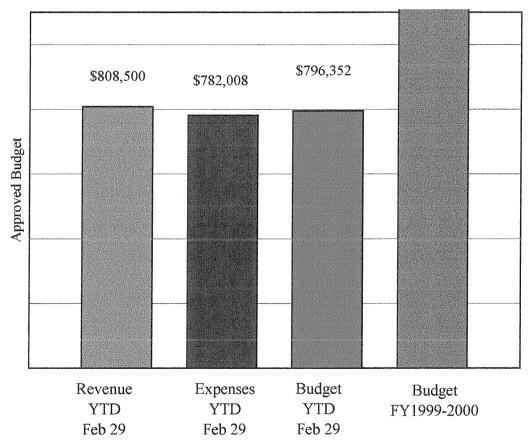

The print vending software is in the final stages of being testing for compatibility by the Gates technicians.

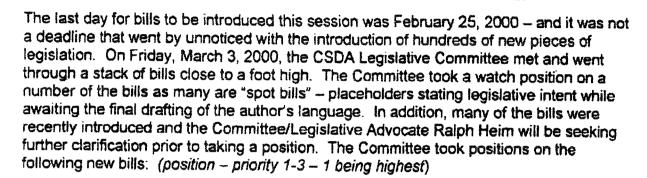

AB 1396 (Villaraigosa) – This bill will be the vehicle for the Speaker's Commission on State and Local Government Finance. This Commission's report is in its final stages and should be printed within the next few weeks. If you are interested in viewing the Commission's recommendations they are available on the following website location www.speaker.metroforum.org.

AB 2838 (Hertzberg) – This bill includes the recommendations from the Commission on Local Governance for the 21st Century. The 243-page bill is being discussed in detail by a Task Force called together by "soon-to-be Speaker" Assembly Member Hertzberg of which CSDA Legislative Advocate Ralph Heim is a participant. CSDA has taken a "support with amendments" position on the report and bill.

A Joint Conference Committee is being established in the Legislature to review all of the recent reports on state/local government finance and structure. Senators Peace, Poochigian and Perada appear to be the selected Senate members. The Assembly representatives have not yet been identified. CSDA will closely follow the activities of the Joint Committee and keep members informed of the discussions.

Retirement – A handfull of bills have been introduced that deal with public employees retirement benefits. A subcommittee has been established by the Legislative Committee to review these specific bills and report back with recommendations.

The next meeting of the CSDA Legislative Committee is scheduled for April. CSDA will report on any amended and established positions at that time. Dear Member District:

Article X of the Bylaws of SDWCA provides that the Bylaws may be amended at any time by a majority vote of the Board of Directors following a thirty (30) day written notice to all participating member districts of the amendment proposed to be adopted. The Board of Directors has voted to notify member district of a proposed amendment to Article II Section D of the Bylaws with respect to filling vacancies on the Board of Directors.

Currently the Bylaws of the Authority are silent on the issue of how to fill a position on the Board of Directors which is to be filled by election, but for which no accepted nominations are received during the election process. This circumstance occurred with respect to the all-mail ballot election conducted in June 1999 for the position on the Board to be filled by a district from the lower one-third in terms of total premium paid to SDWCA during the fiscal year prior to the election. Since no nominations were received, a vacancy occurred on the Board of Directors upon the expiration of the term of the director occupying that position subject to election. The only alternative provided to the Board of Directors by the Bylaws to fill this position was to repeat the all-mail ballot procedure for that position, which is currently underway. The Board of Directors of the Authority believes that a more effective and timely procedure to fill the vacancy would be to allow the remaining members of the Board of Directors to appoint a representative of a participating member district which is in the same category of participating member districts listed in the order of total annual premium paid as the category of district that designated the director whose vacancy has occurred.

The language of the proposed amendment to the Bylaws is set forth below with the new language specified in bold lettering and the deleted language appearing with a line crossed through it.

D. <u>Vacancy</u>

Upon the death or resignation of a member of the Board of Directors appointed by the Board of Directors of the California Special Districts Association, the vacancy shall be filled for the balance of the unexpired term

by appointment by said CSDA Board of Directors. Upon the death, resignation, or ineligibility of any other member of the Board of Directors, or upon the withdrawal or involuntary termination of the membership of any district that designated a member to the Board of Directors, a vacancy shall occur. Such a vacancy shall be filled for the balance of the unexpired term by appointment by the participating member district that originally selected the deceased, resigned, or ineligible director, except that in the event that participating member district is no longer a member of SDWCA or does not fill the vacancy within 30 days after the vacancy occurred, then the vacancy shall be filled by appointment by the remaining members of the Board of Directors. In the event no accepted nominations are received for a position to be filled on the Board of Directors at an election, a vacancy shall occur upon the expiration of the term of the current district occupying the position subject to such election. vacancy shall be filled for the balance of the unexpired term by appointment by the remaining members of the Board of Directors. Such a Any director appointed by the remaining members of the Board of Directors shall be a representative of a participating member district which is in the same category of participating member districts listed in the order of total annual premium paid to SDWCA during the year prior to the filling of the vacancy as the category of district that designated the director whose vacancy has occurred in order to maintain the balance of one director from each of the upper, middle, and lower one-third category of districts and one from the membership-at-large.

In November of 1997 I provided you with a report on our efforts to address the priority recommendations resulting from the Convocation on Providing Public Library Services to California's 21st Century Population, which occurred in May of that year. Since my last report, I am pleased to say we have made significantly more progress toward implementation of many of the recommendations. Following is an update on those priority recommendations which have been addressed up to this point in time.

Recommendations by Priority

The recommendations below have been prioritized according to votes by Convocation participants with the top priorities listed first.

1. The State Library should take a leadership role (working with the California Library Association and membership, ALA¹, CALTAC², Friends, and partners) to develop a statewide public relations campaign. This would include a grant to develop a 3-5 year plan of ongoing activities, and a millennium conference. The campaign should tap major metropolitan areas of San Francisco, San Diego and Los Angeles and include messages that could be replicated locally, with a cost/benefit analysis (Promoting the Values of Libraries).

In April of 1998 the State Library began working with a joint CLA/CSL appointed task force charged with planning for a statewide library awareness campaign. The planning is now complete, and a San Diego pilot media campaign began January 3rd and will run until April 10, 2000. Detailed information regarding the planning, the pilot media campaign, as well as the public opinion poll conducted, and other background

information will be accessible shortly on the State Library's homepage (www.library.ca.gov.).

2. The State Library and public libraries should develop collections and programs for ages 10-18 years, beyond homework assignments (Collection Development).

During the last year, the State Library implemented the Youth Services Materials Grant Program which enabled public libraries to apply for \$5,000 or \$10,000 grants to develop collections for children's services and collections for young adults. Requests totaling \$2.8 million dollars were received and a total of 218 grants (\$1,760,000) were awarded. (144 grants for young adult collections and 74 grants for children's collections).

3. The California Library Association should take a leadership role (with the State Library providing funding) to develop opportunities for internships, models and programs that develop managers into directors. This would include release time grants to go to school plus tuition, while working to remove local restrictions (Staffing).

As reported in November 1997, the CLA Annual Conference in 1996, the California Library Association announced the creation of the Leadership Development Fund which is designed to support a wide variety of specialized training opportunities for CLA members who are becoming the leaders of tomorrow.

5. The State Library should implement a grant program for organizational joint ventures (institutional) to raise awareness of libraries in the community (Community Collaboration).

A 2000/2001 Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) grant proposal addressing this recommendation has been submitted for my consideration by staff.

8. Barriers to access should be addressed.

Library schools, The California Library Association, and all public libraries should work together to address and improve staff attitudes, lack of skills, and staff's need for training.

As reported in November of 1997, the California Library Association makes a significant contribution to staff training and continuing education through the presentation of its annual conference, which includes an enormous variety of training programs, as well as continuing education activities sponsored by CLA during the year at various locations in the state. In addition, the State Library will continue to support training events as appropriate.

The State Library, the California Library Association and public libraries should address the issue of disparities in funding.

As reported in November of 1997, the California Library Association (CLA) adopted a strong legislative platform in 1998 that addresses the disparities of funding through support of augmentation to the public library fund, legislation reversing the impacts of the property tax shifts of the early 1990s (ERAF) and a public library construction and renovation bond act. For current information on CLA's legislative platform, visit their website at www.cla-net/org.

11. The State Library, working with library schools, should train all library staff on the value of community joint ventures, using regional workshops, a manual, and a "train the trainer" approach (Community Collaboration).

A 2000/2001 Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) grant proposal addressing this recommendation has been submitted for my consideration by staff.

12. All public libraries should provide technology and information literacy training for the public in group and individual instruction with support from the State Library and library schools (Technology).

To address this issue, I have provided LSTA grant funds to a number of projects which could serve as models for other libraries. One such project is the INFOPEOPLE Program which many of you are already familiar with. Examples of other projects currently being funded in 1999/2000 which might serve as models include the "Certified Library Users" Project at the Sunnyvale Public Library, and the "Computadoras para tu Futuro" project at the Oceanside Public Library.

13. The State Library should expand Internet access in local public libraries through the InfoPeople project and other appropriate initiatives (Technology).

In 1997/98 the INFOPEOPLE program was expanded to another eighty-nine public library sites, dubbed Cycle III INFOPEOPLE libraries. In 1998/99 the program was expanded again to include an additional 87 public and special library sites. In 1999/2000 one of the project goals is to deliver training in new ways in order to make it more accessible to California library staff and community partners regardless of work schedule or geographic location.

15. The State Library should repeat the Immigrant Grant Program with small, easy-to-implement grants (Collection Development).

This recommendation has been implemented. The State Library awarded a series of non-English language materials grants in 1997/98.

16. The State Library and library schools should survey Partnerships for Change (PFC) libraries to determine the extent of impact on communities and library services and share findings statewide. This should be done with the idea that it may result in future grant projects (Community Collaboration).

Implemented. The survey has been completed. See recommendation #30 for additional information.

17. The State Library, the California Library Association, library schools and all public libraries should publicize the library's unique role in lifelong learning, both to the profession and to the public (Lifelong Learning).

Bookmarks promoting the role of libraries in lifelong learning have been produced and are in the process of being distributed to libraries.

18. The State Library should introduce at a public library director's forum the concept of managing organizational change, followed by a series of targeted programs that would enable libraries to receive customized assistance (Community Collaboration).

The topic was discussed at the 1998 Public Library Director's Forum.

