The Board of Directors of Literacy Volunteers of America-Placentia met on February 28, 1995. Literacy Coordinator Matas and Principal Librarian Ammar attended the meeting.

The effectiveness of the LVA-Placentia affiliate and its relationship with Placentia Library Literacy Services (PLLS) was discussed. A shift has taken place over the years that has changed the literacy program from a volunteer organized and run group to a volunteer tutoring program that is coordinated and guided by a library literacy staff. The LVA affiliate is no longer functioning as an affiliate but as an advisory board. With this in mind, the Board proposed the dissolution of the Affiliate and the formation of some kind of support group that would meet periodically to examine the strengths and weaknesses of PLLS and provide support and guidance to the program.

It was decided that input from the Placentia Library District Board of Trustees should be solicited before any final decision was made about the future of LVA-Placentia.

Literacy Coordinator Matas was asked to investigate the cost of purchasing a computer with CD ROM capabilities for use by the adult learners and their tutors.

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that a condition of financial emergency exists for the District;

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that no local revenues from the General Fund Account be transferred to the Orange County Treasurer until released by Resolution of the Library Board of Trustees when it has deemed the financial emergency to be resolved;

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that the Petty Cash Fund be increased from \$1,000 to \$10,000 for the duration of the condition of financial emergency and until readjusted by Resolution of the Library Board of Trustees.

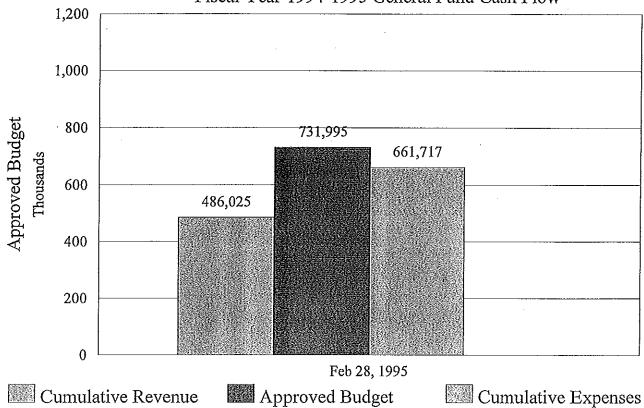

February started with a 50 bp increase in the Fed Funds rate at the conclusion of the January 31 - February 1 FOMC meeting. From that point forward short-term money market rates traded in a very narrow band, with 3-month T-bills moving from a high of 5.89% to a low of 5.68%. The market got a boost in confidence when Alan Greenspan, in his Humphrey-Hawkins testimony to Congress, presented a balanced view on the market and even mentioned the possibility of easing monetary policy for the first time in over a year.

We are enclosing portfolio summaries as of February 28, 1995 for both the prepetition and post-petition portfolios. The OCIP was split into two separate accounts on February 15. We continue to manage the portfolios in a conservative manner, investing in only short-maturity Treasury and government agency securities.

BACKGROUND:

Cash Flow Analysis:

The revised cash flow analysis for the second half of FY1994-1995 is Attachment A. This analysis changes on a weekly basis as new receipt and expenditure information is received.

Bankruptcy:

Library Director Minter attended a meeting of representatives of the independent special districts involved in the Orange County Investment Pool (OCIP) Bankruptcy on March 2, 1995, at the Orange County Water District Headquarters in Fountain Valley.

The settlement proposal was discussed with no new information available. The Committee was asked to seek from the Orange County Supervisors a commitment of security for the balance of the lost investments. It was the strong recommendation of the Investor's Committee Attorney, Patrick Shea, that all members of the OCIP act to reach settlement as quickly as possible so that they can receive the cash that remains in the Pool.

It was announced that because of further analysis of the OCIP that a slight adjustment would be make to the settlement percentages. Agencies with funds in the commingled pool will be getting 76.179% rather than the 77% originally projected. The reason for this adjustment is that there were several agencies with specific/named investment instruments in the Pool and those instruments must be given in their entirety to the purchasing agency.

We anticipate receiving the settlement documents at that time. I will be prepared to review these with the Board at its meeting on March 20, 1995, so that it may determine its response at that time.

Legislative:

Secretary Saundra Stark and Library Director Elizabeth Minter attended a series of meetings in Sacramento on March 13, 1995. Also participating were Board President Robert Niccum and Library Director Colleen McGregor of the Buena Park Library District, and Community Relations Coordinator Nancy Mahr of the Palos Verdes Library District.

Meeting were held with Mike Belote, the Districts' Legislative Representative at California Advocates; Assembly Local Government Chairman Richard Rainey and the Chief Consultant to the Assembly Committee on Local Government, Diane Longshore; and Senate Banking and Finance Chairwoman Lucy Killea and the Chief Consultant to the Senate Committee on Banking and Commerce, Jan Owen. Mrs. Killea is also chairing the hearings on the Orange County bankruptcies.

