The Board of Directors of the Friends of Placentia Library met on Monday, March 10, 1997. Library Board President Peggy Dinsmore, Library Director Elizabeth Minter, Children's Librarian Cyrise Smith, and Library Assistant Cheryl Willauer attended the meeting.

The Treasurer reported an account balance of \$6,252.28 as of March 3, 1997. The Library was given a check for \$700 to cover the costs of a six-week, two sessions per week, story hour series. The Foundation was given a check for \$63.10 for the Book Endowment Fund.

Library Director Minter reported that the net profit for the Author's Brunch on March 1 was \$8,099.66, with \$1,060 designated for the Book Endowment Fund, and \$7,039.66 for the Adopt-A-Book program.

The Board agreed that next year criteria will be established for complementary tickets to the Author's Brunch for volunteers who have achieved a specified number of hours of service.

The Friends Annual Meeting will be held on Wednesday April 16. Refreshments will be served at 6:00 P.M. and the program will be conducted from 6:30 - 8:30 P.M. in the audio visual area of the Library. The program will begin with the recognition of local authors, recognition of volunteers with over 50 hours of service during the past year, and a presentation by Dr. Judith Suchey, forensic anthropologist at Cal State Fullerton.

A "Know Your Library Workshop" will be scheduled in April or May. It will be held on a Friday around mid-day and will include a luncheon. Minter was asked to check the availability of Assemblyman Dick Ackerman and will set the date based on his calendar. The serious part of the program will include a "State of the Library" Report by the Library Director, and reviews of several aspects of Library programming. Entertainment will also be provided. Catered box lunches will be available to purchase or participants may bring sack lunches.

The Friends agreed to sponsor a Water Stop at the Library for the 8K/5K run on April 26.

The next Friends Board meeting is scheduled for Monday, April 7 at 7:00 P.M. Trustee Stark is scheduled to attend as the Library Board representative.



Dear Pool Participants:

We continue to monitor the status of various post-confirmation issues in the County's bankruptcy case.

On December 18, 1996, Steven White filed a taxpayer action (the "White Action") in the Orange County Superior Court challenging the constitutionality of four separate but related acts of the California Legislature. The bills were enacted into law as the California Statutes of 1995, Chapter 745, 746, 747 and 748, respectively and collectively made possible the financing of the County of Orange's (the "County") Plan of Adjustment and allowed the County to emerge from its Chapter 9 case.

The County's initial procedural response to the complaint filed by Mr. White was to remove the action from the State Court to the Bankruptcy Court. Plaintiff White filed in the Bankruptcy Court a Motion to Abstain and Remand which was heard yesterday by Judge Ryan.

At yesterday's hearing, Mr. White's attorney argued that the Bankruptcy Court should abstain from hearing the action and send the White Action back to the Orange County Superior Court. While Judge Ryan acknowledged that White Action may raise issues related to the County's bankruptcy case, he found that the issues in the White Action were predominantly state law issues. Finding that all of the requirements for mandatory abstention under the Bankruptcy Code existed, Bankruptcy Judge Ryan granted plaintiff's Motion to Abstain and Remand. Consequently, the case will be transferred back to the Orange County Superior Court and litigated there.

Attached is the summary of actions taken by the California Library Services Board (CLSB) at its February 20, 1997 meeting in Sacramento. I call your particular attention to item 7, page 3, the draft legislation sponsored by Newport Beach to revise Education Code section 18743, Equal Access. The Equal Access/TBR Ad-Hoc Committee has been hard at work developing both short (item 5) and long-term (items 6 & 7) solutions to improving the effectiveness of the equal access program. State Library staff has outlined (below) the effects of that draft legislation:

- Allows waiver of compliance with the equal access provisions.
- · Fees may be charged to equal access non-residents.
- Waiver recipient will continue as a CLSA member of the System.
- Waiver recipient will continue to receive reimbursements for direct loan imbalances.
- The cost to be recovered will be based on a determination of TBR formula costs unrecovered through the CLSA Direct Loan reimbursement program.
- Establishes process and conditions for System and CLSB approval of waiver.

The Board is extremely interested in your reactions, concerns, and suggestions to this initial attempt to address the equal access imbalance problems.

SUBJECT: CLSB Actions taken at the February 20-21, 1997 Meeting

Purpose of the California Library Services Act:

The Legislature finds and declares that it is in the interest of the people of the state to insure that all people have free and convenient access to all library resources and services that might enrich their lives, regardless of where they live or the tax base of their local government. This policy shall be accomplished by assisting public libraries to improve service to the underserved of all ages, and by enabling public libraries to provide their users with the services and resources of all libraries in this state.

