

#### I. 1/8 CENT SALES TAX BILL - ACTION REQUESTED

Last week the Assembly Appropriations Committee passed SB 154 by Senator Mike Thompson (D-St. Helena), which would authorize the board of supervisors in a county to impose a 1/4 or 1/8 cent sales tax, subject to a 2/3rds vote of the voters in a county, and not to exceed 16 years, to be used only for library purposes. Monday the measure was taken up on the Assembly Figor and passed on a vote of 49 to 21, with 10 members absent or not voting. Several Assembly Republicans joined with the Democrats in support of the measure. They are as follows: Fred Aguiar, Brooks Firestone, Peter Frusetta, Jan Goldsmith, Brett Granlund, Steve Kuykendall, Jim Morrissey, and Rod Pacheco. # II. ERAF PRESS CONFERENCE: 26 LEGISLATORS PRESENT TO SUPPORT CITIES, COUNTIES, AND SPECIAL DISTRICTS

Last Wednesday, the Allies for Cities, Counties and Special Districts (of which CLA is a member) held a press conference, wherein the members of the legislature were asked to "stand up and be counted for the restoration of critically needed services such as law enforcement, fire protection, and library operations." All in all, 26 members of both the Senate and Assembly turned out to voice their support for an appropriation of \$280 million in the Assembly version of the Budget for the Educational Revenue Augmentation Fund (ERAF). The Senate version only contains \$100 million. One representative from the Public Employees Union described to the press the detrimental effects of the ERAF shift on local governments, and added. "Libraries have been his severely. The real foundation of our educational system is our libraries, and when kids can't get to them because they are closed, that's a crime."

In Budget news, the Budget Conference Committee has decided to give the issue of ERAF over to the "Big 5" for resolution. In question is the \$100 million approved in the Senate version of the Budget, versus \$280 million approved in the Assembly version of the Budget, and whether or not money for COPS (the public safety money) should be rolled into these amounts "to allow for broader local discretion," or be kept separate. A member of the press informed us that the "Big 5" was meeting to discuss this issue behind closed doors late this afternoon.



ERAF OPINION

In recent weeks, the California Library Association (CLA) has received numerous questions about Revenue and Taxation code, Section 97.37, and an opinion by the Chief Counsel of the State Controller's Office about that Section. CLA is receiving these questions because the Section was passed into law in 1994 by SB 1648 (Dills), which was sponsored by the Association. The purpose of the measure was to prevent the state from shifting any more property tax than had already been shifted, away from a county property tax library, or library district, in the prior two fiscal years.

\$B 1648 added Section 97,031 to the Revenue and Taxation Code, which reads:

"Not withstanding any other provision of this chapter, for the 1994-95 fiscal year and each fiscal year thereafter, the amount of property tax revenue deemed allocated in the prior fiscal year to a county free library, or a library established as an independent special district, shall not be reduced for purposes of increasing the amount of property tax revenue to be allocated to another jurisdiction."

The Association does not feel it can interpret the Revenue and Taxation Code. If CLA members and other interested parties have questions about this matter, it is recommended that they direct their questions to their respective County Auditor-Controllers and County Counsels.

Yesterday, District Judge Gary Taylor held a Status Conference on the County's actions against KPMG Peat Marwick, Rauscher Pierce Refsnes, McGraw-Hill, Fuji Securities and Morgan Stanley (the "New Defendants"). The purpose of the Status Conference was to monitor the progress of the County's litigation against the New Defendants and determine whether trial dates could be set at this time. The County and the New Defendants argued that the Court should not set trial dates in these cases but should await the outcome of the trial in the Merrill Lynch action, which will involve certain similar issues. The District Court did not set trial dates at the Status Conference but instead set a Continued Status Conference for July 13, 1998 during which the progress of the Merrill Lynch litigation will be addressed. At that time the Court may set trial dates in the County's actions against the New Defendants.

The Orange County Section of the Los Angeles Times on Friday, July 11 quoted the Orange County Assessor as reporting that the increase in Placentia valuations for this year is 2.9%.

It is anticipated that the decision about ERAF will be make in Sacramento by July 18<sup>th</sup>. Presently it is looking hopeful that at least \$100 million will be transferred back to cities, counties and special districts. The amount of the transfer from the cities, counties and special districts was \$3.2 billion.

The status of the State Controller Chief Counsel's Opinion (Attachment A) regarding County and Independent Special District libraries and their ERAF contributions remains uncertain.

#### 2. State Funds

The status of the Public Library Fund, and the reimbursement rate for eligible interlibrary loan and direct loan transactions, will be determined by the State Budget. Presently it looks as if these items may be funded with modest increases.