Petty Cash Accounts:

Administrative Assistant Dumitru will present the results of her analysis of the use of interest bearing checking accounts and money market savings accounts to manage the District's three petty cash checking accounts: General Fund Petty Cash; County Exempt Fund; and Literacy Fund.

SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT APPROVED IN CONCEPT IN OCIP BANKRUPTCY

A settlement in the \$7.6 billion Orange County Investment Pool bankruptcy case was approved in concept today by the seven-member Pool Participants Committee.

"We have agreement on the major deal points," said Stan Oftelie, Chairman of the Orange County Investment Pool Creditors Committee (OCIP) and Chief Executive Officer of the Orange County Transportation Authority.

"Unless we hit a roadblock in the drafting of the actual language this weekend, we should have a settlement agreement to circulate to more than 190 government agencies early next week, " Oftelie said. "It looks like we have a deal to recommend."

The settlement has two options for investing agencies. Each of the options includes the immediate release of \$5.7 billion to schools, cities, water, sanitation and transportation districts and to other pool participants.

"Under Option A, every school district will receive at least 90 cents of its balance now and every other settling agency will receive at least 80 cents now," said OCIP Vice-Chairman Paul Brady, the Irvine City Manager. "The roadmap showing how each agency can reach an 100 percent return has been improved and strengthened. Under Option B, each agency can take its cash share of the December 6 balance and then take its best shot to make its case."

The settlement:

- 1. Recognizes that three distinct investment pools--a commingled pool, a bond pool and a pool for specific investments--existed for accounting purposes;
- 2. Allows each agency to select Option A or Option B. Agencies can either take Option A, which may provide 100% over time, or, select Option B, which gets us approximately 77 cents now and reserves rights to negotiate or litigate outstanding issues;
 - 3. Provides immediate cash to all pool participants;
- 4. For Option A, cash and Recovery Notes get the schools to at least 90 cents, and non-schools to at least 80 cents now;

- 5. Includes "good-as-gold" Recovery Notes for the schools and other settling participants to push schools to at least the 90 percent return level and other agencies to the 80 percent level;
 - 6. Provides claims for future payments;
- 7. Strengthens the Senior Secured Claims backed by litigation proceeds and more clearly specifies how those Claims will be secured;
- 8. Replaces the Subordinated Claims with a new Repayment Claim that has a stronger commitment for repayment from the County of Orange;
- 9. If all Pool Participants opt for Option A, the Recovery Notes are set at \$255 million, the Senior Secured Notes at \$370 million, and Repayment Claims for the balance.
- 10. Requires that 80 percent of the Pool Participants, representing 90% of the amount on deposit on December 6, agree to select either Option A or B.

"Once the OCIP Committee reviews the final legal documents and the accountants final revisions on Monday, we will begin the ratification process for this Settlement Agreement, "Oftelie said.

"Because of the need for proper notice to the Court, it will take at least 45 days to secure the agreements and get court approval for this settlement," said Patrick C. Shea, attorney for the OCIP Committee. "The sooner we can get the agreement into the hands of the Pool Participants and the sooner we can get Executed Agreements back, the sooner we can get cash in their hands.

"When you take a look at the precarious position of some of our constituent agencies," Shea said, "then you can understand our sense of urgency."

The approval of the Settlement Agreement in concept by the OCIP Committee came 92 days after United States Trustee Marcy Tiffany appointed Oftelie, Brady, Blake Anderson of the Orange County Sanitation Districts, Andrew Czorny of the Orange County Water District, Walter Kreutzen of the Transportation Corridor Agencies, Michael Martello of the City of Mountain View and John Nelson of the Department of Education to represent more than 190 OCIP agencies.

The Committee's key professional advisors are Attorney Shea, of Pillsbury Madison and Sutro, and financial advisors M. Freddie Reiss of Price Waterhouse and Jon Schotz of Saybrook Capital.

Property and Professional Liability Insurance Renewals for 1994-1995

BACKGROUND:

The District's property and liability insurance broker, Shipkey Insurance Agency, Inc., has solicited bids from four carriers for the District's 1995-1996 coverage. A copy of Shipkey's report is Attachment A.

The 1995-1996 renewal rate with Employer's Mutual, the current carrier, including both property and public officials/professional liability, is \$1,373 lower than the current year. This policy includes a cost of living increase in the coverage for the library materials collection (3% or \$12,000), increasing the computer data and software coverage from \$27,174 to \$40,000, and the addition of employee benefits liability coverage with limits of \$500,000.

The recommendation also includes the \$1,000,000 umbrella coverage which was added last year.