Goals of the California Library Services Board:

From this time forth the California Library Services Board will be known as a proactive Board with an impact on State and Federal Legislation.

The California Library Services Board will continue to support the California Literacy Campaign.

The California Library Services Board will develop a statewide program for young adult services, based on appropriate supporting statistics and evaluations.

The California Library Services Board seeks to provide adequate financial and technical support to libraries for resource sharing services.

By the year 2000, the California Library Services Board will have successfully implemented the Library of California.

By the year 2000, the California Library Services Board will have been successful in seeing that unfunded components of the California Library Services Act are funded.

The California Library Services Board will continue to seek a higher visibility throughout the state.

The California Library Services Board will review and develop initiatives to ensure adequate citizen participation.

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To achieve the purpose of the Act, the following actions were taken at the CLSB meeting in Sacramento on February 20-21, 1997:

1. Adoption of Agenda

It was moved, seconded (Spence/Fong) and carried unanimously that the California Library Services Board adopt the agenda as presented.

Approval of Minutes

2. It was moved, seconded (Spence/Steinhauser) and carried unanimously that the California Library Services Board approve the draft minutes of the November 14-15, 1996 CLSB meeting as corrected.

Legislative Committee

- 3. It was moved by the Legislative Committee (Dawe) and carried by a vote of 7 yes, 1 no (Steinhauser) that the Board conceptually approve Senate Bill 409 (Library of California) with the understanding that the Senate Bill is in substantially the same form as the December 13, 1996 version recommended for approval by the Networking Task Force and authorize the President of the Board and the Chair of the Legislative Committee to advocate passage of the Library of California.
- 4. It was moved by the Legislative Committee (Dawe) and carried unanimously that the California Library Services Board support Senate Bill 359 (Literacy for Public Safety).

Transaction Based Reimbursements

- 5. It was moved by the Equal Access/TBR Ad-Hoc Committee (Kallenberg) and carried unanimously that the Board authorize its Chief Executive Officer with Equal Access/TBR Ad-Hoc Committee to develop budget act control language for 1997/98 to provide for a waiver process to facilitate addressing the problem in the Equal Access program.
- 6. It was moved by the Equal Access/TBR Ad-Hoc Committee (Kallenberg) and carried unanimously that the California Library Services Board be authorized to seek a legislative augmentation of \$1.6 million to the Transaction Based Reimbursement (TBR) program to enable the Board to fully fund the TBR program.

7. It was moved by the Legislative Committee (Dawe) and carried unanimously that the Board support an amendment to Education Code section 18743 to read as follows:

"Each member library of a system shall provide equal access to all residents of the area served by the system. Member libraries that incur a net imbalance shall be reimbursed through the system for the handling cost of the net loans according to the allocation formula developed pursuant to Subdivision F of Section 18724. A member library shall not be considered in violation of the equal access provisions of this section by implementing a measure or measures (including but not limited to the imposition of a non-resident fee) which allows the member library to recover the portion of the costs of providing library services to non-residents as calculated pursuant to the formula described in Subdivision F of Section 18724 which has not been reimbursed provided (1) all members of the system are authorized to implement such measure(s); (2) such measure(s) has/have been approved as part of the system plan by the system; and (3) the California Library Services Board has approved the system plan which includes such measure(s)."

8. Statewide Data Base

It was moved, seconded (Steinhauser/Fong) and carried unanimously that the California Library Services Board authorize its Chief Executive Officer to expend Statewide Data Base Program funds to support Linked Systems Project grant awards in 1997/98 based on the criteria for the evaluation of Linked Systems Project Proposals. (See Attachment A)

Special Services

- 9. It was moved by the Literacy Committee (Steinhauser) and carried unanimously that the California Library Services Board authorize its Chief Executive Officer to allocate, as soon as the state budget makes them available, the 1997/98 California Literacy Campaign funds to local programs in accordance with the provisions of Section 18733.2 of the Education Code of California.
- 10. It was moved by the Literacy Committee (Steinhauser) and carried unanimously that the California Library Services Board authorize its Chief Executive Officer to allocate, as soon as the state budget makes them available, the 1997/98 Families for Literacy funds in accordance with the provisions of Education Code Section 18735 to local participants based upon the criteria set forth in the Families for Literacy application materials and prior performance in the Program, where applicable.

1997/98 Criteria for the Evaluation of Proposed Linked Systems Project

Eligible library jurisdictions are public library members of consortia and CLSA Systems.