#### 3. Local Revenues

The continuing decline of circulation at the Library has meant a corresponding decline in revenues from overdue materials.

Does Placentia District want to recommend to the Consortium an increase in the overdue material rate from  $20 \, \text{¢}$  to  $25 \, \text{¢}$  per day?

The ongoing problem with XCP's (the Library's vending system vendor) failure to provide a functioning system-wide printer vending software for the reference computer network is costing the District revenue. In addition to the cost of upgrading the system to Windows 95, the local installation cost of the new XCP software, which has not yet successfully enabled systemwide printing, now exceeds \$2,000. This is a serious issue that the Library Director is addressing personally with the owner of XCP.

#### RECOMMENDATION:

Discuss and give direction for future action.

We recommend that this opinion be reveiwed with the County Auditor-Controller and the County Counsel in your respective counties. At this time, there are no specific procedures established by the State Controller or any other entity for implementing the modifications to the ERAF tax shifts suggested in this opinion.

Your memorandum of January 22, 1997, advised that you encountered a problem in the property tax allocation audits of Contra Costa, Sonoma, San Joaquin, and Sacramento Counties. Specifically, the counties did not include their county free libraries (hereinafter "libraries") as special districts for purposes of computing contributions to ERAF. You have asked the following questions (all code references hereafter are to the Revenue and Taxation Code):

- (1) Are libraries that meet the definition of "special district" in section 95, subparagraph (m), required to make contributions to the ERAF for the 1992-93 and 1993-94 fiscal years?
- (2) On the basis of the information presented, are any of the above-mentioned counties exempt from ERAF contributions for libraries?
- (3) Does section 97.37 prevent further transfers of ERAF contributions from libraries for 1994-95 and subsequent fiscal years?
- (4) Does section 97.37 require a reversal or refund of ERAF contributions from libraries made in prior fiscal years?

In response to your first question, libraries that meet the definition of "special district" in section 95(m), as amended by Chapter 921, Statutes of 1993, were required to make ERAF contributions for the 1992-93 and 1993-94 fiscal years.

April 30, 1997

This issue arises because of the legislative history of statutory definitions of "special district" applicable to property tax allocations. Prior to 1981, "special district" was defined as expressly including libraries. The statutory definition was revised on adoption of section 95(m) in 1981 (Chapter 242) which left out the reference to libraries as special districts. This change was interpreted by Sacramento County and apparently by a number of other counties as precluding libraries from receiving an allocation of the one percent property tax. Thus, libraries were not expressly included in section 95(m) when the ERAF legislation was enacted and first implemented in the 1992-93 fiscal year (Chapter 699).

In 1993 (Chapter 921), the Legislature amended section 95(m), effective January 1, 1994, adding the following to the definition of "special district":

"Additionally, a county free library established pursuant to Article 1 (commencing with Section 19100) of Chapter 6 of Part 11 of Division 1 of Title 1 of the Education Code, and for which a property tax was levied in the 1977-78 fiscal year, shall be considered a special district."

Section 3 of Chapter 921 further provided:

"The Legislature finds and declares that the changes made by this act are declaratory of existing law and do not constitute a change in existing law. For that reason, the Legislature finds and declares that this act does not mandate a new program or higher level of service that will result in any additional cost to any local government."

A legislative declaration that an amendment is declaratory of existing law and does not constitute a change in existing law is not necessarily binding upon the courts, but will receive judicial respect. (Standard Oil Co. v. State Board of Equalization (1974) 39 Cal.App.3d 765, 770.) As stated by the California Supreme Court in Stockton Say. & Loan Bank v. Massanet (1941) 18 Cal.2d 200, at 204:

"This expression by the legislature concerning the existence of an ambiguity and the declaration of the intent of the 1993 act, although not binding upon this court in its construction of the 1993 act, is a factor that may properly be considered in correctly determining the meaning and effect of the sentence in question. "" That is not giving a retroactive effect to a statute, because the meaning of the statute to be interpreted has always been the same. The subsequent legislation interpreting the statute construed, does not change the meaning; it merely supplies an indication of the legislative intent which may be considered together with other factors in arriving at the true intent existing at the time the legislation was enacted."

It is clear there was uncertainty in the application of this specific area of the law. In such case, we can look to legislative committee reports as an aid in understanding the intent of the Legislature, and the purpose and objective of the amendment effectuated by Chapter 921. As stated by the Supreme Court in Southern California Gas v. Public Utilities (1979), 156 Cal.Rptr. 733, at 736:

"Statements in legislative committee reports concerning the statutory objects and purposes which are in accord with a reasonable interpretation of the statute are legitimate aids in determining legislative intent."