No items were deleted from last year's coverage.

Tom Shipkey, President of Shipkey Insurance, will be present at the meeting to answer any questions about the proposed coverage and the policies.

Payment of the insurance policy needs to be processed before April 1, 1994. Claim 3252 in the amount of \$ 11,829.75 is Attachment B.

- 1. Your personal property values (excluding books) were increased 3% or \$12,000 to cover inflation costs.
- 2. Computer Data and Media (software) values were increased from \$27,174 to \$40,000 to cover your CD-ROM collection.
- 3. Employee Benefits Liability was added with limits of \$500,000. This gives you errors and omissions protection in the area of employee benefits, such as not adding an eligible employee to your group health or life insurance and there is a subsequent claim.

Your Directors and Officers policy specifically excludes liability arising out of your ERISA Act duties and responsibilities. Therefore, there is no duplication of coverage.

We did obtain three other quotes but Employers Mutual (EMC) was substantially lower. Even with the above increases in coverage, they are \$1,373.00 lower than last year. EMC is an "A" rated carrier and have insured your account for the past 12 years.

We value your account highly and have worked hard in an effort to reduce your premium, especially in light of the County's financial problems. I have been your insurance agent for the past twenty-six years and appreciate your fine business.

O.C. pension plan loses \$55 million

PENSIONS: Retirement system says 2.29 percent loss won't hurt its ability to pay benefits.

The Orange County Employees Retirement System lost \$55 million on investments last year because of a weak bond market and the county's investment debacle.

Retirement officials say the just-compiled 1994 loss — the first since the system's accounting system began in 1984 — will not hurt its ability to serve the 24,000 who rely on its services.

The \$2.49 billion fund provides retirement benefits for 18,000 active workers and 6,000 employees of county and county-related agencies and a handful of local operations as diverse as workers for the city of San Juan Capistrano and UCI Medical Center.

Like most pension funds, the retirement system uses professional money managers — 36 at this point — to invest in a diversified portfolio that includes stocks, bonds and real estate.

The system says its strategy is a long-term outlook that takes losses in stride. The retirement system plans no change in its managers or its allocation of money to types of investments, retirement system investment analyst Terry Slattery said.

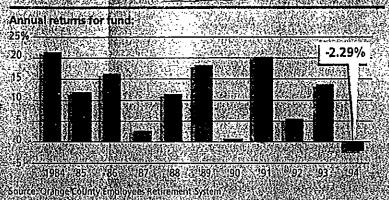

knock you down now and then," Slattery said. "We just got beat up by the markets last year."

The 1994 loss equalled 2.29 percent of the fund's assets. As a comparison, the average balanced mutual-fund lost 2.2 percent, according to Lipper Analytical of New Jersey. The system's managers blamed the loss on two key areas:

- The system had \$122 million in the county's ill-fated investment pool. It took a \$35 million loss on its 1994 books but is likely to recoup some of those losses as the county lowers loss estimates for pool depositors.
- ► The bad bond market, which killed the county investment pool, also hurt the retirement system. Its bond managers, who control 38 percent of the fund, lost about \$34 million last year.

"It was a very difficult year; the numbers don't surprise me,"

said Charles Rother, an investment analyst from Los Alamitos.

The system's 1994 performance was beaten by 80 percent of 158 pension funds tracked by Callan Associates of Denver, the retirement system's independent fund consultant. In the past 11 years, the system averaged a 10.7 percent profit — trailing 65 percent of the funds watched by Callan.

A controversial \$320 million bond sale by the county last year dramatically improved the pension fund's financial underpinning. Unfortunately for the system, \$65 million of that money was parked with the Orange County treasurer when the county filed bankruptcy Dec. 6.

Bond proceeds paid much of what the county owes the system for current and future pension needs. Experts have questioned whether the county took on too many risks to pay off that debt.

SIZZUNG SESSION

The Legislature convened a special session Friday, and it opened with some political fireworks from Speaker Willie Brown.

The powerful Democrat said Orange County ought to raise its sales tax before expecting significant help from the state. Brown also suggested that the county's interest in privatization should include the notion that the El Toro Marine Corps Air Station be turned into a prison.

Brown also named a special committee to look into the bankruptcy. Brown ally Assemblywoman Marguerite Archie-Hudson, D-Los Angeles, was named head of the 18-member panel, which includes the entire Orange County delegation. Archie-Hudson's colleagues on the committee are: Bill Morrow, R-Oceanside; Bruce Thompson, R-Fallbrook; Curt Pringle, R-Garden ty." Grove; Jim Morrisey; R-Santa Ana; Ross Johnson, R-Fullerton; Tl Mickey Conroy, R-Orange; of M Marilyn Brewer, R-Irvine; Doris R-Cypress; Richard Rainey, R-Walnut Creek; Kevin Murray, D-Los Angeles; Diane Martinez, D-Monterey Park; Antonio Villaraigosa, D-Los Angeles; Sheila Kuehl, D-Santa Monica; Mike Sweeney, D-Hayward; Byron Sher, D-Palo Alto; Richard Katz, D-Panorama City; John Burton, D-San Francisco. .