- 1. First priority for the use of the available funds shall be to support the objective of improved resource sharing between eligible public library jurisdictions in order to link the automated systems of several members of a consortia or CLSA System, or make linkages between CLSA Systems or between CLSA System and consortia. Special consideration shall be given to:
 - a. proposals that show promise of reducing the workload and costs involved in directing patrons to resources in other jurisdictions to stimulate direct loan sharing
 - b. proposals facilitating the interlibrary loan process for resource sharing
 - c. proposals for enhanced sharing of non-English language and juvenile materials.
- 2. The second priority for the use of funds that provides for the consideration of proposals for projects at individual public libraries and projects more limited or preliminary in nature than those given first priority. This priority includes the consideration of projects with the goal of establishing linkages between two or more individual public libraries not necessarily in the same consortia or CLSA System. If funds are available for this level of project, they would be used to support the objective of exploring initial steps in creating or improving basic linkages between automated library systems. Consideration will be given to proposals that:
 - a. establish linkages between the catalogs of two or more libraries with complimentary collections
 - b. model resource sharing linkages that emphasize improved access to an important collection
 - c. utilize new technologies and telecommunications routes such as the Internet to make one or more automated catalog available online that was not previously available online
 - d. establish new access to regional or larger union catalogs.
- 3. The evaluation of the proposals will give preference to those that:
 - a. clearly recognize and plan for the need for a realistic evaluation of vendor capabilities
 - b. identify staff resources to support the project efforts, train staff and users to implement the improved capabilities.
 - c. emphasize new linkages between previously unlinked Automated Systems. It is important to the success of a proposal that it be designed to maximize the increase of resources for the users of the expanded system.

President John Kallenberg introduced two new members: Joanne Kennedy, St. John's Hospital, Oxnard, representing institutional libraries, and Mary Purucker, Santa Monica High School, Santa Monica, representing school libraries, both Wilson appointees.

Cameron Robertson, Deputy State Librarian, reported on CSL budget increases related to the Sesquicentennial and the backlog of donated materials. The state budget analyst report does not mention the State Library which is good news. A report on requirements for Bagley Keene followed.

The CLSB unanimously passed a motion to support in concept SB 409 - the Library of California bill. It was acknowledged there was some opposition, however B. Will reported the following organizations have pledged money and or lobbying: California Association of School Libraries, California Law Library Association, the Medical Library Association, Chapters of the Special Library Association, Pac Bell, University of California, and California State University. B. Will reported resistance was based on fear of loss, especially funding, fear of reduction of current support levels, and fear of change.

The CLSB voted to support SB 356 which provides literacy services for the institutionalized.

The CLSB voted to take the following actions related to YA services: The YA committee will develop plans for a service program which will incorporate 99%

comments from the fiscal office and present it to the Board to recommend a budget change proposal.

The CLSB approved revised goals and values, including elements to facilitate a balance between new technologies and traditional library services, and increased citizen participation in systems. More work will be accomplished via the use of subcommittees.

The \$1.4 million increase in TBR which is in the Governor's budget could help meet caseload expansion. The Board voted to authorize the CSL staff and the TBR subcommittee to pursue changes in legislation which would authorize the Board to approve equal access waivers. The Newport Beach bill will serve as a placeholder and be amended to reflect input requesting specificity. Newport Beach is seeking support via authorship/co-sponsorship of the bill. Budget control language will be sent forward asking for full TBR funding. If not granted, request for the waiver will be forwarded as a temporary solution to the nonresident problem.

The 30% hold back will probably cover the anticipated 22% increase in ILL and 6.4% increase in D/L net imbalance. The current projections indicate libraries will receive 74% of the fiscal office approved rates of \$2.85 per ILL and \$.55 per D/L. CLSB recommended rates were \$3.47 per ILL and \$.69 per D/L.

A new element for system plans of service has been adopted. It requires systems to address the equal access issue. Libraries will need to provide MCLS with a great deal of information. WHAT'S THE PURPOSE OF LSTA?

According to P.L. 104-208 (H.R. 3610) enacted on September 30, 1996, the purpose of the Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) is:

- * to consolidate Federal library service programs;
- * to stimulate excellence and promote access to learning and information resources in all types of libraries for individuals of all ages;
- * to promote library services that provide all users access to information through State, regional, national and international electronic networks;
- * to provide linkages among and between libraries; and
- * to promote targeted library services to people of diverse geographic, cultural, and socioeconomic backgrounds, to individuals with disabilities, and to people with limited functional literacy or information skills.

WHAT'S NEW ABOUT LSTA?

