
Cheryl Willauer distributed a 1997 Friends Board Membership Roster.

The Placentia Library Foundation Board of Directors met on May 22, 1977.

The Co-Chairs of the organizing committee for the 8K/5K Earth Week Run held on April 26, 1997, Steve Pischel and John Fraser, reported to the Board that the Foundation's share of the proceeds will be \$3,000. The check was presented on behalf of Placentia Linda Hospital at the City Council Meeting on June 3, 1997. The Foundation Board presented plaques to the City and the Hospital. The funds were designated by the Hospital for the Adopt-A-Book program.

A plaque was also presented to the Moms Club of Placentia honoring the fund raiser they had a Knowlwood Family Restaurant on April 24, 1997. The Club raised \$540 which it designated for purchasing parenting books and materials for preschoolers.

The Annual Giving Campaign will begin in July this year. The last two years it began in September.

The date for the Donor Reception is Friday, September 5, 1997.

The Board endorsed an application by Placentia Library District for a State Library Grant to fund a mass mailing to all Placentia residents. If the Grant is received the project must be completed by the end of the summer.

The Major Gifts Committee will be seeking corporate contributions between May and September.

The Annual Foundation Report to the Internal Revenue Service (Form 990) has been completed by Munson, Cronick and Associates.

The Placentia Historical Afghan profits through the end of April were \$2,275.10. Half was sent to the City of Placentia Historical Committee and the remaining \$1,137.55 is designated for the use of the Library's Placentia History Room Committee.

Digest: Existing law requires the county auditor, in each fiscal year, to allocate property tax revenues to local jurisdictions in accordance with specified formulas and procedures, and generally provides that each jurisdiction shall be allocated an amount equal to the total of the amount of revenue allocated to that jurisdiction in the prior fiscal year, subject to certain modifications, and that jurisdiction's portion of the annual tax increment, as defined.

This bill would instead define a "qualified county" as any county that has implemented this specified alternative distribution method, and would, with respect to counties that first implemented this alternative distribution method prior to the 1994-95 fiscal year, define the "designated fiscal year" as the 1998-99 fiscal year.

ERAF - Budget Action

Early Friday evening (May 30, 1997), the Assembly met to consider AB 107, which is the Assembly's version of the State Budget. As you know, both the Senate and Assembly versions of the State Budget contain \$100 million of ERAF property tax revenues to be allocated to cities, counties and special districts, less any Proposition 172 funds an agency received.

Assembly Member Mike Sweeney offered an amendment to AB 107 which would add an additional \$180 million to the ERAF shift for a total of \$280 million. Speaking on behalf of the amendment were Assembly Members Aquiar, Torlakson and Runner. The amendment passed 73 to 0, with seven members either not voting or absent.

This action will ensure that ERAF will be a discussion item during the Budget Conference Committee as the Assembly's version is at \$280 million, while the Senate's version contains \$100 million. Obviously, the final amount will be developed by the "Big 5", consisting of the Governor and the Assembly/Senate leadership.

The Budget Conference Committee is expected to commence its work shortly. and CSDA Legislative Advocate Ralph Heim will keep CSDA members current relative to all ERAF activities. Letters of thanks to the Assembly members that voted for the inclusion of the additional \$180 million would certainly be appropriate.

Assembly Bill 972 (Torlakson) - LAFCO

Assembly Bill 972 by Assembly Member Torlakson, which among other things, proposed cities, counties and special districts (for LAFCOs with special district representation) fund LAFCO general operations budgets on an equal basis, was held in the Assembly Appropriations Committee late last Friday (May 30, 1997), effectively defeating the measure for this year.

Since Assembly Member Pringle's measure on the same subject was referred to Interim Study, the issues in AB 972 will be included in that Interim Study this Fall. Hearing dates for bills referred to Interim Study are usually announced toward the end of the Session or shortly thereafter. CSDA will advise you when the Assembly Local Government Committee announces the hearing date.

Assembly Bill 556 (Pringle) - Orange County Special District Consolidations

Assembly Bill 556 passed the Assembly Committee on Appropriations on Friday, May 30, 1997.

SUBJECT: ERAF Update

Meetings are continuing, as part of the budget process, on the issue of partial restoration of revenues lost to ERAF. As you know, the statewide restoration figure currently proposed is \$100 million. Although other proposals have ranged as high as \$280 million, most agree that prudence would suggest planning based upon the \$100 million.

An obvious issue is the allocation of the \$100 million figure, between counties, cities, and special districts. Related to the allocation question is adjusting to a "net" figure for governments receiving Proposition 172 sales tax revenues. Although at least two proposals in this area are being discussed, the figure most commonly discussed is a net figure of 14% to 15% of the \$100 million restoration pot for special districts.

At this point, nothing is resolved definitively, including the \$100 million figure and the allocation between levels of government. Also being discussed is whether this year's action should be part of more structural reforms of ERAF. In general, the administration does not seem supportive of capping growth in ERAF.

Also to be resolved are the mechanics of allocating the money back to districts. Presumably the ultimate language will require each county to report on ERAF losses. as percentages, by each district within the county. This in turn will determine the percentage of the special district share to go back to each county. Since there were various anomalies in how counties calculated district losses, this language will have to be monitored closely.

We will report back when more information is available.

Additionally, they believe that the members of the Budget Conference Committee need to hear from every city, county and special distirct in their legislative districts.

SUBJECT: Senate Bill 712 (Haynes)

Dear President and Members of the Board:

As Mike Gotch indicated at the recent CSDA Governmental Affairs Day in Sacramento, the Goleta Sanitary District is sponsoring Senate Bill 712 to correct inconsistencies in the procedures utilized by the Local Agency Formation Commissions (LAFCOs) to reorganize special districts. The bill is currently being supported by CASA, CSDA and a number of special districts throughout the state. The only opposition to the bill is from CALAFCO.

We are writing to ask for your support in the passage of SB 712. Enclosed is a sample letter which can be used by your agency as a model in preparing a letter to your local Assembly Members. Please make any revisions which you deem appropriate and send the letter to your Assembly Members on your District's stationery.

Our District's interest in this issue arises from a situation we recently faced in Santa Barbara County where a neighboring district sought to dissolve and simultaneously annex its territory to our District. We were surprised to learn that existing law allows this type of reorganization to occur without any opportunity for our Board or the voters of our District to approve or disapprove the proposal. We were also surprised to learn that, because of a recently enacted provision of law under the Gotch Bill (Government Code Section 56839.1), even if the proposal had been structured as a "consolidation" rather than as a dissolution and annexation, our voters could still be denied the right to vote on the issue.

What we have learned is that existing law contains certain "loopholes" which enable LAFCOs to combine two districts into a single agency without involving the voter approval procedures which would normally apply. The availability of these procedures means that all districts are at risk of being reorganized without the opportunity for voter confirmation or approval by their governing boards.

The goal of SB 712 is to close these loopholes and to require that all reorganization proposals which combine two districts are subject to voter approval within each affected district. We believe that the existing inconsistencies in the law actually discourage districts from exploring voluntary consolidations on a proactive basis. This is true because districts will be less likely to enter into discussions with neighboring districts to explore consolidation possibilities if there is a risk that one of the districts could, at any point, initiate an adversarial proposal and force a reorganization of the districts. Fundamentally, we believe that the residents who initially vote to establish a district to provide public services should not be deprived of the opportunity to approve or disapprove a reorganization proposal affecting their district.

SB 712, a copy of which is enclosed for your reference, was recently approved by the Senate and will be submitted to an Assembly committee for consideration in the next week or two. We, therefore, ask that you send your letter of support before June 25, 1997. We sincerely appreciate your assistance on this important matter.

SENATE BILL

No. 712

Introduced by Senator Haynes Senators Haynes and Rainey

February 25, 1997

An act to amend Section 57103 of, to add Section 57093 to, and to repeal Section 56839.1 of, and to add Section 57093 to, the Government Code, relating to local government organization.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SB 712, as amended, Haynes. Local government reorganization.

Existing law, the Cortese-Knox Local Government Reorganization Act of 1985, requires the local agency formation commission of a county to authorize the conducting authority to order the consolidation of districts, dissolution, merger or establishment of a subsidiary district, or reorganization including any of these changes of organization without an election, except as otherwise specified.

This bill would repeal that provision.

The act also provides that in any reorganization where the component changes of organization would not individually require a confirmation election, no confirmation election shall be required to approve the reorganization.

This bill would require the conducting authority to order a change of organization or reorganization subject to voter confirmation by the voters in each affected district for any

proposal for the dissolution of one or more districts and the annexation of all or substantially all of their territory to another district when the conducting authority finds that petitions meeting certain requirements request submission of the proposal to voter confirmation. The bill would also make a conforming change.

Vote: majority. Appropriation: no. Fiscal committee: no. State-mandated local program: no.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

- 1 SECTION 1. Section 56839.1 of the Government 2 Code is repealed.
- 3 SEC. 2. Section 57093 is added to the Government 4 Code, to read:
- 5 57093. (a) Notwithstanding Section 57089, for any 6 proposal for the dissolution of one or more districts and 7 the annexation of all or substantially all of their territory 8 to another district, the conducting authority shall order 9 the change of organization or reorganization subject to 10 confirmation by the voters in each affected district if the 11 conducting authority finds either of the following:
- 12 (1) In the case of inhabited territory, that a petition 13 requesting that the proposal be submitted to 14 confirmation by the voters has been signed by either of 15 the following:

- 23 (2) In the case of a landowner-voter district, that the 24 territory is uninhabited and a petition requesting that the 25 proposal be submitted to confirmation by the voters has 26 been signed by at least 25 percent of the number of 27 landowners within any affected district within the 28 affected territory, owning at least 25 percent of the 29 assessed value of land within the territory of that district.

- (b) The petition shall be filed with the conducting authority within 30 days after the public hearing required pursuant to this chapter has been held. If a petition has been filed, the conducting authority shall approve the proposal subject to confirmation by the voters.
- (c) The voter confirmation requirements set forth in subdivision (a) shall not apply to any proposal initiated by the commission under Section 56375 or where all affected districts have each affected district has consented to the proposal by a resolution adopted by a majority of their 11 respective boards vote of its board of directors.

On behalf of the <u>(your agency's name)</u>, I am writing to ask your support for SB 712. This legislation brings clarity to a confusing section of the Government Code. It provides democracy where non currently exists. It creates an opportunity for voters and property owners to register protest where such protest is currently denied.

Why This Legislation is Needed

In all but one proceeding involving LAFCO, there exists the opportunity for registered voters and property owners to protest an action involving annexation or detachment of territory to a special district or city. A protest provision also exists if a new agency is being formed, or an existing one is being dissolved. However, an interpretation of the Cortese-Knox Act permits LAFCO and the conducting authority to approve the dissolution of a district and the concurrent annexation of that territory to an existing district (when processed as a reorganization, as defined), and deny all voter or property owner protest in the annexing district. In all other proceedings before LAFCO, a 10%-25% protest triggers an election. Only in this case is all protest denied.

What SB 712 Will Do

Current law denies the public the chance to access its own government. SB 712 provides the same protest procedures for reorganizations filed with LAFCO as currently exist for other applications. Under SB 712, a 25% protest will trigger an election in the annexing district. This will remove ambiguity from the Government Code, and restore democracy to all LAFCO actions.

I urge your "AYE" for SB 712.

I. ATTEMPT TO INSTALL INTERNET "FILTERS" IN PUBLIC LIBRARIES FAILS

The front page of the June 1997 publication of the California Library Association features an article entitled, "Filtering the First Amendments for Public Librares: A Look at the Legal Landscape." The article discusses the complex issue of Internet software filters and the compounding issue of speech protected by the constitution and access to information.

CLA's article is timely, as this issue surfaced on the Assembly Floor last Thursday afternoon. Our office had been previously alerted by legislative staff that Assemblyman Peter Frusetta (R-Tres Pinos) would be proposing "hostile" amendments to one or two library measures carried by Democrat authors. Responding to an issue raised by parents in Gilroy, in his district, Frusetta's amendments would create a new article in the Education Code to limit access by minors to harmful matter through electronic communications. Each public library providing Internet service would be required to purchase, install, and maintain a computer software program to prohibit the access to minors to the Internet and on-line sites that contain or make reference to harmful matter, as defined. The amendments would be a mandate and the state would provide no reimbursement for the mandate.

The first bill that was seized for the purpose of attaching the hostile amendments was AB 498 by Assemblyman Wildman (D-Los Angeles), which would fund several joint-use library facility projects between a school district and a city or county public library. When the bill was taken up on the floor, Assemblyman Frusetta introduced his amendments, which were immediately tabled by the Democrats. However, when Assemblyman Wildman took his bill up for consideration moments later, Assemblyman Louis Caldera (D-Los Angeles) asked Wildman if he would be amenable to taking an amendment similar to the one proposed by Assemblyman Frusetta. Said Wildman, "The amendments offered may be very good indeed. I will work with Mr. Caldera and anyone else to try to craft amendments of this kind...! wish the amendments had come to me sooner." AB 498, without the Frusetta amendments, passed from the Assembly Floor on a vote of 56-14.