20. The State Library should provide technology consulting services to public libraries, including a list of qualified consultants (Technology).

The State Library hired a Technology Coordinator in 1997, and an Electronic Resources Consultant in 1999.

22. The State Library should develop "Recommendations for Effective Library Service to Asian and Pacific Island Americans to complete the recommendations series on serving California's major ethnic populations" (Collection Development).

This recommendation was implemented with the publication of *Harmony in Diversity:* Recommendations for Providing Effective Library Services to Asian Language Speakers. This document is accessible on the State Library's homepage.

24. The State Library, the California Library Association and all public libraries should provide training for all library staff in customer service, technology, and working with diverse communities, particularly but not exclusively ethnic communities (Staffing).

In 1998/99 the State library provided Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) grant funds to each of the CLSA Systems to conduct customer service training for staff in their

region libraries. In addition, the California Library Association has also provided customer service training opportunities.

The State Library has awarded Library Services and Technology Act grant funds for various technology training projects such as INFOPEOPLE, and for 1999/2000 has also awarded LSTA grant funds for a series of training sessions on serving diverse communities. (See recommendation #30 for more information.)

26. The State Library should bring library schools and public librarians together for discussion of core competencies (Staffing).

The California Library Association has issued a set of core competencies which can be accessed at www.cla-net.org/pubs/competencies.html

27. The State Library, the California Library Association and public libraries should develop bilingual, bicultural staff and work to empower a "feminine" profession (Lifelong Learning).

To help address this issue, in 1998 the State Library initiated the "Public Library Staff Education Program". The program seeks to aid non-professional library staff from all backgrounds move into the library profession by providing tuition reimbursement, on a competitive basis, for library staff members pursuing a Master's degree in library science, or a paraprofessional library certificate or degree.

29. The State Library should develop a needs assessment template for collection development and distribute it to all California public libraries (Collection Development).

A 2000/2001 Library Services and Technology Act (LSTA) grant proposal addressing this recommendation has been submitted for my consideration by staff.

30. The State Library should expand the PFC methodology to include children, young adults, aging baby boomers, seniors, etc. (Community Collaboration)

In 1998/99, a Partnerships for Change manual was developed in 1999/2000, the State Librarian awarded Library Services and Technology Act grant funds for the presentation of a series of workshops on implementing a local Partnerships for Change program, utilizing the manual recently developed. Information about those workshops was recently mailed to all public library directors.

31. The State Library should fund internships for high school students at local public libraries (Staffing).

Before this issue could be addressed, State Library staff determined the need for a survey of the current status of the use of high school interns in public libraries. Therefore, in 1998/99, a survey was conducted. The results of that survey will be posted to the State Library's homepage.

33. The State Library, the California Library Association, library schools and all public libraries should recognize and respond to the need for continuing education in the areas of managing technology (Technology).

To help address issue, and other issues pertaining to continuing education, I have provided LSTA funding for the establishment of the Stanford-California State Library Institute for 21st Century Librarianship. More information on the institute can be found on their website at http://institute21.standford.edu/

Still to be Addressed:

- 4. The State Library and public libraries should establish LSTA³ mini-grants for promoting local libraries and community awareness activities (Promoting the Value of Libraries).
- 6. The State Library should establish and maintain an Internet site that includes core lists of selected multicultural resources, plus hard-to-find materials, collection development policies, etc. (Collection Development).
- 7. The California Library Association should establish minimum levels of technology standards for public libraries in order to ensure equity of access. This should also include an assessment of current technology levels in California public libraries (Technology).
- 9. The State Library and library schools should provide comprehensive technology training in a "train the trainers" format (Technology).
- 10. The State Library, the California Library Association and library schools should continue to develop tools for organizing the World Wide Web to support language and cultural diversity in California (Technology).
- 14. The State Library and all public libraries should support and facilitate community-based planning to determine their individual community's priorities for access (Access).
- 19. The State Library should create and fill a principal librarian position that specializes in development, public relations, networking and fundraising (Promoting the Value of Libraries).

- 21. Library schools should sponsor research on the implications of lifelong learning on collection development e.g., career and job changes, welfare reform, the technologically illiterate (Collection Development).
- 23. The State Library should encourage the formation of a task force to create a new performance measures for electronic library services (Technology).
- 25. The Library of Congress should continue to maintain standards for Spanish and Asian languages subject headings and other language subject headings e.g., Bilindex (Collection Development).
- 28. All public libraries should develop adequate resources in terms of staff, material and hours (Lifelong Learning).
- 32. All public libraries should reexamine and redefine staff duties and expectations so that being flexible, adapting to change, and being creative with the community equals success (Staffing).

Purpose of the Library of California Act:

The Legislature finds and declares that it is in the interest of the people of the state to ensure that all Californians have free and convenient access to all library resources and services that could provide essential information and enrich their lives; and, to respond fully and successfully to these information needs and to the diversity of California's population, libraries of all types and in all parts of the state must be enabled to interact, cooperate, and share resources. This policy shall be accomplished by enabling libraries of all types and in all parts of the state to provide their users with the services and resources of all libraries in this state, and by assisting libraries to provide and improve services to the underserved.

To achieve the purpose of the Act, the following actions were taken at the Library of California Board meeting in Los Angeles on February 17-18, 2000:

Adoption of Agenda

It was moved, seconded (Fong/Kallenberg) and carried unanimously that the 1. Library of California Board adopt the agenda as modified.

Approval of Minutes

It was moved, seconded (Kallenberg/Fong) and carried unanimously to approve the 2. draft minutes of the November 11-12, 1999 Library of California Board meeting as revised.

Suspend the agenda to take emergency action

It was moved, seconded (Fong/Purucker) and carried unanimously that the Library 3. of California Board suspends the agenda to take emergency action related to the Board's Program Priorities for FY 1999-2000.



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Library of California Program Priorities

4. It was moved, seconded (Fong/Kallenberg) and carried unanimously that the Library of California Board adopt the following Program Priorities which the Board identified as part of their Planning Session on February 16, 2000:

For FY 1999-2000 (not in priority order):

- Infrastructure for regional network development including operational funding
- Implement online databases in all regions aimed at the general public and youth
- Board decides the telecommunications model at the regional level and implements the selected model
- Begin the direct loan pilot

Regulations for the Library of California Act

5. It was moved by the Legislation Committee (Steinhauser) and carried unanimously that the Library of California Board direct its Chief Executive Officer to notice changes in the proposed regulations (Text of Modified Regulations, as revised by the Board on February 17, 2000 which adds a substitute page for page 27 of Exhibit C). The Board requests that the notice include a cover letter summarizing the changes and indicating that they do not inhibit the authority of Regional Library Networks to develop protocols. If no comments are received during that period, the Board further directs the Chief Executive Officer to submit these proposed regulations to the Office of Administrative Law. The Board further instructs its Chief Executive Officer to made any necessary changes without regulatory effect in the proposed regulations as defined in Title 1, California Code of Regulations Section 100, Subsections (a) 1, (a) 4, and (a) 5; and to provide additional information or clarification or corrections if necessary in the Rulemaking File. (See Attachment A)

Multitype Pilot Loan Programs

6. It was moved by the Access Services Committee (Fong) and carried unanimously that the Library of California Board direct its Chief Executive Officer to allocate Library of California funds not to exceed \$1,085,000 to implement a year-long Direct Loan Pilot Program commencing in April 2000.

Special Services Program – Literacy

7. It was moved, seconded (Tuttle/Purucker) and carried unanimously that the Library of California Board authorize its Chief Executive Officer to allocate, as soon as the state budget makes them available, the 2000/2001 California Library Literacy Service Act funds to local programs in accordance with the provisions of Section 18733.2 of the Education Code of California.

Special Services Program - Literacy

8. It was moved, seconded (Tuttle/Purucker) and carried unanimously that the Library of California Board authorize its Chief Executive Officer to allocate, as soon as the state budget makes them available, the 2000/2001 California Library Services Act Families for Literacy funds in accordance with the provisions of Education Code Section 18735 to local participants based upon the criteria set forth in the Families for Literacy application materials and prior performance in the Program, where applicable.

CLSA Consolidations and Affiliations

9. It was moved by the CLSA Transition Committee (Kallenberg) and carried unanimously that the Library of California Board approve the affiliation of the Los Gatos Public Library with the Silicon Valley Library System effective July 1, 2000, and waive the September 30, 1999 filing date for 2000/2001 affiliations.

CLSA Consolidations and Affiliations

10. It was moved by the CLSA Transition Committee (Kallenberg) and carried unanimously that the Library of California Board approve the affiliation of the Larkspur Public Library with the North Bay Cooperative Library System effective July 1, 2000, and waive the September 30, 1999 filing date for 2000/2001 affiliations.

Regional Library Network Development

11. It was moved, seconded (Kallenberg/Fong) and carried unanimously that the Library of California Board acknowledges the recommendation submitted by Region 2 and Region 8, that they become a single region for planning purposes, that there now be 7 instead of 8 Library of California Regional Planning Groups.

Regional Library Network Development

12. It was moved, seconded (Kallenberg/Purucker) and carried unanimously that the Library of California Board approve the criteria as listed on Page 5, Criteria 1 through 7 of Document 16, to be used to evaluate and critique applications for planning and project funding for network development from Library of California funds, and that the Chief Executive Officer be directed to apply these criteria in evaluating applications for FY 1998/99 and FY 1999/2000 funds. (See Attachment B)

Regional Library Network Development

13. It was moved, seconded (Kallenberg/Tuttle) and carried unanimously that the Library of California Board authorize the expenditure of Library of California funds not to exceed the following:

for Telecommunications Project requests
 (approximately 50% of request amounts submitted)
 for Database Project requests
 (approximately 75% of request amounts submitted)
 for Network Development requests
 (100% of request amounts submitted)
 for a total of
 \$2,760,000

and that this current expenditure does not constitute Board policy for long term distribution of funds; and that the Board directs the Chief Executive Officer to continue the process of accepting and reviewing applications for projects in funded areas of the Library of California Act both from regions and from staff, including development of initiatives which address the Board's adopted priorities for Library of California programs and services, and that a report be presented to the Board at their April 2000 meeting which includes an update on expenditures and recommendations for additional allocations.