Assembly and Senate floor analyses and committee analyses on SB 368 (enacted as Chapter 921) confirm that confusion existed after the 1981 deletion of the reference to libraries in the statutory definition of "special district." Prior to the 1978 passage of Proposition 13, 32 counties levied a separate property tax rate to support their libraries. After the 1981 enactment, some counties (number not indicated in the analyses) maintained that libraries no longer qualified for separate shares of property tax revenues and such shares thereafter belonged to the counties. Sacramento County, for example, continued to recognize its library as a special district qualifying it for property tax allocations until it changed its position as a result of a County Counsel's opinion in 1992.

The purpose of Chapter 921 in restoring the reference to libraries in the "special district" definition, as clearly reflected in the legislative analyses, was to provide clarification of the law and eliminate any confusion concerning the entitlement of the eligible libraries to receive property tax allocations. In declaring this amendment as declaratory of existing law, the Legislature was stating in effect that libraries come within the "special district" definition even after the 1981 change.

In view of such circumstances, and in absence of a judicial determination to the contrary, the legislative declaration must be accepted in resolving your questions. It necessarily follows, therefore, that libraries were special districts within the meaning of section 95(m) when the ERAF legislation became operative. It would simply be illogical and contradictory to conclude that libraries were special districts for purposes of tax allocations, but not for purposes of making ERAF contributions. Accordingly, the eligible libraries were subject to the ERAF contribution requirement in the 1992-93 and 1993-94 fiscal years.

This result is consistent with the Senate and Assembly floor analyses that were available to the legislators when voting on SB 368 (Chapter 921). Both noted that the legislation would assure continued allocation of property tax revenues to libraries and transfer of a portion of such revenues to the ERAF.

With respect to your second question, I reviewed the materials you forwarded pertaining to Contra Costa, Sacramento, and Sonoma Counties. On the bases of such information, I cannot conclude that any of the three counties was exempt from ERAF contributions for 1992-93 and 1993-94 for its library. Both Contra Costa and Sacramento based their positions on the 1981 deletion discussed above.

The only unique situation concerns Sonoma County which entered into a Joint Powers Agreement in 1974 with four cities for consolidation of library facilities and services. Pursuant to that Agreement, a county free library was established under an Article of the Education Code which was subsequently recodified as "Article 1 (commencing with Section 19100) of Chapter 6 of Part 11 of Division 1 of Title 1 of the Education Code." This, of course, is the Article cited in the amendment to section 95(m) that expressly included libraries in the definition of "special district."

The Joint Powers Agreement also requires the Board of Supervisors to "annually levy, in the same manner and at the same time as other county taxes are levied, and in addition to all other taxes," a property tax for the library. The revenue derived from the tax is required to be credited to the County Library Fund. The Sonoma County library clearly comes within the section 95(m) definition of a "county free library established pursuant to Article 1... for which a property tax was levied in the 1977-78 fiscal year." In absence of further clarification of the law, therefore, it must be considered a special district.

In response to your third question, section 97.37 appears intended to prevent transfer of ERAF contributions from libraries in 1994-95 and subsequent fiscal years. That section reads:

"Notwithstanding any other provision of this chapter, for the 1994-95 fiscal year and each fiscal year thereafter, the amount of property tax revenue deemed allocated in the prior fiscal year to a county free library, or a library established as an independent special district, shall not be reduced for purposes of increasing the amount of property tax revenue to be allocated to another jurisdiction."

The above provision was originally enacted as section 97.031 (SB 1648, Chapter 344, Statutes of 1994). According to legislative analyses of SB 1648, the ERAF shift in 1992-93 and 1993-94 resulted in county free libraries and library districts statewide losing approximately \$60 million in property tax revenues. Generally speaking, ERAF reductions for cities, counties, and special districts have been considered as representing permanent losses to their property tax base. (Background Report for SB 756 Conference Committee dated August 1995.)

My understanding is that your question concerns the extent or scope of the ERAF exemption afforded libraries in section 97.37. In brief, does the ERAF transfers in 1992-93 and 1993-94 represent a permanent loss to the collective tax base of the libraries (i.e., the prior ERAF transfers will continue to be deposited in the ERAF in 1994-95 and subsequent years), with the exemption only avoiding future transfers resulting from the statutory growth factors?