Shortly thereafter, AB 862 by Assemblywoman Denise Moreno Ducheny (D-San Diego) was brought before the house, and again Assemblyman Frusetta proposed to attach his hostile amendments to the bill. AB 862 would create the Library Materials Fund, under the State

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Superintendent, to annually apportion to each school district, the sum of \$5 for each unit of ADA, for the purchase of books and materials. Stating that his amendments pertain to a "serious issue," Assemblyman Frusetta introduced the amendments, which were again tabled by the Democrats. When Assemblywoman Ducheny took up her bill she told the house that the "bill isn't the vehicle for Assemblyman Frusetta's amendments. This is about school libraries. Everything purchased will be in accord with curriculum standards." Assemblywoman Ducheny then noted that Assemblyman Campbell has a bill, AB 132, which would require that schools establish a policy for incorporating filters on school Internet sites, which could "deal with Mr. Frusetta's issue." AB 862-Ducheny passed on a vote of 48-25, without the hostile amendments.

II. BUDGET CONFERENCE COMMITTEE BEGINS

This morning the Joint Budget Conference Committee held their first hearing, and announced an ambitious schedule for the week, to begin reconciling the difference between the Senate and Assembly versions of the Budget. The Conferees were finally named last evening, and include: Senator Mike Thompson (Co-Chair), Assemblywoman Denise Moreno Ducheny (Co-Chair), Senator Steve Peace, Senator Cathie Wright, Assemblywoman Martha Escutia, and Assemblyman Gary Miller.

Today, the Budget Conference Committee is holding "Member Request Day." wherein members are invited to address the Committee on issues of importance to their district or to the state. The total number of member requests before the Committee today is 850 - undoubtedly, one of the highest totals for Budget appropriation requests in years.

I. LIBRARY OF CALIFORNIA BILL: TO BE HELD IN COMMITTEE TILL JANUARY

Last week, the Senate Appropriations Committee held in committee SB 409, by Senator Dede Alpert and Assemblyman Mike Sweeney, which would establish the Library of California. Specifically, the bill, which is sponsored by CLA, would establish a major, statewide networking system of resource-sharing, communications and delivery, and preservation of materials for approximately 8,000 of California's multi-type libraries.

You will recall that in early May, SB 409 was heard by the Appropriations Committee and was subsequently sent to the "suspense file." The "suspense file" is a method by which bills having a fiscal impact greater than \$150,000 are sent to later be prioritized by the Senate leadership and committee chairs. The total number of bills on the Senate Appropriations Suspense file was well over 200, with competing interests fighting for Proposition 98 money and the very tight non-98 side of the Budget.

Senator Alpert was present during a portion of the closed discussions of the "suspense file" committee, wherein she was notified that the cost of SB 409 would be too extreme to move it forward in 1997. Thus, even with an attempt to lessen the first year implementation costs of SB 409 down to \$5 million, the bill was still not given priority to move off the suspense file. Senator Alpert encouraged CLA to seek funding in the Governor's Budget for 1998, and attempt to move the bill forward in January. She asked CLA members to "keep up the fight." The CLA Legislative Committee will meet this week to discuss angoing strategy for SB 409.

II. BUDGET CONFERENCE COMMITTEE WILL BEGIN HEARINGS

Due to a backlog of Assembly floor business, the Joint Budget Conference Committee will likely not begin its deliberations to reconcile the differences between the Senate and Assembly versions of the Budget until next week. Currently, the appointees to the Conference Committee have yet to be named.

When the group does convene, they will be voting to move forward with an augmentation to the Public Library Foundation fund in the amount of \$10 million, which CLA was able to obtain in both the Senate and Assembly Education Budget Subcommittees. When coupled with the current amount the Governor is proposing in this year's Budget of \$15,870,000, this would bring the totalfor the PLF to \$25,870,000. CLA is optimistic that the final Budget version to reach the Governor's desk will contain the \$10 million augmentation, but we need your assistance in convincing the Governor to leave the money intact.

IV. ERAF INCREASED TO \$280 MILLION IN ASSEMBLY BUDGET VERSION

Another issue before the Budget Conference Committee in the next few weeks will be that of the Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund (ERAF) and a possible return of a portion of the property tax for cities, counties and special districts. CLA is supporting three bills which would serve as vehicles to the ERAF issue during the Budget process. Specifically, these measures would freeze the current Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund shift amount at the 1996-97 levels, and gradually return property tax revenues to counties and other local governments that are annually transferred to the ERAF.

Last week, the Assembly voted to augment the \$100 million provided by the Governor in the May Revision of his Budget, by an additional \$180 million for a total of \$280 million. This increased amount was overwhelmingly supported by the Assembly. The Senate version of the Budget includes the Governor's \$100 million only. Thus, the Conference Committee could decide to approve the \$100 million, \$280 million, or find a compromise between these two amounts.

BUDGET MOVES TO FLOOR

Tuesday morning the Senate Budget Committee met to accept reports of its subcommittees. All five subcommittee reports were adopted without much discussion.

The Assembly Budget Committee presentations, by contrast, were hotly contested by Assembly Republicans, who claimed they were left out of much of the process. In fact, during the final meeting of the Assembly Budget Subcommittee on Education, the three Republican members walked out in protest. The full Budget Committee meeting lasted more than 5 hours, with Republicans offering a series of amendments, all of which were tabled or defeated.

Today the Senate will take up its version of the Budget and will likely pass it to the Assembly as is. The Assembly will take up its Budget tomorrov/ where passage in its current form is doubtful. If the Democratic leadership is unable to obtain enough Republican votes for the fifty four votes needed for passage, the fiscal provisions will be stripped and a skeletal bill will be sent to the Senate on a majority vote. Each House will then reject the other House's Budget, thus paving the way for the six member Budget Conference Committee (not yet appointed), to begin its deliberations next week. Both the Assembly and the Senate Budgets contain \$10 million augmentations to the PLF. At this time we are optimistic that the final budget reaching the Governor's desk will contain the \$10 million augmentation.

However, we are currently assessing yesterday's court ruling which requires the State to repay \$1.3 billion in general funds to PERS, resulting from actions the Legislature and the Governor took to balance the Budget in the 1992-93 Budget years. We will update you next week.

SENATE BUDGET SUBCOMMITTEE VOTES \$4 MILLION FOR PLF - THEN ANOTHER 1

Several weeks ago we reported that the Senate Budget Subcommittee on Education considered the PLF issue and placed \$36 million on the subcommittee "check list" of augmentation requests. Recognizing that the non-Prop 98 side of the Budget was very tight, CLA was pushing for a minimum of \$10 million to return libraries to the 89-90 level - adjusted for inflation, about \$26 million. Behind the scenes, we were told privately that the Senate leadership had allocated no money to that subcommittee for non-Prop 98 general fund expenditures, yet we were told the subcommittee members and staff were well aware of CLA's request and were anxious to find some

The background above will give readers a greater appreciation of the actions Tuesday afternoon by the Senate Subcommittee. During debate on one of the K-12 Education issues, subcommittee members unexpectedly found a modest source of funds for the PLF while discussing a budget issue relating to a donated computer program. Staff noted that the Governor's May Revision of the Budget includes \$4 million of non-Prop 98 (state general funds) for the California Computer Refurbishing Program. Light bulbs went on simultaneously with subcommittee Chairman, Senator O'Connell, who stated "Here's \$4 million for the libraries - do I hear a motion?", and Senator Cathie Wright, who instantly made the motion to shift the \$4 million from the Computer Refurbishing Program to the PLF. Senators' O'Connell, Wright, and Schiff voted in support of the mation

Several times throughout the seven-hour hearing, questions arose as to whether other small pots of money could be used to fund public libraries. Unfortunately, the answer was "No" on the Prop 98 fund

The Subcommittee met again last night to discuss Higher Education issues. Again, searching for any source of funds, the committee added another \$6 million to the PLF, bringing the total to \$10

II. ASSEMBLY SUBCOMMITTEE EXPECTED TO ADD \$10 MILLION

The Assembly Budget Subcommittee on Education will consider the PLF issue tonight as the committee closes out its remaining "open items." Key legislators have informed us that the subcommittee will likely augment the PLF budget by \$10 million.

Next Tuesday, the Full Budget Committees in both the Senate and the Assembly will vote to accept the actions of their subcommittees.

Placentia Library Literacy Services provides free and confidential basic literacy instruction to adults in the Placentia/Yorba Linda area. The students are both native English speakers needing help with basic reading and writing skills and speakers of other languages seeking to master spoken English. All instruction is centered on the goals and needs of the individual student. Students work individually and in small groups with volunteer tutors who complete a 15 hour tutor training course. Adult learners are pre-tested using the CASAS Adult Life Skills Reading test. Learner goals and progress are determined through the use of the California Adult Learner Progress Evaluation Process (CALPEP) developed for the California State Library's California Literacy Campaign, and the use of CASAS post-testing. Library budget constraints have necessitated a reduction in staffing from two part-time literacy coordinators to one part-time literacy coordinator. This reduction has impacted the size of the program this year.

In the 17 years the Library has supported the literacy program, some learners have continued to meet with tutors for as much as six years. Others have stayed with the program for a shorter time but have gone on to take classes at the community college. At any one time, 55 to 65 volunteer tutors are working with 70 to 80 students.

When a tutor and student begin working together, they complete the California Adult Learner Progress Evaluation Process (CALPEP) form. The CALPEP focuses on the student's reading and writing practices and goals. The goals identified in the CALPEP are what the student and tutor focus on in their tutoring sessions. The areas covered in the CALPEP include all four of the primary roles for adults. Each student and tutor pair completes the CALPEP when they begin working together and each June and December for as long as they continue to work together.

In the 17 years the Library has supported the literacy program, some learners have continued to meet with tutors for as much as six years. Others have stayed with the program for a shorter time but have gone on to take classes at the community college. Tutoring schedules can be flexible enabling learners with changing work schedules to meet with their tutors at different times each week if necessary. Learners and tutors can be rematched as necessary to provide the best learning environment. Tutoring areas in the library provide tutors and learners with a place to meet where resources and staff support are readily available. Progress is documented through the use of the California Adult Learner Progress Evaluation Process (CALPEP) which is completed twice a year for each learner.

I discussed the proposed change with the staff and everyone indicated that they either don't have a preference or that they strongly prefer the Thursday evening.

The staff also agreed that they would like to have a catered dinner in the Library Meeting Room rather than going to a restaurant. I agreed to investigate a vendor I met an en event last year who does private parties with barbecued ribs and chicken.

BACKGROUND:

The State Library of California has issued a clarification of the confidentiality of library registration files as defined in the Public Records Act, Government Code Title 1, Division 7, Chapter 3.5 Section 6267.

This requirement means that the District cannot make the name/address information in its patron database available to the Friends, Foundation or any other group or individual without a court order.

This leave the plans for a general fundraising appeal with two options:

- 1. Distribute the appeal from the Foundation to carrier route (Resident/Patron form of address) or a purchased/rented mailing list
- 2. Distribute the appeal from the Library Board requesting that cardholders support the Adopt-A-Book program sponsored by the Placentia Library Foundation. A legal opinion is being sought to be sure that this option is within the scope of the public records law.

If the appeal is to be made to District cardholders, the database will need to be provided in an electronic format to be useable by the mailing contractor. The cost of the database preparation will be approximately \$900.

5. The Past Efforts that the Library Has Made in Planning, Creating or Working with a Foundation

Placentia Library Foundation was incorporated on September 8, 1994. It received its certification from the California Secretary of State as a California non-profit corporation on March 30, 1995; and its status as a Federal tax-exempt non-profit organization on June 7, 1995. The Foundation's Federal non-profit 501 (c) (3) identification number is 33-0635140.

Placentia Library Foundation was organized in response to Placentia Library District's loss of 50.41% of its property tax allocation when the State of California established the Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund (ERAF) in Fiscal Years 1992-1993 and 1993-1994. Property taxes account for approximately 85% of the District's annual operating budget.

The Foundation's Organizing Committee was careful to coordinate the responsibilities and interests of the Library Board of Trustees and the Friends of Placentia Library into the structure of Placentia Library Foundation. A copy of the document outlining the responsibilities of each organization is attached to this application.

A seven-member Board of Directors manages Placentia Library Foundation. The Library Board of Trustees appoints two members, the Friends of Placentia Library Board of Directors appoints one, and the Foundation Board appoints the others. Foundation By-laws allow a maximum of nineteen board members. The Board meets four times per year but its six operating committees meet on a regular basis. The Library Director serves as the Executive Officer of the Foundation.

The first activity of the Foundation was the development of an annual giving program entitled "Adopt-A-Book." In Fiscal Year 1993-1994 this campaign was conducted under the auspices of the Friends of Placentia Library because the Foundation had not yet completed its organizational process. The Adopt-A-Book program will begin its fourth campaign in July 1997. During this period the database of donors and supporters has grown from 237 names to slightly over 1,000. New applicants for Library District borrower cards are given the option of adding their names to the Foundation database and approximately 60% elect to do so. Since its beginning in 1993 the Adopt-A-Book Fund has spent over \$35,000 purchasing approximately 1,800 new books for Placentia Library.