TITLE 5 (Chapter 24, subchapter 2). LIBRARY OF CALIFORNIA

TEXT OF MODIFIED REGULATIONS

The Board has illustrated changes to the original text of the regulations (as modified and noticed in September 1999) in the following manner: regulation language __ originally proposed is underlined; deletions from the language originally proposed are shown in strikeout using a "——"; and additions to the language originally proposed are double-underlined.

Article 9 1. General Provisions

20300. Scope. The regulations contained in this chapter shall implement the Library of California Act, Chapter 4.5 of Part 11 of Division 1 of Title 1 of the Education Code, beginning with Section 18800 thereof.

Authority cited: Section 18821, Education Code.

Reference: Chapter 948, Statutes of 1998; Chapter 4.5, commencing with Section 18800 of the Education Code.

20301. Funding Provisions.

- (a) Funding distributed according to Library of California Act provisions shall be used to support library purposes.
- (b) Institutions and public library jurisdictions receiving reimbursement under the provisions of Education Code Section 18844 (a-e) may not collect fees for those same services or those portions thereof for which they have received reimbursement.

Authority cited: Section 18821, Education Code.

20302. Waiver of Dates. The state board may waive or reset any filing, effective, or other dates required by these regulations, if the state board determines that such action would best serve the purposes of the Act and that such action would result in a more timely and effective implementation.

Article 102. Definitions

20303 20302. Definitions.

Complete Strain

- (a) These additional definitions concerning Library of California Act components complement those set forth in Education Code Section 18810.
- (b) Additions to the definitions are as follows.
 - (1) "California Literacy Campaign" means the program authorized and funded under the California Library Literacy Service Act, Education Code Section 18733.
 - (2) "Chief Executive Officer" means the State Librarian.
 - (3) "Families for Literacy" means the program authorized and funded under the California Library Literacy Service Act, Education Code Section 18735.
 - (4) "Fiscal year" means the State fiscal year unless otherwise specified.



- (4) (5) "President" means the elected president of the state board.
- (5) (6) "Regional library network affiliation" means that a public library jurisdiction or an institution formally and legally joins a regional library network to obtain full membership status.
- (6) (7) "Regional library network consolidation" means the formal and legal joining of the geographic service areas, functions, services, and operations of two or more formerly separate regional library networks into a single regional library network, as defined in Education Code Sections 18840-18842.
- (3) "Regional library network division" means the separation of the geographic service areas, functions, services, operations, and membership of a single regional library network into two or more regional library networks, as defined in Education Code Sections 18840-18842.
- (8) (9) "Regional library network realignment" means a change in boundaries of two or more regional library networks.
- (10) "Regional network council" means regional library council, as defined in Education Code Section 18810 (r).

(9) (11) "Statewide electronic library card" means the mechanism by which a library user is authorized to obtain the services provided under Education Code Section 18844 (d), the Electronic Direct Access program. These services allow the user to browse the bibliographic catalogs of libraries statewide on a computer, identify and request library resources through a computer, and/or receive the information resources by means of a computer. The statewide electronic library card may be a physical card or an electronically authenticated equivalent or other appropriate vehicle.

(10) "Vice-President" means the elected vice-president of the state board.

Article 14 3. Library of California Board

20304 20303. Powers and Duties of the State Board. Pursuant to its authority to establish regional library networks, the state board may approve:

- (a) regional library network affiliations and withdrawals; and
- (b) regional library network consolidations, realignments, and divisions.

- 20305 20304. Officers of the State Board. The state board shall elect a president and a vice-president from its members. The term of each office shall be one year.
 - (a) The state board shall elect annually a president and vice-president at the last regular meeting of each calendar year.
 - (b) Should a vacancy occur in the office of president or vice-president, the state board shall elect one of its members to fill such vacancy for the remainder of the term. The state board shall take this action at its next regular meeting following the occurrence of the vacancy.
 - (c) <u>Duties of the President</u>. The president shall preside at all meetings of the state board, shall appoint committees and advisory bodies as authorized by the state board and as necessary to carry out its work, shall execute for the state board any documents requiring such execution, and shall perform such other duties as the state board determines.

(d) Duties of the Vice-President. The vice-president shall, in the absence of the president, perform the duties of the president.

20306 20305. Quorum. A quorum for all state board meetings shall be seven of the thirteen members.

20307 20306. Meetings of the State Board.

- (a) Frequency. Regular meetings of the state board shall be held at least four times each year, distributed over the course of the year.
- (b) Schedule. The tentative dates and locations for the regular meetings for the forthcoming calendar year shall be determined annually, at the last regular meeting of the calendar year.
- (c) Changes in Schedule. Nothing in this regulation shall be construed to prevent the state board from altering its regular meeting dates or altering the locations of meetings.
- (d) Meeting Notice. Any person or organization desiring to receive notice(s) of state board meetings may direct the request to: Library of California Board, California State Library, P. O. Box 942837, Sacramento, California 94237-0001.

20308 20307. Speakers.

- (a) Recognition of Speakers. Members of the public or the State Library staff may be recognized by the president to speak at any state board meeting. All remarks made shall be germane to the business at hand and shall be addressed to the president.
- (b) Subject of Remarks. All speakers before the state board shall confine their remarks to the subject indicated in the recognition of the president.

Authority cited: Section 18821, Education Code.

20308. Robert's Rules of Order. Except where the provisions of the Library of California

Act or of these regulations provide to the contrary, or when the state board determines otherwise, the state board shall operate under the provisions of Robert's Rules of Order.

The state board shall adopt an edition of Robert's Rules of Order as the edition for use by the state board.

20310 20309. Public Hearings. (a) The state board may hold a public hearing regarding any matter pending before it.

(b) Any public hearings held by the state board shall comply with the provisions of the California Administrative Procedures Act, Government Code Section 11340.

20311 20310. Public Records.

Inspection of the original copy of any public record of the state board, as defined in Government Code Section 6252 (d) and 6254, shall be permitted during the regular office hours of the California State Library, Library and Courts I Building, 914 Capitol Mall, Sacramento, California 95814.

Authority cited: Section 18821, Education Code and Section 6253.4, Government Code.

Article 12 4. Eligible Libraries

20312 20311. Continuation of Membership.

- (a) Each institution or public library jurisdiction shall continue as a member of a regional library network as long as:
 - (1) at least one of its participating libraries meets the eligibility standards required by Education Code Section 18830 (a) and complies with the agreements required by Education Code Section 18830 (b);
 - (2) the local governing agencies and appropriate administrative authorities do not reduce funding for library services as a result of membership in the regional library network and participation in the programs and services delivered under this Act; and

- (3) the institution or public library jurisdiction and its participating libraries comply with the resource sharing standards specified in Section 20313 20312 of this subchapter.
- (b) Each regional library network shall assure the compliance of its members with these provisions through its membership policies and procedures.

Authority cited: Section 18821, Education Code.

20313 20312. Resource Sharing Standards.

- (a) Each participating library shall participate in one or more of the four access services components in Education Code Section 18844 (a-d).
- (b) Each member of a regional library network shall provide access to the library's bibliographic records and location information for those resources it has agreed to share with other libraries, to support the purposes of Education Code Sections 18842 (d) and 18851(a-b). The access shall be provided in such form, manner, and frequency as are agreed upon by the member and either the regional library network or the state board, whichever is appropriate for the database(s) described in Section 20330 (a) of this subchapter. The access shall be provided in such form, manner, and frequency as established through subsequent rulemaking conducted under the provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, commencing at Section 11340).

Authority cited: Section 18821, Education Code.

Reference: Section 18830 (b), 18842 (d), 18844, and 18851 (a-b), Education Code.

20314 20313. Affiliation with a Regional Library Network.

- (a) If any institution or public library jurisdiction joins the regional library network serving its geographic area under the provisions of Education Code Section 18830, its affiliation shall be certified by the state board.
- (b) Should an institution or public library jurisdiction wish to join a regional library network other than the one serving its geographic area, it may request an exception to the geographic boundary requirement from the state board. An exception may also be requested to enable all participating libraries of a single institution or public library jurisdiction to be served by a single regional library network. The state board's approval for exceptions shall be based on its determination that:
 - (1) the proposed membership is at least as effective a way of carrying out the purposes of the Act as would be the case if the membership were with the regional library network serving the geographic area; and



- (2) the proposed membership does not result in an inefficient expenditure of state funds or redundancy of service.
- (c) If the participating libraries of an institution or a public library jurisdiction are located in geographic areas served by different regional library networks, the institution or public library jurisdiction may become a member of each regional library network serving one or more of its participating libraries. However, each participating library shall receive state-supported services from a single regional library network and only that regional library network shall file a certification of library participation with the state board under the provisions of Section 20314 20313 (f) of this subchapter for the participating library.
- (d) The administrative body of the regional library network shall file a notice of agreement and the institutional governing body or the public library jurisdictional governing body shall file an affiliation request with the state board by April 1 of the fiscal year prior to the fiscal year when such status is sought.
 - (1) The notice of agreement shall certify that the regional library network approves the membership application of the institution or public library jurisdiction.
 - (2) The affiliation request shall certify that the governing body or appropriate administrative authority for the institution or jurisdiction wishes to join the regional library network and agrees to comply with the provisions of this Act.
- (e) For purposes of determining the eligibility of the affiliating institution or public library jurisdiction to receive services and funds under the provisions of this Act, an affiliation shall be considered effective beginning July 1 of the fiscal year immediately following the fiscal year in which the affiliation is certified by the state board. The state board may approve an earlier effective date if it determines that such action would best serve the purposes of the Act.



- (f) Participating Libraries.
 - (1) If a library within a member institution or member public library jurisdiction elects to become a participating library and it meets the eligibility criteria for a participating library as set forth in Education Code Section 18830 (a-b), and its participation is approved by the regional library network, the administrative body of the regional library network shall file a certification of library participation with the state board by April 1 of the fiscal year prior to the fiscal year when such status is sought.

(2) For purposes of determining the eligibility of the participating library to receive services and funds under the provisions of this Act, the status of the library as a participating library shall be considered effective beginning July 1 of the fiscal year immediately following the fiscal year in which the certification of library participation is filed with the state board. The state board may approve an earlier effective date if it determines that such action would best serve the purposes of the Act.

20315 20314. Withdrawal from a Regional Library Network.

- (a) If a member institution or public library jurisdiction does not retain its membership in a regional library network, the regional library network shall notify the state board within thirty days following the official action of the member and/or the regional library network.
- (b) If a participating library does not retain its status as a participating library in a regional library network, the regional library network shall notify the state board within thirty days following the official action of the member on behalf of its participating library and/or the regional library network.
- (c) For the purposes of determining the eligibility of an institution or a public library jurisdiction or a participating library to receive services and funds under the provisions of this chapter, a withdrawal shall be considered effective upon filing the notification with the state board.