SUPERVISORS CRITICIZED

On Thursday, in a Senate hearing on the bankruptcy, a bond lawyer hired by the county said county officials did not inform in-

vestors or creditors of trouble for nearly two weeks after learning that the treasurer's investment pool had lost \$1.5 billion and was in risk of collapse. Jean Costanza, the county's longtime private bond counsel, told senators that a New York analyst told her and top county officials in mid-November that the \$7.4 billion fund had taken a staggering loss and would collapse unless creditors and depositors could be persuaded to sit fight in hopes that interest rates would fall.

The senators were sharply critical of the Board of Supervisors for failing to exercise oversight and civil servants for usurping the roles of elected officials. Sen. Rob Hurtt, R-Garden Grove, said the civil servants should be canned, "Why are any of those guys still there? Why haven't they either quit, resigned or been fired? ... There is a cadre, a posse ... of top department people who pretty much ran the county."

The senators were also critical of Merrill Lynch for not informing other elected officials when Treasurer Robert Citron failed to heed nine documented warnings that his strategy was overly risky. Merrill officials said they fulfilled their obligation by persuading Citron to include risk discussions in his 1993 annual report.

MORE OPTIONS

It was also revealed last week that the county's bankruptcy filing may not have been necessary. The consulting firm that discovered the \$2 billion loss in the Orange County investment pool presented a "platter of alternatives!" to bankruptcy, but its advice was ignored.

"They couldn't get people to listen," said David Grant, a lawyer representing Capital Markets Risk Advisors. "The company was able to arrange dealings with various brokers who were prepared to orderly liquidate the pool. They were offering solutions. They were ignored."

POLITICAL FALLOUT

More political fallout from the bankruptcy became apparent last week. Fullerton City Councilman Chris Norby and state Assemblyman Mickey Conroy, R-Orange, decided to oppose Supervisor Gaddi Vasquez in the March 1996 GOP primary.

FOR SALE

A couple of privatization proposals surfaced this past week. The Los Angeles-based Reason Foundation rolled out a pian Wednesday at the Orange County Forum and acting Treasurer Tom Daxon also floated a plan to sell assets. A key provision of both plans: no tax increases.

Elected Official's Little Handbook: A Portable Guide For Local Government Legislators

Elected Officials often enter the political arena with spirit and enthusiasm, a pocketful of ideas, and little training in the day-to-day processes they must work through to get things done. Many have other full-time jobs that demand their attention, and yet the minute they are sworn in, they have reams of paper to read, a new set of people to deal with, skills to be learned, and new roles to play.

In the Elected Official's Little Handbook, Len Wood tries to ease the transition from private citizen to productive elected official by presenting in outline form a handy guide to such mundane topics as agendas, staff interaction with the elected body, open meeting laws, dealing with reporters, and the elected official's responsibilities.

The guide is divided into sections called Roles, Duties, Meetings, Teamwork, and Political Savvy. The text is short and peppered with quotations. It provides advice, explanations, and checklists and could quickly become the "security blanket" for the new official, who must shed campaign rhetoric and work with a

whole new set of procedures to get things done.

The Portable Guide answers such basic questions — the kind that people sometimes feel silly asking — as how do I control a meeting when the crowd has turned ugly, how do I get something on the agenda, and how do I unearth a colleague's hidden agenda? It helps the new elected official define his or her role with colleagues and appointed bodies and offers helpful questions that can be asked during budget sessions and other meetings that are typical of all agencies.

This is the third in a series of how-

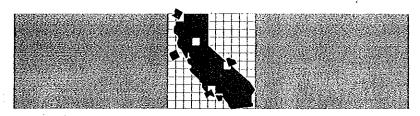

Flood, Fire, Quake Districts' Role in Natural

Disasters

Beaumont-Cherry Valley Water District

Note: This is the last in this series on special district participation in natural disasters throughout California. Beaumont-Cherry Valley Water District is located near the Mojave Desert region of Southern California. The article was submitted by C.J. Butcher, general manager of the district.

he Beaumont-Cherry Valley Water District is an irrigation district originally formed in 1919. The District's service Area is located in the San Gorgonio Pass midway between the cities of Palm Springs and San Bernardino. The District has 5800 active water services which are primarily residential, with a small amount of agricultural and commercial/industrial. The source of water for the service to the District comes from 22 groundwater wells which are the District's only source of supply as there are no emergency connections to other



water systems, or connections to imported supplies. The District's source of supply (wells), reservoir system and distribution system are operated through an automated telemetry system, incorporating the use of both radio and telephone communication to the central control.