Placentia Library Foundation did not begin with the receipt of a large bequest or gift. The Board members and Library Director began with a careful and systematic study of the elements of developing and managing a successful non-profit organization by attending National Society of Fund Raising Executives (NSFRE) training seminars and conferences. In addition, the Board President has taken three courses in the Fund Raising Certificate Program at the University of California, Irvine (UCI) and the Library Director has completed seven courses. The UCI program is endorsed and cosponsored by the NSFRE Orange County Chapter. The Library Director is a member and attends the programs of the Los Angeles Chapter of NSFRE and the Planned Giving Round Table of Southern California.

Placentia Library Foundation has initiated discussions with representatives from the Anaheim Library Foundation and the Fullerton Library Foundation about conducting a joint special event with the goal of raising the visibility of the library foundations in North Orange County.

Since 1995 the Friends of Placentia Library have donated the proceeds of its Author's Luncheon to the Adopt-A-Book program. In 1997 two community organizations sponsored their own fundraisers in support of the Library Foundation: Mom's Club of Placentia had a fund raiser at Knowlwood Family Restaurants raising \$540 for the parent education and preschool reading materials; and Placentia Linda Hospital and the City of Placentia made the Foundation one of the beneficiaries of their annual 8K/5K Earth Week Run which will be contributing \$3,000 to the Adopt-A-Book Fund at a public presentation on June 3, 1997.

The Library Director will serve as the manager of this project. The Library Director and the Foundation's Annual Giving Committee will work with the campaign consultant to develop the letter and insert materials.

Two community leaders have agreed to work with this project by serving as advisers to the Direct Mail Campaign and as Honorary Campaign Co-Chairs: The Honorable Norman Z. Eckenrode and Mr. Al Shkoler.

A professional computer database and graphics design consultant, Mr. Shkoler developed the Foundation's donor database in Microsoft Access while serving as a member of the Foundation Board of Directors. Always "on call", Mr. Shkoler has answered countless technical questions for the Library Director and Staff. He also helps the Library Director review automation and direct mail bids.

7a. Outline Plan of Action

Plan of Action

The purpose of the Direct Mail Project is to increase the number of contributors to the Placentia Library Foundation by:

- Sending a Placentia Library Foundation solicitation, which will include a personalized letter, Foundation brochure, business return envelope and bookmark, to the 9,626 "named households" in the City of Placentia which are not in the Placentia Library Foundation database, at a printing and mailing cost of \$2,000 for design and content consulting, and \$5,987 for printing, assembling and postage.
- Sending a Library Board of Trustees solicitation with the same insert contents, on behalf of Placentia Library Foundation, to approximately 3,000 Library cardholders that live outside the District, at a cost of \$1,868 for printing, assembling and postage.

Library cardholders that live outside Placentia Library District must receive their letter from the Library Board of Trustees because it is the only organization that has a right to access and use the Library's circulation system database. A California State Library General Counsel Opinion on this issue, dated January 9, 1996, is attached to this grant application.

Individuals who respond to the Direct Mail solicitation will be added to the Foundation's database and will receive future Annual Giving Campaign solicitations and the Foundation's newsletter. They will also be invited to the Annual Donor Reception.

The target response rate for the local "named household" mailing is 2.5%; and the target response rate for the non-resident Library cardholders is 3%. The first \$10,000 received from the Direct Mail solicitation will be placed in a reserve fund to finance next year's Direct Mail campaign. The remaining contributions will be deposited in the Adopt- A-Book Fund. A direct mail solicitation that recovers its costs in its first campaign is considered by professional fundraisers to have performed well.

Qualified direct mail letter and brochure design consultants identified through NSFRE Orange County and Los Angeles County Chapters. "Requests for Quotes" mailed to potential consultants, for up to 20 hours of content and design consulting, with up to 2 revisions each, for both versions of the letter, the brochure and bookmark. Responses due July 9. Annual Giving Campaign Committee develops preliminary themes and content of both versions of the Direct Mail letters and brochure, reviews consultant, printer and mailing house responses and makes recommendation to the Library Board of Trustees.

8. Preparation of a Foundation Plan of Action for 1998

The annual plans of service for Placentia Library Foundation for calendar years 1996 and 1997 addressed the activities for those years only.

In 1997 the Library Board initiated a strategic planning process that involves the Library Board, Friends Board, Foundation Board and Library Staff. Community representatives will participate in various elements of the planning process.

All three boards and the staff will participate in a one-day session to review the state of the Library and the status of each organization. They will also hear presentations on the future of Placentia and of public library services in general. The City of Placentia is contributing the services of its Development Services Director as the project's facilitator.

After the combined session, a series of focus groups will be conducted to discuss various services and issues with representatives from the community and our donors.

After the observations and recommendations from the focus groups have been published, each Board will meet to review and refine its mission statement and develop its own strategic five-year plan.

After each Board completes its work, the entire group will meet again to review and coordinate each of the plans.

A public hearing will give community members another opportunity to participate and make suggestions. After the public hearing, the plans will be adopted and implemented by each Board of Directors.

The completion date for the strategic plan is estimated to be June 1998.

8. Plans for promoting the Foundation to the community

Direct Mail Campaigns

This grant will fund an annual mailing to residents of Placentia Library District who are not in the Foundation database. It will solicit contributions to the Foundation and promote Library services. In as much as possible, after the initial campaign, succeeding campaigns will be funded from the revenues of the previous direct mail campaign. Receipts over and above the cost of providing the next mailing will go to either the Adopt-A-Book Fund or the Book Endowment Fund. Individuals who respond will be added to the Foundation Database and, in future years will be included in the Annual Giving Campaign. Individuals who respond will be listed in *Placentia Library Notations* and invited to the Annual Donor Reception.

Annual Giving Campaigns

An annual letter is sent to donors, volunteers and supporters whose names are in the Foundation database. Letters are customized for the level and frequency of giving. The goal of these letters is to encourage donors to increase their level of support and to share information about Library services. Individuals who respond will be invited to the Annual Donor Reception.

Donor Recognition

Donors are recognized in *Placentia Library Notations*, the quarterly publication of the Foundation, their names are included in a framed poster beside the Circulation Desk, and they are invited to an Annual Donor Reception.

Special Events

The Foundation solicits corporate sponsorships for the Friends of Placentia Library Author's Luncheon each year. This event is held at the local country club and sold out for the first time in 1997. While special events are in the purview of the Friends, the Foundation will be visible at each event.

Mewsletter

Placentia Library Notations contains news about Placentia Library District, the Friends of Placentia Library, and Placentia Library Foundation. It is mailed to everyone in the Foundation database.

Participation in Chamber of Commerce and other Community activities

The Foundation participates in the monthly meeting and mixers of the Placentia Chamber of Commerce and shares a booth at the annual Placentia Business Expo with the Friends of Placentia Library.

Public Speaking

The Foundation conducted an estate planning workshop in 1996, and plans to have an orientation for CPAs, attorneys and financial planners in July 1997.

The Library Director and several of the Foundation Board Members are available to speak to community groups.

Plans for continuation of Foundation activities after the grant period

Placentia Library Foundation has taken a studied and careful approach to its organization and operation. The Foundation Board has initiated programs only when it has been confident that it will be able to proceed with them on an annual basis. The programs initiated thus far have been the Annual Giving Campaign, the Book Endowment Fund, a Major Gifts Campaign, a Planned Giving Program, and a Donor Recognition Program. If funded, the Direct Mail Campaign will add another critical element to a well-balanced program.

Foundation Board members are selected on the basis of the skills that they bring to the Board. They know before they accept an appointment that they are expected to be donors and to recruit donors. The Board has adopted a formal policy for Board Development and Orientation.

The Placentia Library Foundation Board of Directors perceives that its role is ongoing. Even if all of the ERAF money were to be returned to the District, the Book Endowment Fund and other capital campaigns would still need to be developed.

After the establishment of an annual direct mail campaign the next element in the Foundation's development will be a capital campaign for the Book Endowment Fund. Another future element will be seeking grants and other resources outside of Placentia Library District.

BUILDING MAINTENANCE REPORT FOR MONTH OF APRIL

1. Outside Walkways - In order to meet access requirements of the Americans with Disabilities Act, the City of Placentia is assisting the Library by installing concrete walkways from the Library's emergency exits on the northwest side of the Library and on the east side of the Library. These will replace the grass and stepping stones. The City has included the Library work in its bid solicitations for paving work, thereby obtaining the best available price. The cost of upgrading the exit walkways will be \$2,150.00.

Under the Joint Powers Authority, the City will also be installing drainage grates in the patio area in front of the Library entrance to correct the severe drainage problem which creates flooding in rainy weather. This work should be started within two to three months.

The City of Placentia will bill the Library for its share of the cost of these improvements early in Fiscal Year 1997-1998.

- 2. Plumbing Running water problem in toilet in public restroom was repaired.
- 3. Towel Dispensers Paper towel dispensers have been located in public restrooms at a height accessible to patrons in wheelchairs.
- 4. Air Conditioning Regular monthly maintenance was performed.
- 5. Lighting Regular inspection, cleaning and replacement of overhead lighting.

An act to amend Section 41204.1 of the Education Code, and to add Section 97.43 to the Revenue and Taxation Code, relating to local government finance, and declaring the urgency thereof, to take effect immediately.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 1, as amended, Aguiar. Local government finance: property tax revenue allocation: local agency relief.

Existing law requires the county auditor, in each fiscal year, to allocate property tax revenues to local jurisdictions in accordance with specified formulas and procedures, and generally provides requires that each jurisdiction shall be allocated an amount equal to the total of the amount of revenue allocated to that jurisdiction in the prior fiscal year, subject to certain modifications, and that jurisdiction's portion of the annual tax increment, as defined. Existing property tax law modifies these general allocation provisions by requiring, for purposes of determining property tax revenue allocations in each county for the 1992-93 and 1993-94 fiscal years, that the amounts of property tax revenue deemed allocated in the prior fiscal year to the county, cities, and special districts be reduced in accordance with certain formulas. It requires that the revenues not allocated to the county, cities, and special districts as a result of these reductions be transferred to the Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund in that county for allocation to school districts, community college districts, and the county office of education.

This bill would modify these reduction and transfer requirements, for the 1997-98 fiscal year and each fiscal year thereafter, by prohibiting the total amount allocated to a county's Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund pursuant to those requirements from exceeding the total amount allocated to that fund for the 1996-97 fiscal year. This bill would also require, commencing with the 1997-98 fiscal year, that each reduction and transfer amount calculated for a local agency in a county be annually reduced in accordance with an unspecified schedule, and that the revenues not allocated to the county's Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund as a result of these reductions be instead allocated among the local agencies in the county, as provided. By imposing new duties in the annual allocation of ad valorem property tax revenues, this bill would impose a state-mandated local program.

Existing law requires the Director of Finance to make certain adjustments in one of the formulas used in computing the state's obligation under the California Constitution to provide funding for school districts and community college districts so as to ensure that the modifications in property tax revenue allocation requirements that were made by a prior enactment do not have a net fiscal impact on school districts or community college districts, or upon the state's funding obligation to those districts.

This bill would instead apply the adjustment requirement to modifications in property tax revenue allocation requirements that are made by "qualified provisions," and would define "qualified provisions" to include both the prior enactment currently specified by the adjustment requirement and a specified statute proposed to be added by this bill.

The California Constitution requires the state to reimburse local agencies and school districts for certain costs mandated by the state. Statutory provisions establish procedures for making that reimbursement.

This bill would provide that no reimbursement is required by this act for a specified reason.

This bill would declare that it is to take effect immediately as an urgency statute.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Section 41204.1 of the Education Code is amended to read:

41204.1. (a) (1) Pursuant to paragraph (2) of subdivision (b) of Section 41204, the Director of Finance shall annually adjust "the percentage of General Fund revenues appropriated for school districts and community college districts, respectively, in the 1986-87 fiscal year" for purposes of applying paragraph (1) of subdivision (b) of Section 8 of Article XVI of the California Constitution, to reflect those property tax revenue allocation modifications, required by the amendments made to Chapter 6 (commencing with Section 95) of Part 0.5 of Division 1 of the Revenue and Taxation Code by the act adding this section *qualifying provisions, as defined in paragraph (2)*, in a ner that ensures that those modifications will have no net fiscal impact upon the amounts that are otherwise required to be applied by tate for the support of school districts and community college districts pursuant to Section 8 of Article XVI of the California Constitution.