The Library Services and Technology Act builds on the strengths of previous federal library programs, but has some major advantages and differences. LSTA retains the state-based approach, but sharpens the focus to two key priorities for libraries:

- 1. Information access through technology
- 2. Information empowerment through special services

Emphasizes public libraries, but encourages interlibrary cooperation and productive partnerships throughout the entire act, allowing much more flexibility; drops "bricks and mortar" construction but allows renovation and upgrading for technology and for ADA requirements

Emphasizes libraries as change agents and implementers of equity

Emphasizes libraries as self-help institutions and community partners in lifelong learning and literacy, economic development, jobs nformation, health information, etc.

The Governor's office has sent a list of concerns, and a request for response to those concerns, regarding the Library of California legislative proposal. Those concerns are:

- * This proposal presents an admirable goal -- everyone having access to all information contained in all libraries -- but the language in the bill goes toofar in making commitments that cannot, should not, and will not be kept.
- * This proposed legislation has an estimated General Fund cost of \$3 million in 1997-98 (\$1.15 million for technology and \$1.85 million for transaction reimbursement) to establish one or more regional pilot projects. The proposal states that the intent is to have the state provide full funding for the transactions and infrastructure program, but does not specify at what rate transactions will be reimbursed or define infrastructure. As a result, this legislation would have unknown but significant ongoing general fund costs in future fiscal years. (Bold in original.)
- * This proposed legislation would result in the use of state General Funds to support various types of private libraries, including law, corporate, academic, and non-profit, which may be inappropriate.
- * This proposed legislation is poorly conceived and drafted. As written, it is vague and lacks specificity with respect to the development of the required governance structure and regional networks of the program, the timelines or deadlines for the various implementation stages of the program, and the details of the required pilot programs. The proposal expresses a broad outline for the program, but as law would be unclear and difficult to implement.
- * (On page 3, lines 4-5). This bill would make an "ongoing commitment by the state to compensate libraries for services to Californians other than their primary clientele." Again, this kind of "commitment" should not be made by the state -- the state has a role in facilitating access, but should not be responsible for every cost.

- * (On page 4, lines 18-19). Similar problem with the statement that the state should "remiburse equitably any participating library for services it provides for Californians other than its primary clientele.
- * (On page 7, line 8). Who are the "economically displaced"? Is it the intent that the state pay all the costs of the homeless for library services?
- * Contents of the Bill Proposal: Current law provides for resource sharing among 174 public library jurisdictions in the state.

This bill would establish resource sharing among 8,000 California libraries as a goal.

The Library of California would be implemented in incremental steps, beginning with pilot projects at the regional level.

The legislation requires that each developmental step include authorizing legislation and adequate funding from state, local, and private sources.

Fiscal Impact: Unknown, open-ended, multimillion dollar commitment.

The MCLS Executive Committee which met on 2/27/97 requested I transcribe and send out a checklist of their comments on SB 409. The transcription is attached.

SB 409 Checklist Points discussed by attendees at the 2/27/97 ExCom meeting

MCLS HQ

- 1. Most libraries do not oppose the concept. The current document is flawed and needs major simplification and revision.
- 2. There is a very high price tag (\$100 million or more) for a modest increase in benefits to most library users. Almost ninety percent of public library needs are met locally and require neither ILL or referral. To provide better service to the majority of users, local libraries need to be strengthened.
- Future costs are undetermined. Since increases in budget (as seen by the history of 3. TBR) are unlikely, over time more and more activity will be supported by less and less money.
- 4. If legislators choose to vote for it, they must be sure it is fully funded at the \$100 million level. Lack of full funding will drain local resources for a program that benefits an elite minority. How many patrons really go library to library?
- 5. SB 409 does not provide for actual access to libraries and their services. Private, school, and academic libraries will still restrict public access. Current ILL programs already provide access to most types of materials.
- 6. Payments to private academic and special libraries may be a gift of public funds.
- 7. Other types of libraries have access to many different types of funding. Academics charge student fees, corporate libraries are supported by profits, school districts are allowed to determine how they spend their funds and have chosen not to spend on their libraries. Only public libraries are primarily supported by local taxes with important support through CLSA and PLF funds.
- 8. SB 409 requires school libraries have certified professionals. This mandates but does not fund an expensive prerequisite to participation.
- 9. Recommend waiting to see how SB 409 evolves before taking a stand.

The Presidents of the three library organizations met on Monday, March 17 along with Library Director Minter.

The purpose of the meeting was to develop a framework upon which each of the organizations, individually and together, could develop a strategic plan for the next three to five years.

Minter announced that City Manager D'Amato had said that the City would be willing to make available the services of City Development Services Director Joyce Rosenthal to be the facilitator for this process.