20316 20315. Membership Eligibility Appeals.

- (a) If an institution or a public library jurisdiction considers the membership eligibility policies and/or membership eligibility actions of the regional library network serving its geographic area to be inconsistent with the purposes and provisions of this Act, it may file an appeal with the state board.
- (b) An appeal shall include references to the relevant purposes and/or provisions of the Act; information on the membership eligibility policies and/or membership eligibility actions of the regional library network which appear inconsistent with the Act; and any available documentation.
- (c) The state board shall notify the regional library network of the appeal and shall invite the regional library network to respond to the appeal, which response is due within sixty days of the state board's notice.

- (d) The state board shall take action on the appeal within one hundred and fifty days of the institution's or public library jurisdiction's initial filing.
- (e) The state board's determination shall be based upon:
 - (1) the accuracy of the data presented in the appeal;
 - (2) the impact of the regional library network's membership eligibility actions and/or membership eligibility policies on resource sharing in the geographic region and the state;
 - (3) the consistency of the regional library network's membership eligibility actions and/or membership eligibility policies with the purposes and provisions of the Act; and
 - (4) the exclusion or inclusion of libraries by type, size, or other factors inconsistent with the purposes of this Act as a result of the regional library network's membership eligibility actions and/or membership eligibility policies.
- (f) The decisions of the state board shall become effective thirty days from its official action on the appeal.

20317 20316. Establishment of Regional Library Networks.

- (a) The state board shall use the following criteria to approve the boundaries of the regional library networks, considering both cost-effectiveness and relationship to the resource sharing purposes of this chapter: public library jurisdictional boundaries; commonality with boundaries of educational institutions; recognition of current transportation, marketing, and communication patterns; location of and access to library resources; adequacy of resources for resource sharing purposes; population; and geographical contiguity.
- (b) Every geographic area of the state shall be served by a regional library network.
- (c) Upon receipt of a plan for a regional library network as set forth in Education Code Section 18840, the state board shall review the plan for completeness and for compliance with the purposes and provisions of the Act.

- (d) The state board shall conclude its plan review within one hundred and twenty days from the submission of a plan and approve it or disapprove it. If a regional library network's plan is disapproved, the state board shall note the reason(s) for its disapproval and may make recommendations as to modifications which would make the plan approvable. A modified plan may be re-submitted for state board consideration.
- (e) Upon state board approval, a regional library network shall be established for the purposes of this Act and its organization and members shall be recognized as eligible to receive services and funds under the provisions of this Act. The establishment and recognition of the regional library network shall be considered effective on the first July 1 following state board approval. The state board may approve an earlier effective date if it determines that such action would best serve the purposes of the Act.

20318 20317. Consolidation of Regional Library Networks.

- (a) If any two or more regional library networks whose borders are contiguous wish to consolidate, a joint notice of intent, approved by the regional network councils of the consolidating regional library networks, shall be filed with the state board no later than September 1 of the fiscal year immediately preceding the July 1 effective date of the consolidation. Regional library network affiliation authorizations approved by the institutional or public library jurisdictional governing body of each member of the new consolidated regional library network, and a new regional library network plan as specified in Education Code Section 18840, shall be filed with the state board no later than January 15 of the fiscal year immediately preceding the July 1 effective date of the consolidation.
- (b) The state board's approval of requests for regional library network consolidations shall be based on the criteria for the establishment of regional library networks specified in Section 20318 20316 of this subchapter and upon the state board's determination that the consolidation provides at least as effective a way of carrying out the purposes of the Act as would be the case if the consolidation did not occur.
- (c) For purposes of determining the eligibility of the regional library networks and their members to receive services and funds under other provisions of the Act, a consolidation approved by the state board shall be considered effective beginning July 1 of the fiscal year immediately following the fiscal year in which the consolidation authorizations are filed. The state board may approve an earlier effective date if it determines that such action would best serve the purposes of the Act.

20319 20318. Realignment of Regional Library Networks.

- (a) If any two or more regional library networks whose borders are contiguous wish to realign their boundaries, a joint notice of intent, approved by the regional network councils of the realigning regional library networks, shall be filed with the state board no later than September 1 of the fiscal year immediately preceding the effective date of the realignment. Regional library network affiliation requests approved by the institutional or public library jurisdictional governing body of each member of the new regional library networks, and revised or new regional library network plans as specified in Education Code Section 18840, shall be filed with the state board no later than January 15 of the fiscal year immediately preceding the effective date of the realignment.
- (b) The state board's approval of requests for regional library network realignments shall be based on the criteria for the establishment of regional library networks specified in Section 20318 20316 of this subchapter and upon the state board's determination that the realignment provides at least as effective a way of carrying out the purposes of the Act as would be the case if the realignment did not occur.
- (c) For purposes of determining the eligibility of the regional library networks and their members to receive services and funds under other provisions of the Act, a realignment approved by the state board shall be considered effective beginning July 1 of the fiscal year immediately following the fiscal year in which the realignment authorizations are filed. The state board may approve an earlier effective date if it determines that such action would best serve the purposes of the Act.

- (a) If a regional library network wishes to divide into two or more regional library networks, a notice of intent approved by its regional network council shall be filed with the state board no later than September 1 of the fiscal year immediately preceding the July 1 effective date of the division. Regional library network affiliation authorizations approved by the institutional or public library jurisdictional governing body of each member of the new regional library networks, and a new regional library network plan as specified in Education Code 18840 for each regional library network resulting from the division, shall be filed with the state board no later than January 15 of the fiscal year immediately preceding the July 1 effective date of
- (b) The state board's approval of requests for regional library network divisions shall be based on the criteria for the establishment of regional library networks specified in Section 20318 20316 of this subchapter and upon the state board's determination that the division provides at least as effective a way of carrying out the purposes of the Act as would be the case if the division did not occur.

(c) For purposes of determining the eligibility of the regional library networks and their members to receive services and funds under other provisions of the Act, a division approved by the state board shall be considered effective beginning July 1 of the fiscal year immediately following the fiscal year in which the division request is filed. The state board may approve an earlier effective date if it determines that such action would best serve the purposes of the Act.

- 20321 20320. Regional Library Network Long-Range Plan and Annual Plan of Service. To continue to qualify for funding under the Library of California Act, each regional library network shall submit a long-range plan and an annual plan of service to the state board for its approval.
 - (a) The long-range plan shall set forth the goals and objectives for the regional library network over a three year period, relative to the purposes of this Act and the needs of people within the region.
 - (b) The annual plan of service shall provide for:
 - (1) services to advance the regional library network's long-range goals and objectives; and
 - (2) a budget proposed for the next fiscal year.
 - (c) Following approval by the regional network council, the long-range plan and annual plan of service shall be submitted annually to the state board in the format and manner specified by the state board by April 1 of the fiscal year immediately preceding the fiscal year for which funds are requested.



- (d) The state board shall review the long-range plan and the annual plan of service for compliance with the purposes and provisions of the Act.
- (e) The state board shall conclude its review within sixty days from the submission of the plans and approve or disapprove them. If a regional library network's plans are disapproved, the state board shall note the reason(s) for their disapproval and may make recommendations as to modifications which would make the plans approvable. Modified plans may be re-submitted for state board consideration.
- (f) Any revision of the annual plan of service, including its budget, shall be submitted to the chief executive officer at least thirty days prior to the effective date of the proposed changes.

(g) In addition, each regional library network shall file by October 1 of each year a report, in the format and manner prescribed by the state board for the fiscal year just ended, that describes the actual accomplishments and expenditures of the regional library network program, compares them with the planned accomplishments and expenditures for the fiscal year reported, and includes other appropriate commentary.

- 20323 20322. Interlibrary Loan. This program of the Act supports the sharing of library materials through interlibrary loan. Library resources needed by a library user and not available in the user's library may be made available to the user via interlibrary loan.
 - (a) Members of regional library networks are eligible to obtain interlibrary loans and to receive reimbursement for interlibrary loans under the provisions of this chapter. A library shall agree both to extend interlibrary loan services and initiate interlibrary loan requests for its primary clientele in order to participate in this program.
 - (b) An interlibrary loan shall result in reimbursement under Education Code Section 18844 (a) if it consists of the loan of a library material in any format or if it consists of the provision of a copy in lieu of loan of a library material from one member of a regional library network to another member of any regional library network statewide. in accordance with the protocols of the regional library network and/or the state board.



(c) Interlibrary loan protocols shall be established through subsequent rulemaking conducted under the provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, commencing at Section 11340).

- (e) (d) Reimbursable costs are those handling costs and delivery costs which a lending library incurs in filling a successfully completed interlibrary loan request.—The state board shall review and approve the cost data annually.
- (e) The reimbursement formula and procedures shall be established through subsequent rulemaking conducted under the provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, commencing at Section 11340).
- (d) (f) To obtain reimbursement, a regional library network member shall provide to the state board by the deadline date, an invoice detailing its interlibrary loan transactions for the appropriate period. For audit purposes, a record of these invoices must be maintained for four years.

- 20324 20323. Patron Referral and Onsite Services. This program of the Act enables library users from one institution or public library jurisdiction to use library services and resources in another institution or public library jurisdiction which would otherwise be inaccessible to them.
 - (a) Members of regional library networks are eligible to refer patrons under this program. Members of regional library networks are eligible to receive reimbursement for onsite services delivered under the provisions of this Act.
 - (1) The provision of onsite services to a referred library patron shall result in reimbursement under Education Code Section 18844 (b) if the services are delivered and if the referral originated from another member of the regional library network in accordance with protocols developed by the regional library network.
 - (2) The provision of onsite services to a referred library patron shall result in reimbursement under Education Code Section 18844 (b) if the services are delivered and if the referral originated from a member of any regional library network statewide in accordance with protocols developed by the state board. Protocols shall be established through subsequent rulemaking conducted under the provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, commencing at Section 11340).