- (2) For purposes of this section, "qualifying provisions" means both of the following:
- (A) The amendments made to Sections 97.2 and 97.3 of the Revenue and Taxation Code by Chapter 1111 of the Statutes of 1996.
- (B) Section 97.43 of the Revenue and Taxation Code.
- (b) It is the intent of the Legislature in enacting the act adding this section to ensure both of the following:
- (1) That the changes required by the act adding this section *qualifying provisions* in the allocations of ad valorem property tax revenues do not have a net fiscal impact upon school districts, as defined in accordance with Section 41302.5, or community college districts.
- (2) That the changes required by the act adding this section *qualifying provisions* in the allocations of ad valorem property tax revenues do not have a net fiscal impact upon the amounts of revenue otherwise required to be applied by the state for the support of school districts and community college districts pursuant to Section 8 of Article XVI of the California Constitution.
- SEC. 2. Section 97.43 is added to the Revenue and Taxation Code, to read:
- 97.43. (a) Notwithstanding any other provision of this article, for purposes of ad valorem property tax revenue allocations for the 1997-98 fiscal year and in each fiscal year thereafter, the auditor shall comply with both of the following requirements:
- (1) The auditor shall not allocate to the county's Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund a total amount of ad valorem property tax revenue that exceeds the total amount of ad valorem property tax revenue that was allocated to the county's Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund in the 1996-97 fiscal year.
- A) The auditor shall allocate to the county's Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund only that percentage specified in subparagraph of each amount of ad valorem property tax revenue that is required to be allocated to that fund rather than a local agency as a result of the total reductions calculated for that local agency pursuant to Sections 97.2 and 97.3.
- (B) For purposes of subparagraph (A), the allocation percentages are as follows:

(b) In the 1997-98 fiscal year and each fiscal year thereafter, any amount of ad valorem property tax revenue that is not allocated to a

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county's Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund as a result of any limit or reduction established in subdivision (a) shall instead be allocated among the local agencies in the county in accordance with each local agency's proportionate share of the total amount of ad valorem property tax revenues that would be required to be allocated to the county's Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund in the absence of this section.

SEC. 2.

SEC. 3. No reimbursement is required by this act pursuant to Section 6 of Article XIIIB of the California Constitution because this act provides for offsetting savings to local agencies or school districts that result in no net costs to the local agencies or school districts, within the meaning of Section 17556 of the Government Code.

Notwithstanding Section 17580 of the Government Code, unless otherwise specified, the provisions of this act shall become operative on the same date that the act takes effect pursuant to the California Constitution.

SEC. 3.

SEC. 4. This act is an urgency statute necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, or safety within the meaning of Article IV of the Constitution and shall go into immediate effect. The facts constituting the necessity are:

In order to provide as soon as possible that measure of fiscal relief that will allow local agencies to begin to restore an adequate level of essential public services, it is necessary that this act take effect immediately.

An act to amend Section 18025 of the Education Code, relating to libraries.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

AB 345, as amended, Granlund, Libraries.

Existing law requires that the state allocation for a library's foundation program be equal to 10% of that program and requires the proportional reduction of the state allocation to a library for its foundation program if local revenues total less than 90% of the cost of the foundation program.

This bill would no longer require the method of allocation to be changed to a simple per capita allocation based on the population served by each public library if in any fiscal year the amount appropriated to the Public Library Fund reaches a certain amount proportional reduction of the state allocation to a library for its foundation program if specified requirements in funding are met. This bill would state that the intent of this change is to provide the state's share of the cost of the foundation program to each library based only on its population served, as certified by the State Librarian, and to make this change without harm to any library currently receiving an unreduced share of the state's cost of the foundation program.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Section 18025 of the Education Code is amended to read:

- 18025. (a) For the 1982-83 fiscal year and each fiscal year thereafter, the State Librarian shall determine the amount to which each public library is entitled for support of the library during the fiscal year. The amount shall be equal to 10 percent of the cost of the foundation program as determined pursuant to Section 18022.
- (b) If, in any fiscal year, the amount appropriated to the Public Library Fund is nineteen million forty-three thousand dollars (\$19,043,000) or more, the method of allocation shall be changed to a simple per capita allocation based on the population served by each public library as certified by the State Librarian. Until the state's budgetary appropriation reaches this level, the allocation method used in the 1996-97 fiscal year shall remain in effect. It is the intent of this subdivision to change to a more equitable allocation formula and that no library shall be harmed by this change.
- (b) If local revenues appropriated for a public library for the 1982-83 fiscal year and each fiscal year thereafter, including tax revenues made available under Chapter 282 of the Statutes of 1979, total less than 90 percent of the cost of the foundation program as determined pursuant to Section 18022, the state allocation for that fiscal year shall be reduced proportionately. A proportional reduction in the state allocation as described in this subdivision shall not be made, however, commencing with the 1997-98 fiscal year and each fiscal year thereafter, if the amount appropriated to the Public Library Fund for that fiscal year is equal to or greater than the amount necessary to fund each public library in the amount it received for the prior fiscal year. After the first fiscal year in which the proportional reduction is not made, no further reductions based on this subdivision shall be made in any future fiscal year. It is the intent of this subdivision to provide the state's share of the cost of the foundation program to each library based only on its population served, as certified by the State Librarian, and to make this change without harm to any library currently receiving an unreduced share of the state's cost of the foundation program.
- (c) If local revenues appropriated for a public library for the 1982-83 fiscal year and each fiscal year thereafter, including tax revenues available under the provisions of Chapter 282 of the Statutes of 1979, total more than 90 percent of the cost of the foundation program as determined pursuant to Section 18022, the state allocation for that fiscal year shall remain at 10 percent of the cost of the foundation program as determined pursuant to Section 18022.
- (d) In order for a public library to receive state funds under this chapter in the 1983-84 fiscal year and any fiscal year thereafter, the total

Agenda Item 23 Page 8 amount of local revenues appropriated for the public library for that fiscal year, including tax revenues made available under Chapter 282 of the Statutes of 1979 and other revenues deemed to be local revenues according to Section 18023, shall be equal to at least the total amount of local revenues, as defined, appropriated for the public library in the previous fiscal year. State funds provided under this chapter shall supplement, but not supplant, local revenues appropriated for the public library.

- (e) (1) Notwithstanding subdivision (d), or any other provision of law, in the 1993-94 fiscal year, any city, county, district, or city and county, that reduces local revenues appropriated for the public library for the 1993-94 fiscal year shall continue to receive state funds appropriated under this chapter for the 1993-94 fiscal year only, provided that the amount of the reduction to the appropriation to that public library for the 1993-94 fiscal year is no more than 20 percent of the 1992-93 fiscal year appropriation made to that public library as certified by the fiscal officer of the public library and transmitted to the State Librarian pursuant to Section 18023.
- (2) Commencing with the 1993-94 fiscal year, and each fiscal year thereafter, any city, county, district, or city and county may request from the State Librarian a waiver of the requirements of subdivision (d) or of paragraph (1) by demonstrating that the percentage of the reduction in local revenues appropriated for the public library is no greater than the percentage of the reduction of local revenues received by the city, county, district, or city and county operating the public library as a result of changes made to Chapter 6 (commencing with Section 95) of Part 0.5 of the Revenue and Taxation Code by statutes enacted during or after the 1991-92 Regular Session having the effect of shifting property tax revenues from cities, counties, special districts, and redevelopment agencies to school districts and community colleges. Requests for the waiver and the substantiating documentation shall be submitted to the State Librarian along with the annual report of appropriation required by Section 18023 or any other report of appropriations applying to public libraries required by any other provision of law.
- (f) If the state allocations computed pursuant to this section exceed the total amount of funds appropriated for such purposes *purposes of this section* in any fiscal year, the State Librarian shall adjust on a pro rata basis public library allocations prescribed by this section so that the total amount in each fiscal year does not exceed this amount.

An act to add Chapter 4.5 (commencing with Section 18800) to Part 11 of the Education Code, relating to libraries.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SB 409, as amended, Alpert. Libraries.

Existing law, the California Library Services Act (act), establishes the California Library Services Board and provides that its duties include, among other things, adopting rules, regulations, and general policies relating to the implementation of the act. The State Librarian is the chief executive officer of the board and administers the act. Under the act, a library system, constituted as specified, receives an annual allowance for the improvement and maintenance of coordinated reference service support to the members of the system. A library system, any public library, or any combination of public libraries is authorized to apply for funds for special services programs, as defined. Each member library of a system is reimbursed for interlibrary loans between member libraries of the system, as specified. Each library m is required to apply for funds for intrasystem communications and delivery and for planning, coordination, and evaluation of all systemwide services. Each system is required to establish an administrative council and an advisory board, each with specified duties. Under the act, the California Library Services Board is authorized to establish and administer state reference centers responsible for answering reference requests that cannot be met by systems and libraries authorized under the act.

This bill would revise and recast the act by enacting the Library of California Act under which services would be augmented and regional networks established. The bill would provide for a transition period from the California Library Services Act services and funding to the Library of California Act services and funding.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF CALIFORNIA DO ENACT AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1. Chapter 4.5 (commencing with Section 18800) is added to Part 11 of the Education Code, to read:

CHAPTER 4.5. LIBRARY OF CALIFORNIA ACT

Article 1. General Provisions

18800. This chapter shall be known as the Library of California Act.

18801. (a) The Legislature finds all of the following:

- (1) Our economy is information-based. Because libraries are information providers, they have a primary responsibility for the collection, organization, and dissemination of information supporting the economic development of California.
- (2) Resource sharing, cooperation, and collaboration among all California libraries of all types creates a whole that is greater than the sum parts. Each library can serve as a gateway to the resources and services of every other California library.
- (3) The state's economic and democratic vitality depends upon the education of all Californians and their equitable access to information in an effective, timely fashion. Public and private partnerships enhance information access and delivery.

- (4) Access to information is increasingly technology-based. Technology is vital to the libraries serving Californians. The sharing of resources and services among libraries is most cost-effective when appropriate technology is utilized effectively.
- (5) Our multicultural and complex society creates needs for materials, information, and services that go beyond the ability of any one library or any one type of library to provide.
- (6) The academic library is a primary source of curriculum-related educational and research information for higher education.
- (7) The public library is a primary source of information, enrichment, and lifelong learning for persons of any age, location, or economic circumstance.
- (8) The school library is a primary source of curriculum-related resources and instructional reading materials in elementary and secondary schools.
- (9) The special library is a primary source of information and research resources related to its specific mission or the purpose of its parent organization which may be a corporation, hospital, legal organization or other institution.
- (10) No single library is able to meet all the diverse needs of all of its primary clientele, including people with disabilities, nonEnglish non-English-speaking and limited-English-speaking persons, those who are confined to home or an institution, those who are geographically isolated, and those who are economically disadvantaged. Highly specialized information needs often surpass the resources of any single library in the state.
- (11) The effective sharing of resources and services among the libraries of California requires a structure and an ongoing commitment by the state to compensate libraries for services provided to Californians other than their primary clientele.
- (b) The Legislature therefore finds and declares the following:
- (1) It is in the interest of the people of the state to ensure that all Californians have free and convenient access to all library resources and services that could provide essential information and enrich their lives.
- (2) To respond fully and successfully to these information needs and to the diversity of California's population, libraries of all types and in all parts of the state must be enabled to interact, cooperate, and share resources.
- (c) (1) It is the intent of the Legislature to provide all Californians with the opportunity to obtain from a local library all their needed materials and informational services by facilitating, and supporting through that library, access to the resources of all libraries in the state.
- (2) It is the intent of the Legislature to accomplish this goal by enabling libraries of all types and in all parts of the state to provide their users with the services and resources of all libraries in this state, and by assisting libraries to provide and improve service to the underserved.
- 18802. In adopting this chapter, the Legislature declares that its policy is as follows:
- (a) To reaffirm the principle of local control of the government or administration, or both, of libraries and to affirm that the provisions of this chapter apply only to libraries authorized by their jurisdictions or institutions to apply to participate in the programs authorized by this chapter.
- (b) To enable the users of all libraries, regardless of the library type, size, or geographic location, to benefit from some or all of the services authorized by this chapter.
- (c) To require that no library, as a condition for receiving funds or services under this chapter, acquire, provide access to, or exclude any specific book, periodical, film, recording, data base, picture, or other material or medium, or acquire, provide access to, or exclude any classification of books or other material by author, subject matter, or type.
- (d) To encourage adequate funding of libraries from local or other sources, with state aid under this program to be furnished as a supplement, to to, rather than a replacement for, other funds.
- (e) To ensure that the necessary technological infrastructure is provided.
- (f) To ensure library service to the underserved of all ages.
- (g) To encourage and enable the sharing of resources among libraries of all types.
- (h) To reimburse equitably any participating library for services it provides to Californians other than its primary clientele.
- (i) To assure that no existing library service programs, funded at the local or state level, are diminished as a result of the resource-sharing

authorized by this chapter.

Article 2. Definitions

18810. As used in this chapter, unless the context otherwise indicates or unless specific exception is made, the following definitions apply:

Academic library" means a library established and maintained by a college or university or other postsecondary institution to meet the equcational needs of its students, faculty, staff, and others by agreement.