Although the District is located near the Mojave Desert, it is not

Rancho Simi R & P Honored

Rancho Simi Recreation and Park District officials recently received a Design for Excellence Program Award and a cash rebate for energy efficiency in the design of the Rancho Santa Susana Community Center. The award and a check for \$16,372.35 was presented to district General Manager Jerry Gladden by Southern California Edison during the October 20, 1995 board of directors' meeting.

In addition to the rebate, the district will save 48 KWH in demand charges each month and over 95,000 KWH's per year in energy costs. Between the lowered demand charges and annual KWH's of use, it is anticipated that the district will save \$10,000 annually in energy costs at the new Center.

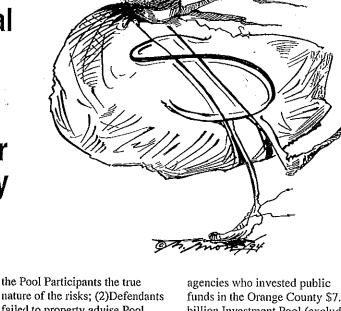

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First Lawsuit by an Orange County Pool Participant

Filed in Federal **Court Against** Merrill Lynch, Citron and Stameson over Orange County Debacle



n January 9, 1995, a class action lawsuit (U.S. District Court, Central District (Santa Ana Division) Case No. SA CV 95-23 GLT (EEX)) was filed by a public agency, the Schools Excess Liability Fund, on behalf of itself and all other public entities investing in the Orange County Pools (except Orange County public entites) except Orange County itself, Orange County pool participants, against Merrill Lynch, Pierce, Fenner & Smith, Inc., Michael Stamenson and Robert L Citron for federal and state securities violations, fraud, negligence, negligent misrepresentations and breach of fiduciary duty.

The class action complaint the first filed on behalf of the 187 pool participants - alleges that the defendants recklessly gambled with public money by investing in high risk, volatile derivatives which were excessively leveraged and not adequately hedged against loss. Among other claims, the complaint alleges that: (1) Defendants failed to disclose to

nature of the risks; (2)Defendants failed to property advise Pool Participants in 1994 that their investment funds were so highly leveraged that the already substantial risks of investing in derivates were dramatically increased; (3) Defendants knew, as early as May 1994, of the extreme volatility of the derivative securities; (4) Defendants knew, as early as August 1993, the Orange County Treasurer's Office was operating without internal controls, which enabled Merrill Lynch effectively to direct and control the investment policy of the pool; (5) Merrill Lynch and Orange County engaged in a number of unusual transactions which were apparently designed to assist Merrill Lynch to meet certain financial statement ratios required by the Securities and Exchange Commission; and (6) even while Merrill Lynch designed this high risk investment strategy it protected itself against loss and reaped in excess of \$80 million in fees,

The proposed class consists of the approximately 187 municipal

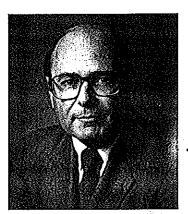
funds in the Orange County \$7.5 billion Investment Pool (excluding Orange County, itself.) Unlike the previously filed lawsuits brought on behalf of the Orange County bondholders - the class member plaintiffs in this action assert direct claims arising from the defendants; investment scheme. According to the complaints, at the same time the defendants were engaging in increasingly risky use of the pool participants' funds, they repeatedly downplayed the risk associated with the financial activities of the investment pool,

The class action complaint, filed in the Central District of California (Santa Ana Divison), asserts claims under federal and state securities laws and common laws claims, and seeks compensatory and punitivie damages, as well as certification of the class.

The lawsuit is being handled by Lieff, Cabraser & Heimann (San Francisco), Marlin & Saltzman (Orange) and Kronick, Moskovitz, Tiedemann & Girard (Sacramento.) 3

In the Capitol

This article is being written on January 23, 1995, and as of this date, the Assembly is still negotiating relative to the details of a power-sharing agreement. I have no prediction as to when an agreement will be reached, or what details the final agreement will include.

"A Republican Agenda for 1995"

n a letter, dated December
19, 1994, Senate Republican
Caucus Chairman Bill
Leonard distributed a
memorandum to Republican
members of the Senate and
Assembly titled, "A Republican
Agenda for 1995." The document
contains what Senator Leonard
described as "a list of legislative
ideas in the issue areas of major
concern to us and to all Californians."