- (b) Information agencies with uncommon and exceptional onsite services and resources, which would otherwise be inaccessible to the public, may receive designation as an eligible recipient of reimbursement funds under Education Code Section 18844 (b).
 - (1) The information agency may apply to a regional library network to provide services to its members provided that:

- ex (A) it is one of the few if not the only source of the onsite service in the region; and
- b. (B) it agrees to comply with the purposes and provisions of this Act.
- (2) The information agency may apply to the state board to provide services to members of all regional library networks statewide provided that:
 - <u>a.</u> (A) it is one of the few if not the only source of the onsite service in the state; and
 - b. (B) it agrees to comply with the purposes and provisions of this Act.
- (c) Reimbursable onsite services are those identified by the state board. The state board shall review and approve the list of services eligible for reimbursement every two years.
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- (d) Reimbursable costs are those identified by the state board.—The state board shall review and approve the cost data every two years.
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- (e) To obtain reimbursement, an institution or a public library jurisdiction or an information agency shall provide to the state board by the deadline date, an invoice detailing its provision of onsite services to referred library patrons for the appropriate period. For audit purposes, a record of these invoices shall be retained for four years.

- (f) Reimbursable services, costs, and procedures shall be established through subsequent rulemaking conducted under the provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, commencing at Section 11340).

- 20325 20324. Direct Loan. This program of the Act enables library users to receive direct borrowing privileges at libraries for which these people do not constitute the primary clientele.
 - (a) Members of a regional library network are eligible to receive reimbursement for extending direct borrowing privileges to people who are not part of their primary clientele, but who are part of the primary clientele of other members of its regional library network. Services shall be provided in accordance with the protocols of the regional library network.

(b) Members of a regional library network are eligible to receive reimbursement for extending direct borrowing privileges to people who are not part of their primary clientele, but who are part of the primary clientele of other members of any regional library network statewide.—Services shall be provided in accordance with the protocols of the state board. Protocols shall be established through subsequent rulemaking under the provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, commencing at Section 11340).



- (c) A library participating in a direct loan program under this Act shall apply the same rules, policies, procedures, and fees related to borrowing privileges to eligible borrowers from other institutions or public library jurisdictions as are applied to individual members of its own primary clientele. Where there are different categories of primary clientele with different service levels, the library shall identify the service level applicable to eligible borrowers from other institutions or public library jurisdictions.
- (d) Libraries participating in this program shall ascertain whether or not each person requesting direct borrowing privileges is a member of its primary clientele. If the person is a member of the library's primary clientele, such services shall not be reimbursable under this Act.
- (e) An eligible borrower shall hold a valid borrowers card (or equivalent) issued by a member of a regional library network in recognition of his or her status as part of the primary clientele of that institution or public library jurisdiction.
 - (1) Any additional identification generally required by a library of its own primary clientele may also be required.
 - (2) The lending library may also require the name and current address of the borrower and the name and current address of the institution or public library jurisdiction through which the borrower is eligible for service.
- (f) Contracts for loan and other services provided by an institution or a public library jurisdiction to the primary clientele of another institution or public library jurisdiction are not prohibited. Persons served under such contracts shall be registered as part of the primary clientele of the institution or public library jurisdiction providing the contract service. No reimbursement for services provided under the terms of such contracts shall be provided under this Act.
- (g) Loan of a library material of any type by an institution or public library jurisdiction to an eligible borrower shall result in reimbursement from the state under Education Code Section 18844 (c). Reimbursements shall be equitable in that:
 - (1) each loan to an eligible borrower from a type of library different from the lending library shall be reimbursed; and

- (2) each loan to an eligible borrower from the same type of library as the lending library shall be reimbursed on a net imbalance basis, to the extent that the number of items loaned to its non-primary clientele exceeds the number of items borrowed by its primary clientele from other libraries of the same type.
- (h) To obtain reimbursement, an institution or public library jurisdiction shall provide to the state board by the deadline date, an invoice detailing its provision of direct loan services in the form and manner determined by the state board and for the appropriate period. For audit purposes, a record of these invoices shall be retained for four years.
- (i) Reimbursable costs are those handling costs incurred by the lending library in processing a direct loan under the provisions of this Act. The state board shall periodically review and approve such cost data at least every two years.



(j) The reimbursement formula and procedures shall be established through subsequent rulemaking conducted under the provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, commencing at Section 11340).

- 20326 20325. Additional Direct Loan Provisions for Public Library Jurisdictions. Each public library jurisdiction that is a member of a regional library network shall provide direct borrowing privileges to all residents of the geographic area served by the regional library network in accordance with Education Code Section 18842 (c) and shall provide such service under the provisions of Section 20326 20324 of this subchapter.
 - (a) In addition to the reimbursable services identified in Section 20326 20324 (a-b) of this subchapter, each public library jurisdiction is eligible to receive reimbursement for extending direct borrowing privileges to Californians who are not residents of its geographic jurisdiction and who are not part of the primary clientele of other members of any regional library network.
 - (b) For the purposes of this Act, each resident of the state shall be deemed to have a single legal residency, which shall entitle him or her to resident library services of the public library jurisdiction in which he or she resides, and such services shall not be reimbursable under this Act. In determining the places of residency, the provisions of Government Code Section 244 shall apply.
 - (c) Extension of borrowing privileges by public library jurisdictions to residents of the geographic area served by the regional library network should shall not adversely affect the level of service provided by that library to its own primary clientele.



- (1) If existing public library service programs, funded at the local level, are diminished as a result of this resource sharing program, the public library jurisdiction may request a waiver of its participation in the direct loan program or a waiver of one or more of the provisions of Section 20326 20324 (c) of this subchapter.
- (2) The regional library network shall submit the original waiver request and the subsequent recommendation of the regional library network to the state board for its consideration within ninety days from receipt of the original request.
- (3) The state board shall approve or disapprove the waiver request within one hundred and twenty days of the waiver filing with the state board by the regional library network. If approved, the provisions of the waiver shall be effective thirty days from the date of the state board's action and shall be effective for the time period specified by the state board in its approval.
- (4) Criteria considered by the state board in making its determination on the waiver request shall include: impact of the direct loan program on local library service; equity of benefits to the primary clientele of the requesting library; relationship of the action proposed by the public library jurisdiction to the purposes of the Act; and recommendation of the regional library network.

- 20327 20326. Electronic Direct Access. This program of the Act enables library users to obtain electronic borrowing privileges and electronic information delivery privileges from libraries for which these people do not constitute the primary clientele.
 - (a) Each member of a regional library network is eligible to authorize library users who constitute part of its primary clientele to utilize this service and is eligible to receive reimbursement for extending this service to people who are not part of its primary clientele but who are part of the primary clientele of other members of regional library networks statewide.
 - (b) A member of a regional library network desiring to participate in this program shall:
 - (1) make its own bibliographic records and location information as described in Section 20330 20328 (a) of this subchapter available electronically statewide:
 - (2) at its discretion, authorize members of its primary clientele to receive electronic borrowing privileges and electronic information delivery privileges by issuing statewide electronic library cards to them:
 - (3) provide electronic borrowing privileges and electronic information delivery privileges to authorized holders of statewide electronic library cards; and

(4) deliver services in accordance with the protocols of the regional Herary network and/or the state board established through subsequent rulemaking conducted under the provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, commencing at Section 11340).



- (c) An eligible borrower is a person who is authorized by and holds a valid statewide electronic library card issued by a member of any regional library network statewide.
 - (1) Any additional identification normally required by a library of its own primary clientele may also be required.
 - (2) The lending library may also require the name and current address of the borrower and the name and current address of the institution or public library jurisdiction by which the borrower is eligible for service.
 - (3) Items may be sent electronically to the computer transmitting the request or to a designated substitute computer or to an e-mail account.
 - (4) Items which cannot be transmitted electronically may be delivered physically to the member of the regional library network authorizing the eligible borrower. Alternatively, the borrower may pay for delivery costs for delivery to an alternate site. The borrower is responsible for returning the item to the library authorizing him or her as an eligible borrower or, alternatively, paying the delivery and related costs of returning the item to the lending library.
- (d) Electronic transmission of information or loan of a library material of any type by an institution or a public library jurisdiction to an eligible borrower shall result in reimbursement from the state under Education Code Section 18844 (d). An institution or public library jurisdiction shall not collect reimbursement for the same transaction under both the interlibrary loan program and the electronic direct access program.
- (e) Reimbursable costs are those handling costs and delivery costs which a lending library incurs in filling a successfully completed electronic direct loan transaction. Reimbursable costs may vary depending upon the degree to which electronic technology supports the process. The state board shall review and approve the cost data at least every two years.



(f) To obtain reimbursement, an institution or public library jurisdiction shall provide to the state board, by the deadline date, an invoice detailing its electronic direct access transactions for the appropriate period. For audit purposes, a record of these invoices shall be maintained for four years.



The reimbursement formula and procedures shall be established through subsequent rulemaking conducted under the provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, commencing at Section 11340).

Article 15 7. Statewide Services

- 20328 20327. Telecommunications. This program of the Act assists all participating libraries in obtaining equitable access to the resources and services of all other California libraries through a telecommunications infrastructure.
 - (a) Each member of a regional library network is eligible to receive state funds for its participating libraries to become electronic doorways to other library resources and services statewide.—The state board may identify minimum technical specifications and identify products and services that will allow libraries to meet this designation, and it may allocate funds to assist eligible libraries to reach this threshold. The state board shall identify minimum technical specifications and/or performance standards to allow libraries to meet this designation through subsequent rulemaking conducted under the provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, commencing at Section 11340).



(b) Any combination of regional library network members, including regional library networks, is eligible to receive state funds for linking library automation systems, supporting electronic access and resource sharing, maintaining access to electronic files and databases, and other services pursuant to the purpose of this Act. The state board may determine the minimum technical specifications and identify products and services capable of implementing linked systems projects. The state board shall identify minimum technical specifications and/or performance standards for obtaining state funds through subsequent rulemaking conducted under the provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, commencing at Section 11340).



(c) The state board may assist any participating library in obtaining access to telecommunications and Internet services with sufficient capacity, hours of availability, and other technical specifications to support equitable service statewide.



Any member of a regional library network is eligible to receive state funds to assist its participating libraries with the telecommunications ability to provide access for its clientele to services provided under this Act in a manner that is generally available statewide. The state board shall identify minimum technical specifications and/or performance standards to achieve this equity through subsequent rulemaking conducted under the provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, commencing at Section 11340).



(d) The state board shall determine priorities and eligible costs for telecommunications projects on at least an annual basis.

(d) The state board shall identify priorities, criteria, procedures, and eligible costs for telecommunications projects through subsequent rulemaking conducted under the provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, commencing at Section 11340).