- (b) "Act" means the Library of California Act.
- (c) "Direct loan" means the lending of a book or other item, or furnishing a copy directly to a borrower, in person or through electronic means.
- (d) "Document delivery" means the transmission, in response to a request, of information from one library to another, in either a physical or digital format.
- (e) "Electronic direct access" means the provision of electronic borrowing, or electronic document delivery services directly to library users, or both.
- (f) "Information agencies" means institutions that provide or preserve, or both, information resources, such as archives, historical societies, libraries, and museums.
- (g) "Institution" means a business or corporation, college, correctional facility, education agency, governmental agency, hospital, not-for-profit organization, professional association, school district, or other organized group that is authorized by law and that operates one or more libraries. These libraries would be academic, school, or special libraries located in California. For the purposes of this act, if an institution is a member of a regional library network and a library of that institution decides to participate in a regional library network and meets the eligibility standards, but is located within the geographic boundaries of a network that is different from the network within which the institution is located, that library shall be a participating library in the regional network within which it is located.
- (h) "Interlibrary loan" means the lending or providing of a book or other item, or furnishing a copy, from one library to another library that is under a different jurisdictional or institutional administration as the result of a request for the item from its primary clientele.
- nterlibrary reference" means the providing of information by one library or reference center to another library or reference center that 1s under a different jurisdictional or institutional administration as the result of a request from its primary clientele for information which that is beyond that library's mission and resources.
- (j) "Library user" means a Californian who is part of the primary clientele of a library but does not work for that library.
- (k) "Network region" means a geographic subdivision of California within which libraries organize under this act for the purpose of resource sharing and mutual cooperation. Boundaries of network regions are determined on the basis of the following criteria: public library jurisdictional boundaries; commonality with boundaries of educational institutions; recognition of current transportation, marketing, and communication patterns; location of and access to library resources; and population.
- (l) "Participating library" means the libraries of a public library jurisdiction that is a member of a regional library network or a library of an institution that is a member of a regional library network if that library decides to participate in a regional library network and meets the eligibility standards set forth in Section 18830.
- (m) "Patron referral" means the accepted procedure among libraries by which onsite services are made available in an appropriate format to people who would otherwise not be able to utilize them.
- (n) "Preservation" means the prevention or delay of deterioration of, and damage to, archival and library materials through the appropriate environmental controls or treatment, or both. For the purposes of this chapter, preservation encompasses conservation, digitization, and duplication of endangered materials in a different format.
- (o) "Primary clientele" means the people for whom the library has been established to provide services. It includes people served by different outlets of its jurisdiction or institution. A person may be a member of the primary clientele of more than one type of library.
- (p) "Public library" means a library, or two or more libraries, operated by a single public jurisdiction to meet the needs of its primary clientele and others by agreement.
- Public library jurisdiction" means a county, city and county, city or any district that is authorized by law to provide public library services and that operates a public library.
- (r) "Regional library council" means the administrative body over each regional library network, on which all members are represented.

- (s) "Regional library network" means a not-for-profit, cooperative organization established by the Library of California Board composed of libraries within the public library jurisdictions or institutions that choose to become members and agree to share resources and services with, or to provide resources and services to, or both, other members of the regional library network.
- (t) "Resources" are library materials that include, but are not limited to, print, nonprint materials and microformats; network resources such as software, hardware, and equipment; electronic and magnetic records; data bases; communication technology; facilities; and human expertise.
- (u) "School library" means a library that is established to support the curriculum-related research and instructional reading needs of pupils and teachers and provides the collections, related equipment, and instructional services of a staff for an elementary or secondary school.
- (v) "Special library" means a library that is maintained by a parent organization to serve a specialized clientele; or an independent library that may provide specialized materials or services, or both, in a specific subject to the public, a segment of the public, or other libraries. It is maintained by an association, business or corporation, government agency, research institution, learned society, not-for-profit organization, professional association, museum, industrial enterprise, chamber of commerce, or other organized group and is characterized by its depth of subject coverage.
- (w) "Statewide resource library group" means those libraries in California that have the most comprehensive or specialized resources, or both, in topics needed by people statewide or regionally and that agree to provide access to their resources to all members of all regional library networks.
- (x) "State board" means the Library of California Board.
- (y) "Types of libraries" includes academic, public, school, and special libraries.
- (z) "Underserved" means any population segment with service needs not adequately met by traditional library service patterns; including, but not limited to: children, disabled, economically displaced, ethnic and culturally diverse populations, geographically isolated, illiterate, institutionalized, non-English speaking, and young adults.

Article 3. Administration

- 18820. (a) There is hereby established in the state government the Library of California Board. The state board shall consist of 13 members.
- (b) It is the intent of the Legislature that members of the state board be broadly representative of the people served by libraries statewide and that members reflect the cultural traditions of California's people and the diverse geographic areas of the state.
- (c) The Governor shall appoint nine members to the state board. The Governor shall appoint two members to represent academic libraries, two members to represent public libraries, two members to represent school libraries, and two members to represent special libraries. At the time of their appointment and throughout their tenure, these eight members must work for, or be part of, or be associated with, the governance structure of the type of library they represent, and that library must be a member of a regional library network. The Governor shall also appoint one member representing the general public.
- (d) The Senate Rules Committee shall appoint two members representing the general public. The Speaker of the Assembly shall also appoint two members representing the general public.
- (e) The initial members of the state board shall be those persons serving on the California Library Services Board at the time of the enactment of this chapter. As new members are appointed, the composition of the board shall reflect the provisions of this section. The terms of office of members of the state board is four years or the remainder of the term for a position filled after a vacancy. No individual shall serve for more than two consecutive four-year terms.
- (f) The concurrence of seven members of the state board is necessary for the validity of any of its acts.
- (g) Members of the state board shall serve without pay. They shall receive their actual and necessary traveling expenses while conducting official business.
- 18821. The state board shall adopt rules, regulations, and general policies for the implementation of this chapter and, consistent with this chapter, shall have the following powers and duties:
- (a) To direct the State Librarian in the administration of this chapter.
- (b) To review for its approval all proposals submitted under this chapter.
- (c) To submit budget proposals as part of the annual budget of the State Library.

- (d) To expend the funds appropriated for the purpose of implementing this chapter.
- (e) To require participating libraries, member institutions, public library jurisdictions, and regional library networks to prepare and submit any reports and information necessary to carry out the provisions of this chapter, and to prescribe the form and manner for providing the raports and information.
- (1) To develop formulas for the equitable allocation of reimbursements.
- (g) To administer an appeals process for membership eligibility in a regional library network.
- (h) To work with and support the work of the regional library networks and the statewide resource libraries group.
- (i) To administer the California Library Services Act, California Literacy Campaign, and Families for Literacy program.
- (j) To serve as the State Advisory Council on Libraries on matters related to the federal Library Services and Technology Act.
- 18822. The State Librarian is the chief executive officer of the state board for the purposes of this chapter and shall do all of the following:
- (a) Make reports and recommendations that may be required by the state board.
- (b) Administer and monitor the provisions of this chapter.
- (c) Review all claims to ensure the programmatic and technical compliance with the provisions of this chapter.

Article 4. Eligible Libraries

18830. (a) Libraries in public library jurisdictions that are members of a regional library network and libraries in institutions that are members of a regional library network are eligible to receive services under this chapter and to become participating libraries. The board of governance or the appropriate administrative authority for each academic library, public library, school library, and special library that decides to join a regional library network shall take official action to approve network membership. That local governing agency or appropriate administrative authority shall agree not to reduce funding for library services as a result of network participation. Each public library jurisdiction, school district, university or college, and institution or corporation, or agency or branch thereof, may become a iber of a regional library network. A public library jurisdiction not eligible under the California Library Services Act on the effective

aure of this section, and an institution, shall have at least one library that meets the following eligibility standards:

- (1) A written explicit mission statement and service objectives.
- (2) A fixed location in California.
- (3) Established hours of service.
- (4) An organized collection of information and materials accessible for use by its primary clientele.
- (5) Designated, onsite, paid staff for library services. At least one staff person shall have a master's degree in library or information science or a California library media teacher credential issued by the Commission on Teacher Credentialing;, but equivalent graduate education or demonstrated professional experience may be substituted for this requirement. The eligibility determination will be made by the regional library network.
- (6) An establishment funding base.
- (b) Participating libraries must agree to all of the following:
- (1) To share resources and services with other members of the regional library network.
- (2) To provide resources and services for other members of the regional library network.
- (3) To meet the minimum resource-sharing performance standards of the regional library network.
- (c) Participating libraries may not obtain services provided under this act on behalf of nonparticipating libraries. No membership fees or ice fees may be assessed for access to state-funded services. Regional library networks may provide their members with increased oranced services for a fee, at the option of each member.
- (d) Public libraries eligible under the California Library Services Act on the effective date of this section are deemed to meet the eligibility standards in subdivision (a), and shall not be required to certify that they meet these eligibility standards.

- 18831. (a) Each participating library shall receive state-supported services from a single regional library network. Geographical boundaries determine which regional library network a public library jurisdiction or institution, and its participating libraries, may join; exceptions may be made by the state board. Realignment of membership from one regional library network to another is permissible. A public library jurisdiction or an institution that is a member of a regional library network may also subscribe to services offered by other regional library networks.
- (b) Eligible libraries may receive state funds for services delivered under this chapter.

Article 5. Regional Library Network Services

- 18840. To be eligible for funds under this article, a regional library network shall submit a plan to the state board for its approval. The plan shall include all of the following:
- (a) An organizational structure.
- (b) Bylaws.
- (c) Membership policies, assuring that all eligible libraries in eligible public library jurisdictions and in eligible institutions in the geographic region will be enabled to participate.
- (d) A long-range plan, including the transition of services from the California Library Services Act to the Library of California Act, the criteria and functions for regional resource libraries, and the linkages with information agencies in the region.
- (e) The endorsement of the charter members. The charter members shall include more than one type of library.
- (f) Geographical contiguity.
- 18841. (a) Each regional library network shall establish a regional library council. Every eligible public library jurisdiction is designated as a member of the regional library network and its library director or designee is its representative on the regional network council. Every eligible institution of which one or more libraries is a participating library, as described in Section 18830, is designated as a member of the regional library network and shall designate its representative on the regional network council from among the directors of those participating libraries and its chief library coordinator. In addition, the regional library council shall include one library user from each type of member library. There shall be one vote per person on the regional network council. Duties of the regional network council include overall administrative responsibility for the network, adopting an annual plan of service, assuring the appropriate expenditure of funds, and submitting annual budget proposals to the state board for implementation of the provisions of this article.
- (b) Each regional network council shall elect from its membership a representative board to carry out its policies. The board shall include at least one representative from each type of library elected by representatives of that type of library and at least one library user. There shall be one vote per person on the representative board.
- (c) Administration and management of the regional library network shall provide the vision and leadership necessary to perform the functions and deliver the services in a timely and satisfactory manner.
- 18842. Each regional library network shall do all of the following:
- (a) Make available a telecommunications system for the transfer of information and communications among its members.
- (b) Provide regional communications based upon the most effective methods of exchanging information among its members.
- (c) Provide intraregional delivery service based upon the most cost-effective methods for moving materials among its members.
- (d) Provide online access to the information files, resources, and bibliographic records of its members which may be accessed regionally and statewide.
- 18843. Any eligible library or combination of eligible libraries may receive funds from a regional library network for the provision of public access to the range of library resources and services available statewide through electronic online resources.
- 18844. Each eligible library may participate in one or more of the access services components through its regional library network and be reimbursed fully for its service to Californians who do not constitute its primary clientele. Reimbursement rates shall be equitable. The state board shall develop the reimbursement rate formulas. All of the following are access services components:
- (a) Interlibrary loan. Each eligible library shall be reimbursed fully to cover the handling costs of each interlibrary loan among members of the regional library networks. Participants shall provide, as well as utilize, interlibrary loan services and may not charge handling fees to other members.

- (b) Patron referral and onsite services. Each eligible library shall be reimbursed fully for services and resources that are provided to Californians who would otherwise be ineligible for services from that public library jurisdiction or that institution. These persons must be referred by another member of a regional library network. Information agencies that are not libraries may also participate in this component and be reimbursed if they are the only source for the information.
- Direct loan. Each eligible library may provide access to Californians by providing direct borrowing privileges to the primary clientele or other libraries. They shall be reimbursed fully for the handling costs of all loans according to an allocation formula. Each public library jurisdiction that is a member of a regional library network shall provide direct borrowing privileges to all residents of the area served by the regional library network.
- (d) Electronic direct access. Each eligible library may provide access to Californians by providing electronic borrowing privileges or electronic document delivery privileges, or both, to the primary clientele of other participating libraries. They shall be reimbursed fully for the handling costs of each transaction. Members participating in the electronic direct access component shall provide and utilize electronic direct access services and may not charge handling fees for this service to other members participating in this program or to their primary clientele.
- (e) Document delivery. Each eligible library shall be reimbursed fully to cover the costs of document delivery resulting from an interlibrary loan transaction and electronic loan transaction as defined in this section.
- 18845. Each regional library network shall provide opportunities for training and continuing education activities that encourage the most effective use of the resources and services authorized under this chapter, and that respond to the needs of its members in the effective delivery of services.
- 18846. (a) Each regional library network shall provide information and referrals to answer requests that are beyond the capacity or capability of its members by accessing the resources and expertise of other libraries, improving general reference service in participating libraries, and improving reference service to respond to the needs of the underserved populations in the region.
- (b) Any eligible library or combination of eligible libraries or regional library network may receive funds from the state board for information service enhancement within the service area.
- 18847. Each regional library network shall augment the public awareness programs of its members by providing public relations packages to them for customization and dissemination.
- 10848. Any combination of eligible libraries may receive funds from the regional library network for cooperative, coordinated resource development programs of benefit to the local service area and to the region as a whole. Each library participating in this program shall already be capable of meeting the basic, recurring needs of its primary clientele through its locally supported collection. Library resources purchased, in whole or in part, under this program shall be widely accessible to Californians for the useful life of those resources.
- 18849. Any regional library network may apply to the state board for funds for services to the underserved programs on a region-wide basis. Regional library networks may also apply for funds for other region-wide programs, but these programs shall include a component for serving the underserved on a region-wide basis.