In the section titled, "State/ Local Fiscal Realignment," a number of proposals are of great interest to special districts. Allow me to cite four specific items:

(1) The State should roll back that portion of the property tax

shifts that were not backfilled with the Proposition 172 funds. The return of property tax revenues, to be phased-in over several years, should be financed with cuts in state programs.

- (2) The Legislature should clarify the intent and application of Proposition 13 by adopting legislation to require two-thirds votes on all new special taxes, and prohibit the use of benefit assessments for raising general taxes.
- (3) The Legislature should begin immediate negotiations with local governments on the implementation of these proposals. Constitutional reforms, such as controlling the Legislature's ability to shift revenues and impose mandates, should be specifically addressed.
- (4) To hasten the completion of these negotiations, the Legislature should adopt, no later than April 1, 1995, a modified version of Senate Bill 1234. That legislation should do the following:
- (a) Sequester all state revenues on July 1, 1996, unless substantive reforms are adopted.
- (b) Establish a commission for negotiating reforms.
- (c) Establish a timetable for completion of the reforms and introduction of the statutes carrying the long-term reforms.

This section further states:
"The budget shortfalls at the local level are caused in part by reduced state funding, but a major contributing factor is unfunded state mandates. The Legislature must work during the 1994-95 legislative session to give more flexibility and discretion to local governments." (Note: While the sentence above refers to the "1994-1995 legislative session," I believe it should have read the 1995-96 legislative session.)

"A full examination of the state-local fiscal relationship is

long overdue. The Legislature must decide what functions local governments should be responsible for and give them the tools to perform their duties. Without comprehensive reform, the battle between the state and local governments for revenue will continue."

There is much in this document that special districts can agree with, as well as a number of items that raise serious concerns. As I have suggested many times over the past three years (some think too many), changes in the state/ local government relationship are inevitable, and the proposals continued in the Republican Agenda, as well as others that will emerge, present special districts and all other entities of local government the opportunity to confront this challenge of change in a comprehensive, open and direct manner. We can afford to do nothing less.

On the subject of legislation of interest to special districts, the deadline for bill introduction this year is February 24. As of this writing, there have been few bills introduced of primary interest to CSDA, a fact that I suspect will change as the February 24 deadline approaches. A number of bills have been introduced relating to local agency investment matters resulting from the Orange County disaster. We are in the process of reviewing each bill and will report on their contents in next month's report.

Let me close with a short commercial for this year's CSDA Legislative Day, which is scheduled for May 1. It is very important for you and your district to participate in Legislative Day, and equally important for you to be part of the special district presence in the State Capitol. As I have said many times, if your legislator does not know you and understand your issues, how can you expect him or her to be of

assistance? Please make every effort to attend Legislative Day on May 1. \(\)

actually a desert community. The District has more of a foothill type setting, with service elevations ranging from 2500 feet above sea level to 4300 feet in the northern areas of the District.

To set the scenario for what occurred on November 2, 1993, the reader needs to further understand weather conditions that prevail in the fall of a given year. Since the District is located in a mountain pass area, the community is affected by Santa Ana wind conditions that can occur, with velocities up to 60 mph in an east to west direction. The Repplier fire which occurred November 2, consuming about 8000 acres, occurred during a moderate Santa Ana condition, with wind gusts up to 40 mph. The fire was the fifth major fire to occur in the Southern California area in approximately two weeks, originating from a downed power line in the neighboring community of Banning, situated east of the District.

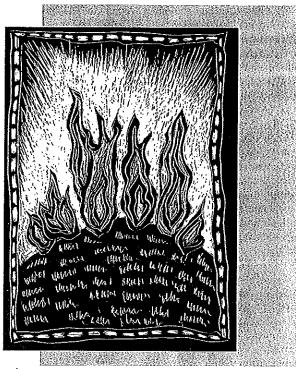
In the Morning

n the morning of November 2, one of the District's personnel reported sighting smoke in the upper elevations of the District. This turned out to be a small brush fire which had been set in the northern most field of the District near Oak Glen. Following that report, District personnel reported sighting smoke in the Banning area which was the beginning of the Repplier fire. District personnel concentrated on the Oak Glen fire since it was on District property and it was contained by 11:00 a.m. at about 60 acres.

The Repplier fire was quite large by this time and moving toward the District's service area driven by the east/west Santa Ana winds. The California Division of Forestry called for the evacuation of the approximately 2700 residential units in the Cherry Valley area. By the time the Repplier fire had approached the

service area, there were over 120 fire fighting vehicles in the area with more on the way. Immediately in the past of the oncoming fire was a mobile home development consisting of approximately 800 units. As the fire approached the mobile home park, 60 pieces

moving, four reservoir sites and fourteen well sites, as well as two District owned residences, were in the fire's path. Due to the chaotic conditions that prevailed at that time, with mass evacuation and the fire burning in the foothill region, management of the District placed a spotter on a ridge line approximately 2 miles north and west of the fire to track its progress. Personnel rapidly and effectively readied the District's



of fire fighting equipment had been deployed within the park in CDF's attempt to protect the dwelling units. The firefighters were successful in defending their position at the mobile home park and no dwelling units were lost or damaged.