- 20329 20328. Bibliographic Databases. This program of the Act ensures that the bibliographic records and location information representing resources in participating libraries are made available statewide.
 - (a) Members of regional library networks shall provide access to the bibliographic records and location information for those resources they share with other libraries. Such access shall be provided in accordance with the protocols of the regional library network or state board, whichever is appropriate for the database(s). Bibliographic records and location information may be provided for books, serials, non-print items, information files, and other library materials. Protocols shall be established through subsequent rulemaking conducted under the provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, commencing at Section 11340).



- (b) For those library resources available for sharing but for which bibliographic records and location information are unavailable, incomplete or incompatible with current national standards for cataloging, or inaccessible in electronic format, or a combination thereof, the state board may allocate funds to:
 - (1) reimburse regional library network members for cataloging previouslyuncataloged or inadequately-cataloged materials in an online communications format at the current national standards of Machine Readable Cataloging (MARC 21; 1999 edition; Network Development and MARC Standards Office, Library of Congress) which is hereby incorporated by reference; and



(2) reimburse regional library network members for converting local bibliographic records to the online communications format at the current national standards of Machine Readable Cataloging (MARC 21; 1999 edition; X Network Development and MARC Standards Office, Library of Congress) which is hereby incorporated by reference.



(c) The state board may establish and maintain electronic access to bibliographic records and location information for library materials, through the creation of one or more centralized online databases, or through linking library automation system servers to one or more access clients, or both, depending upon the availability and capabilities of local or regional library resources and the priority for statewide access.

- (d) The state board may allocate funds to train library staff in the standards and technologies needed to support the creation and maintenance of bibliographic databases and to utilize linked systems or equivalent access.
- (e) The state board shall determine priorities and eligible costs for bibliographic database projects on at least an annual basis.
- (e) The state board shall identify priorities, criteria, procedures, and eligible costs for bibliographic databases projects through subsequent rulemaking conducted under the provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, commencing at Section 11340).

- 20329. Specialized Reference and Information Provision. This program of the Act enables libraries to draw upon the specialized information resources of other libraries statewide to answer questions beyond the capacity and capability of the regional library network and its members.
 - (a) The state board may designate libraries, regional library networks, and information agencies to respond to queries in specific subject areas and reimburse them for their services.
 - (b) The state board may allocate funds to libraries and regional library networks to make available or develop and assemble information resources especially relevant to culturally diverse populations and people with disabilities, converting those resources to electronic format in information modules and making them accessible statewide.
 - (c) The state board shall determine priorities and eligible costs for specialized reference and information provision services on at least an annual basis.
 - (c) The state board shall identify priorities, criteria, procedures, and eligible costs for specialized reference and information services projects through subsequent rulemaking conducted under the provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, commencing at Section 11340).

- 20331 20330. Enhanced Reference and Information Service. This program of the Act improves reference service at the local level in all participating libraries.
 - (a) Members of regional library networks or regional library networks or a combination thereof are eligible to receive state funds for reference enhancement projects.

 - (1) training in reference service provision;
 - (2) developing local library reference collections and services;
 - (3) providing consultations:
 - (4) conducting continuing education classes;
 - (5) developing and implementing reference evaluation tools; and
 - (6) other services as necessary to improve local reference service under the provisions of this program.
- (c) Services provided under this program shall be offered to members of regional library networks.
- (d) The state board shall select the projects for implementation on the basis of the following criteria:
 - (1) demonstrated need for the project;
 - (2) evidence of adequate planning;
 - (3) anticipated effectiveness of the proposed approach and plan of operation in addressing the need;
 - (4) qualifications and skills of key personnel;
 - (5) cost-effectiveness and adequacy of resources to achieve the project goal(s);
 - (6) anticipated contribution of the project to improvement of reference service in libraries; and
 - (7) appropriateness of the evaluation plan.
- (e) Each applicant seeking funding under this program shall submit an application, in the manner and form and by the deadline established by the state board, that addresses the criteria in Section 20330 (d) of this subchapter.
- (e) The state board shall determine priorities and eligible costs for enhanced reference and information service projects on at least an annual basis.

(f) The state board shall identify priorities, procedures, and eligible costs for enhanced reference and information services projects through subsequent rulemaking conducted under the provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, commencing at Section 11340).



(f) (g) Each applicant receiving funds under this program shall submit a final report, in the manner and form and by the deadline set by the state board, comparing project goals with actual accomplishments and budget estimates with actual expenditures. The final evaluation, using the methodology specified in the application (Section 20330 [d][7] of this subchapter), shall also be included.

- 20332 20331. Cooperative, Coordinated Resource Development. This program of the Act encourages, promotes, and supports the cooperative acquisition and utilization of library resources among participating libraries.
 - (a) The state board may authorize the procurement of negotiate reduced acquisition costs or licensing costs and usage fees for members of regional library networks.



(b) The state board may allocate funds to support the trial participation of regional library network members in the use of library resources and technologies for a limited period of time, enabling them to use and evaluate information resources new to them. Member libraries may participate by contacting the state board.



- (c) The state board may allocate funds to develop, license, distribute, and support electronic files or databases to be used by members of regional library networks.
- (d) Any combination of regional library network members or a regional library network or a combination thereof is eligible to receive funds for cooperative, coordinated resource development projects.
 - (1) Eligible projects include but are not limited to:
 - a. (A) cooperative acquisition or selection processes to assure quality acquisitions and cost-effectiveness for all participants;
 - b. (B) collection agreements regarding areas of subject responsibilities for acquisition and/or long-term retention;
 - e. (C) shared storage and retention facilities;
 - d. (D) collection assessment and evaluation; and
 - e. (E) other projects as necessary to promote cooperative, coordinated resource development consistent with the purposes of this program.

- (2) Each participating library involved in a project under this program shall already be capable of meeting the basic, recurring information needs of its primary clientele through its locally supported collection. Library resources purchased, in whole or in part, under this program shall be widely accessible to Californians for the useful life of those resources and shall be represented on regional and statewide bibliographic databases or electronic information access gateways.
- (3) The state board shall select the projects for implementation on the basis of the following criteria:
 - a. (A) demonstrated need for the project;
 - b. (B) evidence of adequate planning:

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- e. (C) anticipated effectiveness of the proposed approach and plan of operation in addressing the need;
- d. (D) qualifications and skills of key personnel;
- e- (E) cost-effectiveness and adequacy of resources to achieve the project goal(s);
- £ (F) sufficient local or other funds committed to project purposes;
- g: (G) anticipated contribution of the project to the improvement of library collections available locally, regionally, and statewide;
- h. (H) plan for project continuation; and
- in (I) appropriateness of the evaluation plan.
- (4) Each applicant seeking funds under this program shall submit an application; in the manner and form and by the deadline established by the state board, that addresses these the criteria in Section 20331 (d)(3) of this subchapter.
- (4) The state board shall determine priorities and eligible costs for cooperative, coordinated resource development projects on at least an annual basis.
- (5) The state board shall identify priorities, procedures, and eligible costs for cooperative, coordinated resource development projects through subsequent rulemaking conducted under the provisions of the Administrative Procedure Act (Chapter 3.5 of Division 3 of Title 2 of the Government Code, commencing at Section 11340).

(5) (6) Each applicant receiving funds under this program shall submit a final report, in the manner and form and by the deadline established by the state board, comparing project goals with actual accomplishments and budget estimates with actual expenditures. The final evaluation, using the methodology specified in the application (Section 20330 [d][3][I] of this subchapter), shall also be included.

- 20333 20332. Preservation. This program of the Act preserves, and provides widespread access to, library materials documenting California's heritage, enhancing California's educational opportunities and economic future, and portraying California's cultural diversity.
 - (a) Any member of a regional library network or a regional library network or a combination thereof is eligible to receive funds for preservation projects.
 - (b) Eligible projects include but are not limited to:
 - (1) preservation of library materials in any format by reformatting, digitizing, conservation treatment, and other appropriate preservation methods;
 - (2) preservation program management, including needs assessment and planning, research and testing, training, disaster preparedness and recovery, and other managerial activities;
 - (3) improvement of collection security and the storage environment; and
 - (4) other projects necessary to preserve library materials consistent with the purposes of this program.
 - (c) Each member of a regional library network participating in a project under Education Code Section 18856 (b) shall demonstrate a commitment to ongoing preservation. Library resources preserved, in whole or part, under this program, shall be made available for long-term resource sharing purposes and shall be represented on electronic or bibliographic databases accessible regionally and/or statewide.
 - (d) The state board shall select the projects for implementation on the basis of the following criteria:
 - (1) demonstrated need for the project;
 - (2) evidence of adequate planning;
 - (3) anticipated effectiveness of the proposed approach and plan of operation in addressing the need;

- (4) qualifications and skills of key personnel;
- (5) cost-effectiveness and adequacy of resources to achieve the project goal(s);
- (6) sufficient local or other funds committed to project purposes;

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Regional Library Network Development Criteria:

- 1. Grants should be considered in relation to the progress a Planning Region has made towards Regional Library Network Development relative to other planning regions.
- 2. Requests for planning funds should not exceed 50% of the original planning grant made to Planning Regions in 1999.
- 3. The outcome of efforts funded through project grants is development and support of direct public services.
- 4. Project requests are supported by needs assessment that validates the request.
- 5. Since the reason for providing supplemental planning and project funding is to enhance the ability of Planning Areas to become Regional Library Networks, grant applications should clearly demonstrate how funding will lead to network status.
- 6. It is the intent of the Board to award as much funding as is legally possible given the specified areas of funding currently allowable and given the timeframe of grant requests.
- 7. Funding of individual grants or programs does not constitute the establishment of Board policy or direction. Since the law allows for regional pilot programs, funding of a pilot does not constitute agreement that the pilot becomes the de facto statewide program.

ORANGE COUNTY BANKRUPTCY

TODAY'S DISTRIBUTION

<u>Purpose of today's distribution</u>: To distribute various funds to Pool Participants. The primary distribution is of Net Litigation Proceeds.

Amount being distributed today:

- \$863.5 million Net Litigation Proceeds and interest;
- \$17.8 million Additional Funds;
- \$20.9 million excluded funds;
- \$5 million professional fee reserve funds.

Amount being distributed to Pool Participants today: \$523 million.

Total amount recovered by Pool Participants: \$4.534 billion.

Percentage recovery by Pool Participants: 97% schools; 94% all others.