Minter also reported that local business analyst Alfred Gobar has expressed a willingness to do a presentation on the economic picture for Placentia.

Minter suggested that either Yorba Linda Library Director CarolAnn Tassios or SLS Executive Director Linda Katsouleas could be asked to give a profile of public libraries in 2001.

The group expressed several concerns about the planning process:

How do we stimulate community participation.

How do we stimulate community enthusiasm.

How do we gather information from all of Placentia.

The group discussed the distinction between focus groups and community/public hearings:

Focus groups are discussion groups of up to 10 participants, who are identified in advance and selected based upon their interest and knowledge of the topic. They are led through a structured discussion of the topic by one of the planning leaders. There may be multiple focus groups for each topic. The summary findings of each group will be presented to the planning conference. Everyone in the community, through newspaper advertisement, mailing to the Foundation database, posters, etc. will be given the opportunity to participate in a focus group. Primarily, these groups will be filled by individuals whose participation has been directly solicited.

A community/public hearing will be held after the individual boards have incorporated the information from the focus groups into their own mission statement and plan, and before the final review and modifications by the joint action of all three organizations.

The following steps were identified:

Planning session for the presidents of the three organizations and the library director with the facilitator.

Presidents prepare each of their groups for the first joint planning session.

1st Planning Session, full day. All members of each of the governing boards of each of the three organizations plus key Library staff.

Background information:

State of the Library by Minter.

State of the Friends by Irot.

State of the Foundation by Stark.

Economic and Social prognosis for Placentia

The Library of 2002.

Identify topics for focus groups and determine leadership for each group.

Focus groups meet.

Each organization meets for ½ day session to develop or review its mission statement, review the reports from the focus groups; and develop a strategic plan for the next five years.

Public hearing during which preliminary plans are presented for each group and public reaction is received. Each focus group participant will be encouraged to attend this meeting as well as library clients and community leaders.

THE ISSUE The Orange County library system, including the branch in-Laguna Beach, faced cutbacks in service because of state cutbacks in funding. The Laguna Beach Friends of the Library and the City Council formed

a partnership to raise the funds to keep the local branch open six days a week. rather than the five days a week funded by property taxes.

► THE LATEST: _Councilman Wayne Peterson has been working on. a plan to rent out the library parking spaces when the library is closed, as a fund-raiser to help minimize the burden on the Friends of the Library.

The county would have to sub-lease the lot to the city and the city would sub-lease it to the Friends of the Library. Not as complicated as it

sounds, according to Peterson. The city has lease agreements with groups such as Friends of the Sea Lions, Club for Kids and the Girl Scouts.

A lease agreement would allow the Friends to negotiate parking fees directly with businesses. The county would need to be indemnified. Peterson said, and the city and the county would have to be named as insureds on a liability insurance policy of at least \$1 million.

▶ TALK ON THE STREET: "The city manager and I have explored this

concept with the Director of the Orange County Library," Peterson said. "His legal staff has advised him it would be lime-consuming and cumbersome to lease the library property to a businessor even a non-profit corporation. However it is relatively simple for the county lo lease the property to a public agency such as the city of Laguna Beach,

County library systems struggle to varying degrees

There's glitz. There's basics. And there's the ever-increasing need to get books into the hands of the people who need them

When the state took more money away from counties in the ear-1990s, city governments and library systems began fighting for ways to stretch their dollars. They often must choose between

glitz and the basics.
"You could get the new Tom Clancy pretty quickly, but we've had to prioritize and decide that the public needs a copy of encyclopedius and reference materials more than to have 300 copies of a new adventure novel," Orange County Librarian John Adams said.

Anaheim is expected to spend \$5.7 million on its libraries during the 1996-97 fiscal year.

The Anaheim Public Library is part of the Santiago Library System. That means patrons can borrow books and other materials from any Orange County Public Library, the Buena Park

Library District, the Fullerton Public Library, the Mission Viejo Public Library, the Mission Viejo Public Library, the Newport Beach Public Library, the Orange Public Library, the Placentia Library District and the Yorba Linda Public Library. The library systems struggle

to varying degrees.
In 1993, the Orange County Public Library system budget was \$27 million. This year, it dropped to \$17.4 million, after the state changed the way it allocates property taxes.

Yet circulation in the county system increases 5 percent each

About \$2.6 billion that used to go to local governments — in-cluding libraries — was eaten up by the state.

The county Board of Supervisors reconfigured the way money is distributed to the 21 cities with county-run libraries.

The new formula gives more money to larger cities, such as Irvine, and less money to smaller cities, such as San Juan Capistrano, Adams said.