On the Move

he fire however did continue around the perimeter of the mobile home park, moving west. Power and communication to the reservoir serving that portion of the Cherry Valley Pressure Zone was in fact interrupted due to the fire, with the fire completely surrounding the reservoir site. Because of the fire's rapid approach to the District's service area, and the direction in which the fire was

system for the oncoming fire, using District and contract equipment to wet down well houses and residences in hopes of protecting them from the oncoming fire. The District had also opened a line of communication with Southern California Edison Company to prepare for an immediate response to the affected areas of the District's system, as it related to power, so those systems could be brought back on line as quickly as possible. As the fire progressed westward to the middle areas of the Cherry Valley foothills, a second reservoir site was encircled in flames. By this stage of the fire, there were approximately 160 pieces of fire fighting equipment within the service area of the Beaumont-Cherry Valley Water District using water from the District's

system creating a demand that was 7 times greater than the previous summer peak. The water system continued to function throughout the fire, with the exception of remote power failure at given locations, spreading the demand and managing reservoir levels based on the demand.

The fire was now burning in the easterly portion of the District's watershed lands and the adjacent large-lot custom home residential areas. In preparation for the fire moving into the western area of the District, District personnel were directed to place all automated systems in the District's well field located in the western portion of the District's. watershed on manual, as well as activating all internal combustion stand-by units at the District's well in preparation of power failure. The California Division of Forestry was success in stopping the fire along the western edge of the District's watershed area but it was still moving in a north to northeast direction, away from the District's well field and watershed lands and into the National Fore

Under Control

y 8:00 p.m. on November 2, system demands had greatly reduced, all of the District's systems, wells, reservoirs, automated values, were in full operation. Half of the District's personnel was released to go home but were required to return at 3:00 a.m. to relieve the other personnel that remained with the intent of staying at 50% of staff, until the California Division of Forestry had the fire fully under control. Water levels in the District's reservoir in the immediate area of the fire never dropped below 50% of their capacity. Lower pressure zones retained a level of 80% of capacity. Although the District had two reservoir sites that were completely surrounded by flames during the fire, the District being aware of the fire danger that exists in our area, had an active weed abatement program which enabled us to come through the fire without any structural damage occurring to any of the District's facilities.

Legal Alert

New Law Changes Disclosure Requirements, Applies to Special Districts

B 1542, effective January 1, 1995, establishes new restrictions on gifts to public officials and stiffens disclosure requirements. Prior to AB 1542, acceptance by a local elected office holder of gifts or honoraria over \$1,000 in value as a misdemeanor, and voting on ecisions affecting the donor of

such gift was prohibited when the

gift's value exceeded \$250.

With the passage of AB 1542, which amends Section 89501 and adds Sections 53065.5 and 82048.5 to the California Government Code, locally elected office holders are prohibited from accepting gifts over \$250 in value. Violation of this prohibition is a misdemeanor. In addition, the prohibition now applies also to members of governing boards of special districts and designated

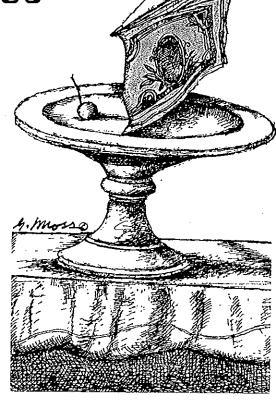
employees of local government agencies. Thus, members of special districts and designated employees of local government agencies must be very careful not to accept gifts from any single source totaling more than \$250 in any calendar year. If they do, they could be convicted of a misdemeanor and potentially prohibited from running for public office for up to four years.

The new law also requires each special district, as defined in Section 82048.5, to disclose any reimbursement paid by it within the immediately preceding fiscal year of at least \$100 for each individual charge for services or product received, in a document published or printed at least annually and made available for public inspection. The term "special district" as used in this new law is defined to mean "any

agency of the state established for the local performance of governmental or proprietary functions within limited boundaries," expressly including "a county service area, an improvement district or zone, an air pollution control district, or a

redevelopment agency," and not including cities, counties, or school districts.

SEC Update

n November 10, 1994, the Securities and Exchange Commission adopted amendments to its Rule 15c2-12 nat will require issuers of municipal securities or other obligors to provide continuing annual disclosure of key financial and operating data and timely disclosure of certain material events whenever they occur. The new requirements apply to municipal securities sold on and after July 3, 1995, but annual financial disclosure will commence only for fiscal years ending after January 1, 1996. Except for

certain limited circumstances this will affect all special district issuers including participants in the CSDA Finance Corporation.