Article 6. Statewide Services

- 18850. The state board shall make available all of the following:
- (a) A telecommunications infrastructure to ensure that all participating libraries have equitable access to the resources and services of all other California libraries.
- (b) A statewide communications system between and among regional library networks, statewide resource libraries, information agencies, and all other organizations or institutions participating in the programs authorized by this chapter.
- (c) A statewide delivery system between and among regional library networks, statewide resource libraries, information agencies, and all other organizations or institutions participating in the programs authorized by this chapter.
- 18851. (a) The state board shall promote and support standard bibliographic records and communication protocols in participating libraries to ensure statewide access to their resources.
- (b) The state board shall make available online access to bibliographic records and locations of serial publications held by participating ries and statewide online access to library information files, resources, and bibliographic records statewide, as facilitated by the regional library networks.
- 18852. (a) The state board shall make available a continuing education clearinghouse related to library services and encourage the coordination of activities among the continuing education providers statewide.

- (b) The state board shall provide for training and continuing education opportunities that encourage the most effective use of the resources and services authorized under this chapter.
- 18853. (a) The state board shall facilitate and support access to specialized information expertise and resources statewide to answer information requests generated by its primary clientele that are beyond the capacity or capability of a member institution or public library jurisdiction and its regional library network. The information may be provided by libraries, information agencies, and other regional library networks; and it shall be provided through electronic or physical means. Provision shall be made for information formats specially relevant to culturally diverse populations and persons with disabilities.
- (b) Any eligible library or combination of libraries or regional library networks may receive funds from the state board for information service enhancement within the service area.
- 18854. The state board shall expand public awareness of the value, services, and resources of the participating library of whatever type, emphasizing its ability to serve as a gateway to all other California libraries.
- 18855. (a) The state board shall encourage, promote and support cooperative, coordinated resource development among member institutions and member public library jurisdictions.
- (b) The state board shall make available a clearinghouse to facilitate the voluntary transfer of a participating library's resources to another participating library in response to changes in that library's mission or location.
- (c) Any combination of eligible libraries may receive funds from the state board for cooperative, coordinated resource development programs of benefit to people in their local area and in the state as a whole. Each library participating in this program shall already be capable of meeting the basic, recurring needs of its primary clientele through its locally supported collection. Library resources purchased, in whole or in part, under this program shall be widely accessible to Californians for the useful life of those resources.
- 18856. (a) The state board shall make available a preservation information center to provide preservation information, coordinate preservation activities, and conduct preservation training for participating libraries and information agencies statewide.
- (b) Any eligible library or combination of eligible libraries may receive funds from the state board for the preservation of, and widespread access to, materials that document California's heritage, enhance its educational opportunities and economic future, and portray its cultural diversity. Materials in all formats may be preserved.
- 18857. Any eligible library or combination of eligible libraries may submit proposals to the state board for services to the underserved programs within the service area. Funds may be expended for the development of collections to meet the needs of the underserved, together with the employment or retraining of staff necessary to promote and utilize the collections effectively, and to provide appropriate services to the underserved.
- 18858. Administration and management shall provide the vision and leadership necessary to perform the functions and deliver the services in a timely and satisfactory manner. Statewide coordination includes linkages with national and international library networks and participation in initiatives related to library services and development that cross state and national boundaries.
- 18859. Major resource libraries statewide may participate in these programs, developing protocols whereby their resources may be accessed appropriately by people throughout California. Each library must be a member or a participating library in a regional library network.
- (a) Funds may be allocated to some or all libraries in this group for services delivered and performed under this article and Article 6.
- (b) Collaborative and cooperative projects advancing library services to the people of California may be undertaken and supported by some or all members of this group.

Article 7. State Funding

- 18860. (a) Planning shall occur at the regional level for the development of library service programs responsive to the needs of people within each network region. Some or all of these service programs may be supported by the state.
- (b) It is the intent of the Legislature that the state do all of the following:
- (1) Reimburse all participating libraries for services provided to Californians who do not constitute their primary clientele.
- (2) Support the necessary infrastructure enabling the interlibrary resource-sharing to occur.
- (3) Assure equitable access to the rich resources of its many libraries to all Californians.

Agenda Item 23 Page 17 18861. Funds shall be allocated to member institutions and member public library jurisdictions in accordance with reimbursement formulas adopted by the state board and with criteria adopted by the state board to carry out the provisions of this chapter.

18862. (a) During the first three years of operation, each regional library network shall receive a basic funding allocation for service delivery as it establishes services and expands its membership.

.fter its three-year establishment period, each regional library network shall receive an appropriation that contains a base component that is a uniform statewide minimum allocation, a component related to demographic variables including population, geography, population demographics and cost of living, and a component related to the amount of service delivered in the preceding fiscal year.

18863. Funds appropriated for the support of statewide services shall be allocated to those services in accordance with criteria adopted by the state board to carry out the provisions of this chapter.

18864. There shall be a transition period from California Library Services Act services and funding to the Library of California Act services and funding.

18865. Funding provided under this chapter shall support the costs of administering its provisions and delivering its services.

Article 8. Transition

- 18870. (a) The transition period from the California Library Services Act to the Library of California Act shall begin on the effective date of this chapter.
- (b) As new program elements and state funds are phased in to implement this chapter, they will replace and augment the corresponding program elements and funds in the California Library Services Act.
- (c) It is the intent of the Legislature that, when all program elements of the California Library Services Act have been replaced and augmented under the provisions of this chapter, the California Library Services Act will be repealed unless a subsequent act of the Legislature continues it in full force and effect.

I. ASSEMBLY BUDGET SUBCOMMITTEE CONSIDERS \$10 MILLION MORE FOR PLF

Last week, the Assembly Budget Subcommittee Number 2 on Education Finance met to discuss various proposals contained in the Governor's Budget. Late in the evening, the subcommittee took up the category of the State Library Budget. After a very brief discussion regarding the Library Budget, CLA was allowed to pursue our request for an augmentation to the PLF. Ultimately, Assemblyman Bill Leonard moved that the subcommittee place a \$10 million augmentation to the PLF on the "checklist." If approved, this would bring the total PLF budget to \$25,870,000 for 1997.

The "checklist" system is often used in the subcommittees in the same manner that the "suspense file" is used in the Appropriations committees. An item that is placed on the "checklist" is given priority consideration later in the deliberations, once the subcommittee has a clearer picture of the fiscal condition of the state as presented in the Governor's May Revision of the Budget. In fact, said subcommittee Chairman, Assemblyman Jack Scott, "We are not going to deal with the augmentations today. The Legislative Analyst's Office needs to look at that first." In several weeks, we will hope that the Assembly subcommittee moves the recommendation from the checklist, and approves it for submission to the full Budget committee.

The Senate Subcommittee Number One on Education Finance will hear the issue of the PLF on Wednesday, May 14.

II. LIBRARY OF CALIFORNIA SET FOR HEARING ON MAY 12

The Library of California bill, SB 409 by Senator Dede Alpert and Assemblyman Mike Sweeney, will be heard in the Senate Appropriations Committee on Monday, May 12. (The time has yet to be announced.) The bill, which is sponsored by CLA would establish a major, statewide networking system of resource-sharing, communications and delivery, and preservation of materials for approximately 8,000 of California's multi-type libraries.

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Since the bill contains a price tag of \$150,000 or more, if SB 409 receives a favorable hearing, the bill will automatically move to the Senate Appropriations "suspense file," where it will become part of the hundreds of bills seeking priority for an appropriation in late May. This next Monday, more than 200 bills are on the calendar for hearing in Senate Appropriations. We expect the calendar to be lengthy on May 12th as well.

Please take a moment today to write the members of the Senate Appropriations Committee and urge their support, if you have not already done so. They are, Senators: Pat Johnston (Chair), Tim Leslie (Vice Chair), Dede Alpert, John Burton, Charles Calderon, Ralph Dills. Ross Johnson, Betty Karnette, Dave Kelley, Barbara Lee, Bruoe McPherson, Richard Mountjoy, John Vasconcellos.

III. AB 345-GRANLUND: DIFFICULT SECOND HEARING FOR PLF BILL

You may recall from the last CLA legislative update, that AB 345-Granlund had received such a difficult hearing in the Assembly Local Government Committee on April 16 that a member requested it be put over for an additional week to attempt to remove the confusion surrounding the bill. The bill, which is sponsored by San Bernardino County, and supported by CLA, would, in future years, distribute PLF funding on a per capita basis if funding reaches a level that holds all libraries harmless. (e.g. If we were successful in obtaining \$10 million in additional PLF funding this year, the first \$3 million would go to help the lowest funded libraries - those below the average - and the remaining \$7 million would be distributed proportionately to all libraries.)

Despite efforts to alleviate members concerns days before the hearing, debate on the bill last Wednesday still lasted over a half an hour. After assurances that the bill would not go into effect unless the PLF could be increased to a set level, and that all libraries would be held harmless or benefit from the distribution, the bill finally moved from committee. AB 345 will now travel to the Assembly Appropriations Committee. The hearing date has not been set.

1. ERAF PRESS CONFERENCE ASKS FOR GOVERNOR'S ASSISTANCE

On Wednesday, the Allies for California's Cities, Counties, and Special Districts, of which CLA is a member, held a press conference to encourage the Governor and the legislature to make the ERAF issue part of the 1997 Budget negotiations. Present at the press conference were Assemblymembers Fred Aguiar (R-Chino) and Mike Sweeney (D-Hayward), the joint authors of two principal ERAF measures. AB 95 and ACA 4. The bills would freeze the current ERAF (Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund) shift amount at 1996-97 levels, and gradually return property tax revenues to counties and other local governments that are annually transferred to the Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund. Senator Bill Craven (R-Oceanside) has authored an identical bill in the Senate, SB 880. Due to illness, Senator Craven was unable to attend the press conference. Flanking Assemblymembers Sweeney and Aguiar were various representatives from cities, counties, and special districts, along with the Allies members.

Many local government representatives made note of the negative impact of the property tax shift on public services. Said one county supervisor, "The libraries, roads, and general maintenance, are really staring to show the wear and tear." Ron Zeise of the Ross Valley Fire Department added, "The libraries in my area are closed in the evenings. They are also closed one day a week. This is a forecast to what is next. Police and fire are next." When one member of the press corps asked Assemblyman Aguiar for his opinion on where the issue of ERAF falls within the overall Budget discussions, along with class size reduction and welfare reform, he stated, "I believe we need to get local governments back to square one and then deal with class size reduction and welfare reform. We need to make cities, counties, and special districts whole before we can deal with these issues."

I. BUDGET SUBCOMMITTEES HEAR REQUESTS FOR FULL FUNDING OF PLF

Yesterday, the Senate Budget Subcommittee on Education Finance considered the State Library Budget. In order to open the PLF issue for discussion, CLA had requested Senator Dede Alpert to submit a "member request" letter to the subcommittee, recommending that the PLF be fully funded, or at a minimum, be funded at an amount similar to last year's action.

Despite heavy lobbying prior to the hearing, and the fact that each subcommittee member received almost 100 letters in support of the full funding request, one member still asked difficult questions. Chairman Jack O'Connell said, "Mr. Dillon, where would you advise us to take this money from the universities, CSU, community colleges, or some other program?" I responded that CLA is fully aware that the non-98 side of the Budget is very tight, but urged the committee to at least increase the PLF to 1989-90 levels, (adjusted for inflation), or approximately \$10-\$12 million. In an action similar to the Assembly, the Senate committee agreed to place the item on the checklist, where it will be prioritized in line with all of the other requests before the Budget committee.

In the Assembly Subcommittee on Education Finance on Tuesday, Assemblyman Brooks Firestone appeared before the committee on "Member Request" day to recommend that the PLF be fully funded in the amount of \$52.86 million. The Committee had also received member request letters from Assemblywoman Figueroa and Senator Alpert on the PLF issue. Firestone told the committee that local communities are making the tax effort to generate the 90%/10% match every year. He noted that the 10% match required by law "really is the state's obligation and we haven't be augmented when asked by one of the subcommittee members why the public libraries should be augmented when some of the university libraries would be sufficient to provide needed services, Firestone stated, "There are kids that can't travel to the university. These are the young kids that don't read yet, who are learning to read. They need the atmosphere of the books, being around the books, and access to the Internet."

