Corporation, at its option, may enter upon the premises where the Property is located and take immediate possession of and remove the same without liability to Corporation or its agents for such entry or for damage to property or otherwise; (b) sell or lease the Property or sublease it for the account of the Lessee, holding Lessee liable for all Rental Payments and other payments due to the effective Date of such selling, leasing or subleasing plus any accrued interest to the Date of termination; and (c) exercise any other right, remedy or privilege which may be available to it under applicable law, including the right to (i) proceed by appropriate court action to enforce the terms of this Lease, (ii) recover damages for the breach of this Lease, and (iii) rescind this Lease as to any portion of or all of the Property. No right or remedy herein conferred upon or reserved to Corporation is exclusive of any other right or remedy herein, but each shall be cumulative of every other right or remedy given hereunder or now or hereafter existing at law or in equity or by statute or otherwise, and may be enforced concurrently therewith or from time to time; provided, however, that notwithstanding any provisions to the contrary herein, Corporation shall not under any circumstances have the right to accelerate the Rental Payments that fall due in future rental periods or otherwise declare any Rental Payments not then in default to be immediately due and payable.

SECTION 25. <u>Non-Waiver</u>. No covenant or condition to be performed by Lessee under this Lease can be waived except by the written consent of Corporation. Forbearance or indulgence by Corporation in any regard whatsoever shall not constitute a waiver of the covenant or condition in question. Until performance by Lessee of said covenant or condition is complete, Corporation shall be entitled to invoke any remedy available to Corporation under this Lease or by law or in equity despite said forbearance or indulgence.

SECTION 26. Assignment. Without the prior written consent of Corporation, Lessee shall not (a) assign, transfer, pledge, or hypothecate this Lease, the Property, or any part thereof, or any interest therein, or (b) sublet or lend the Property or any part thereof, or permit the Property or any part thereof to be used in a material way by anyone other than Lessee or Lessee's employees. Consent to any of the foregoing prohibited acts applies only in the given instance and is not a consent to any subsequent like act by Lessee or any other person. Corporation shall not assign its obligations under this Lease with the exception of its obligation to issue default notices and its obligations pursuant to Section 30. Corporation may assign its right, title and interest in this Lease, the Rental Payments and other amounts due hereunder and the Property in whole or in part to one or more assignees or subassignees at any time, without the consent of Lessee. Any such assignment by Corporation or its assigns shall comply with the requirements of Sections 5950-5955 of the California Government Code. No such assignment shall be effective as against Lessee unless and until Corporation shall have filed with Lessee written notice thereof. Lessee shall pay all Rental Payments hereunder pursuant to the direction of Corporation or the assignee named in the most recent assignment or notice of assignment filed with Lessee. During this Lease term, Lessee shall keep a complete and accurate record of all such notices of assignment. Subject always to the foregoing, this Lease inures to the benefit of, and is binding upon,

the heirs, legatees, personal representatives, successors, and assigns of the parties hereto.

SECTION 27. <u>Title</u>. The Property is and shall at all times be vested in District, subject to Corporation's security interest pursuant to Section 9.

SECTION 28. Personal Property. The Property is and shall at all times be and remain personal property notwithstanding that the Property or any part thereof may now be or hereafter become in any manner affixed or attached to or imbedded in, or permanently resting upon, real property or any building thereon, or attached in any manner to what is permanent by means of cement, plaster, nails, bolts, screws or otherwise.

SECTION 29. <u>Prepayment Option</u>. If Lessee is not in default of any term, condition or payment specified hereunder, Lessee may exercise options to prepay this Lease and purchase not less than all of the Property in "as-is" and "where-is" condition on the specified Dates and for the specified amounts set forth in the Schedule annexed hereto. - (d) The Lease Proceeds used for reimbursement of prior expenditures will be made pursuant to and in compliance with Income Tax Regulations Section 1.150-2.
- (e) Lessee hereby designates this Lease for purposes of paragraph (3) of Section 265(b) of the Code and represents that not more than \$10,000,000 aggregate principal amount of obligations the interest on which is excludable (under Section 103(a) of the Code) from gross income for federal income tax purposes (excluding (i) private activity bonds, as defined in Section 141 of the Code, except qualified 501(c)(3) bonds as defined in Section 145 of the Code and (ii) current refunding obligations to the extent the amount of the refunding obligation does not exceed the outstanding amount of the refunded obligation), including this Lease, has been or will be issued by Lessee, including all subordinate entities of Lessee, during calendar year 2004.
- SECTION 32. Extraordinary Costs. In the case of litigation, the prevailing party shall be entitled to recover from the opposing party all costs and expenses, including attorneys' fees (which may be the allocable cost of in-house counsel), incurred by the prevailing party in exercising any of its rights or remedies hereunder or enforcing any of the terms, conditions or provisions hereof.
- SECTION 33. <u>Severability</u>. If any provision of this Lease shall be held invalid or unenforceable by a court of competent jurisdiction, such holdings shall not invalidate or render unenforceable any other provision of this Lease, unless elimination of such provision materially alters the rights and obligations embodied in this Lease.

- SECTION 37. Further Assurances and Corrective Instruments. Corporation and Lessee agree that they will, from time to time, execute, acknowledge and deliver, or cause to be executed, acknowledged and delivered, such supplements hereto and such further instruments as may be reasonably required for correcting any inadequate or incorrect description of the Property hereby leased or intended so to be or for carrying out the expressed intention of this Lease.

SECTION 38. <u>Execution in Counterparts</u>. This Lease may be executed in several counterparts, each of which shall be original and all of which shall constitute but one and the same instrument.

Background

On April 14, 2004, your Commission adopted a proposed budget for all LAFCO operations for FY 2004-2005. A copy of the April 14, 2004 staff report is attached for your review (Attachment 1). It includes a copy of the proposed operating budget, a summary of LAFCO budget expenditure categories and a detailed list of individual city and special district allocations. A final budget is required to be adopted by your Commission no later than June 15, 2004.

Agency Contributions Remain Static

The proposed budget for FY 2004-2005 is static for our funding agencies, with expenditures (less revenues) totaling \$930,920. Per Government Code Section 56381, the County, cities and special districts are required to equally divide this cost, each paying \$310,306. This amount is equivalent to funding agencies' contributions for FY 2001-2002, FY 2002-2003 and FY 2003-2004. Given the rising costs of employee health care and retirement, in addition to project increases in LAFCO's office lease and overall office expenses, FY 2004-2005 will likely be the last year that LAFCO can be fully funded without increasing contributions from our funding agencies.