This issue arises not only because of the general concept of a permanent tax base reduction, but also because of the language used in section 97.37 that a library's revenue allocation "shall not be reduced for purposes of increasing" (emphasis added) revenues to be allocated to another jurisdiction. Additionally, subdivision (d)(5) of section 97.3 provides that for purposes of making 1994-95 property tax allocations, amounts allocated from the ERAF "shall be deemed property tax revenues allocated to the" ERAF in 1993-94. This would appear to indicate that the ERAF contributions now represent revenue allocations belonging to the ERAF rather than transfers from tax revenue allocations of the cities, counties and districts.

The code sections governing this matter are not a picture of clarity. As suggested above, an argument could be made that section 97.37 applies only to the growth factors that would otherwise increase ERAF contributions from libraries. However, I believe the better interpretation is that section 97.37 overrides not only future increases resulting from the growth factors, but also the continued transfer of ERAF contributions equivalent to transfers made from library revenue allocations prior to 1994-95.

The primary objective of statutory interpretation is to ascertain and give effect to legislative intent. That intention becomes relatively clear after examination of the legislative analyses of SB 1648 which enacted the library exemption provision in 1994 (Chapter 344). As noted in the Assembly floor analysis on SB 1648:

"The property tax shifts enacted as part of the 1992-93 and 1993-94 state budgets resulted in county free libraries and library districts statewide losing approximately \$60 million in property tax revenues. These revenue losses have forced closure of library outlets, service hour reductions, cuts in library materials budgets, hiring freezes, and staff layoffs.

Local agencies are authorized under current law to levy a special tax with 2/3 voter approval to fund library services. Citing the shortage of revenue-raising options available to local libraries, proponents of this bill are seeking protection for county free libraries and library districts from future property tax shifts."

The source of this legislation was the California Library Association and was supported by a number of county libraries. In seeking protection "from future property tax shifts" it seems apparent that the proponents had reference to the \$60 million shift which had a devastating impact on county libraries. If the exemption was intended to apply only to future growth transfers, then the legislation would have had very little remedial effect. The amount of the growth transfers that would be terminated would be minimal when compared to the \$60 million tax shifts. If amounts equivalent to the \$60 million were continued to be shifted, the damage caused to library programs would continue.

The purpose and objective of the legislation was to avoid this result. The wording of section 97.37 is consistent with this objective. Under the statutory ERAF formula in effect in 1992-93 and 1993-94, tax revenues were allocated to the local agencies and then reduced by the ERAF transfers. Section 97.37 provides that amounts deemed allocated in 1993-94 should not be reduced, notwithstanding any other provisions of the pertinent chapter in the Revenue and Taxation Code (which would include section 97.3).

The conclusion that 97.37 was intended to terminate any further ERAF transfers from libraries, including the continuation of the \$60 million transfers, is also supported by the Legislative Counsel's Digest of SB 1648. In <u>People v. Superior Court</u> (1979) 155 Cal.Rptr. 704, at 707, the Supreme Court stated:

"It is reasonable to presume that the Legislature amended those sections with the intent and meaning expressed in the Legislative Counsel's digest."

(See also Maben v. Superior Court (1967) 63 Cal. Rptr. 439.)

The Digest of SB 1648 referred to the ERAF transfers made in 1992-93 and 1993-94 and then stated, as the purpose of the legislation, that libraries "shall not be subject to any similar reduction and transfer requirement" in 1994-95 and subsequent fiscal years. The term "similar" can only have reference to transfers similar to the \$60 million transferred in the prior two years. Libraries were not to be subject to such transfers in future years.

In response to your final question, a statute will operate prospectively unless the intention to make it retrospective clearly appears from the statute itself. Section 97.37 expressly refers to 1994-95 and subsequent fiscal years. There is no

intention manifested in the section that it should apply retroactively. Accordingly, no reversals or changes are required with respect to 1992-93 and 1993-94 ERAF contributions from libraries.

AGGREGATE ERAF SPLIT AMONG COUNTIES, CITIES AND

SPECIAL DISTRICTS

After a series of negotiations, the representatives of the counties, cities and special districts have reached and agreement on the shares that each of the three segments will receive from a return of "base" property taxes.

The percentages agreed to are:

Counties	60.672%
Cities	24.167%
Special Districts	15.161%

These were derived using a cumulative net methodology which subtracts the cumulative Proposition 172 revenues for each segment (counties, cities and special districts) for fiscal years 1993-94, 1994-95, 1995-96 and 1996-97 from the cumulative ERAF loss for each segment in the same fiscal years. The net cumulative total for each segment was then calculated as a percent of the total net cumulative loss for all segments.