The changes impose a requirement that the issuer must annually disclose certain financial information and occurrence of certain events, and to promise to do so in the trust indenture, bond resolution or some other documents which is enforceable by bondholders. This promise, referred to as a "contractual"

undertaking," must include certain information, including specifying the accounting principles which will be used for the financial statements and whether they will be audited, as well as the date in each year by which the financial information for the preceding fiscal year will be provided.

Official Statements of obligations issues sold on or after July 5, 1995 will also be required to obtain a

From the Loss Control Officer

Bloodborne Pathogens

The two most serious "bloodborne pathogens" include acquired immune deficiency syndrome (AIDS) and the Hepatitis-B viruses. Much publicity has been afforded the AIDs virus due to its almost always fatal result, but Hep-B can be almost as deadly and is 100 times more communicable than AIDS. Hep-B, as in other strains of hepatitis, attacks the liver, but is fatal in about 25% of chronic cases. Virtually all survivors of chronic Hep-B infection will remain contagious carriers as long as they live.

Employees who may be exposed to bloodborne pathogens, such as paid or volunteer firefighters, need to become aware of the risk of day to day occupational health hazards, particularly those involving treatment of the injured. Also, any employee certified in first aid and CPR should be trained in prevention of bloodborne disease transmission.

New Employee Training

A training area which is all too often overlooked is initial safety training of new hires. Although your Illness and Injury Program requires training of new employees and training of all employees whenever new elements are introduced in the workplace it is very easy to hand a shovel to a new worker, but forget to ask if the new workers knows what to do with the shovel.

Make sure all new hires are thoroughly informed as to the safety requirement so each job they are expected to perform, as well as other employment related requirements, before they are handed that "shovel." Also, insure that all training steps taken with new employees are documented and added to the employee's personnel file, just as they should be for regular safety meetings.

Ergonomics

The recent fervor over ergonomics standards has died down somewhat with the Legislature's failure to pass enabling legislation. This does not mean that ergonomics will not become a regulations issue in the future or that the topic should be forgotten.

Ergonomic related injuries are known by several names, the most commong being cumulative trauma disorders. The cause of these injuries is stress to various parts of the body brought about by repetitive strain. Office workers are the most likely to suffer these types of injury within special districts.

Employers should identify workers who may be at risk of injuries caused by repetitive activities and provide whatever equipment is required to lessen that risk.

Non-Owned Autos

We periodically receive inquires about coverages for employees and Board members that drive their personal vehicles on district business or to/from Board meetings. Before discussing this, we note that each district is strongly encouraged to have a policy to ensure that anyone driving on behalf of the district or traveling to Board meetings has a valid drivers license and carries at least minimum liability coverage.

SDRMA's Package Program (Memorandum of Coverages includes coverage for members' non-owned or hired autos.

Vehicle coverage usually falls into two lines of coverage: liability (for bodily injury and third party loss) and physical damage (comprehensive and collision).

Under SDRMA's Memorandum the liability coverage is provided as primary for member vehicles, and secondary for nonmember (i.e. employees, volunteers, officers, and directors) vehicles. Therefore, on liability claims against owners of nonmember vehicles, the owner's coverage is primary. Finally, physical damage to non-member vehicles is not covered under the Memorandum.

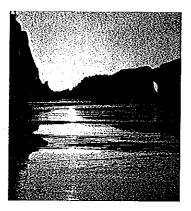

or any notice of material events, will therefore require careful review under applicable securities law standards in order to avoid liability on the part of the entity making the disclosure.

The new Rule also contains a new paragraph, effective January 1, 1996, that will prohibit a broker, dealer, or municipal securities dealer from recommending the purchase or sale of a tax-exempt security unless it has procedures in place that provide reasonable assurance that it will receive promptly any event notices with respect to that security. This is a milder form of the SEC's original proposal, which brought vigorous opposition from many market participants, that dealers have to examine the annual reports before recommending a security for purchase.

description of the contractual undertaking and bond purchase contracts will have to include representations to the underwriter that the undertaking has been made.

In addition to the promise to

provide annual financial informa-

tion, the changes require an

undertaking to provide timely

notice to information repositories if any one of eleven categories of events occurs and is deemed material. The list of events focuses mostly on objective events which are important to the market, such as defaults, draws on reserves, changes in credit enhancements, redemptions, and defeasance. It is not totally clear yet whether other information not included on the list is also equired. However, it is essential .o recognize that the release of . information intended for investors must be accurate and complete.