What are net litigation proceeds: The Net Litigation Proceeds are the proceeds of litigation brought against securities brokers, accountants, attorneys, bond ratings firms and others. All of the litigation was settled. The total amount of settlement proceeds was \$870,868,908.04 plus approximately \$28 million interest.

Who Brought the Litigation: The Representative, Mr. Thomas Hayes, former Treasurer and Auditor General of the State of California. Mr. Hayes was appointed as the Representative on the recommendation of the County and Pool Committee under the County's bankruptcy Plan of Adjustment.

What was the litigation about: The litigation sought to recover the losses sustained by the County and the Pool Participants when the County's investment pools sustained losses totaling approximately \$1.6 billion upon liquidation by the County in the last quarter of 1994.

Total litigation costs: Over \$50 million; over 2/3 paid to Hennigan Mercer & Bennett, counsel for the County and the Representatives.

Who was sued, and how much did they pay: The largest settlements were against Merrill Lynch (\$420 million), KPMG Peat Marwick (\$75 million), Morgan Stanley/Dean Witter (\$69.6 million), Nomura (\$47.8 million) and Lebouf, Lamb (\$45 million).

Who are the Pool Participants: The Pool Participants are the over 215 cities, school districts, community colleges, community facilities districts, the Orange County Transportation Authority, the Orange County Transportation Corridor Agencies, water districts and other municipal entities who had funds in the Orange County investment pools at the time the bankruptcy was filed. The

Pool Participants had the largest stake in the outcome of the County's bankruptcy. The Pool Participants' investments in the investment pools totaled \$4.77 billion as of the bankruptcy filing (December 6, 1996).

<u>Pool Committee</u>: The Pool Committee was appointed by the Bankruptcy Court to protect the interests of the Pool Participants. The Pool Committee selected Pat Shea, Esq. of Pillsbury Madison & Sutro as its counsel. Mr. Shea's telephone number is (619)544-3177.

<u>Subcommittees</u>: The Pool Committee formed subcommittees to represent the special interests of certain Pool Participants. The Schools Subcommittee represented the interests of Orange County schools. Its counsel is John Giovannone, Esq. of Sheppard Mullin Richter & Hampton. Mr. Giovannone's telephone number is (714)513-5100. The Cities Subcommittee represented cities' interests. Its counsel is Paul Glassman, Esq. of Peitzman Glassman & Weg. Mr. Glassman's telephone number is (310)552-3100.

What are Additional Funds: The "Additional Funds" are funds located by the County in various County administered accounts after the bankruptcy Plan was confirmed which previously were not known to exist. This distribution of Additional Funds comprised \$17.88 million, including interest. Approximately \$10.3 million of the Additional Funds was located in mid-1997, and the balance was located in late 1999. The County and the Pool Committee agreed in 1996 that any previously unidentified funds would be evenly split between the County and the Pool Participants. The Additional Funds were divided pursuant to this agreement.

What are excluded claims: Excluded claims are special direct claims against securities brokers, etc. owned by a few particular Pool Participants. These claims were also settled at the same time the Representative settled the pool-related claims against the securities brokers and other defendants and special distributional agreements were reached.

What is the Professional Fee Reserve: The Professional Fee Reserve was created to provide a mechanism for payment of the professional fees and costs of the Pool Participants. It was originally funded in 1995 in the amount of \$15 million. Approximately \$5 million of the Professional Fee Reserve is today being returned to Pool Participants since the Pool Committee and its subcommittees will be dissolved pursuant to the County's Plan of Adjustment on April 20, 2000.

<u>Remaining activities</u>: The Representative has the right to pursue a tax refund relating to interest paid on qualified settlement funds.

Effect of this distribution: The County's bankruptcy is essentially over. The Committees will be dissolved. The Representative is discharged.

GENERAL FACTS REGARDING THE BANKRUPTCY

Date bankruptcy was filed: 12/6/94

Reasons for bankruptcy filing: (1) to use the automatic stay provided by Bankruptcy Code Section 362 to prevent collateral calls by securities dealers who had entered into reverse repos with the County¹; and (2) to restructure the County's payment obligations.

<u>Did the filing fulfill its purpose</u>: There is substantial disagreement on this subject. Among other things, Bankruptcy Code Section 362 exempts collateral calls by securities dealers relating to reverse repos from the automatic stay.

Chapter: The bankruptcy was filed under Chapter 9, which is specifically for municipalities.

Judge: John R. Ryan.

Bankruptcy judges: Are appointed for 14 year terms.

Case no. and court: Orange County's bankruptcy was filed in the Santa Ana Division of the U.S. Bankruptcy Court for the Central District of California and assigned case number SA 94-22272-JR.

Orange County Investment Pools: The Pools were three investment pools maintained by the Orange County Treasurer (Robert Citron at the time). The Pools contained nearly all the County's funds and some or all of the Pool Participants' funds. Some Pool Participants (notably schools) were required by law to deposit their funds with the Orange County Treasurer; some did so to avoid the need for employing and paying a fund manager; and some did so to obtain the high returns provided by the Pools. Several Pool Participants are located outside of Orange County.

What happened to the Pools: The Pools traditionally were safely invested. Beginning in the early 1990's, Citron began a progressively more risky investment pattern. As evolved, his primary income-producing strategy involved using highly interest-rate sensitive investments, primarily derivatives including inverse floaters, to generate high returns. In November 1994, 40% of the Pools was invested in inverse floaters and other structured securities highly sensitive to interest rate changes.

Citron magnified the Pool's vulnerability to interest rates by leveraging the Pools through the use of reverse repos. (A reverse repo involves an agreement to sell a security combined with an agreement to repurchase the security at a set time at a pre-determined price. In essence, a reverse repo is a secured loan. Reverse repos are widely used to manage large amounts of cash.)

Normally the automatic stay (which is imposed in all bankruptcy cases) prohibits actions against the property of a debtor.

The Pools began to collapse when the Federal Reserve began increasing interest rates in February 1994.

In November 1994, the Pools had been leveraged over 2 $\frac{1}{2}$ times from a base portfolio of \$7.6 billion to a total portfolio of \$20.6 billion.

The Comprehensive Settlement Agreement: In May 1995, less than 5 months after the bankruptcy was filed, the Bankruptcy Court approved the Comprehensive Settlement Agreement ("CSA"). The CSA was a pivotal event in the bankruptcy, because it provided for distribution of approximately \$3.7 billion to Pool Participants. This enabled many of the Pool Participants to avoid filing their own bankruptcies, and avoided years of litigation over entitlement to the funds in the Pools. The CSA allowed Pool Participants to select between (i) waiving their claims against the County in exchange for certain allowed claims in the bankruptcy and joining the County in litigating their pool-related claims, or (ii) litigating their claims against the County and separately litigating their pool-related claims. Over 90% of Pool Participants decided to select the former option.

In response to your request of February 3, 2000 pursuant to the California Public Records Act, Section 6250 et seq. of the Government Code, I will be happy to provide you with access to all materials in the possession of Placentia Library District that were identified in your request of February 3, 2000 for the purpose of inspection and copying, with the exception of those materials that identify the name and address of the borrower and the titles of materials borrowed by an individual.

California Government Code Section 6267 requires that Placentia Library District, as a library supported by public funds, not disclose registration and circulation records without the permission of the person to whom the records pertain, or the order of the appropriate superior court. The term "circulation records" includes any information that identifies the patron borrowing particular books and other material. This section does not apply to statistical reports of registration and circulation nor to records of fines collected by the library.

Placentia Library District has an active accounts collection program that we will be happy to explain to you. You are welcome to make copies of the monthly reports from the Agency which provide detailed information about each current account in the collection process. The name and patron account number will not be available to you.

The "lost book" list for Placentia Library District is a report that is printed on demand. It does not contain the cost of the item nor the name of the borrower. We usually print the report in March or April when we are making decisions about replacement of lost last copies.

Placentia Library District is a member of the Tri-City Library Network which shares a library management and circulation system. The other member libraries are Yorba Linda and Anaheim. The system headquarters is located at the Anaheim Public Library.

RE: POSSIBLE RETURN TO SELF INSURANCE

Dear Member District:

Your SDWCA Board of Directors has directed that SDWCA and its member districts be prepared to return to self insurance status for fiscal year 2000-01. You will recall that SDWCA has been purchasing insurance on the commercial market since 1995-96 in order to maintain lower premium rates. If unsatisfactory insurance quotations are received for fiscal year 2000-01, your Board will then have the option of rejecting all quotations and returning to a self insured program. The Board will not have an opportunity to act on the insurance quotations until April 6, 2000.

In order to again become self insured, each member district must obtain a new Certificate of Consent to Self Insure from the Department of Industrial Relations, Self Insurance Plans, prior to July 1, 2000. This requires that each member district's Board of Directors adopt a Resolution authorizing the signing of an Application for Certificate of Consent to Self Insure, and that the Application be signed by the person so authorized.

The purpose of this letter is to ask your district to: (1) Adopt a Resolution authorizing the signing of an Application for a Public Entity Certificate of Consent to Self Insure, a copy of which is attached; and (2) cause a partially completed Application for Certificate of Consent to Self Insure to be signed by the person authorized in the Resolution, and return both the Resolution and Application to the SDWCA administrative offices.

These Applications, with the Resolutions attached will then be held in the SDWCA office until after insurance quotations are received for fiscal year 2000-01. If those quotations are not satisfactory to the SDWCA Board of Directors, then the Applications will be filed on behalf of all member districts with the Department of Industrial Relations, Self Insurance Plans, in order to effectuate a return to self insured status.

It is important that your district adopt a form of the attached Resolution and return it to the SDWCA administrative offices at the earliest possible time. Please use the Resolution form enclosed. This is the form suggested by Self Insurance Plans, and it will avoid any problem if we use their form. I suggest that you designate as the position title in the Resolution either the general manager or the Chairperson of the Board of Directors. The person holding that position can then sign the Application for Certificate of Consent to Self Insure on behalf of your district without further action by your Board of Directors. Please remember to complete the certification at the bottom of the Resolution form and send a certified copy of the Resolution to my office.