For an additional return of ERAF (in 1997-98, for example), the same basic methodology will be used except that ERAF and Proposition 172 data for that fiscal year (e.g. 1997-98) will be added to the respective cumulative totals and the ERAF and Proposition 172 data for the earliest fiscal year (e.g. 1993-94) will be subtracted. The percentage shares for each segment can then be calculated.

To avoid future audit problems and any future concerns that one or more of the segments did not receive their appropriate shares, we strongly recommend that the actual percentages be used in the statutory language.

### **BACKGROUND:**

The State of California has not yet adopted its budget for Fiscal Year 1997-1998. Several of the State Budget issues have a significant impact on the District's Budget:

Status of ERAF reversal

State Library reimbursements and the Public Library Fund

The budget forms are due to the Orange County Auditor by July 18, 1997. These forms cannot be completed until the District's Budget is adopted. They will be submitted after the Board meeting on August 19.

### RECOMMENDATION:

Defer action on the Fiscal Year 1997-1998 Budget until the August 19, 1997, Board Meeting pending resolution of the ERAF issues by the State of California.

Establish a Library Board Officer Selection Policy, Third Reading

### **BACKGROUND:**

At its meeting on April 15, 1997 the Library Board requested that a discussion of the adoption of a Library Board Selection Policy be placed on the May 20, 1997 Agenda.

The item was discussed on May 20<sup>th</sup> and continued until the June 24th Meeting without amendment. The item was discussed on June 24<sup>th</sup> and continued until the July 15<sup>th</sup> Meeting without amendment.

Trustee Pappas and Library Director Minter met on May 7<sup>th</sup> and prepared the following proposals to initiate discussion:

The premise for this proposal is that there is a desire within the Library Board of Trustees for Library leadership to be developed for each of its members, and that the responsibilities of Office be shared in an equitable manner.

- A non-binding rotation list will be created for the Board positions of President and Secretary.
- > Trustees will not be added to the President's rotation list until the end of their first full year of service.
- Names will be added to both lists at the bottom of the current list for each office, at the time the name is eligible to be added. If more than one name is being added to the list at a time, the individuals will draw numbers to determine the order of placement on the list.
- The first list will be established by drawing numbers.
- Any Trustee may decline to serve in an office without stating a reason. In that case, the position will be offered to the next Trustee on the list. However, if each Trustee has declined the position, when the rotation comes back around to the first Trustee who declined, that Trustee shall be expected to accept the Office unless there are extenuating circumstances.
- > The Office of President will be filled first. After that position is filled the position of Secretary will be filled, with the President being passed over on the list. (The President's position in the Secretary's rotation list will remain the same.)
- > This system will be implemented with the Board officer election to be held in December 1997.

Trustee commitments, apart from the Library Board Meetings, will also be shared to the fullest extent possible. These include, but are not limited to:

- > Independent Special Districts of Orange County (ISDOC) quarterly evening meetings, once a year there is a NOON luncheon meeting.
- ➤ Local Area Formation Commission (LAFCO) Nominating Committee District must be represented by its President or another delegate who has been appointed by formal Resolution of the Board. This body meets only when there is a vacancy for the Special District representatives on LAFCO. These meetings are sometimes held at the same time as ISDOC.
- ➢ Orange County Investment Pool (OCIP) Bankruptcy Committee meetings are usually held during the day and are informational in nature. If votes are required they are presented at Board Meetings. This group met frequently during the first two years of the Bankruptcy. If future meetings are called, they will probably deal with the third party litigations (Merrill Lynch, etc.). These meetings are usually held in Irvine or Fountain Valley, and the advance notice is often short. It is at these meetings that we get first hand briefings from the Committee's Attorney (Patrick Shea), and the CPAs.
- > California Special Districts Association (CSDA) Annual Conference and Legislative Day.
- ➤ CSDA Worker's Compensation Authority Board of Directors 4 meetings per year, including one at the CSDA Annual Conference.
- ➤ California Association of Library Trustees and Commissioners (CALTAC/CLA) Spring workshop for all Trustees and an Annual Conference (part of California Library Association Conference).
- ➤ Placentia Chamber of Commerce monthly breakfast meetings, includes time for visiting with community leaders and owners/managers of small businesses and a presentation by a speaker, 7:15 8:30 A.M.
- ➤ Placentia Chamber of Commerce monthly mixers, includes time for visiting with community leaders and owners/managers of small businesses, 5:30 7:00 P.M. The time is very flexible, like an open house, and one can come and go as needed.
- ➤ Placentia Library Foundation Board of Directors 4 Board meetings per year plus active committee assignments. Two Board delegates to the Foundation are elected by the Trustees at the Board's Annual Meeting each December.
- > Friends of Placentia Library Board of Directors 10 Board meetings per year, currently rotated among Trustees.