Committee Chair Jack Scott told the audience and legislators present that there were 117 member requests on the calendar, and while there would be no action on the proposed items Tuesday, they would record all requests for future consideration.

II. PLF PER CAPITA DISTRIBUTION BILL

Yesterday the Assembly Appropriations Committee heard AB 345 by Assemblyman Granlund which would, in future years, distribute PLF funding on a per capita basis if funding reaches a level that holds all libraries harmless. You will recall from prior CLA correspondence, that AB 345 received two difficult hearings in the Assembly Local Government Committee in April. The bill's

sponsor, San Bernardino County, and CLA have done a significant amount of work to alleviate the legislators' concerns on the bill. The effort appeared to pay off as the members of Assembly Appropriations approved the bill, which will now travel to the Assembly Floor.

III. LIBRARY OF CALIFORNIA BILL WILL AWAIT ITS FATE IN APPROPRIATIONS COMMITTEE

On Monday, the Senate Appropriations Committee heard testimony on SB 409 by Senator Alpert and Assemblyman Sweeney, which would establish a major, statewide networking system of resource-sharing, communications and delivery, and preservation of materials for approximately 8,000 of California's multi-type libraries. The bill, which is sponsored by CLA, was sent to the Senate Appropriations "suspense file." All bills with a fiscal impact of \$150,000 or greater are sent to the "suspense file" where they become part of the hundreds of bills seeking priority for an appropriation in late May. The committee will make a decision regarding the fate of SB 409 in two weeks.

Before SB 409 was sent to suspense, Senate Appropriations Chair, Patrick Johnston stated, "This bill is good in purpose...We'll try our best."

IV. GOVERNOR'S MAY REVISION RELEASED: MONEY FOR SCHOOLS, LITTLE LEFT ON NON-98 SIDE

Yesterday the Governor released his May Revision of the state Budget, which includes \$2.25 billion in new revenue and a reserve of \$580 million. The Governor is providing some relief for local governments in the amount of \$225 million. \$100 million of which represents the growth amount on the ERAF shift. The \$100 million will be available as a one-time appropriation built into the base, and according to Director of Finance, Craig Brown, "should be a budget issue every year." instead of an automatic continuation of the funds.

The Governor noted that of the \$2.25 billion in new revenue, 98% will go to schools, leaving the non-Proposition 98 side of the Budget not as flush. When asked by one member of the media, "Why so much to Proposition 98?", Wilson answered, "It's the law. The growth on the non-98 has been small. The growth on the 98 side has been spectacular. I think it's a good investment." Note: The large percentage of funds going to schools is due to the highly complex Proposition 98 formula, influenced by the interaction of higher than projected enrollment increases, lower population estimates, and lower than projected property tax revenues.

Today in a briefing of the Assembly Budget Committee on the May Revise, Legislative Analyst, Elizabeth Hill reiterated the Governor's point. Said Hill, "Virtually all of new money went to Proposition 98. The fact that any new money goes to non-98 is due to savings in some areas." She added that the remaining non-98 money will more than likely be consumed by the budgeted child care programs and local government fiscal relief. Hill warned that issues such as the maintenance of effort on SSI/SSP and bills pending on the Assembly Floor regarding flood relief, would put additional cost pressures on the reserve and the Budget — making it all the more difficult for CLA to secure additional PLF funding.

Establish a Library Board Officer Selection Policy, Second Reading

BACKGROUND:

At its meeting on April 15, 1997 the Library Board requested that a discussion of the adoption of a Library Board Selection Policy be placed on the May 20, 1997 Agenda.

The item was discussed and continued until the June 24 Meeting. No amendments of the proposed Policy were made at the June 24 Meeting.

Trustee Pappas and Library Director Minter met on May 7th and prepared the following proposals to initiate discussion:

The premise for this proposal is that there is a desire within the Library Board of Trustees for Library leadership to be developed for each of its members, and that the responsibilities of Office be shared in an equitable manner.

- > A non-binding rotation list will be created for the Board positions of President and Secretary.
- > Trustees will not be added to the President's rotation list until the end of their first full year of service.
- > Names will be added to both lists at the bottom of the current list for each office, at the time the name is eligible to be added. If more than one name is being added to the list at a time, the individuals will draw numbers to determine the order of placement on the list.
- > The first list will be established by drawing numbers.
- > Any Trustee may decline to serve in an office without stating a reason. In that case, the position will be offered to the next Trustee on the list. However, if each Trustee has declined the position, when the rotation comes back around to the first Trustee who declined, that Trustee shall be expected to accept the Office unless there are extenuating circumstances.
- > The Office of President will be filled first. After that position is filled the position of Secretary will be filled, with the President being passed over on the list. (The President's position in the Secretary's rotation list will remain the same.)

> This system will be implemented with the Board officer election to be held in December 1997.

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Trustee commitments, apart from the Library Board Meetings, will also be shared to the fullest extent possible. These include, but are not limited to:

- > Independent Special Districts of Orange County (ISDOC) quarterly evening meetings, once a year there is a NOON luncheon meeting.
- ➤ Local Area Formation Commission (LAFCO) Nominating Committee District must be represented by its President or another delegate who has been appointed by formal Resolution of the Board. This body meets only when there is a vacancy for the Special District representatives on LAFCO. These meetings are sometimes held at the same time as ISDOC.
- Orange County Investment Pool (OCIP) Bankruptcy Committee meetings are usually held during the day and are informational in nature. If votes are required they are presented at Board Meetings. This group met frequently during the first two years of the Bankruptcy. If future meetings are called, they will probably deal with the third party litigations (Merrill Lynch, etc.). These meetings are usually held in Irvine or Fountain Valley, and the advance notice is often short. It is at these meetings that we get first hand briefings from the Committee's Attorney (Patrick Shea), and the CPAs.
- > California Special Districts Association (CSDA) Annual Conference and Legislative Day.
- ➤ CSDA Worker's Compensation Authority Board of Directors 4 meetings per year, including one at the CSDA Annual Conference.
- ➤ California Association of Library Trustees and Commissioners (CALTAC/CLA) Spring workshop for all Trustees and an Annual Conference (part of California Library Association Conference).
- ▶ Placentia Chamber of Commerce monthly breakfast meetings, includes time for visiting with community leaders and owners/managers of small businesses and a presentation by a speaker, 7:15 8:30 A.M.
- ➤ Placentia Chamber of Commerce monthly mixers, includes time for visiting with community leaders and owners/managers of small businesses, 5:30 7:00 P.M. The time is very flexible, like an open house, and one can come and go as needed.
- ➤ Placentia Library Foundation Board of Directors 4 Board meetings per year plus active committee assignments. Two Board delegates to the Foundation are elected by the Trustees at the Board's Annual Meeting each December.
- ➤ Friends of Placentia Library Board of Directors 10 Board meetings per year, currently rotated among Trustees.

But all night long, nobody said "shhh."

Across the country, the public library is shaking off its dusty image as a hushed and intimidating place. role in the lives of youngsters.

"It has done wonders," librarian Vernell Madden said. "A lot of the little guys have improved in their academic subjects. Some behavior problems have been countered and they had a good time. . . . This was something really needed in this community."

Like their counterparts in Chicago, librarians in suburban Los Angeles have learned that just as books can open new horizons, new experiences can also lead to books.

More than 120 kids packed the tiny Las Virgenes county libraryLibrary, uses to describe these programs. Workshops on Japanese animation, makeup and even a comic book festival have pulled kids into the city library system.

The May 17 event at the Central Library will include displays of classic and customized cars-including lowriders-as well as bicycles and motorcycles. Making Most of Resources

Such resourcefulness is necessary in light of the budget constraints faced by most municipalities. Some library programs are paid for with funding raised by Friends of the Library groups at each branch. Others are staged by the librarians themselves, using their own talent and skills.

More costly performances and programs are often funded by donations and grants, said Connor of the Los Angeles Public Library.

This year, a "substantial" grant from the Ahmanson Foundation paid for two professional performances at each branch of the Los Angeles Public Library. A gift from United Airlines paid for a third performance, Connor said. A fund-raising effort by the Department of Water and Power helped pay for young adult programs.

Actress Debbie Allen has hosted a massive festival of reading in Los Angeles, reading her favorite stories to a packed audience. The next year, Martin Landau read "Pinocchio." And each year in April, celebrities and politicians read stories at local libraries as part of the Los Angeles library's "Night and Day of a Thousand Stars."

Nationally there's even a campaign endorsed by First Lady Hillary Rodham Clinton encouraging pediatricians to prescribe that mothers read to their children.

The Los Angeles Public Library will kick off its Summer Reading Program in June with L.A. Kids Read, a festival of storytellers, puppeteers, face painting, music, dance groups and free refreshments.

With a 200-seat children's theater and a 60-seat puppet theater, the Central Library has changed from a research-oriented facility to one that is user friendly for kids and their families, Connor said.

"The vision of this department has really changed a lot," Connor said. As a result of all the new programs, "the usage of this department has skyrocketed," she said. At the branches, librarians have found one sure way to appeal to young children: invite them to visit in their pajamas for an evening of stories and related arts and crafts.

"Certainly, I'm not that gorgeous in my pajamas, but the kids seem to

not limited to recent arrivals.

According to a 1991 Gallup study, only 26% of high school dropouts possessed a library card. Only 47% of individuals with incomes under \$20,000 are likely to hold a library card, compared to 73% of those with incomes of \$50.000 or more.

"In the more than 3,000 squ miles that we cover, we have all kinds of communities with huge socioeconomic differences," said Markey of the Los Angeles library.

Aides Reach Out to Community

Librarians are even venturing into the waiting rooms of clinics where low-income, often poorly educated women receive prenatal care.

"We want to motivate the parents to serve as a catalyst for their children," Markey said.

At the Bellflower County Health clinic recently, books were far from the minds of the pregnant women waiting to be examined—until county library aides Rossana Llamas and Esther Martinez began to speak.

With missionary zeal, they explained the importance of reading to children—even in the womb. And they described the programs offered at the library, emphasizing to the mostly Spanish-speaking group that the services are free.

"It's very important that y support your children," Martinez said. "It's very important that you have a library card to be able to select books."

Although the Clifton M. Brakensiek Library was just across the walkway—visible through the glass doors of the clinic—many of the women had never visited, and most did not have a library card.

Before the morning was over, Llamas and Martinez introduced several young mothers to the library, handed out applications for library cards and referred one 23-year-old to a literacy program.

As patients checked in and out at the clinic counter, Llamas read "Salta Ranita, Salta," "Mi Casa," and later, "How Many Bugs in a Box" to children.

Afterward, 8-year-old Schronda Robertson—there with her mother, two brothers and baby sister—decided to take over.

She picked up "Spot's First Words," held it open so her 1-year-old sister Chantel could see, and began.

"Hat. Mirror. Shoe. Table Schronda read, dutifully point out the pictures, before turning the page."

Library to reopen without stench

UPDATE: Exhaust fumes and trash-bin odors were being drawn in through a vent at the Laguna Beach facility.

LAGUNA BEACH — It took a smoke bomb to finally clear the air at the Laguna Beach Library.

The facility, closed since March 24 because of a stench that caused employees to become ill, will reopen Monday now that county officials have determined the source of the mystery stench - an open vent in the basement that was allowing odors into the building.

The investigation, which officials estimate will cost \$40,000-\$50,000, used high-tech tests to locate the origin of the odors including putting video cameras

in the building's pipes.

But it was the not-so-high-tech smoke bomb that uncovered a pathway leading from a 3-by-5 vent in an unused basement room to the rest of the structure.

Orange County Librarian John Adams said auto exhaust fumes, trash-bin odors and possibly even sewer gases were being drawn in through the vent and dispersed through the building via pipe and conduit passages. Those passages have now been sealed and the vent closed off.

"There is nothing hazardous in the facility," Adams said.

Dr. M. Joseph Fedoruk, medical director of the Center for Occupational and Environmental Health at the University of California, Irvine, conducted several tests and reviewed the data collected by the county. He said he is certain odors were causing the employees' illnesses.

Adams said officials are still unsure why the odors started causing illnesses in March and not before.

Besides the repairs, the 25year-old library has been thoroughly scoured, including steam cleaning the carpets, disinfecting the bathrooms and cleaning air ducts.

"This library is cleaner than any other location in Orange County," Adams said. "While we were at it, we washed the win-

Committee wants to build city library

A group of local residents has banded together to raise money to build Costa Mesa a library of its own.

The Costa Mesa Library Formation Committee soon plans to file for official nonprofit organization status, granting the group a tax exemption and clearing the way for its fundraising campaign.

"Our goal is to have a city library, city run and directed," Kenton White, a former Huntington Beach assistant city librarian and member of Costa Mesa's Library Services Committee, said Tuesday. "The problem is that the city doesn't know how to fund one, so we said we would do it privately.