Formulas for allocating costs to individual cities and special districts were adopted in 2001 by the Orange County Division League of Cities and the Independent Special Districts of Orange County, respectively. Individual city cost allocations are based on a formula using a city's population and geographic size. The special districts adopted a method in 2001 which apportions costs to individual districts based on: (a) whether the district is an enterprise or non-enterprise district; and (b) which budget "tier" the district falls into based on its total operating budget.

Comments

On April 19, 2004, the proposed LAFCO budget for FY 2004-2005 was distributed to the Board of Supervisors, each city and independent special district. Only one comment letter from the County of Orange (see Attachment 2) was received by staff. The County's comment letter, in summary, is supportive of the proposed FY 2004-2005 LAFCO budget.

Conclusion

The proposed LAFCO budget for FY 2004-2005 has undergone extensive review by the County, cities and special districts. The proposed budget is consistent with the guiding principles outlined by the Executive Committee by maintaining level funding contributions for our funding agencies.

Recommendations

The Acting Executive Officer recommends that the Commission:

- 1. Adopt the Final Fiscal Year 2004-2005 Local Agency Formation Commission budget.
- 2. Direct the Acting Executive Officer to distribute the final budget to the Board of Supervisors, each city, each independent special district and the County Auditor.

Background

Government Code Section 56381(a) requires the Commission to adopt a proposed budget for all LAFCO operations by May 1st of each year. Following adoption, the proposed budget is distributed for review and comment to the Board of Supervisors, each city, the city selection committee, each independent special district and the independent special district selection committee. The final LAFCO budget is required to be adopted by the Commission no later than June 15, 2004.

For your Commission's consideration, the proposed LAFCO budget for FY 2004-2005 is presented in Exhibit A of this report. LAFCO's Executive Committee, consisting of Chair Chuck Smith, Vice Chair Susan Wilson and Past Chair Arlene Schafer, met with LAFCO staff on March 10, 2004 to discuss and review the proposed budget. At the outset of the Executive Committee's review of the proposed budget, three key guiding principles were adopted:

- No increase to funding agencies' contributions
- Maintain 10 percent emergency fund
- Maintain quality staffing to implement the Commission's adopted work plan

The proposed FY 2004-2005 LAFCO budget is consistent with the guiding principles and is recommended for Commission approval by the Executive Committee.

Increasing LAFCO Costs/Challenges for FY 2004-2005

FY 2004-2005 will be the fourth year that LAFCO has operated as a completely independent agency. Since July 2001, as required by state law, the Commission has been solely responsible for approving a budget for all LAFCO operations. Funding for LAFCOs is provided in equal proportion by cities, special districts and the County. Prior to 2001, the County provided all funding for LAFCO operations.

FY 2004-2005 brings a number of fiscal challenges to LAFCO. These challenges include increasing health care and retirement costs and the elimination of the Unincorporated Islands Program funding. The Islands funding was used in prior fiscal years to offset salary/benefits costs for two of LAFCO's Policy Analyst positions. Designed and funded as a three-year program, the Islands Program funding will be fully exhausted by the end of the FY 2003-2004 fiscal year. The key fiscal issues are addressed in detail below.

Rising Health Care/Retirement Costs

The chart below provides your Commission with a comparison of LAFCO's rising retirement and health care costs for Fiscal Years 2002-2003, 2003-2004 and 2004-2005. While LAFCO is an independent agency from the County, its employees share commensurate benefit packages offered to County employees, including participation in the Orange County Retirement System (OCERS) and health insurance benefits.

Increasing costs for employee health care and retirement are a statewide issue, with California's medical premium increases significantly outpacing those of the country as a whole. Recent rate increases in California are attributed to a number of factors, including changes to managed-care plans in California allowing consumer access to more doctors and hospitals and rising hospital expenses to meet new nursing staffing requirements and seismic retrofit requirements. In addition, fewer insurers are now operating in California, giving them more control of premium rates. Rising retirement costs are largely attributable to the overall decline in the stock market during the last few years which has adversely affected OCERS reserves. County projections indicate a continued rise in retirement costs for FY 2005-2006.

Unincorporated Islands Program

The Unincorporated Islands Program will expire in July 2004. The Islands Program is a collaborative program of the County, League of Cities and LAFCO to annex 50 small, unincorporated islands in Orange County within three years. Since the program's inception, 21 small islands have been successfully annexed.

In June 2000, your Commission adopted a three-year work program and resource plan to fund the Islands Program. The total cost of the work program was \$297,000 plus two full time staff positions. The County agreed to fully fund the first two years of the Islands Program and provide two full time staff positions for two years. Current costs for the third and final year of the program are fully funded through the LAFCO budget.

In April 2003, both of LAFCO's limited term Policy Analyst positions were due to expire. Policy Analyst Jay Wong departed LAFCO and returned to a position within the County's CEO department. On the recommendation of LAFCO's personnel committee, the Commission converted the other position from a limited-term to a permanent position, allowing Policy Analyst Kim Koeppen to remain with LAFCO. Funding for this position in FY 2003-2004 is funded at 50% from the Unincorporated Islands budget and 50% from the regular LAFCO budget. In FY 2004-2005, this position is fully funded through the regular LAFCO budget.

Budget Overview - Proposed LAFCO 2004-2005 Budget

Despite the increased costs outlined above, the proposed FY 2004-2005 LAFCO budget is static for our funding agencies, with expenditures (less revenues) totaling \$930,920. The County, cities and special districts will equally divide this cost, each paying \$310,306. This is equivalent to the funding agencies' contributions to LAFCO for FY 2001-2002, FY 2002-2003, and FY 2003-2004. It is also consistent with the Executive Committee's direction to staff to not increase funding agency contributions for FY 2004-2005 above current year levels. Given the rising costs of employee health care and retirement, in addition to expected cost increases in LAFCO's office lease and overall office expenses, FY 2004-2005 will likely be the last year that LAFCO can be fully funded without increasing contributions from our funding agencies.