I am also enclosing a partially completed Application for a Public Entity Certificate of Consent to Self Insure. This Application should be signed by the person authorized in the enclosed Resolution, and should be completed as follows:

- 2. On page 2, leave blank the information concerning the Claims Administrator. If the decision is made to self insure, then the Board will accept proposals from various claims management firms for claims administration. I will complete that information when the Board has made that decision.
- 3. On page 3, fill in the number of agency employees, and the number of public safety officers, if any.
- 4. On page 3, fill in the name of the individual responsible for the District's Injury and Illness Prevention Program.
- 5. At the bottom of page 3 and on page 4, please leave blank the information concerning Supplemental Insurance. I will fill in that information when the Board has made those decisions.
- 6. On page 4, sign the Application and fill in the information under the signature. The District seal should be affixed or the signature should be notarized.

Please return the signed Application and a certified Resolution attached to me at the earliest possible time.

Adoption of this Resolution by your Board of Directors does not constitute a commitment on behalf of your district to maintain its membership in SDWCA in the future, subject to the minimum notice of withdrawal period specified in the Bylaws. If the SDWCA Board elects not to return to self insurance this year and defers that decision until next fiscal year, these Resolutions and Applications will be retained to enable the Authority to expeditiously return to self insurance if necessary for fiscal year 2001-02. If your district should terminate membership in SDWCA prior to that time, your district's Resolution and Application will be destroyed at that time.

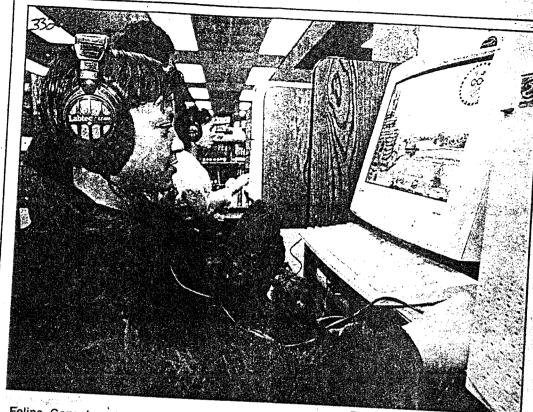

The world's richest man is giving \$56,000 to four Orange County public libraries to increase the public's access to the Internet.

The Board of Supervisors on Tuesday accepted the grant from the Gates Foundation — Microsoft founder Bill Gates' philanthropic organization — to buy six personal computers each for the Costa Mesa, Stanton and Westminster branch libraries and four for the University Park/Irvine facility.

San Juan library gets new technology

Branch gets 22 computers; system gets Gates Foundation Grant

Capistrano Valley News

The library has gotten a technological face-lift.

Twenty-two new Windowsbased computers have been installed in the San Juan branch library. Eight are equipped to surf the Internet, while the remaining 14 are for browsing library records and book collections.

"We recently learned that public libraries are the No. 1 point of online access for people without Internet connections at home, school or work," County Librarian John Adams said. "In keeping with the new information technology, we are working to provide the most up-to-date equipment and expertise."

The new computers provide library users with a more easilyused system to search the library's holdings, and offer features such as best seller lists and a patron profile system to check library records. In addition, more workstations will provide better access to the library's online database subscriptions, which offer a wealth of information on a variety of subjects, including business, health and literature.

"The library has quickly become the hot spot in town!," San Juan Library Manager Renee Welling said. "All of our terminals are busy, patrons are excited about the enhanced services and the number of people checking out reading material has increased overnight."

The Orange County Library system will soon have nearly 400 Windows-based computers installed in its 27 branches.

The library is getting help in its efforts to increase techology, too: The system received a \$56,000 grant from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation to increase public access to computers and the Internet.

The grant is part of \$11 million the Gates Foundation earmarked for public libraries

in California that serve communities at or above the 10 percent poverty level, as determined by the 1990 census, Adams said

Dr. Kevin Staff, the state librarian, said in a written statement that the Gates donation is the most "dramatic intervention by the private sector into public library development" since Andrew Carnegie.

The Orange County money will be used for 22 computers and four printers.

"This funding moves us one step closer to our goal of providing accessible information in all formats to all communities served, and will provide a stronger base on which to continue to build and enhance our library services," Adams said.

Survey determines board's budget priorities ouldn't you like to see your board operate a little bit better? Board Member Dagmar "Woody" Murphy (Albany, NY) tells me that the board's Accountability Committee helps board operations run smoothly.

This committee's mission statement states: "The Accountability Committee serves to assist the board in carrying out its duties in the most effective and efficient manner. The committee annually reviews board operating procedures and committee structure, and makes recommendations to the board for operational change."

The Accountability Committee's major functions include, develop an annual board self-evaluation; review board agenda and operating procedures; review board operating procedures, including committee structure; develop an annual board budget survey; and orientation of new board members.

A good example of the Accountability Committee's work is the survey to determine the board's budget priorities. This annual, confidential, survey is an internal board planning document. It helps the board and administrator create a budget that reflects board members' views and generates full board support for the budget.

There's sound logic at work in asking the board to complete the survey confidentially. Budgets are political. Some board members have difficulties expressing their views openly as the board works out its priorities.

"This survey helps us during the budget process," says Murphy. "For many organizations, passing a budget is a tug of war. Everybody has their priorities."

The survey is completed anonymously by board members. It is not a public document and is discussed in executive session. The Accountability Committee and administrator review and modify a draft of the survey before board members complete it to ensure that it reflects the current goals and priorities of the organization.

When they complete the survey, board members assign a degree of importance on a one to five scale to various items in five categories: 1) Program, 2) Buildings and Grounds, 3) Budget, 4) Transportation and 5) Board Development.

A statement under Buildings and Grounds, for example, reads "Current

level funding for building improvements/maintenance."

Under the "Budget" category, board members are asked to rank their support for initiatives such as increasing user fees for the organization's services, contracting out staff functions like cleaning and data collection, and continuing membership in professional organizations.

"We give board members a time frame to complete and return the survey," says Murphy. "Surveys are returned to me as the chair of the Accountability Committee and I compile the results to share with the board and administrator."

The final document uses rating scales to tell the board where it stands on budget priorities. For each category, the board can see how many board members support the item.

"We find the survey very useful," says Murphy. "There is no point in going after something that is dead in the water, according to survey results. It saves us from spinning our wheels and helps us create a budget that reflects our organization's needs."

Two strategies help board advocate

've always said that a board has four key responsibilities to a nonprofit: 1) Selecting an administrator; 2) Planning; 3) Monitoring the organization's performance; and 4) Serving as an advocate for the organization.

The fourth responsibility, advocacy, is one that I think many boards can do a better job with. Fortunately, it's not that difficult!

Board Chairperson Cheryl S. McFadden (Rock Hill, SC) shares two good

examples that demonstrate the board's commitment to advocacy.

Educational video dispels myths about nonprofit's program

- Communication with state legislators. "Board members write to our state's legislators to communicate the issues that affect our organization and our stance on them," says McFadden. "We feel that by writing personal letters, we can give our elected officials insight and knowledge about the effect of their decisions."
- Develop an educational video about the nonprofit's services and programs. "We're doing this to dispel some of the myths and stereotypes that surround mental health," she says. "The purpose of the tape is educational and we use it during some of our nonprofit's events."

 Here are some other advocacy activities board members can try to spread the word about their nonprofit's mission: Participate in a nonprofit's "speaker's bureau," membership and participation

in local service clubs, attendance at your nonprofit's special events. ■

Sometimes, a board needs to throw out the formalities!

B oard meetings can be pretty cut and dried affairs. After all, they're business meetings. But Board Member Margaret Wheeler (Camden, NJ) makes a good point about mixing in some informal board activities that help build a stronger board.

"We try to do two social meetings each year to help board members get to know each other better," she says. "We only see each other at board meetings, so we build the socials around the board's meetings."

Two examples: The board will have a holiday season dinner (spouses invited) and also schedules a summer picnic. "We have a brief business meeting and then dinner and social time," says Wheeler. "These events help us to get to know each other as people, and not just as board members."

LITIGATION SUCCESSFULLY CHALLENGING ERAF PROPERTY TAX SHIFT County of Sonoma v. Commission on State Mandates et al

Dear Member District:

RE:

As you are aware, beginning in fiscal year 1992-93 the State Legislature shifted property taxes from local governments to schools to close the annual budget gaps faced by the State. The concept of the property tax shift was to shift property taxes from local governments to schools which reduced, on a dollar-for-dollar basis, the amount the State was required to spend for schools pursuant to Proposition 98. These property tax shifts were implemented on a permanent basis so that cities, counties and special districts continue to receive a smaller share of property taxes than they did before the tax shifts, and schools receive a larger share. The property tax shift in the current budget year redirects about \$4 billion of property taxes from local governments to schools, which offsets an equal amount of State education spending.

STATUS OF LEGAL CHALLENGES TO PROPERTY TAX SHIFT

Several legal challenges have been filed to overturn the property tax shift. The grounds alleged by local government for overturning the property tax shift are that: (1) the State lacked the authority under Article XIII A of the State Constitution to reallocate property taxes to increase school funding; and (2) the property tax shifts violated local governments' "home rule" authority provided in the State Constitution. The courts rejected these arguments.

However, a different type of challenge was initiated by the County of Sonoma in December 1997. The County of Sonoma, later joined by most other counties, filed a claim with the Commission on State Mandates, arguing that the property tax shifts represent a reimbursable state mandate. Specifically, Sonoma County argued that the State has historically been responsible for funding the cost of education, and that the passage of Proposition 98 in 1988 mandated the State to contribute a minimum amount from its general fund to fund education. The property tax shift resulted in the State transferring part of its school funding responsibility to local governments by reallocating a portion of property tax revenues back to schools through ERAF's. The ERAF legislation caused the shift in the cost of funding schools by compelling cities, counties and special districts to accept partial financial responsibility for education that was previously funded by the State under the mandate of Proposition 98. The County of Sonoma argued that this practice of compelling local governments to accept financial responsibility for a program that was previously funded by the State constitutes a reimbursable mandate under Article XIII B section 6 of the Constitution.

In November 1998 the Commission on State Mandates issued its decision rejecting the test claim filed by the County of Sonoma and forty-seven other counties. The Commission

Executive Director Catherine Smith If the County of Sonoma is successful on appeal, the specific issue of reimbursement will be returned to the Commission on State Mandates for decision. The regulations governing the procedures of the Commission on State Mandates appear to allow other "interested parties," such as special districts, to file their own claims for reimbursement of shifted property taxes before the Commission.

CSDA will continue to apprise special districts of the status of the litigation and the procedures available to special districts to process their own individual claims for reimbursement before the Commission.