It gives more money to cities

that contribute more property, have larger' populations and have the highest circulations, Forty percent of the money allocation is based on property tax.
"Our cities have been uniform-

ly satisfied that this allows for an equitable return for what they are paying into the system," Ad-

ams said.

Five libraries in the Orange County Public Library system offer Sunday hours. They are in Costa Mesa, Irvine and Laguna Niguel. Prior to Jan. 5, no branch libraries had been open on Sundays since 1978.

Costa Mesa's two branch li-braries are open from 1 to 5 p.m. Laguna Niguel's one library and Irvine's two branches are open

from noon to 5 p.m.

Anaheim's city service outshines Stanton's county service. It's county branch library is open only three days a week. Ana-heim's city libraries are closed only on Sundays.

County supervisors established the library as its own county department Dec. 17. Supervisors also created a Library Advisory Board to develop general

library policies for the 21 cities with branch libraries.

The newest branch library, to

be built in Aliso Viejo with Mello Roos funds, will include a restaurant, Adams said. The restau-rant will pay rent to the library, which will use the funds for

"It's a real natural," Adams said. "People can stop outside for a cup of coffee."

The county system spends \$14 per resident. It's a far cry from the \$56 per person in Newport Beach and the \$20 per person in Huntington Beach. San Francisco spends \$40 per person each

year, Admas said.
The county system serves 1.2
million residents, 750,000 of whom have library cards.

The county's \$17.4 million budget is split like this: \$1.6 million buys new books, periodicals and databases; nearly \$16 million pays for staff, hours, utility bills and operations and operations.

The county library has not had a Bookmobile for at least 10 years, Adams said. But they do have children's story hours

The county has turned to what

Adams refers to as "adaptive mechanisms" to get by. Patrons can rent current bestsellers for \$1.50 per week, and the \$125,000 program pays for itself.

Within the next three weeks, county library patrons will be able to access full-text databases of materials in the nine-campus University of California library system. Patrons can borrow the materials on an interlibrary

A 1995 county survey of library users showed that 90 percent of the patrons rated their library as good or excellent, Adams said. The single-most desired improvement was longer hours.

Two other city libraries also are expanding their services.

Newport Beach spends \$55 per person on their main library and three branches, said John Calla-han, assistant city librarian.

The library has Internet connections and digital databases.
The Newport Beach Pubrary Foundation raised lion to help build the libral lahan said.

"The growth just exploded," Callahan said of library use after the new building was constructed. "It was pretty much a 100 percent increase in use."

The library operates with a \$3.6 million annual budget, serving 70,000 residents. There's also a \$500,000 debt service on the building construction.

The Huntington Beach library system, with a \$2.8 annual budget for 1996-97, serves 130,000 cardholders. The library also has a \$600,000 annual enterprise fund that covers its own expenses through development fees, room rentals and donations.

The library spends \$20.50 per resident, said Ron Hayden, the library director, and circulates 1

million items each year.

Despite the perks of housing one of the largest children's collections and the lections in the nation and the Huntington Beach Playhouse, the library has not been without controversy.

"People can just zoom through ow," said Diane Bisom, head of the library systems department at the University of California, Irvine. "They won't have to wait in line." COLLEGE: It's the first UC campus to use the machine system, which scans II) cards and books. Some local public branches use it, too.

The Express Checkout machines -- which cost \$25,000 each - are the first in the nine-cam-pus UC system and are stationed in UCI's main hbrary and science library.
Using the machine is much like

using an ATM. A computer scanner reads a bar code on the student library card, then reads the bar code on the book. It also demagnetizes the book so students can walk through the door without sounding an alarm. The re-ceipt includes the due date.

"Once I got the hang of it, it was like, ham, you're out of here," said Nicole Litzie, an 18-year-old sophomore, who tested the system last week. "It's really easy."

Will students miss the human contact as they check out their books? Will they miss getting that due date stamped on the inside cover by their librarian?

If it means added convenience,

most say no.
"This is really as fast as an "This is really as fast as an ATM," said 21-year-old criminology major Anthony Alvarez. "I mean, I haven't been inside my bank for years. This is better."

Joanne Euster, UCI's head libarian, has been in the business for 29 years and isn't nostalgic about the pre-technology library, either.

She said some patrons still

Two city libraries have the systems in place: Newport Beach Public Library installed a machine a year ago, and the Buena Park system set one three months are got one three months ago.


"They are just starting to take off in Orange County because of the bankruptcy," said Art Leon-cio, the Southern California rep-resentative for the 3M Co., which manufactures the checkout ma-chine. "They didn't have any money to do it with, and now things are starting to improve."