City and Special District Contributions

Individual city and special district contributions for the proposed FY 2004-2005 budget have been calculated by staff using the cost allocation formulas

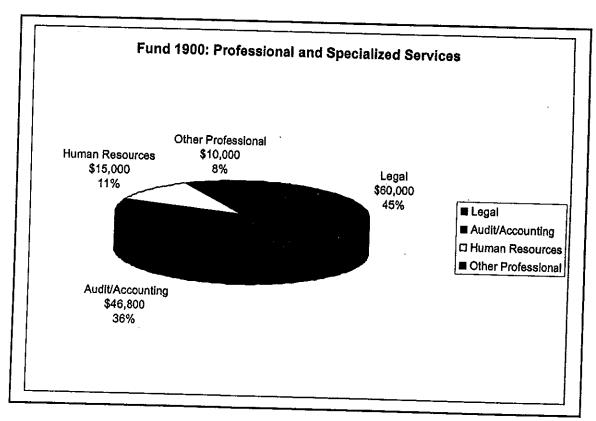
previously adopted by the Independent Special Districts of Orange County and the Orange County League of Cities. City and special district contribution summaries are included as Exhibits C and D, respectively.

Trust Fund Revenues

Staff was able to develop a budget which remains static for our funding agencies for the fourth consecutive fiscal year despite increasing costs for retirement and health care and the loss of Islands funding. This is possible due to higher than expected revenues from FY 2003-2004, specifically moneys from the El Toro and Talega trust accounts. The trust accounts were set up by the project proponent to reimburse LAFCO staff for extraordinary staff time and costs in processing both of these complex annexations. Both projects were closed out during FY 2003-2004.

Professional and Specialized Services Costs

The "Professional and Specialized Services" category is the largest fund in the services and supply account totaling \$131,800. It includes bookkeeping and accounting/auditing services and contracted services for legal counsel, human resources, and other professional services. The percentage and distribution of these costs are depicted on the chart below:

For reference, a summary listing of all LAFCO expenditure categories is included as Exhibit B.

Conclusion

The proposed LAFCO budget for FY 2004-2005 is consistent with the guiding principles outlined by the Executive Committee. The proposed budget is static in its funding demands by maintaining level funding contributions for our funding agencies. Finally, it provides sufficient funding to carry out your Commission's adopted work plan for the next fiscal year.

Recommendation

The Acting Executive Officer recommends that the Commission:

 Adopt the Proposed FY 2004-2005 Local Agency Formation budget, and direct the Acting Executive Officer to distribute the proposed budget for review and comment to the Board of Supervisors, each city, the city selection committee, each independent special district and the independent special district selection committee.

LAFCO Budget Expenditure Categories

The following summarizes the expenditure categories used in the proposed FY 2004-2005 LAFCO Budget:

Salaries, Retirement and Employee Benefits

These accounts are used to pay for LAFCO employee salaries and benefits, including retirement, unemployment insurance, health and dental insurance, workers compensation and Medicare. This category includes regular and extra help employees.

Communications (0700)

This account is used to pay for the costs associated with the telephone, fax, modem lines and Internet access.

Insurance (1100)

This account is used to pay for required commercial crime and liability insurance coverage for staff and Commissioners.

Maintenance/Equipment (1300)

These costs include the maintenance of the office computers, typewriters, and the assigned cost of GSA communication personnel at LAFCO hearings.

Memberships (1600)

This account is used to pay for Orange County LAFCO's membership in CALAFCO and other organizations.

Municipal Service Reviews (1701)

This category includes both direct costs and consultant assistance necessary to conduct municipal service reviews.

Office Expense (1800)

This category provides for the purchase of computer and office supplies/equipment and software for on-going office automation requirements.

Professional/Specialized Services (1900)

This category covers the costs for LAFCO legal counsel through the law offices of Best, Best & Krieger (BB&K), human resources administration through Alcock & McFadden, Inc., and bookkeeping and accounting services through Conrad Business Services, Inc. This account also pays for a certified public accounting firm to conduct mandated annual audits of LAFCO's financial statements project and miscellaneous Commission support services including map review and preparation through the County Surveyor.

Publications/Legal (2000)

This category covers the cost of legal noticing.

Rents/Leases Equipment (2100)

This account reflects costs associated with rental and maintenance of office equipment such as the copier and postage meter.

Special Department Expense (2400)

This budget category is use to pay for Commissioner stipends, staff training, and upgrades to our mapping data base.

Transportation & Travel - General (2600)

This account is used to provide funding for the costs associated with Commissioner parking (i.e., parking debit cards), mileage reimbursement for Commissioners and staff, and the Executive Officer's automobile allowance.

Transportation & Travel - Meetings (2700)

This category represents costs associated with Commissioners and staff attending CALAFCO workshops and conferences.

Jane Jones and Bob Lee gave an update on their trip to Sacramento at our meeting last night. The message they brought back is the importance of the special library districts speaking with one voice - to that end they have asked if there is any possibility of having our next trustees and directors networking meeting BEFORE the state budget is finalized on June 15th. My Trustees are mostly retired, so we could even be available on a weekday....could you let me know if there are any options for meeting earlier than planned?

Also, the CSDA email we received last night was confusing and concerning as (1) it reads to me that the additional ERAF contribution for special districts will be 25% of net property tax revenues, when my understanding had been that the most likely scenario was an additional 25% of our current ERAF contribution. For us the difference is over \$600,000 and (2) the newsletter is silent on the special library exemption (so-called Dills bill) and in fact on its face says there are NO exemptions. This is contrary to the verbal advice we received from Geoff Neill, and to the inforamtion we have received from CLA.

I have left a message for Geoff Neill asking for clarification - but if you have any further information please give me a call or send an email!

Subject: Special Library District cooperation re state budget

Following on a successful meeting between Directors and Trustees of the Buena Park, Palos Verdes, and Placentia Library Districts I am writing to ask you and your Trustees to participate in a meeting of Special District Directors and Trustees on June 5 from 9-11AM at the Buena Park Library. The purpose of the meeting is to discuss joint approaches to the current state budget deliberations.