"They said 'where are you going to get the money?" he added. "We proposed the same way that they did the Performing Arts Center."

White said that at least \$15 million is needed to build a new library in the city. He estimates annual operating costs to be at least \$3.5 million.

White said the formation committee plans to use the same private fund raising approach used by the founders of the Orange County Performing Arts Center more than a decade ago.

"We want a library of some architectural stature," White said, adding that his group is looking at potential locations along Adams Avenue, Harbor Boulevard and Fairview Avenue.

The committee's goal is to have a major local library closer to the city's center.

The committee hopes that the goal of building a cultural and educational icon for Costa Mesa will encourage businesses and the public to help.

Committee members include a number of former and current city Library Services Committee members, as well as former Mayor Sandra Genis, municipal activist Eleanore Humphrey and public relations professional Joan Murphine.

White said the committee is working with people who helped form a city library in Rancho Mirage — Assistant State Librarian Richard Hall and UC Irvine's community outreach representative Barbara Al-Bayati.

The committee, formed in February, will also have to work out if and how Costa Mesa would split from the countywide library district that now runs two branches of the Orange County Public Library in the city.

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

In your letter of November 15, 1995, to Dr. Kevin Starr, State Librarian of California, you asked for guidance concerning the Placentia Library's duty to protect the confidentiality of library registration records. Specifically, your inquiry related to a solicitation of library patrons by the Library Board for contributions to the Placentia Library Foundation.

As I indicated during our telephone conversation today, I see no problem in meeting the confidentiality requirements of Government Code section 6267 so long as the mailing is controlled exclusively by the Library, preferably at the Foundation's expense, and so long as patron responses to the solicitation are directed to the Foundation and not the Library. Once a patron voluntarily responds to the Foundation the information provided ceases to be a registration record of the Library.

I hope this information is helpful. Please contact me if you need further clarification.

Contribution deductions are allowable to donors only to the extent that their contributions are gifts, with no consideration received. Ticket purchases and similar payments in conjunction with fundraising events may not necessarily qualify as deductible contributions, depending on the circumstances. See Revenue Ruling 67-246, published in Cumulative Bulletin 1967-2,




Exhibit 1.2 The Pyramid of Giving

I appreciated the opportunity to talk with you on the phone yesterday regarding the potential participation by water agencies in supporting the Center for Demographic Research (CDR) at California State University, Fullerton. As you know, creation of the CDR followed the March, 1995, reorganization of the County Administrative Office which resulted in the layoff staff who were responsible for a wide range of demographic and related activities. The CDR is in its second year of operation, and is funded by a consortium of agencies in Orange County who are users of demographic information.

Attached for your use is a general information sheet on the CDR and the benefits that sponsorship of the Program include. As we discussed, we are looking for a commitment from water agencies of \$35,000 for the next year, which can be met by a single agency or collectively by multiple agencies. This is a nominal cost considering the many products that the CDR produces and the benefits of maintaining staff in Orange County to produce the demographic forecasts. I have also attached a copy of the draft Demographics MOU which describes the structure of this unique partnership and the work products to be developed by the CDR.

Ouestions and Answers

Regarding the Partnership Among Orange County Agencies and California State University, Fullerton to Maintain the Center for Demographic Research

- Q. What is the purpose of the Center for Demographic Research (CDR)?
- A. The major objectives of the CDR are to 1.) maintain an Orange County presence in the development of short and long-term growth projections, 2.) establish a mechanism to allow for increase participation and oversight of the function by interested and affected Orange County interests, and 3.) reduce the costs of this function.
- Q. How is the CDR being funded?
- A. The CDR is collaboratively funded by a number of Orange County entities who benefit from having accurate population, housing and employment forecasts. These include the County of Orange, the Orange County Division, League of California Cities, the County Sanitation Districts of Orange County, the Orange County Transportation Authority, the Orange County Fire Authority and the Transportation Corridor Agencies.
- Q. What is the data used for?
- A Information produced by the CDR is used for a wide range of activities, including bond-revenue stream analysis, public facilities needs analysis, siting and timing analysis, development of fee programs and general plan activities. Regionally, growth forecasts comprise subregional input to multi-county growth forecasts, providing a planning linkage to public facilities planned in a regional context.
- Q. What would the sponsorship fees be for participation in the CDR by water agencies?
- A. \$35,000 for this year, which can be funded by a single entity or by multiple entities.
- Q. Is the CDR cost-effective?
- A. Yes! The CDR, because it minimizes full-time staff by utilizing graduate students and interns, operated at a more than \$500,000 / year savings compared to when the program was housed in the County.
- Q. What are the benefits for water agencies in participating in the CDR?
- A. The benefits are many, including direct access to the latest population, employment and housing growth forecasts, membership on the CDR Technical Advisory Committee which provides guidance and input into the development of products, and membership on the Management Oversight Committee which considers policy matters associated with CDR activities.
- Q. What would happen if the CDR did not exist?
- A. Growth forecast information would be prepared by the Southern California
 Association of Governments, and probably would not be as accurate as the data
 prepared here in Orange County. Also, access to and participation in the
 development of demographic products would diminish considerably.

Public Hearing for "Home Depot Reorganization" Cities of Laguna Niguel and San Juan 3. Capistrano (CA95-04)

Assistant Executive Officer Joyce Crosthwaite provided the Commission with a staff report on the "Home Depot Annexation" to the City of Laguna Niguel. The proposal involves the annexation of 21 acres of a portion of unincorporated island to the City of Laguna Niguel. The remainder of the unincorporated island includes the Schuller property which is located to the south. Staff proposed amending the spheres of influence for the Cities of Laguna Niguel and San Juan Capistrano. Ms. Crosthwaite said that approval of the Home Depot annexation leaves the remaining 70 to 80 acres as a county island which causes concern for future development and recommended continuing the Schuller property to the July 1997 LAFCO hearing.

3.1 Public Comment

Linda Lindholm, Mayor Pro-tem, City of Laguna Niguel and Frank Hazelton of LSA & Associates supported staff recommendations and stated their willingness to cooperate with the City of San Juan Capistrano.

Michael Tidus, Attorney for Schuller Properties did not support the separation of properties. Commissioner Smith asked if Schuller Properties is considering annexing to the City of Laguna Niguel. Mr. Tidus said that Schuller Properties was open to all options. Commissioner Anthony noted that the properties have always been separate and that notification to both property owners has occurred repeatedly. Cheryl

Jim Holloway, Director Community Services, City of San Clemente said that the City's position changed because of the litigation and other concerns. He hopes to meet with Capo Beach Water District to resolve the issue of protecting employee jobs and also to achieve efficiencies. He added that the City of San Clemente has operations and managers in place and the technology to serve as the successor to Tri-Cities MW/D

5. Commission Comment

Executive Officer Smith said that the Commission may decide to continue this item to the May LAFCO hearing while the agencies work out the revised terms and conditions. She added that the Commission could approve the dissolution today and continue only the terms and conditions.

Clark Alsop, Counsel said Ms. Smith's recommendation would be an alternative but would not be a final action. He added that this recommendation would serve more as an intent and the Commission would need to direct staff to prepare revised terms and conditions and this would serve as the final action.

Commissioner Smith agreed with this recommendation. He disagreed on LAFCOs directing public agencies and subordinating their management's policy making decisions. He said the agencies involved should do this themselves and that staff should remove this from the terms and conditions. He recommended taking action to prepare revised terms and conditions.

Vice-Chairman Bressette asked for specific Commission direction for staff. Commissioner Anthony made a motion and Vice-Chairman Bressette seconded the motion to dissolve TCMWD, select the City of San Clemente as the successor agency if they can work out a reasonable arrangement with Capo Valley Water District and prepare acceptable terms and conditions. Vice-Chairman Bressette seconded the motion.

Commissioner Spitzer made a substitute motion to dissolve TCMWD and recommended returning at a later date with staff direction on the funding mechanism. He said that it is the City of San Clemente's responsibility to work this out with Capo Beach Water District.

Executive Officer Smith asked the Commission to direct staff to prepare an analysis of the terms and conditions that support the City's proposal so the Commission can evaluate what was done previously with the revised analysis. She added that this will allow the Commission to be able to evaluate both sets of analyses.

Commissioner Smith seconded Commissioner Anthony's motion.

Vice-Chairman Bressette asked that Commissioner Anthony withdraw his motion, and he himself withdraw his motion. Mr. Bressette asked Commissioner Spitzer to restate his motion.

CLSB Actions taken at the May 8-9, 1997 Meeting

Purpose of the California Library Services Act:

The Legislature finds and declares that it is in the interest of the people of the state to insure that all people have free and convenient access to all library resources and services that might enrich their lives, regardless of where they live or the tax base of their local government. This policy shall be accomplished by assisting public libraries to improve service to the underserved of all ages, and by enabling public libraries to provide their users with the services and resources of all libraries in this state.

Goals of the California Library Services Board:

From this time forth the California Library Services Board will be known as a pro-active Board with an impact on State and Federal Legislation.

The California Library Services Board will continue to support the California Literacy Campaign.

The California Library Services Board will develop a statewide program for young adult services, based on appropriate supporting statistics and evaluations.

The California Library Services Board seeks to provide adequate financial and technical support to libraries for resource sharing services.

By the year 2000, the California Library Services Board will have successfully implemented the Library of California

By the year 2000, the California Library Services Board will have been successful in seeing that unfunded components of the California Library Services Act are funded.

The California Library Services Board will continue to seek a higher visibility throughout the state.

The California Library Services Board will review and develop initiatives to ensure adequate citizen participation.

To achieve the purpose of the Act, the following actions were taken at the CLSB meeting in Sacramento on May 8-9, 1997:

1. Adoption of Agenda

It was moved, seconded (Spence/Fong) and carried unanimously that the California Library Services Board adopt the agenda as presented.

2. Approval of Minutes

It was moved, seconded (Dawe/Steinhauser) and carried unanimously that the California Library Services Board approve the draft minutes of the February 20-21, 1997 CLSB meeting as corrected.

Legislative Committee

- 3. It was moved by the Legislative Committee (Dawe) and carried by a vote of 7 yes, 1 no (Spence) and 2 abstentions (Frizzelle, Kennedy) that the California Library Services Board take a position of support for Senate Bill 1100, Public Library Foundation waiver.
- 4. It was moved by the Legislative Committee (Dawe) and carried unanimously that the California Library Services Board take a position of support for Assembly Bill 403, Literacy for Public Safety.
- 5. It was moved by the Legislative Committee (Dawe) and carried unanimously that the California Library Services Board take a position of support for Senate Bill 356, State Literacy Resource Center.

Transaction Based Reimbursement

- 6. It was moved by the Budget and Resource Sharing Committee (Spence) and carried unanimously that the California Library Services Board adopt, subject to the concurrence of the State Department of Finance, reimbursement rates for the CLSA Transaction-Based Reimbursement Program for the 1997/98 fiscal year as follows: for interlibrary loans, a reimbursement rate of \$3.29 per eligible transaction; for direct loan, a reimbursement rate of \$.75 per eligible transaction; and that the CLSB Chief Executive Officer inform all participants of the 1997/98 reimbursement rates as soon as Department of Finance concurrence is obtained.
- It was moved, seconded (Kallenberg/Patria) and carried unanimously that the California Library Services Board continue to support full funding for the Transaction Based Reimbursement program either through the ECP (Enrollment/Caseload/Population) or BCP (Budget Change Proposal) process, which ever is most appropriate.

Special Services - Literacy

- 8. It was moved by the Literacy Committee (Wang) and carried unanimously that the California Library Services Board direct its Chief Executive Officer to prepare a Budget Change Proposal to seek additional 1998/99 local assistance funding to fully fund the programs of the CLSA California Library Literacy Service for consideration at the August 1997 Board meeting.
- 9. It was moved by the Literacy Committee (Wang) and carried unanimously that the California Library Services Board direct its Chief Executive Officer to prepare a Budget Change Proposal to seek additional 1998/99 local assistance funding to expand Families for Literacy services in California libraries for consideration at the August 1997 Board meeting.

10. System Reference

It was moved by the Budget and Resource Sharing Committee (Spence) and carried unanimously that the California Library Services Board authorize its Chief Executive Officer to prepare a Budget Change Proposal for additional 1998/99 local assistance funding for the System Reference Program to meet additional costs to the program for newly formed library jurisdictions that affiliate with a CLSA system by 1997/98 for consideration at the August 1997 Board meeting.

11. System Communication and Delivery

It was moved by the Budget Committee (Spence) and carried unanimously that the California Library Services Board authorize its Chief Executive Officer to prepare a Budget Change Proposal for additional 1998/99 local assistance funding for the System Communication and Delivery Program to meet additional costs to the program for newly formed library jurisdictions that affiliate with a CLSA system by 1997/98 for consideration at the August 1997 Board meeting.

12. State Reference Centers

It was moved by the Budget Committee (Spence) and carried unanimously that the California Library Services Board direct staff to develop concepts for a potential Budget Change Proposal for the 1998/99 State Budget to implement the State Reference Centers Program.