In 1994, California State University, Fullerton's library was the first in Orange County to get the express checkout machine, but officials there said the tech-nology was so new that it didn't really work until the past school

This year, the system is on the blink while the machine is con-verted to read a magnetic strip on student cards instead of the

old bar codes.

The system, which should be running again next week, is used to check out about 80 percent of

Libraries Write New Chapter

Across the nation, institutions are trying to balance technology and tradition. At San Francisco's New Main, bibliophiles say, books are getting short shrift.

SAN FRANCISCO—Billed as the crown jewel of a civic renaissance, this city's New Main library opened just over nine months ago to national acclaim for its daring architecture and bold embrace of technology.

Gleaming in marble splendor within the Civic Center, the

New Main was hailed as a model public library for the 21st century. From its light-filled, six-story entrance atrium to the comfortably furnished study nooks tucked into corners and the computers offering free Internet access, the new library seemed to have it all.

But from the beginning, some saw the library's offerings as threats, not blessings. Free access to computers and videocassettes, displays of dramatic public art and myriad meeting rooms open to community groups are all fine, critics said, but where are the books?

"I feel so angry and so betrayed," said Tille Olsen, a poet and author of short stories who spent thousands of hours educating herself in the musty book stacks of the 19th century Old Main.

Visiting the New Main shortly after it opened, Olsen looked at the atrium and saw a void where she thought books should be. She saw youngsters crowded around computer terminals in the roomy and colorful children's center, but noticed none of them prowling through open stacks of books. She saw the names of prominent corporate donors mentioned liberally throughout the library and recoiled.

And she found that not one book she wanted to check out was available.

"The New Main is a betrayal of what a public library is supposed to be about," Olsen said. In its rush to embrace technology, she mourned, the library

"left its soul behind." Olsen's assessment pinpoints the dilemma librarians and library lovers in many communities are fac-ing as they update one of society's most cherished public institutions. How do you move a public library into the Information Age without sacrificing its traditional role as a collector and circulator of books? How do you modernize a library without violating the sentimental notions many Americans carry with them from their youth—memories of quiet retreats presided

memories of quiet retreats presided over by stern but kind librarians?
"There are debates going on everywhere," said Peter Lyman, UC Berkeley's chief librarian. "Some people are wary that this technological library is being sold as a replacement to the traditional library." brary. It is a question of what is being lost as well as what is being gained." In the case of the New Main—

dubbed that in the planning stages years ago to distinguish it from the then-functioning Old Main—criti-cisms such as Olsen's gradually gained credence.

From the day it opened last April, the New Main seemed to lurch from one problem, one scandal to the next.

one scandal to the next.

There were lengthy lines to check out materials, shortages of public bathrooms, flaws in the computerized catalog, long lag times for re-shelving books and then the sudden, shocking news of a \$2.8-million deficit in the library system's budget. system's budget.

A loose-knit band of authors.

bibliophiles and intellectual gad-flies began showing up at Library Commission meetings to denounce the New Main. Newspaper head-lines, radio talk shows and magazine pieces dissected its operations.

There was criticism that books took second place, even when it came to the design of the building. Space that could have been used to shelve books, critics said, had been given over to "affinity groups" to build single-subject study centers for Filipinos, African Americans, gays and lesblans and others.

Space also had been set uside for community rooms, part of Chief Librarian Kenneth Dowlin's vision of the New Main as a meeting spot. As a result, many books available to the public in the Old Main now vere stored in closed stacks, accessible only to library employees,

Demoralized librariums said the New Main-swamped by as many as 12,000 visitors a day in the beginning to a still hefty 5,600

now-did not work.

They complained of computer terminals often being on the blink and of patrons practically coming to blows as they stood in line for

those that functioned.

"All in all, it's been quite a disappointment," said Kathy Bremer, a branch librarian who heads the librarians union. "They created a cultural center. It looks like a mall." The revelation that caught the

attention of official San Francisco came in December, when Dowlin told a stunned County Board of Supervisors of the \$2.8-million budget deficit. The financial crisis was so severe, he said, that he was forced to temporarily stop buying new books as part of a package of cost-cutting measures.

"It's been a wild ride" since the New Main opened, Dowlin told the board as he struggled to explain

where the money had gone.

There were signs of trouble even months before the opening day. When librarians revealed that they had culled 100,000 books from the collection and tossed them out, a turor erupted.

Critics charged the culling was done to fit the collection into its new home. Library managers said the books were damaged or outdated.

To comply with a city ordinance that barred the sale of the books, the tomes were buried in a city landfill.