The current budget situation as I understand it from CSDA and CLA is:

- The "deal" between the Governor and local governments calls for a \$1.34 billion additional shift of local property tax revenue to ERAF in each of 04/05 and 05/06 in exchange for constitutional protections beyond 06. Special Districts share of this additional shift is \$350 million in each of the next two fiscal years. As part of the deal all previous caps, exemptions, waivers, etc. have been eliminated and a new contribution formula established. Non-enterprise special districts are required to make an additional ERAF contribution of 25% of their net ad valorem property tax revenue (i.e. 25% of all property-value based property taxes, so not parcel taxes, net of the current ERAF contribution level). The sole exceptions at this stage are police/fire/healthcare districts for whom the deal includes special arrangements, and special library districts under the terms of the 1994 "Dills" bill (SB 1648) which protects special districts from further ERAF shifts.
- While it would be nice to rely on the Dills bill, the reality is that no legislature can bind future legislatures and there is a real risk that the Dills bill gets undone or modified during the budgeting process in which case we could be up for a loss of up to 25% of our net property tax revenue. This would be devastating. It would be helpful for the special districts to have a strategy for trying to prevent this, or at least minimizing the exposure, and there is strength in numbers. We are a unique group within both CLA and CSDA and there is a risk that we "fall between the cracks" or get sacrificed to the "greater good" in their lobbying efforts unless we make our presence and needs known. At present the advice from CSDA is that we need to lobby hard for the Governors deal to be approved "as is", while CLA seems to be advocating that we not emphasize the Dills bill as to do so might make it a target. I expect that even before June 5th some of us will begin letter writing campaigns and other lobbying efforts once the appropriate strategy becomes clearer, but we still need to think about what we can do collectively as the budget process draws to a close.
- Apart from ERAF, the Governors budget reduces PLF funding by somthing like 3%. It is important to all libraries that the legislature not further reduce or eliminate PLF funding.

SO - we would love to work together with you to try to protect our funding. Please let me know if your District is able to participate on June 5th.

WHEREAS, the California Education Code Section 19479 states, "Every library established under this chapter shall be forever free to the inhabitants and nonresident taxpayers of the library district, subject always to such rules, regulations, and bylaws as may be made by the board of library trustees."; and

WHEREAS, Placentia Library District is currently contributing 50.41% of its property tax revenue to the Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund (ERAF); and

WHEREAS, the California Revenue and Taxation Code Section 97.37 states, "Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, for the 1994-95 fiscal year and each fiscal year thereafter, the amount of property tax revenue deemed allocated in the prior fiscal year to a county free library system, or a library established as in independent special library district, shall not be reduced for purposes of increasing the amount of property tax revenue to be allocated to another jurisdiction."; and

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Board of Trustees of Placentia Library District endorses the State Budget as recommended by the Governor; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Trustees of Placentia Library District urges the California Legislature and all of its Committees to adopt the State Budget without amendment to the California Revenue and Taxation Code Section 97.37; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Board of Trustees of Placentia Library District authorizes any representative of the Board of Trustees of the Palos Verdes Library District to speak on Placentia Library District's behalf before the Committees of the California Legislature on the issue of the State Budget for Fiscal Year 2004-2005.

At its Work Session on March 29, 2004 the Library Board completed its review of the second draft of the Personnel Policies as prepared by Personnel Consultant Gail Koff.

At the end of the Work Session the Board asked the Library Director to prepare the policies with the original numbering system from the first draft. This was presented at the Board Meeting on April 26 and reviewed at the Personnel Policy Work session on May 10, 2004.

The following items are still outstanding:

2040 Sick Leave – review revised copy provided by the Library Director including the sick leave incentive program in 2040.11 (The revisions were incorporated but the sick leave incentive item was not reviewed.)

2110 Health and Welfare Benefits – review section 2110.5.1 establishing the matching contribution program for deferred compensation participants.

2165.3 Unauthorized Voluntary Absence – awaiting opinion from SDRMA on whether Skelly applies

2180 Grievance Procedure – provide CA Code citation for Skelly hearing process. There were 2 Grievance policies – both are included and one needs to be selected.

2190.7 Drug and Alcohol Abuse – awaiting explanation/opinion from SDRMA regarding notification of conviction.

2230 Nepotism - Library Director was asked to revise the structure, blending old and new policies

Once all of the above items are resolved the Board will be ready to adopt the policies as a "first reading" and, if desired, forward them to the staff for review and suggestions. Other than the items that were submitted to the Board from the staff, none of the other proposed policies or changes have been reviewed or discussed by the staff.

The next Personnel Policy Work Session is scheduled for Tuesday, June 8, 2004 at 9:00 A.M. to work on compensation and benefit issues.

The following is a summary of the status of items from the Policy Manual:

Advancement of Wages

POLICY NUMBER:

2140

2140.1 This policy will apply to all regular and probationary full-time and part-time District employees.

2140.2 Employees requesting payment of wages in advance of regular pay days as defined in Policy No. 2130, "Pay Periods", will submit said request in writing to the Library Director. The request must include a specific reason for the advance.

2140.3 The Library Director may authorize the requested advancement of wages if the amount requested does not exceed the wages accrued (excluding applicable deductions) by the employee to the date of said request.

2140.4 Advancement of wages prior to a regular payday is not a privilege that an employee may use at his/her discretion, but may be authorized by the Library Director, or in the absence of the Library Director the Library Board President, at his/her discretion only in the case of proven employee necessity and/or personal financial emergency.

2140.5 Frequent requests will be grounds for denial.

- 2150.1 This policy will apply to all District employees.
- 2150.2 Compensation at Hiring.
 - 2150.2.1 New Employees. All newly appointed employees will be paid at the first step of the salary range for the position to which the employee is appointed except as provided elsewhere herein.
 - 2150.2.2 <u>Advanced Step Hiring</u>. If the Library Director finds that a qualified applicant cannot be successfully recruited at the first step of the salary range, he/she may authorize an appointment at an advanced step of the salary range.
 - 2150.2.3 Former Employees. A person who previously held a full-time position from which the person was separated in good standing may, when re-employed in a position with the same or lower pay range than held at separation, be appointed at the same salary rate which was paid at the effective date of the person's termination, or the nearest lower applicable step for the range to which the person is appointed, provided such re-employment occurs within twelve (12) months from the date of said termination.
- 2150.3 Merit Advancement Within Range.
 - 2150.3.1 <u>Performance Evaluation Required</u>. The Library Director will authorize a merit advancement within the salary range only after evaluating the employee's performance review as submitted by the employee's supervising manager and determining that it is satisfactory. This determination will be noted on a performance evaluation form to be placed in the employee's file, with a copy given to the employee.
 - 2150.3.2 <u>Period of Employment Required for Merit Advancement</u>. Unless otherwise specified herein, each employee will, in addition to receiving a satisfactory performance evaluation, complete the following required time of employment to be eligible to receive a merit increase:
 - 2150.3.2.1 New Employees. A person hired as a new employee will have a merit advancement date which is six (6) months following the appointment date.

