his first visit. He doesn't go to the library often.

"I used to check out stacks of picture books when I was learning to read. Now I only go when I have to. You grow out of it,' he said. He was pleasantly surprised, though, to find some good CDs and movies available at the library.

"I love the library. It's somewhere I can sit and grab any book and just relax," said fellow student Tracie Mills-Winkler, 14. "A lot of kids think coming to the library is a waste of time. You have to show them that libraries aren't that boring."


Lauren Drake, 15, agreed. "My mom had me come here to hear stories," she said, but she

doesn't come often now unless it's related to homework. "If you want teens to come to the library, you have to make it sound more exciting."

That's exactly what libraries are trying to do. Libraries across Orange County have begun to market themselves. They have been hiring young adult librarians, creating new programs aimed at teens, and going out to the schools trying to sell a new version of an old product.

"We focus a heck of a lot on the little ones. We want to get them early and as long as we can," said Kathleen Wade, public services manager for the Buena Park Library District. "l'eens haven't necessarily been neglected, but they are a tough group to reach. It's that age where coming to the library is kind of a chore or related to homework. Trying to get them to come for leisure time reading, we are compet-ing with other things."

Julie Fredericksen, youth services coordinator for the Orange County Public Library, said she has noticed a new awareness of teens as potential customers. "Traditionally li-braries put a lot of effort into getting new users and (young) users," she said. "Now we're starting to realize we need to

be hitting older users, also."
At the Rancho Santa Margarita branch, Fredericksen helped create a teen coffeehouse - a relaxed place where

kids could come to express themselves. It drew 70 kids the

The Newport Beach library received a \$38,000 grant from the California State Library last fall. It's being used to expand relationships with schools and foster recreational reading among teens. Louise Kelley is the Teen Read grant librarian.

"We have had groups come here where the kids have never stepped into this library. After that two-hour visit, they were rushing to get library cards. They were excited," Kelley said. "They saw that they could use those cards for CDs and not just for school assignments.

Newport Beach has created a teen center with comfortable couches and young adult books grouped together. The library has presented Internet workshops and sponsored a series of talks by young-adult authors. Newport also created a Young Adult Advisory Council, The council helps plan activities for teens and gives them a sense of ownership in the library.

young-adult area. We discuss books and recommend books we like," said Amanda Rigas, 16, a junior at Mater Dei High School who has served two years on the council. "I could recommend a book and a couple of weeks later I would see it at the library. That's pretty cool."

The Anaheim Public Library also has been aggressively pur-suing teens. "Can you wait for the teens to walk into the library?" asked young-adult librarian Tasneem Ghazali. 'You can, but you may wait a long time. So I go out to the schools and I talk up library services. Outreach is the No. 1 way to get them here."

The Anaheim library co-sponsored an evening with author Victor Villaseñor in April that drew 1,000 people. Each year it also sponsors a creative-writing contest. Ghazali emphasizes electronic media, computers and the Internet when she talks to high school classes. Yet she said the tried-and-true summer reading



"The big ones do come in and they do read. We try to have prizes for them that are not lame," she said. "A meal at Subway is OK; an eraser is not oK."

The El Modena branch of the Orange Public Library started... its own teen summer reading program last year. It also offers teen book-lovers clubs and special young-adult concerts.

"We want them to know the library is not just a place to come for school materials and homework," said Beth Irish, branch outreach supervisor. "We want to encourage them to read and find the library an alternative place where they can come and feel comfortable.

The Santa Ana Public Library is having success making teens feel comfortable. It offers summer reading and math programs, as well as computer-equipped learning centers at all its branches. Teens might come in for homework help, and come back because they discover something fun. The central library hosts a weekly teen book club that draws 15 kids on a school night.

Gustavo Espana, 12, Paulette Garcia, 12, and Edgar Benitez, 13, come early to practice reading their script for the reader's theater that night. They are performing a scene from "Sleepy Hollow," the book the group just finished. The friends from Willard School say the library is a fun place to be. The word spreads

"I came because everybody" came," Edgar said. "We share what happened in the books."

Gustavo's brother, Jose, joins them. "Gustavo told me


we read cool books," Jose said:
Caesar Esmerio, 14, didn't;
have much choice but to go along. There was nobody at my house to play with. They were all here," said Caesar, 14,

a freshman at Santa Ana High.
The group takes a quick pizza break and then moves on to its current book, "Where the Red Fern Grows." Librarian Elizabeth: Speigle leads them through a discussion of what "dedication" means.

"This is not like school," said Fernando Esmerio, 12. "You" can talk about the book. We can choose which book we want to read."

At the end of the hour, kids mention any new words they found in the story. By the next week, they agree they will finish the book. Speigle asks if they want to perform another reader's theater, and everyone's hands shoot up to volun-

"I saw my friends come. They were involved in this club," said Marco Aguilera, 12, a seventh-grader at MacArthur. "I like it. They have good books to read. I like to read good books and talk about them."

Patron: Library should filter porn

COMPLAINT: Library admits quandary over Internet offerings, working for improvement

When Jennifer Denman took her 7 year-old nephew, James, to the library, she never expected pictures of naked women to greet her.

"There were two computers where their screens face the courtyard and the first thing I saw was (full frontal nudity) on both screens with my nephew walking in with me," said Den-

man, a medical equipment salesperson. "As an aunt in a very Catholic city having to enter into my county children's library and having to see that really bothered me."

Librarians are faced with the challenge of bringing the information age to patrons of all ages. They can't censor adults, but they do not have the technology in place to completely monitor content for children.

Orange County Librarian

John Adams said they are working on solutions.

"We can understand their concern," said Adams, who oversees 27 libraries, including the San Juan Capistrano site. "Court decisions and the First Amendment make it illegal for us the government to tell adults what they can look at but we can limit the (access of kids)."

Countywide, 400 library terminals have Internet access. One third filter access.

At the San Juan Capistrano Regional Library, eight computers have Internet access. Four of the terminals have filters that screen out inappropriate or adult oriented web sites. Four terminals have unfiltered access.

"Basically, we have a system where the parent has the opportunity to exercise control over what their children see," Adams said

Any person younger than 18 is limited to using the filtered computers.

But children are allowed to bring in a signed form from their parents that allows them full access.

"You can pretty much get

anything you want on those computers," said Denman, 3S. "My argument is that when you go into Crown books, those pictures are covered with papers. I'm not a prude, but there has got to be something

more they can do."

Adams contends that the county has "punted" on this is-

sue by leaving it up to parents to decide for themselves what they're children can see,

The library has also published a parental guide to the Internet

(available at the libraries and on its web site, www.ocpl.org).

He said parents should also be aware of the other hazards of Internet surfing.

"There are other problems besides looking at nasty pictures, like putting in dad's credit card number," Adams said. "A challenge for the libraries is finding the most effective technology to use in filtering. To date, there is not perfect solution for this, even the best system let's things through."

And other systems are too stringent, make research on topics such as "breast cancer" impossible.

He said, however, that library officials are doing the best that they can with current technology.

"We are working on ways to make it safe for everyone to explore the world of ideas that are out there," Adams said.

Denman said she spoke to her local librarian about moving terminals so personnel will be able to view the terminals at all times.

She said she doesn't understand why her access can be limited at her workplace, but not her young nephew's.

"It's completely blocked where I work, I wish there was more they could do," she said.