### **BACKGROUND:**

At the District's request Anderson & Anderson has completed its annual review of group vision and dental insurance policy options for the District.

### Vision Plans

Attachment A summarizes the findings for Vision Plans.

At the last plan selection opportunity, the Board changed from Vision Service Plan to Vision Plan of America.

With this change the coverage no longer included testing for video display terminal usage and reduced the benefits for contact lenses from an allowance of \$105 per year to \$40.

Anderson & Anderson has not provided staff with the details of the plans for which quotes were received. There is a \$15 co-pay for the annual vision exam with the current provider which does not show on the rate analysis.

The difference in cost from the low bidder, VPA, which provides no VTD coverage at \$79.20 per full time staff member per year, and the VSP with VTD coverage at \$136.08 per full time staff member per year, is \$56.88 per full time staff member per year.

### Dental Plans

Attachment B summarizes the findings for Dental Plans.

The District has been with Principal Insurance for dental coverage for four years. There have been no complaints received from staff about this insurance provider.

### **RECOMMENDATION:**

Space is limited and there needs to be a balance between recognition formats and interior design.

There needs to be coordination of old recognition programs (like the plaque in the lobby) with new programs.

Timing is not a critical issue here. It is more important to do a comprehensive and thorough job of developing the proposals.

# Bill Gates starts foundation to give libraries computers

Bill Gates, the billionaire softare strepreneur, is creating a ur on that plans to spend 00 .....lion over five years to ing new computers and the Inrnet into the nation's public liaries.

The Gates Library Foundation ainly is intended to help librars in low-income areas. But as any as half of America's 16,000 blic libraries may receive astance eventually, foundation ecutives said.

Library professionals say the indation will make an impor-

tant contribution to bringing libraries into the information age.

By setting up a major foundation that encourages use of the technology that made him rich, Gates, 41, co-founder of Microsoft Corp. and the nation's wealthiest person, is open to criticism that his big philanthropic push is self-serving.

Any expansion of technology helps Microsoft, of course, especially when it gives the company's software more exposure. Microsoft, struggling to catch up with Netscape Communications after getting a late start in Internet software, is donating software to the new foundation.

The Gates foundation is an outgrowth of a charitable program called Libraries Online at Microsoft, begun in late 1995. To date, the Microsoft program has provided computers, software and training to about 200 libraries,

from the Flatbush section of Brooklyn to rural Mississippi.

Santa Ana's three library branches could benefit from the foundation's mission, said Rob Richard, library director. Only the city's central branch has Internet access via four terminals. Those computers serve a homework tutoring program for about 1,350 students.

Su Chung, principal administrative librarian for Garden Grove Regional Library, said Garden Grove's three branches would benefit from more Internet terminals. Garden Grove has only one — for staffers. A state grant will fund installation of one public terminal.

"I wish we had more," Chung said. "The Internet is here to stay."

## O.C. Libraries Grapple With Internet Porn

Things used to be simpler at the public library.

You'd go to the card catalog, look up "Bambi" and find a storybook about a baby deer.

Nowadays you go to the library's Internet terminal, type in "Bambi" and get more than 9,000 references—from "Tammy's Home Page" where "Thumper and Flower come out to play" to "Bambi—one of our hot Cyber Sex Toys Play Things!!! Win a FREE call!!"

Librarians, accustomed to reviewing books before they're purchased and put on the shelves, now find that the information superhighway is delivering goods they would never have ordered. How to cope, especially with parents who fear their children will be viewing hard-core pornography, is "the issue of the moment" for public libraries from Boston to Anaheim, says the American Library Assn.

Politicians have become involved. Congress passed, and President Clinton signed, the Communications Decency Act last year, making it a crime to transmit indecent material over the Internet. Two federal courts unanimously struck down the law as unconstitutional, and the U.S. Supreme Court is expected to issue its opinion this week.

Boston Mayor Thomas M. Menino, reacting to news reports of angry parents, decreed in February that all city computers, including the library's, must have filtering programs to screen out Internet indecency.

available for patrons of highschool age and above. They offer unfiltered access.

"We have not had the kind of abuse that is touted in the newspapers," says Joanne Hardy, adult services manager. "It's not come up. Nobody has come running to us to say, 'I just saw porno on the screen or I can see it over that man's shoulder.'"

After two years of Internet access in all its libraries and branches, the Los Angeles Public Library still believes it's better off without filters on its terminals.