Subject: Price and Population Information

Appropriations Limit

The California Revenue and Taxation Code, Section 2227, mandates the Department of Finance (Finance) to transmit an estimate of the percentage change in population to local governments. Each local jurisdiction must use their percentage change in population factor for January 1, 2004, in conjunction with a change in the cost of living, or price factor, to calculate their appropriations limit for fiscal year 2004-05. Enclosure I provides the change in California's per capita personal income and an example for utilizing the price factor and population percentage change factor to calculate the 2004-05 appropriations limit. Enclosure II provides city and unincorporated county population percentage changes, and Enclosure IIA provides county and incorporated areas population percentage changes. The population percentage change data excludes federal and state institutionalized populations and military populations, as noted.

Population Percent Change for Special Districts

Some special districts must establish an annual appropriations limit. Consult the Revenue and Taxation Code, Section 2228, for the various population options available to special districts to assess population change in their district. Article XIII B, Section 9, of the State Constitution exempts certain special districts from the appropriations limit calculation mandate. Special districts required by law to calculate their appropriations limit must present the calculation as part of their annual audit. No State agency reviews the appropriations limit.

Population Certification

The population certification program applies only to cities and counties. Revenue and Taxation Code Section 11005.6 mandates Finance to automatically certify any population estimate that exceeds the current certified population with the State Controller's Office. Finance will certify the higher estimate to the State Controller by June 4, 2004.

Please Note: City population estimates are controlled to independently calculated county population estimates. Due to county estimates revisions for 2001 through 2003 prior year city population estimates for local areas have also been revised.

I participated in the following activities during the current report period:

April 27 Attended the Association of Professional Fundraisers meeting with Laranne Millonzi and Foundation Directors Jean Lasley and Michael Ebenhoch. The topic of the seminar was Annual Giving Campaigns.

April 29 In celebration of Administrative Assistant's Week I took Donna Siloti, Julie Shook and Laranne Millonzi for lunch at La Vie én Rose.

I attended the awards dinner for the American Business Women's Association (ABWA) at the Foxfire Restaurant during which Library Assistant Katie Matas was honored as a "Star" employee. Katie was nominated by a staff committee and I prepared the nomination materials.

- May 1-6 I attended the Human Intervention Laboratory training program in Costa Mesa. During this time I missed the Friends Board Meeting on May 3.
- May 8 I attended the joint meeting of the Boards of Directors of the Independent Special Library Districts in Buena Park where I made a presentation on the history of Independent Special Library District funding from Prop 13 through the Special District Augmentation Fund (SDAF) to the Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund (ERAF).
- May 12 I participated in a Placentia Library Foundation Board of Directors recruitment luncheon with Jean Lasley, Laranne Millonzi and Nancy Lone Tollefson. Nancy accepted the appointment to the Foundation Board.
- May 13 Completed draft letters for the Placentia Library Foundation annual giving and direct mail campaigns for 2004 and mailed them to the Foundation Board of Directors.
- May 14 I represented the Library Foundation at the presentation of *Elephant Rides for Free* to the third grade students at Golden School. This is a joint project between Chris Lowe and the Library Foundation to permit local businesses and service clubs to purchase and present copies to each third grader in the Placentia elementary schools in the Placentia-Yorba Linda Unified School District.

- May 19 I met with Saundra Stark and Toby Silberfarb to develop the Stark collection of Jewishthemed books for the children's and young adult collections.
- May 20 I participated in the Special District Risk Management Authority's (SDRMA) triennial inspection and evaluation of the District's liability issues. This now also includes workers' compensation issues.
- May 21 I attended the California Special District's Association (CSDA) workshop on changes in the audit requirements by the State of California which have been implemented over the past five years. Since Placentia is a very small district we are in the final year of implementation. These requirements are going to more than double the cost of preparing the District's annual audit. Wendy Goodson and I took initial training when the new standards were first announced and M.A. McHenry and I have been discussing the implementation over the past several years.

May 22 Passport duty.

April 28 This was the quarterly brainstorming session for agenda development. The topics for the next three months include:

Staff members were asked to rotate attendance at the Chamber Networking Lunches so that everyone could present information about their role at the Library. A sign-up process was initiated. Laranne and I went on May 5 and Yesenia Gomez and Mary Strazdas went on May 12. Other staff are scheduled through the end of June.

May 12 A drawing was held for the first couple of lunches with the Library Director. This is intended to give staff members an opportunity to talk about their work and to give me direct feedback on how things are going and to find out if there is anything I can do to make their jobs more enjoyable and/or productive. Jim Roberts and Barbara Phillips are the first two participants.

A number of recent changes and problems with Passport Services were discussed.

The monthly safety information was distributed.

Building issues:

Staff is continuing to express the urgency of revising the Circulation Desk layout and furniture. This will be addressed in the budget process.

Meeting Room groups are continuing to express dissatisfaction with the window covering, or lack thereof. Donna and I met with a representative from Pringles who installed a horizontal blind in the Conference Room for us to test the product. I think that it is a huge improvement over the vertical blinds. I have made arrangements for the interior person from the architectural firm that worked on the Civic Center Renovation project to visit the Library and make some recommendations.

Placentia split on call to revive sminent domain

Businesses in redevelopment zone say city leaders want too much power.

FLACENTIA • Community members and city leaders are clashing over a proposal to reinstate eminent domain authority over commercial prop-

erty in Placentia's redevelopment zone.

Some 200 people packed council chambers earlier this month, most of them arguing against reinstating the authority for 12 years.

City Hall has received 67 letters of protest.

Heightening fears is TOD Properties' vision for building

) homes and adding retail, e space and a Metrolink station on redevelopment land south of the city's downtown, an area that is now mostly industrial.

"They (the city) want power over a good portion of the businesses in Placentia with no plan for what they want to do," said Debbie Bright Stevens, part owner of Environmental Audit Inc. and other property in the redevelopment zone.

If property owners band together to drive up prices; eminent domain could facilitate a redevelopment project, Councilman Norman Eckenrode said, though he added he was looking at whether the authority was necessary at this time.

Councilwoman Connie Underhill has said the amount of opposition makes her wonder if the reinstatement should be reconsidered.

Mayor Judy Dickinson and Councilman Chris Lowe could not be reached for comment. Councilman Scott Brady has recused himself because of a conflict of interest.

If the council reinstates eminent domain, Stevens said she'd work with other opponents on a referendum.

Using eminent domain would be the city's last choice in acquiring land, and the rules ensure a fair outcome for property owners, said Leigh DeSantis, economic development manager.

"The city does not set the final price – a judge and jury set the final price," she said.

allows the government to take property by force and requires it to pay "just compensation" to victimized owners.

But the reality in Orange County and elsewhere is quite disturbing.