The outery was so great that the library's embarrassed management invited the public to pick through discards not yet disposed of. In response, the local chapter of the Gray Panthers organized a rescue operation.

operation.

"We are keeping them in trust for the library until they come to their senses," said Deetje Boler, a bibliophile who said she must squeeze past boxes of books to get out her front door. Boler said she carted home several hundred books earmarked for destruction. "I stuck mostly to nonfiction, but

how do you choose?" Boler said.
"These were the books that librarians had preserved for generations."
Then came the fight over the

card catalog. Bibliophiles battled, unsuccessfully, for a place in the New Main for the 2,520 carved drawers of the catalog they said was needed to supplement the new,

computerized version.

The Library Commission said not only was there no room, the

printed catalog was obsolete.

Leading the defense of the old catalog was author Nicholson Baker, who sued the Library Commission

for access to prove that it listed books the online catalog did not include. Ultimately, the commission agreed to give the public access to the old catalog, which will be located in a nearby exhibition hall.

The story of the New Main is nothing less than "a case study of what can be accessed.

what can happen . . . when tele-communications enthusiasts take over big old research libraries and attempt to remake them, with corporate help, as high-traffic showplaces for information tech-nology," Baker charged in an arti-cle he wrote in the New Yorker.

To all the criticism, Dowlin and his supporters answered that the \$140-million library—built with a combination of bond measures and a massive private fund-raising drive—was a victim of its success.

Patronage was up 300% both in the New Main and elsewhere in the system's 26 branches. Instead of issuing a few dozen library cards daily, as they had in the Old Main, librarians were issuing more than 100 daily. Community groups kept meeting rooms in continual use. Tour buses added the New Main to their routes.

Some of these folks cannot bear Some of these folks cannot bear the fact that the library has been so successful," said Dale Carlson, a former library commissioner who was a key fund-raiser for the New Main. "This library doesn't look like any other library. It redefines: the definition and the concept of what a library is all about."

The budget went in the red, Dowlin and his supporters said, because he was trying to keep pace with demand by adding more staff and paying huge sums of overtime.

But the union representing li-brarians countered that the culprits were incompetent management and expensive technology.

hatever the source of the financial troubles, Dow-lin's admission spurred Mayor Willie Brown and the Board of Supervisors to act. The board took control of the library's finances from Dowlin, and Brown ordered his budget director to audit the perfetuior's finances and may be a section of the perfetuior's finances and may be a section to the institution's finances and man-agement practices. The city pumped \$1.7 million into the library's budget from other funds. In January, Brown forced Dow. lin to resign.

At an emotional, standing-room-only Library Commission meeting, an unrepentant Dowlin defended an unrepentant Dowlin defended his vision of the library and his record. He hinted that he was forced out by librarians who feared that his high-tech library would reduce them to gatckeepers for the World Wide Web.

Some library commissioners wept as they bade him farewell.

Commission President Steve Coulter, who worked side by side with Dowlin for nine years on the

with Dowlin for nine years on the New Main, was so overcome by emotion that, at first, he could not

speak as he began to praise him as

speak as he began to praise him as a visionary "agent of change."

"This is a revolutionary time in history." Dowlin told the crowd.

"Libraries have to respond to that... I am proud of what I accomplished here. I took a dream... I helped shape that dream into a vision and sold that vision to the community.... I delivered what we promised."

The trouble, Dowlin said, was that.

The trouble, Dowlin said, was that The trouble, Dowlin said, was that San Franciscans didn't want just a library, they wanted "an icon . . . and that is a heavy burden to bear." Few believe Dowlin's departure will end the library's troubles.

The day after Dowlin tenderechis resignation, Los Angeles City Librarian Susan Goldberg Ken received a flood of e-mail fron colleagues across the country, con-

colleagues across the country, con-cerned about what had happened to Dowlin and the New Main.
"People are asking, 'What is the reason for this resignation? Didn' Ken build the library people had been asking for?' People are shocked," said Goldberg Kent.

"If this is set up as tradition versus innovation, you obviously have a controversy," she said, "Bu it is not an either/or proposition There's been a lot of passion and people do get nervous, but you have to explain to them that when you put in a computer, it doesn' mean you will lose a book."

In San Francisco, the next library battle is likely to erupt over the selection of Dowlin's replacement. The Library Commission has

promised a nationwide search for someone who will share Dowlin's vision, but be a skilled manager. vision, but to a skined manager.

Dowlin's critics are urging the board to look for a librarian less wedded to technology and more reverential of books.

A worried Deetje Boler sald she

fears the new librarian will be of the same mind as Dowlin.

"So my work is cut out for me," said the book-loving Gray Panther. "I have got to defend the books."