"We feel very strongly that filtering is too difficult to do," says Joan Bartel, the library's director of information technology. "You can't filter out everything anyway, and what may be a concern for one group may not be a concern for another. Some may not be worried about pornography but about racist or inflammatory information, and how do you filter that?

"And even if we did try to filter, you can be sued for that."

At present, the American Library Assn. is withholding a formal position on filtering until the U.S. Supreme Court defines the Internet's First Amendment status. But

filtering is roundly criticized, either because it filters out too much or too little.

Most surfers browse the Internet using the free search programs found on the Internet itself. Type in one or a series of words and the programs search Internet sites for those words in their titles or descriptions.

Early filter programs simply blocked access to sites containing certain words—sex, for example—and made no other distinctions. That meant children could not connect to the Internet's "Decadence Phone Sex Directory" but were also barred from research on Sussex, sextants and sextuplets.

Newer filter programs depend on lists of sites evaluators have found to be objectionable, but in its May issue, Consumer Reports said the programs are far from perfect. "Our conclusion was that you couldn't use one of these things and feel certain the child would not be able to go to adult sites," says senior editor Jeffrey Fox.

"If I were a parent, I would be very concerned," says Suad Ammar, principal librarian in Placentia. "I don't know how children learn about the [pornography] sites, but they do.

"But it's the parents' responsibility. This is a new tool, and people need to be educated. We are not going to look over our patrons' shoulders."

More important to librarians is the credibility of Internet information, says Ron Hayden, director of library services in Huntington Beach. "There's so much crap on the Internet, stuff that's just worthless. . . . Cyberspace is so new and so unpredictable and uncontrollable, it's really made some of us, me included, step back and rethink."

But it's definitely worth the trouble, he says. "It's here to stay. It has improved so much since I started looking at it a year ago."

"I constantly tell people we should look at the wonderful stuff you can get on the Internet and stop dwelling on things controversial," Bartel says.

"Libraries have traditionally tried to outreach, especially to young people, and having computers and the Internet has been a tremendous draw for this age group. We've been able to reach them where we haven't been able to before."

"I've heard the Internet called the devil incarnate and the savior of civilization," Hayden says. "Neither is true.

"But libraries must have it. It's here, and it's going to be used even more."

That's a par-nt's responsibility. We won't be poking over their shoulders. We ion't plan on using the [filtering] oftware in the beginning.

"In the beginning" is Gebelein's oncession that things can change, ınd fast. Ask John Wallach, libraran in Dayton, Ohio, and chairman of the state agency that provides nternet access to all Ohio public

praries

The Ohio system, completed in April, connects 250 main libraries, out one complaint from one library ear Cleveland that children had alled up pornography prompted he state House of Representatives o pass a bill mandating that all internet terminals be filtered. The state Senate softened the bill to permit filters, and the issue is being thrashed out in committee.

'We have not had a problem here in Dayton, and the other libraries have not had a problem, but this is a very, very popular issue," Wallach says. "Any time you get into children and illegal material, you have a very popular topic to take off on."

If the Ohio Legislature mandates filtering library Internet access, "I can guarantee we'll be sued by the ACLU [American Civil Liberties Union]," Wallach says. The ACLU in Florida has teams of attorneys preparing a lawsuit against the Orange County Library System's filtering policy.

he California State Library estimates that Internet access is available to patrons in 65% of the state's library systems. But of those surveyed in March, only 22% reported using Internet filters.

Three-fourths of the library systems had experienced no Internet "incidents" involving children, but they had prepared for them. The vast majority-85%-had formally adopted Internet use policies.

The number of California libraries offering Net access is rising rapidly, due in part to state library InFoPeople grants made to about 430 libraries since 1993. But the prospect of controversy has persuaded some libraries, such as Anaheim's, to bide their time.

Anaheim's one Internet terminal is for staff use only. The staff now is waiting to see what the Supreme Court has to say. "I can't think of anything that's required so much advance planning and analysis," says Kevin Moore, Anaheim's central library manager. "This is the toughest issue we librarians have ever had."

In the 1960s, Anaheim was the national battleground in the bitter war over sex education in schools. Since then, "Anaheim has always been on the cautious side, and in a way, it's paid off." Moore says. "This community has traditionally been conservative. It's one thing to be cutting edge. It's another to make a foolish decision.'

Fullerton's library, however, plunged into the Internet back in 1994, when it made two terminals

# New Chapter for Libraries' Budget

■ Services: Proposal would have all county branches open at least five days a week and add books, computers.

SANTA ANA—For the first time in years, all of the county's 26 libraries would remain open at least five days a week, under a new operating plan being unveiled today.