Individual property owners are

routinely forced from their homes and businesses, not to build a road or school or other public project, as allowed by the U.S. Constitution. Instead, cities take property from current owners to hand over to other private owners.

Typically, those who lose their properties must hire a lawyer to fight for a fair price.

Local cities – Garden Grove is a notorious abuser of this process – play legal hardball with owners, oftentimes offering a small percentage of what the property is really worth.

Placentia, like many other cities, wants to increase its tax revenue and improve an older area of town. Officials are working with a selected developer to build a massive transit-oriented development just south of the historic downtown. Downtown has a great deal of charm, and local business owners rightly fear that the project will

Placentia drains grant for rail project

THE ORANGE COUNTY REGISTER

PLACENTIA • The city has run out of state grant money to pay for the construction of its railroad underpass at Melrose Street and needs to dip into proceeds from bonds and property sales to pay the bills.

Because of its own budget crisis, last year the state froze \$11 million of a \$28 million transportation grant, forcing the city to scramble to pay a

debt to Office Depot and do a street closure at Bradford Avenue.

The first \$16.9 million of the grant paid for work on the underpass, initially expected to cost \$16.4 million.

Because right-of-way purchases cost more than expected and the remaining \$11 million of the grant is not available, the city will have to delve into its own coffers to finish the underpass.

Work is still expected to conclude in December.

Tuesday night the City Council will be asked to approve the use of \$258,918 of proceeds from certificates of participation, which are essentially bonds, raised last

The city is negotiating the sale of excess property that should pay for much of the remaining construction, Finance Director Steve Brisco said.

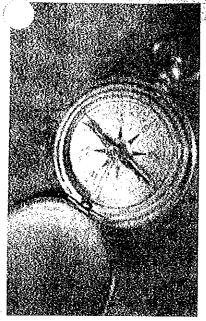

Novelist Loves Trustees

Dean Burgess claims his ALA membership card as a valued possession. While posing for photographs, he notably reaches for his wife Peggy, another important credential. Both have been part of his life for more than forty years. The former library director enjoys life in Portsmouth VA, laced with a busy round of appearances.

Burgess's first novel, An Unclean Act (Permanent Press, Sag Harbor NY 2002) drew good reviews. As the dust jacket proclaims, the book deals with "the first Puritan settlers, and brings to life the struggles and realities of earliest colonial life as it was actually lived, unvarnished and unromanticized."

The tale bears "witness to the ironic intolerance of the Puritans who, after feeling religious persecution in England, were not reluctant to inflict their own cruelties upon the growing number of freethinking Quakers who were springing up amongst them." Burgess is a direct descendent of Thomas Burge, one of the characters.

The author was born in Niagara Falls NY and attended Kenyon College in Gambier OH, known for its ties to literature. His first thought was to enter the acting world. "I was in professional theater for a while, manager of a theater company," he explains. "But I found I was not cut out to be a gypsy."

"My brother at Old Dominion University, Virginia, got me a job as a library clerk. Like Sholem Alechem, you know?"

"I taught speech and drama at Norview HS, and English classes, too. At the end of each day, I was wiped out," Burgess continues. "When my wife saw a library job in the newspaper, I grabbed it."



Soon after joining the Portsmouth Public Library, he got a scholarship to study library science at Chapel Hill NC. "We had two children," he says, "so my wife took my job and my mother looked after the kids."

"After I got my MLS, we switched," he adds, proudly "I returned to become director of reference, while Peggy earned the same degree. Our careers have paralleled." Burgess went on become director of Portsmouth Public Libraries for 21 years. "I served as president of the Virginia Library Association, and edited *The Virginia Librarian* for ten years. I was fortunate enough to be in on the beginning of automation."

As Burgess explains it, there have been three distinct waves in the world of libraries. "The first generation built research libraries," he says. "The next generation built branches—I came in on the end of that. Portsmouth has a main library and three branches. I was in on the opening of all 'three."

"I was appointed to the Virginia Networking Commission," he adds. "I was on the first library delegation to China. My expertise was automation. Technicians there were just developing computers to type Chinese characters. They were very proud of that."

The Fifth Annual Trustees-Friends Day featured four events. Meeting on March 31 attendees were hosted by the Kansas Library Trustee Association (KTLA) and Friends of Kansas Libraries (FOKL).

FUTURIST STRETCHES MINDS

Laughter. Pin-drop silence. New and sometimes frightening concepts. Futurist Ian Jukes knew how to hold his audience. His "Living on the Future Edge" keynote speech included:

- Moore's Law: computing power doubles every 18 months, as prices drop.
- The Internet has No Walls: Its emails and Web sites use a different language. Are we teaching our kids to write for the Web?
- People over 30 are Digital Immigrants: But today's kids are "digital natives" who grow up with a mouse in their hands.

By 2016, children can expect ten to fourteen careers in a lifetime compared to about five to six for today's thirtysomethings. How to prepare them? By recognizing that Internet search engines teach kids, too, and paper is not as real as multi-media experience.

Teaching must change, in order to develop information fluency, Jukes declared. The 250 people in the audience agreed with thunderous applause. The speaker and his company model what he

Regional trustees of the year: These winners go "above and beyond" to help their libraries. In 2004 they were Joe Simunac, Baldwin (Northeast Kansas Library System) and Beverly Roepke, Waterville (North Central Kansas Library System).

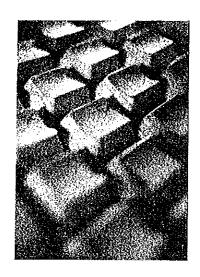

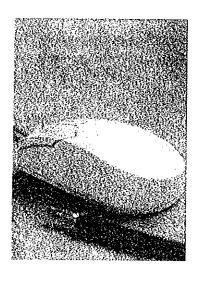

From the Office of ALA Governance: As the U.S. Presidential election campaign heats up, ALA, as a 501 (c) 3 organization, is strictly prohibited from engaging in any political activities on behalf of individual candidates for public office. This prohibition extends to staff or member discussion on ALA electronic discussion lists, in Ala or unit newsletters, at programs at ALA conferences.

I've Been Reading

Charles Ogletree, Jr., All Deliberate Speed: Reflections on the First Half-Century of Brown v. Board of Education, W. W. Norton, New York, April, 2004

Charles J. Ogletree, Jr., professor of law and vice dean for clinical programs at Harvard, has written a critical account of the last half century of American race relations since Brown v. Board of Education. He concludes that the Supreme Court compromised the effects of their landmark 1954 decision when they stated that change was to be brought about with "all deliberate speed." This was a flaw in their unanimous decision, which has, in Ogletree's view, given many individuals and officials at various levels continuing license to resist and defy the Court's mandate, this delaying needed action not only in the public schools but in other areas of American life.

Ogletree was born and raised in Merced, California, and writes movingly of his childhood life in a segregated community. His family's poverty and a variety of school experiences fed his growing sensitivity to racial inequality in Merced during his early years. An African-American basketball coach encouraged him to delve extensively into Black literature. He encountered some compassionate teachers in high school, and a guidance counselor persuaded him to apply for admission to Stanford University, instead of a local community college. Following his graduation from Stanford, he

attended Harvard Law School. In the mid-1970s, his first job as a lawyer was with Washington, D.C.'s Public defender Service. There he noticed that despite an overwhelmingly (70%) black population, Washington's indigents were for a number of years primarily represented by white attorneys.

In much of his book, Ogletree intersperses his own experiences as a student and practicing attorney with accounts of some of the major racerelated legislation, litigation and issues of the past century, some of which involved him personally. These range from Southern paternalism and violent repression, Black exclusion from mainstream education and the political process in the Brown decision, Black Panther shootings and the Angela Davis trials in the early 1970s. Ogletree devotes major sections in his book to segregation in the Boston public schools, the Bakke and related cases of "reverse discrimination," and the legacy of Thurgood Marshall. He described in detail his involvement as an untenured professor in Anita Hill's defense following her challenge to Clarence Thomas's appointment to the Supreme Court. He also reviews the recent controversies regarding admissions standards at the University of Michigan. He is presently representing Black citizens of Tulsa, Oklahoma, who are seeking reparations for the destruction of their homes in a 1921 race riot.

Ogletree concludes that the "important goal of full equality in education following slavery and Jim Crow segregation was compromised from the beginning and that 50 years after *Brown* there is little to celebrate." The nation's refusal to acknowledge this history "and to repair the harm done" has permitted "the problem of the color line to carry over into the 21st Century." Nothing less than "an unequivocal commitment" to racial equality by government, industry, "and in our personal lives," will do, "and we must do it now."

As Nation Celebrates 50 Years of Brown, Americans Reflect on Opening Libraries to All

Library services specifically provided for African-Americans extend back nearly two centuries to 1816, when the first school and library for their use was established in Wilmington DE. During the early decades of the 19th century, Philadelphia became a center of Black-centered library activity, with the creation in that city of the first "social library" for their use (1828), the first social library for Black women (1831) and the Philadelphia Library Company of Colored Persons (1833).

The Enoch Pratt Library in Baltimore and four if its branches appear to have been the first public library facilities in the South providing services for both races, beginning in 1886. The earliest Black college library in the South was founded at North Carolina Agricultural and Technical College in Greensboro NC in 1894. Two years later, the infamous *Plessy v. Ferguson* case, handed down by the Supreme Court, established its "separate but equal" doctrine, which was to govern much national library policy, particularly in the Southern states, until the mid-20th century.

Among the stereo views of the Boston Public Library issued in 1902 was one featuring a Black patron.

Philanthropist Andrew Carnegie underwrote reconstruction of a number of Black college and university libraries during the early years of the 20th Century, beginning with Tuskegee Institute (1901) and including Alabama A & M, Atlanta University (GA), Benedict College (SC), Talladega College (AL), and Wilberforce University (OH), all in 1904, and Cheyney State Teachers College (PA), Johnson C. Smith University (NC), Livingstone College (NC) and Fisk University (TN), the following year. During the next several years, additional Carnegie aca-

demic libraries for Blacks came into being at Wiley College in Texas (1906) and at Howard University (DC) and Knoxville (TN) College in 1907.

In 1910, the Marblehead Libraries, a traveling library service specifically for Southern Blacks, was established by James H. Gregory of Marblehead MA. This program was administered by Atlanta University. In 1917, Julius Rosenwald, president and later Chairman of the Board of Sears Roebuck, inspired by the work of his friend Booker T. Washington, created the Julius Rosenwald Fund, which ultimately established 5,357 schools for Blacks in the rural South. Beginning in 1929, he began funding the construction of a number of urban and rural libraries in thirteen Southern states that were open to patrons of all races.

American library organizations first became active in a variety of projects on behalf of Blacks in the 1920s. The American Library Association (ALA) held its first Work with Negroes Round Table in 1921. George Settle, Director of the Louisville KY Public Library, delivered a paper concerning the "Status of Work with Negroes" a conference of the Southeastern Library Association in 1926, and the first Negro Library Conference was convened at Hampton Institute's Library School in Hampton, VA, in 1927.

For a number of years, some individual librarians in the South took a stand for integration before the ALA got involved in doing so. For many years, ALA's standing policy was to avoid unnecessary turmoil by holding no annual meetings in the segregated South. In the 1950s, it did begin to insist that all states maintain one state library association, rather than two segregated ones. Unfortunately, this meant that for some years, African-American librarians were denied membership in white library associations.

In 1956, following the Supreme Court's decision in *Brown v. Board of Education*, two years earlier, ALA finally convened its first integrated annual conference in Miami Beach FL. In 1961 ALA amended its Library Bill of Rights by sting "the right of an individual to the use of a

library shall not be denied or abridged because of his race, religion, national origins, or political views." The ALA Black Caucus, organized at ALA's 1970 midwinter meeting in Chicago, was formed "to mobilize the power necessary to ensure that the fullest and most relevant library service is made available to black people."

As early as 1928, the West Virginia Supreme Court handed down a path-breaking decision in that state, when it determined that as taxpayers, Black citizens of Charleston had as equal right to the use of public library facilities in that city. In general, however, Southern states and municipalities were slow to change their policies, although occasional progress was made. In 1953, for example, Rosa Keller, president of the New Orleans Urban League, and the first woman appointee to that city's Library Board, began insisting, despite great opposition, that all libraries in that city be integrated. Though this was finally accomplished with the support of Mayor deLesseps Morrison in 1955, library water fountains and rest rooms would continue to be segregated for some years.

In Albany, GA, in 1963, the local public library, which was closed in response to many library sit-

ins, reopened when 1600 white citizens petitioned for integrated services. In *Brown v. Louisiana* (1966), the only case concerning library segregation to be decided by the US Supreme Court, the Court determined that five Black demonstrators who had staged a sit-in at a public library in Clinton, LA, could not be charged with disturbing the peace.