The branches would also have more than \$1 million added to their budgets for buying books, magazines and Internet computers.

For the first time since the 1970s, six of the libraries would be open seven days a week, while seven others would operate six days. Currently, some libraries are open only two or three days a week

The new operating plan reflects the first major budgetary boost for a library system that has seen its spending slashed by more than 30% since 1993—first by reductions in state funding, and then by cutbacks dictated by the county's bankruptcy.

"This makes our libraries more accessible to the public and restores some of the services we've cut in the past," County Librarian John M. Adams said.

"The county has invested millions of dollars in these facilities," Adams added, "and it's good public policy to make them available to the people who paid for them."

The new operating plan comes three weeks after the Board of Supervisors increased by

\$2.3 million the struggling system's annual budget, which is also benefiting from modest increases in other revenues, such as those generated by library fines and fees.

Library patrons who have long complained about reduced operating hours and shrinking services were heartened by the proposed changes.

"It'll be great to have the library open more often than it is closed," said Leticia Perez, a regular at the Chapman branch in Garden Grove, which would expand operations from two to five days per week.

"The way it is now, I don't get use the library as much as I want, because the hours are so crazy. This would be a big improvement," said Perez, noting that the county threatened to close the Chapman branch altogether in the months following its 1994 bank-ruptcy.

The Los Alamitos library would go to five days of operations from the current four, and volunteers said Wednesday that they might try to pay for a sixth day with money raised from private donors.

"I think being open six days will be very good for us," said Charles Scott, president of Friends of the Los Alamitos Library. "Regardless of someone's age, the library is the source people go to if they need help or information. If it's not open when you need it, that's a problem."

In addition to the extra hours, Adams is proposing a \$1.1-million increase for books, magazine subscriptions and other materials. The system has slashed its budgets for such purchases by more than 50% since 1993, forcing branches to cancel dozens of magazine subscriptions and to buy so few copies of new books that patrons have often been obliged to wait months to check out bestsellers by Stephen King and John Grisham.

The system also plans to spend \$800,000 to install computers with Internet access at branches.

The proposed plan will go before the county's library advisory board today. The Board of Supervisors is expected to consider the matter sometime in July.

Ten libraries would add anywhere from one to three days of operations under the plan, including branches in Garden Grove, Seal Beach, Silverado Canyon, La Palma, Los Alamitos, San Juan Capistrano, Villa Park and Stanton. San Clemente's library could begin seven-day-a-week operations, or local officials could decide to increase other types of services instead.

Earlier this year, five branches in Irvine, Costa Mesa and Laguna Niguel began seven-day operations.

While other libraries won't get more days of operations under the plan, they could receive additional books, materials, computers or staffing, Adams said.

Library officials will meet with community representatives to determine exactly how each branch spends its additional resources.

The plan is a far cry from the austerity measures the library system has taken over the last five years.

The budget problems stem from the state's decision in 1992 to balance its budget by reducing the amount of property taxes allocated to the state's library systems and other special districts.

The situation worsened after the bankruptcy, when the county cut its modest subsidy to the system.

### **Branching Out**

A new budget plan for the Orange County Public Library system would dramatically increase operating hours at the 26 branch libraries, some of which are now open just two or three days per week. Under the proposal, each branch would be open a minimum of five days each week:

### GOVERNOR SIGNS SB 154-THOMPSON

Our office is pleased to announce that this morning Governor Pete Wilson signed in to law SB 154 by Senator Mike Thompson (D-St. Helena). SB 154 will allow a county board of supervisors to establish a 1/8 cent or 1/4 cent sales tax for library purposes, subject to the approval of 2/3rds of the voters. The time period for the tax could not exceed 16 years, and the revenues collected can only be used for funding library programs and operations within the county.

Upon learning of the Governor's signature on his measure, Senator Thompson stated:

"Without an additional source of revenue, many of our community libraries will be forced to close their doors for the last time," Thompson said. "We have the opportunity to stop this erosion by providing local communities the power to save these treasurers. This is an effort to provide local voters with the ability to provide the funds necessary to save and enhance libraries in their own communities."

Two years ago, the legislature passed, and the Governor signed, a similar measure for San Joaquin county and the previous year, for Stanislaus county. Senator Thompson's bill now extends that option to other counties throughout the state, who have the ability to obtain 2/3rds approval of the voters, to restore library hours and book purchases.

SB 154-Thompson is Chapter 88, Statutes of 1997. CLA thanks Senator Thompson for all of his hard work on our behalf and for his ongoing commitment to library issues.