Mexican-Americans were among other minorities who for many years were place in segregated schools in the Southwest. Mexican-American children were often channeled into sub-standard or vocational programs, solely because of their ethnicity. Others were obliged to adjust to an English-only environment. One Mexican-American woman in Arizona, who had attended a public school there and had loved to read since her childhood, gratefully recalled a sympathetic Anglo educator in her school who set up a "makeshift community center and library" in a local barrio. "To this day," she remarked, "I just love going into libraries . . . there are two places that I can go in and get a real warm, happy feeling: that is, the library and Bullock's [local department store] in the perfume and make-up department."

"I saw symbols on a library wall. They were ancient Chinese symbols, but the librarians could not read them," Burgess recalled. "I wandered away from the group and came to a locked door. A woman hurried after me, and I asked what was inside. 'Those are books published by the Nationalist Chinese,' she explained. 'They include lies.' So I asked, why keep them at all? She replied, 'The government might change.'"

Back to the novel. How did Burgess get the idea to write it? "I was sitting in the Reference Room of the Library of Virginia. They had records of the courts of the Plymouth colony, including a "ivorce trial. I knew I had to write that story."

Is there a second novel in the works? "It's titled Smoke on Water. It's the story of a Virginia mountain girl's trip to New York in the 1920's. And like my first book, it requires a lot of research in the library."

Back to libraries. How does Burgess feel about trustees? "If you work for the mayor, and he says no, trustees can help. Trustees are your advocates at City Hall. And they keep you honest."

"Some library directors like working in groups. Some don't. And they don't know what they're missing!"

ALTA ANNOUNCES LITERACY AWARD WINNER CONGRATULATIONS TO WILLIAM H. WILSON!

William Wilson is the winner of this year's Literacy Award, to be presented at the ALTA SOS Luncheon on Sunday, June 27, 2004. This award is an acknowledgement of his commitment to directly preserve and further literacy in his state. Mr. Wilson has served on the Lexington Public Library's Advisory Board and Board of Trustees since 1997, serving as both Chairman and Vice-Chairman of the Board. He is also a past-president of the Literacy Volunteers of America, and for the past several years, has served on the board of the Carnegie Center for Literacy and Learning. In 2003, while serving as a trustee of the Carnegie Literacy Center, Wilson took initiative to prevent proposed funding cuts, lobbying the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government. and enlisting other Board and Advisory Board members to contact and lobby each City Council member.

As Chair of the Board's Public Relations committee, he helped to prepare a letter to Council members with the facts and history of the situation, and at the end of June 2003, the Lexington Public Library signed an agreement with the Lexington-Fayette Urban County Government and Lexington resident William Farish, to provide the necessary funding for the Carnegie Center. Though many Library Board members were involved in this effort, William Wilson was the one who spearheaded it, and provided the necessary leadership. Kudos to him for his achievement and steadfast work!

The ALTA Literacy Award is presented annually to a library trustee or volunteer who has made some significant contribution to addressing the literacy problem in the United States—particularly as it relates to the role of the public library. The award, which is a plaque, is presented during the SOS Luncheon at the ALA Annual Conference.

ALTA ANNOUNCES THE 2004 ALTA/GALE GRANT WINNER CONGRATULATIONS TO JOEL HONDORP AND KAREN DYERI

Congratulations to Joel Hondorp and Karen Dyer, the recipients of this year's ALTA/Gale Outstanding Trustee Grant. Karen Dyer is a trustee at the Alameda County Library in Fremont, CA, who has been working with libraries (in Friends, Task Force, and Board capacities) since 1992. Since 1995, she has attended every annual California Library Association Legislative Day, and testified before legislative subcommittees in support of library legislation in California, but has never had the opportunity to attend an American Library Association Annual Conference.

In 2000, Joel Hondorp was appointed to the board of the Kent District Library in Michigan, and since then, has been elected both to Treal and Vice-Chair positions. Mr. Hondorp has been a lifelong book-lover, and user of school, church, and public libraries, and now he enjoys helping to make decisions for a library system. Established in 1990, this award provides \$750 each to enable two public library trustees to attend an ALA Annual Conference for the first time. It is awarded annually to two public library trustees who have demonstrated qualitative interests and efforts in supportive service of the local public library. Made possible by an annual gift from Gale Research, Incorporated, the grant is administered by the Association for Library Trustees and Advocates, a division of the American Library Association. A formal pretation to winners will be made at the A Opening Session at the ALA Annual Conference.

ALTA ANNOUNCES WINNERS OF MAJOR BENEFACTORS HONOR AWARD CONGRATULATIONS TO THE CLEMENTS FAMILY AND THE BANK OF SOUTHSIDE VIRGINIA!

This year's ALTA Major Benefactor Award is a two-pronged pat on the back to the Clements family of Carson, Virginia. Both the Clements' business (The Bank of Southside Virginia), and two individual members of the Clements family (father and son bank owners John and Peter Clements) are being honored for their donation of funds and land for the new Carson Depot library in Hopewell, Virginia. Until 1992, only a bookmobile stop, and a temporary stationery bookmobile supplied public library service in the Town of Carson. In the past eleven years, John and Peter Clements have made donations totaling approximately \$15,000; giving both funding and land for the relocation and renovation of an old caboose to the grounds of the Carson Depot Library. They have also helped to fund the Appomattox Regional Library's summer reading program, and given support to other library branch building projects. With their efforts, The Bank of Southside Virginia and the Clements family have demonstrated the capability of a local business to provide and promote public library service, and have created a showplace library with a corresponding museum devoted to local railroad history. The Association for Library Trustees and Advocates commends the Clements family for their efforts in preservation and benefaction of both local history and public libraries. As noted by Mr. Chuck Koutnik, Director of the Appomattox Regional Library System; "In 20 years of working in libraries, I have never seen such great support of libraries from a corporation and community."

Established in 1976, the Major Benefactors Honor Award is a specially prepared citation established to give recognition to individuals, families or corporate bodies who have made major benefactions to public libraries. The award is presented locally in a ceremony at the library, and consists of two specially prepared citations for the recipient(s) and the beneficiary library. The significance of the gift will be measured from the point of view of the recipient library, rather than by the size of the gift alone.

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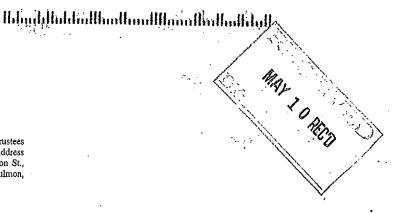
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
